## Springlake-Earth Band Wins Sweepstakes At Region Meet

The University Interscholastic League sight reading and concert contests for A and B schools were held Friday, April 2 in Seagraves. Springlake's 104 piece band, competing with 13 other class A schools, composing Region I, won Sweepstakes. The two divisions, sight reading and concert, completed a three-part contest, as Springlake had previously completed the marching division in Lubbock. A band must be first in all three to earn Sweepstakes. Four bands out of 13 in Class A who won firsts in all three divisions were Hale Center, Springlake, Seagraves, and Petersburg. There were two out of thirteen last year, Hale Center and Springlake.



SPRINGLAKE-EARTH BAND WINS SWEEPSTAKES for the second year in a row, setting a record unexcelled by any previous Springlake School Band in history. The 108 member band received this coveted honor under the direction of band instructor, Dean Foshee. Shown with the beautiful trophy is Pruda Kay Sanders, band favorite, and instructor, Dean Foshee.

Each band was rated in five classes: superior, excellent, average, good, and poor. This ends the competition of the UIL for the school year. The next competition will be at Six Flags, May 5, 6, and 7, where the band will compete in concert and sight reading with other first division bands of the State.

On April 8, 1964 also, the Wolverine Band brought home a Sweepstakes trophy from the Region I University Interscholastic League Band Contest in Levelland. It was the first time in Springlake Band's history that such a high honor had been won. At that time the 84 member band also received superior ratings in concert and sight reading, having earlier received a superior rating in marching competition.

Sweepstakes in 1964 also went to Hale Center, as well as Springlake, both bands of which competed with eleven other Class A bands. Only 8 bands of the 37 competing in region I contest, were Sweepstakes winners.

Trophies were presented to first division winners by Ross Buckler, Supt. of Seagraves Schools. Dean Foshee directs the local Sweepstakes winning band for 1964 and 1965. He has been director since the 1961-62 school term, replacing Norman Hempfuhl.

Each year for the past eight years, the band has steadily improved. Early in the 1961-62 school term, a total of 76 members were enrolled in the band; only 16 of which were high school students, the remainder was composed of 7th and 8th grade students. During that year 141 band students were enrolled in the entire band program. In 1963 and 1964 students in grades 8-12 made up the Wolverine Band.

Numerous individual and collective honors have been won

including: '61-'62, marching 2; concert 2, sight reading 2; '62-'63, marching 1, concert 3; sight reading 2, and Sweepstakes, April 1964 and April 1965.

The 110 member band has participated at various events throughout the school term, displaying superb marching and playing skill, as they appear dressed in their green and white uniforms, white caps, and plumes, which were purchased during the '58-'59 school terms by the band booster organization, with additional uniforms added each year with expanding growth of the band.)

The 1964-65 Elementary band has 84 members, the 7th grade Junior High School band has approximately 32 members. Both bands are also under Mr. Foshee's supervision. Foshee, band director, graduated from Shamrock High School, and received his college degree from West Texas State University. He directed the Cowden Junior High School band in Midland. The band won outstanding honors under his leadership.

It is with the highest degree of praise that the people of the Earth-Springlake area congratulate Dean Foshee and the Wolverine Band.

## What Will Be Next?

For years, the taxpayers have been putting up for low cost public housing to provide low rent accommodations.

Now it seems that the cost of public housing has climbed to a point where some people are unable to afford it.

It is reported that another group of families are too rich to qualify for public housing and too poor to afford private housing.

Now--you've guessed it. It is proposed that builders of cheap privately financed housing be paid by the government on a monthly basis to supplement payments of tenants too rich for public housing but too poor to pay going rents.

"It would not be a small program... And so a new federal subsidy seems about to be born... And we will still have with us those too poor to afford the public housing built for the poor," says the Portland Oregonian.

The public has not been told what this will cost taxpayers who are still trying to keep a roof of their own over their heads after paying federal and local taxes.

## Wrong On Every Count

The proposal that a tax, in the neighborhood of \$100, be imposed on all Americans going abroad, as a means of easing the balance of payments problem, has been given considerable attention. It has brought this report from Newsweek magazine; "The State Department, along with Fed chairman Martin and other monetary experts, quickly argued that such a move would be ineffective as well as political dynamite. There is only a bare chance that such a tax may be imposed."

One hopes this will prove correct. The arguments against a travel tax are overwhelmingly strong. It would be purely discriminatory and penalize the freedom of movement of American citizens, which is certainly a basic freedom. Its effect on the balance of payments situation would be extremely small at best. And it would be a form of class tax. The well-to-do traveler would not be seriously affected. But it would be a real burden to the growing numbers of people of modest means who now, in this jet age, are able to see some of the world outside our own borders. It would fall with particular weight on the legs of young people who now travel abroad on skin-tight budgets and must make every dollar count.

It would be in direct contradiction, also, to the principle underlying the government-supported People-to-People program, which has the laudatory aim of encouraging peoples of all the nations to learn more about each other, as a means of building world understanding and peace. An essential part of such a program, surely, is the stimulation of travel. The travel tax idea is wrong on every count.

## Questions And Answers To Your Income Tax Problems

This column of questions and answers on federal tax matters is provided by the Plainview Office of the U.S. Internal Revenue Service and is published as a public service to taxpayers. The column answers questions most frequently asked by taxpayers.

**Q-**My wife died March 8, 1964, after an illness of several months. Since we had always filed a joint return, can I file a joint return for 1964?

**A-**Yes, unless you have remarried before the end of the taxable year you are permitted to file a joint return with your deceased wife. Generally, such a joint return must be prepared with the deceased wife's executor or administrator. However, you are allowed to file the joint return alone if no executor or administrator has been appointed by the due date for filing the return. If an executor or administrator is appointed after you file your joint return, he can disaffirm your previously prepared return by filing a separate return for your deceased wife within one year after the due date of your return. In that case the joint return is regarded as your separate return.

