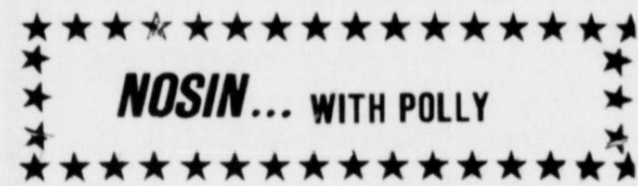

Charles Jones Resigns As County Clerk

Charles Jones, County Clerk of Lamb County for the past 14 years resigned his position in the Lamb County Courthouse, Wednesday to become manager of the Producers Co-op Gins, in Amherst. Jones' resignation will become effective on May 31.

Jones was hired as manager of the Gins at 10 o'clock Tuesday night during a business meeting of the directors. He will replace Clarence Black who resigned his position with the Gins and will leave (today) Thursday to take over management of the Rainbow Lodge at Valacita Lake, Colorado.

Jones submitted his resignation to the Commissioners Court at a regular meeting at 10 a. m. Wednesday. The resignation was approved at that time. Jones will remain on the job throughout the month of May to allow commissioners time to

appoint a new clerk, before taking over his position with the Gins.

His resignation to the Court read as follows: I must advise you that I have been hired as manager of the Producers Co-op Gins, in Amherst.

Therefore, I must submit to you my resignation as County Clerk of Lamb County, effective May 31, 1969.

I wish to extend my sincere appreciation to you The Commissioners Court of Lamb County, to each and every court official and court employee for your friendship and courteous extended to me throughout these years.

My Sincere Thanks to all the people of Lamb County for the support and encouragement that you have given me as County Clerk for the past 14 years.

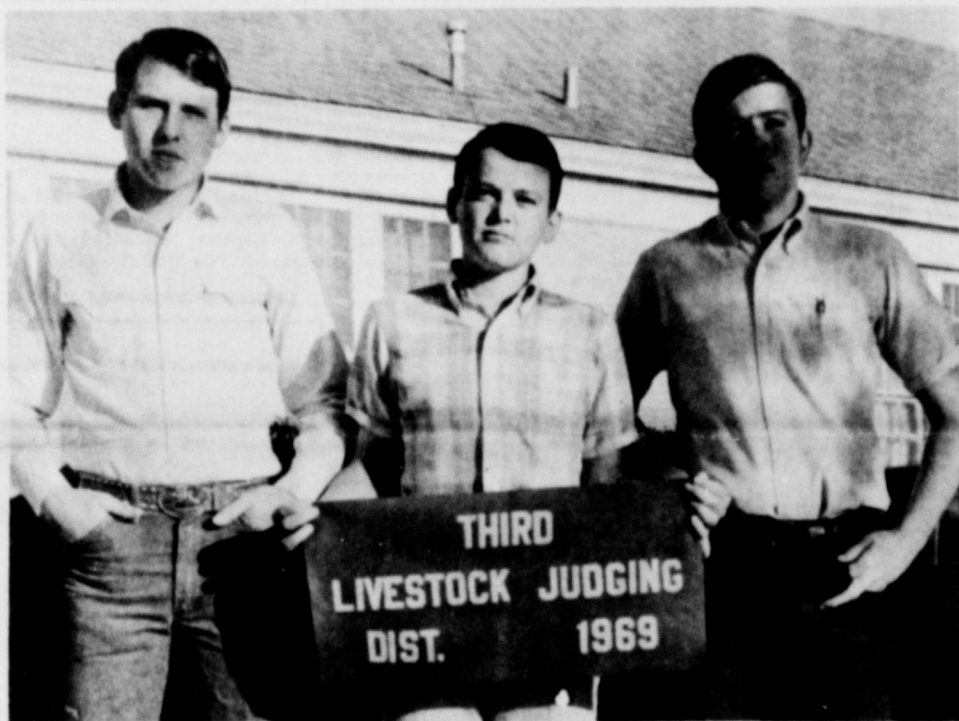
The band was awarded the Sweepstakes trophy after having received first divisions in concert, sightreading Thursday and the marching competition, which was held last fall.

Proceeds from the day's activities will be used to help defray the cost of the Six Flags Festival Trip May 7 - 10.

