Graveside rites were conducted at 4 p.m. at Olton, with burial in Olton Cemetery, under direction of Griggs Funeral Home, Amarillo.

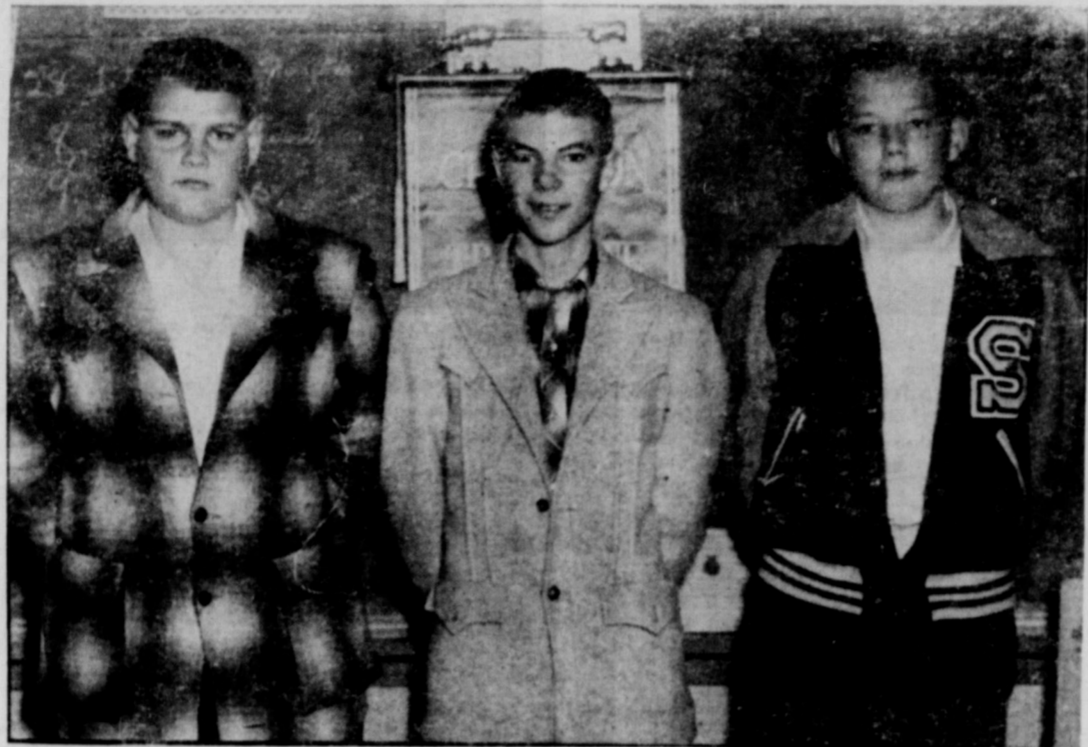
Simmons died, at 5 p.m. Sunday in Northwest Texas Hospital, Amarillo, of a heart attack.

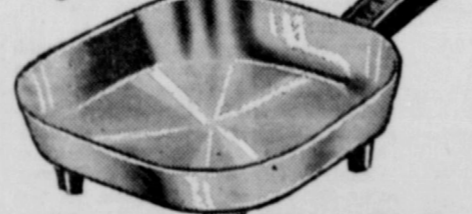

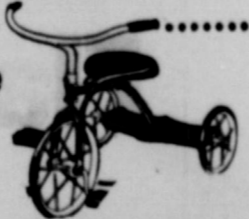

The school colors of green and white were used in carrying out the decorations.