**Q-**I have a savings account. My friend told me that if I didn't go to the bank to have my interest entered in my passbook until this year (1965), I would not have to report the interest on my 1964 income tax return. Is he right?

**A-**No, he is not. Bank interest is taxable the year it is credited to your account at the bank whether you receive it or not. However, if you have Series F Sav-

ings Bonds, you don't report the interest on them until they are cashed, unless you elect to report their increase in value each year.

**Q-**My dentist put in some bridge work last year. Can I deduct what it cost?

**A-**Yes. If you itemize deductions, this cost is deductible as a medical expense. Remember, unless you or your spouse are 65 or over only those medical expenses in excess of 3% of your gross income are deductible.

**Q-**It seems that I never have enough taxes taken out of my pay. I always owe some money when I file my return. What can I do?

**A-**Your easiest solution would be to reduce your withholding exemptions and, if necessary, to request your employer to withhold additional amounts of income tax from your wages each week. This will result in a greater credit for withholding tax and will decrease or eliminate your having to pay additional taxes when you file your return. Some taxpayers prefer to make a declaration of estimated tax and then make quarterly payments.

**Q-**While Christmas shopping last year I lost my pocketbook containing \$200 in cash. Can I deduct this loss?

**A-**Unless your pocketbook was stolen this loss can not be deducted. Thus, if you can establish that you were robbed of the \$200, some of it would be deductible. Note, however, that only \$100 of your loss would be deductible under the new tax law. Check your 1040 instructions for details on this provision.

(Don) Anderson, Crosbyton; Roy Davis, Lubbock; Carroll Himmel, Crosbyton; John Pugh, Lubbock; Wilburn Bailey, Meadow; Victor Watts, Brownfield; Larry Hagood, Tahoka; and Carlton Chapman of Big Spring.

Each school in the county will have two representatives in the contest, which is open to students who have not finished the eighth grade. Springlake-Earth School will send two students to the contest. They have been studying the word list, and decisions will be made in the very near future as to the two representatives from our local school.

The Spelling Bee will be at 1:00 p.m. Wednesday, April 14. The pronouncer will be Mrs. Lenton Smith, of Littlefield. The winner of the Littlefield contest will represent Lamb County in the District spelling bee in Lubbock, May 1, with the winner at Lubbock going to the National contest in June. Debbie Landers, of Amherst, won the Lamb County Contest last year, and also the Lubbock contest. She finished in the top 20 in the national finals.

## Special Seasonings Know No Season

Special seasonings for familiar foods know no season, reminds Mrs. Gwen Clyatt, Texas A&M Extension consumer marketing specialist.

These seasonings can provide year-round enjoyment. For example, when frying chicken, sprinkle the coated chicken pieces with chopped chives or onion and a little thyme and rubbed sage. Then cook as you always do.

If you are preparing pork chops for dinner, after browning sprinkle the chops with curry powder, or, if you are not a curry fan, sprinkle the browned chops with dill seed. Then add a little water, cover and cook until fork-tender.

When you have some fully cooked ham to slice and you want to serve it hot, you may want to try this method. Spread prepared mustard over the ham slices cut a fourth to three-eighths inch thick. Then sprinkle on brown sugar generously. Broil the mustard-brown sugar topped ham slices until hot and the topping bubbles.

If veal chops or steaks are on the menu, for a change you may want to marinate them in a well seasoned French dressing over beef steaks or lamb chops before broiling. These and other special seasonings know no season, the specialist reminds.

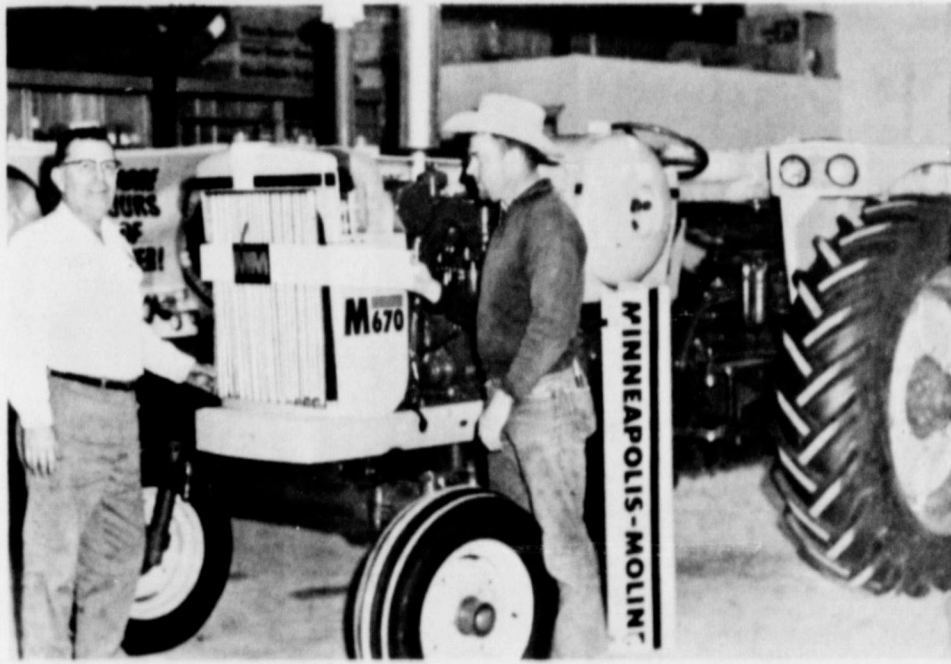