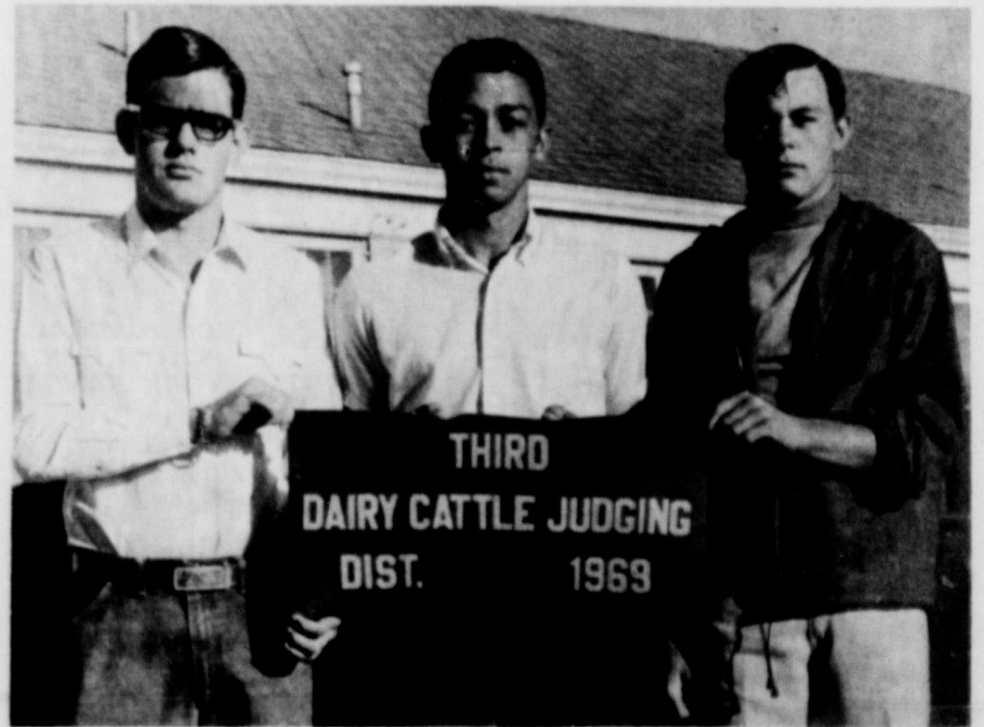

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

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Area Young Homemakers Meet In Plainview For Activity Day

"Mod Podge," "Counter that Cooks," "By-Products of Castor Oil," and "Parenthood" were the topics of discussion at the Area Young Homemakers' Activity Day, April 25 at Plainview's Holiday Inn.

Gwen Edwards and Mary Stewart, owners of Village Craft Corner in Lubbock, demonstrated the various uses of mod podge, a texturing material used to

decorate purses and other wooden surfaces. It is a water soluble material, and would make a wonderful children's craft. Using the supplies available at their shop, the ladies demonstrated the steps necessary to make a mod podge purse in an afternoon's time. They also introduced cold ceramics, which requires no fixing and may also

be completed in one afternoon. Nunn Electric of Lubbock supplied the materials for Josephine Blanch to demonstrate the new counter-top cooking and the "cook mates" dishes. Counter-top cooking is easy to keep clean, has 4 thermostat controls, and can be used as either a cooking area or a counter. It is made of Corning's Pyroceram brand glass-ceramic material. The "Cook-mates," also by Corning, are ground and polished exceptionally flat so that the heat goes directly into the food, assuring even, consistent cooking. They can be used on the table and then go directly to the refrigerator or freezer.

After a buffet lunch, courtesy of the sponsoring electric cooperatives, Wayne Martin, manager of Plains Cooperative Oil Mill, Plainview spoke on the production and uses of castor oil. 40,000 tons of the castor bean were grown in this area last year, producing 20,000 tons of castor oil. The U.S.A. is the largest consumer of castors, with the only U.S. castor mill in this area. Paints and varnishes, and plastics are the two main industrial uses of castor

oil, with other uses in such areas as insulation and cosmetics.

"Parenthood" was the subject chosen by Clark Ellzey, Professor of Home and Family Life at Texas Tech. This most enjoyable and enlightening talk pointed out the nine romantic illusions of parenthood: 1. You always love your children; 2. Anyone who is capable to have children is capable of raising them. In this area, people overvalue individual experience; 3. Parental love is always wonderful. This dealt with the nature of the love. The daughter-father love is very significant when the child is between 2 and 5 years old, because this is the time she forms her impression of all men. The relationship becomes evident in a young girl's reaction to boys when she reaches puberty; 4. A child won't change the parents' lives much. Mothers must be very careful not to invest their whole self in motherhood; 5. Children will hold a marriage together; 6. Our child is ours in the sense of ownership. Don't forget they belong to themselves and their Creator; 7. If you spare the rod you'll spoil the child. A child must realize if he goes too far he will be met with force; 8.

all delinquency comes from broken homes; 9. Once a parent, always a parent. Parents must be willing to turn loose. They must turn an irresponsible dependent child into a responsible independent adult.