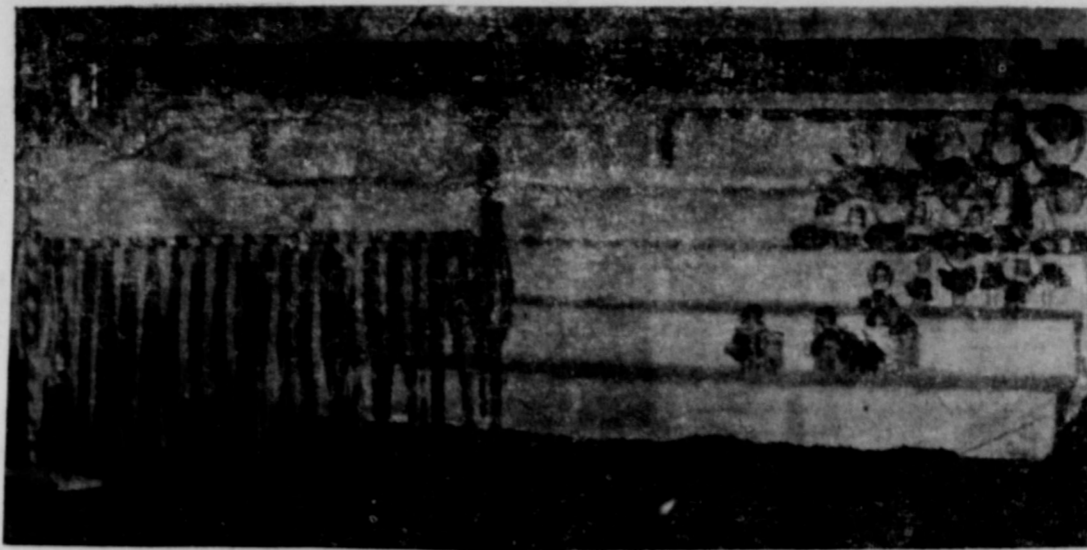
Miniature football boys bearing each of the boy's numbers lined the walls of the banquet room.

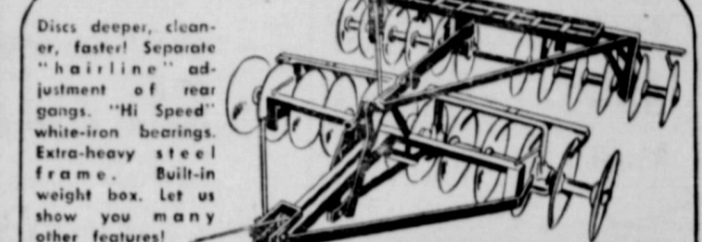

Seventeen Rural Accidents In Lamb County In October

The Highway Patrol investigated 17 rural accidents in Lamb County during the month of October, according to Sergeant D. S. Lawson, Patrol Supervisor of this area.

These wrecks have accounted for no persons killed, 8 injured, and a property damage of \$8,167.00.

This brings the total for the year in this county to 5 persons killed on the streets and roads of damage of \$55,233.00.

"In 1959, eight thousand and two hundred pedestrians were killed on the streets and roads of America," Sergeant Lawson said. That figure represents about twenty four percent of all traffic fatalities in this country in one year's time. If we could eliminate this one category from our death toll, it would contribute heavily toward a general massive reduction in traffic fatalities.

True, a pedestrian doesn't have much of a chance against two tons of steel. But, if the driver and pedestrian both would use good defensive measures and common sense this type of casualty could be averted.

OUTDOORS IN TEXAS

This is about birds... "screwy" birds. Birds you've seen, but seldom read about.

They are called several names—most of them unprintable.

Hunting season is a good time to mention them. If you recognize yourself as one of these birds... well and good... especially if you're man enough to change your feathers, or at least change your thinking or your attitude.

All of us have our faults. None of us possesses all these failings... thank goodness. But, if you are one of these birds... maybe you shouldn't go hunting at all. Maybe you should stay home and give some thought to correcting your faults.

On the other hand, maybe you can do something about it. If you hunt companions as well as all other men and women in the field and on the stream.

First bird we want to call at-

ention to is the heavy-footed FENCEHAWK. He rides the fences for all they are worth. He spreads the barbed wire enclosures so wide you could drive a truck through them.