Mr. Ellzey continued by giving the 4 basic motivations for a child's being bad: (1) attention (2) involvement in a power struggle, such as parent against parent, (3) revenge and (4) giving up. Love and discipline are essential. Love as nourishment for the soul and discipline, to obtain respect. Encouragement is one of the most influential corrective devices, since this modern, achievement-oriented culture makes failure terrifying. Mr. Ellzey recommended the "Theory of Logical Consequences" as a means of discipline. "A child can't be taught to take responsibilities unless it's given to him."

NUMBER THREE ON THE BALLOT (SJR31)

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 24, Article III, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows:

"Section 24. The Lieutenant Governor and the Speaker of the House of Representatives shall each receive from the Public Treasury an annual salary in an amount to be fixed by the Legislature, not to exceed one-half the annual salary of the Governor. Each other member of the Legislature shall receive a salary fixed by the Legislature, not to exceed one-half the salary of the Governor; providing that the Legislature shall fix the salary of the other members, not to exceed that received by a district judge from state funds; and removing the 120-day limitation on per diem for regular sessions."

PUBLIC NOTICE
Proposed **CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT**
NUMBER FOUR ON THE BALLOT (SJR6)

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 2, Article VIII, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows:

"Section 2. All occupation taxes shall be equal and uniform upon the same class of subjects within the limits of the authority levying the tax; but the legislature may, by general laws, exempt from taxation public property used for public purposes; all real and personal property owned by a nonprofit water supply corporation which is reasonably necessary for, and is used in, operation of the corporation in the acquisition, storage, transportation and sale of water as authorized as its sole legal purpose; actual places of (of) religious worship, also any property owned by a church or by a strictly religious society for the exclusive use as a dwelling place for the ministry of such church or religious society, and which yields no revenue whatever to

such church or religious society; provided that such exemption shall not extend to more property than is reasonably necessary for a dwelling place and in no event more than one acre of land; places of burial not held for private or corporate profit; all buildings used exclusively and owned by persons or associations of persons for school purposes and the necessary furniture of all schools and property used exclusively and reasonably necessary in conducting any association engaged in promoting the religious, educational and physical development of boys, girls, young men or young women operating under a state or national organization of like character; also the endowment funds of such institutions of learning and religion not used with a view to profit; and when the same are invested in bonds or mortgages, or in land or other property which has been and shall hereafter be bought in by such institutions under foreclosure sales made to satisfy or protect such

bonds or mortgages, that such exemption of such land and property shall continue only for two years after the purchase of the same at such sale by such institutions and no longer, and institutions of purely public charity; and all laws exempting property from taxation other than the property above mentioned shall be null and void."

Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in August, 1969, at which election all ballots shall have printed on them the following:

"FOR the Constitutional amendment to exempt nonprofit water supply corporations from taxation," and

"AGAINST the Constitutional amendment to exempt nonprofit water supply corporations from taxation."

Section 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election, and this amendment shall be published in the manner and for the length of time required by the Constitution and laws of this state.

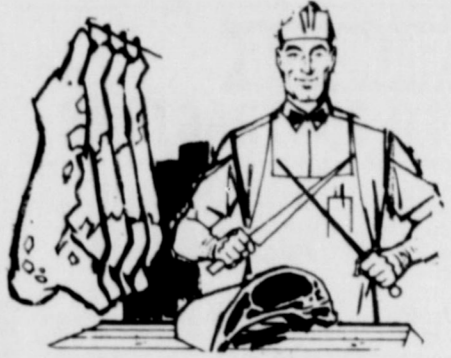

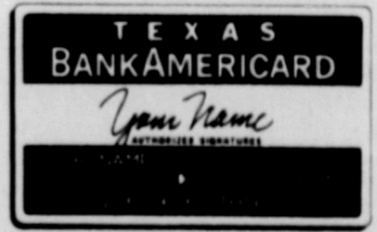
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