Crawling through one of the openings he makes in a barbed wire fence is a snap. In fact, he is so heavy footed and so strong armed that he pops the staples clear out of the posts.

Then he is wont to say, "They just don't make them staples like they usta!"

Another fine-feathered friend is the SNIPEFLICKER.

He's the bird who tosses away cigarette stubs and cigar butts with reckless abandon.

The addleheaded snipeflicker has cost Uncle Sam (that's you and me, Bub) millions of dollars in fire damage to timber and wildlife.

He's not careless in our book. He's just one bird that doesn't give a hoot. If his grandchildren have no place to hunt, it makes no difference to him. What the

heck does he care about the future! He won't be here anyway.

This bird's even worse than the MIGRATORY LITTERBIRD. That creature has the same attitude, true enough. Also—the same lack of respect for the property of others. And the same lack of appreciation of what has been made available to him by the farmer or the parks board, or the game and fish commission. He's a litterbird wherever he goes.

Often wonder what his home looks like inside... don't you? Betcha there are banana peels everywhere, apple cores all over the house and empty beer cans scattered about every room.

Goodness knows what the messy place really looks like. Sure couldn't be a very tidy spot... inside... judging by the way this bird litters up the outdoors.

There are plenty of other creatures of the woods and waves. For example... the REDEYED SWALLOWER... better known as the BOOZYBIRD.

No need for them to wear heavy hunting clothes. He's fired up internally.

Why be a comfortable 98 degrees, body-temperature bird, when you can feather your nest with 100-proof alcohol and feel oh so light-headed?

Actually this bird isn't light-headed, he's empty headed. There are just no brain cells in that ivory-covered skull. Couldn't be, or he wouldn't be out hunting in that condition.

And, anyone who hunts with him better be a ROADRUNNER and in the finest trim. Otherwise he'll never make it back to camp... alive.

This BOOZYBIRD, incidentally... more often that not... is part SNIPEFLICKER and part LITTERBIRD. They seem to team together in the roughest sort of way.

The REDEYED SWALLOWER also has many traits common to the LARGEMOUTH GROUSE... a very loquacious and vociferous animal. Much of his time is allocated to complaints that are reminiscent of the BELLYACHING BULLFROG, who's not even a part of the feathery tribe.

While we're at it, let's not overlook the DIMWITTED WOOD-

SRUFF. He's the hot-tempered animal who clobbers the park fountain if it fails to work. He does so with the park bench and he doesn't care which collapses first, so long as his temper is not restrained.

You've seen this bird I know. I'm talking about the SNEAKY-EYED WOODPECKER. He transfers shrubbery from the field to his own front yard.

Not to be overlooked is the LARGE-POCKETED CAMPROBER. He is known to have carried off the grate from the roadside barbecue pits, to appropriate it for his own use. Neither does he think anything of toting all the extra state park firewood home with him.

Then there's the REDHATTED LOON who doesn't know the difference (or care) between a 12-point buck and the farmer's choice Jersey Cow. He's the farmer's delight. But only if the cow is heavily insured.

Too, let's not forget the ROOST-ERTAILED WATERTHRASHER.

He's the speed demon of the waterways. This gink "wakes up" the fishermen with mammoth man-made waves. He boils them up as close to the angler's boat as the law allows... if not closer.

All these birds are not legal game. But more than one hunter thinks they should be. Among those who think so are the farmers whose cows are killed; the landowners whose fences are torn down; and the hunters whose lives are endangered.

Let's not spoil the fun for anyone. As we take to the field for a day of pleasant hunting, let's be more considerate of "the other fellow." Let's give thanks to those who make this great sport possible. And let's do our part to make it an event for all to enjoy and to live to remember.

The Saturn rocket is the big project at the George C. Marshall Space Flight Center at Huntsville, Ala. The center is a few miles out of Huntsville. There, more than 5,000 persons are at work getting a man made Saturn ready for space. Dr. Werner von Braun, one of our top rocket experts, is in charge of the project.

In talk of rocket men, Saturn will have 1,500,000 pounds of thrust. To us that figure means that the rocket will have a tremendous amount of push. The million and a half pounds of thrust means that Saturn will be able to haul objects weighing many tons into space.

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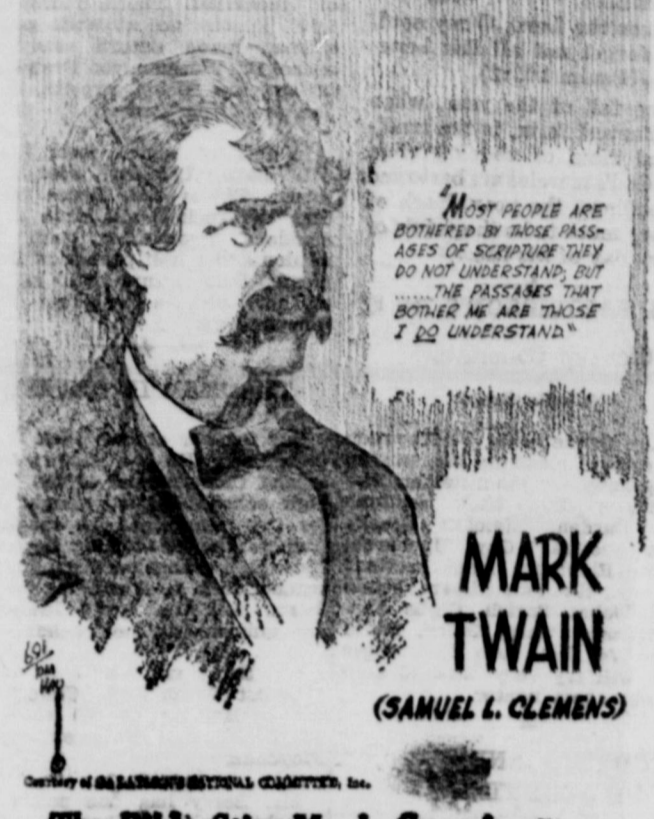

Hi-Plains Hi-Lights

NEWS from the High Plains
Research Foundation

Field drying grain sorghum by the use of flame cultivation was a new experiment conducted at the High Plains Research Foundation in September and October. The object was to reduce the moisture content to the 13 percent acceptable for safe storage or government loan, without dockage.

The results secured were encouraging enough to justify continuation of the tests. During the winter months the experiment will be continued on grain sorghum in the Rio Grande Valley and at the Foundation at Halfway in 1961 by Dale Price, agricultural engineer.

A high clearance tractor equipped with a flame cultivator was used in the tests. Two additional burners were added per row and the burners placed opposite each other. The flame was directed at the base of the plants in the row. Where the flame from the burners collided, the flame moved upward, drying the leaves and reducing the moisture in the head.

Dr. Tom Longnecker, in commenting on the procedure, stated, "Although it is too early to predict whether this artificial drying or grain sorghum in the field has a place, the results so far are very encouraging. In good dry weather grain sorghum will dry at the approximate rate of 0.5 percent per day after maturity, under the same conditions the application of heat increased the drying rate to around 1 per cent per day. We are definitely not recommending the use of artificial field drying as yet, but we believe that techniques can be developed so it will be possible to speed up field drying and make it possible to harvest grain ten to fourteen days earlier."

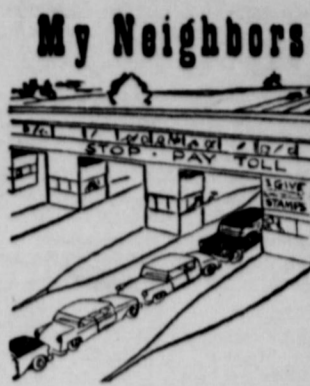
Both guests delivered brief addresses.
