### Resistance To Some Insecticides Is A Problem

Greenbug resistance to some commonly used insecticides apparently will be a problem in some areas in 1975, according to Dr. George Teetes, entomologist with the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station at Lubbock.

"Preliminary data indicates Ethyl Parathion, Thimet and Diazinon have been effective in controlling greenbugs in the resistant area," Dr. Teetes said. Dr. Teetes pointed out that in selecting an insecticide producers must consider several factors.

"First, the farmer should ascertain the need to control greenbugs. Only populations that have reached the economic threshold should be treated. Premature applications can seriously compound the resistance problem in the field," Dr. Teetes warned.

"Second, the selection of an insecticide should be based on results obtained in other fields in the area. In some areas almost all compounds remain effective while in other areas control may be difficult with any material," Dr. Teetes said. Cost, availability and effects on beneficial insects and other pests should be considered in selecting an insecticide.

"The rate of ethyl parathion can be reduced in many areas to control greenbugs while sparing some beneficial insects but it has shown to stimulate increases in spider mite numbers," Dr. Teetes said.

"Thimet can only be used one time per season and it has been a constant chemical for spider mite control," Dr. Teetes explained. "If it is used for greenbug control it cannot be used later for spider mites." Dr. Teetes stressed that control from all registered chemicals may vary from area to area and from field to field. He added that test areas of small acreages may be treated prior to large applications to determine the level of control that may be expected.

Entomologists have noted that in areas where greenbugs have not developed resistance to insecticides, Disyston and Cygon still are effective.

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# Dimmitt Shocks Wolverines 20-0

Dimmitt High's angry underdogs using an inspired effort by their defense, roared into town Friday night and hammered the Wolverines from the unbeaten ranks 20-0.

After losing two close games, the young Bobcats took advantage of four fumbles and three interceptions to completely shut down the Wolverine's veer attack.

Both teams exchanged fumbles and punts in the early going until 3:36 of the 1st period when Mark Barton, starting his first game at quarterback, fumbled on his own 15 with Aleman recovering for the Bobcats. Using

Thompson Mayberry for five straight carries the Bobcats had a 3rd and goal from the 3, when Dulaney threw a swing pass to Mayberry for the Cats first TD. Using a modern version of the Statue of Liberty play, Mayberry ran a reverse that fooled the Wolverines for the two points and with 1:32 left in the first it was 8-0.

The Wolverines began a drive on its 25 and with Barton and Geissler carrying the workload moved to the Cat 29. On first and 10 Barton ran the option for 9 making a good run, but fumbled and Dimmitt recovered.

The teams then traded punts with the Wolverines Wood kicking a 46 yarder to pin the Bob-

cats at their 10. On 1st Washington broke over guard and only a saving tackle by Lee Brown kept him from going all the way. The Cats then moved quickly to the Wolverine 35 using a passing attack that featured a stacked receiver set which the Wolverines had trouble adjusting to. But after Mayberry gained 5, Washington 2, the drive stalled when a 3rd down pass went incomplete and on 4th down Larry Dear broke up a sure TD when he tackled Bagwell on a screen pass for a three yard loss.

With time running out in the first half, the Wolverines started an impressive drive from its 30, Barton got 14 on an option when

he seemed trapped. Geissler and Furr both carried for 5 yards. Furr then fought for 10 yards to the Bobcat 35 and again on the next play rambled for 12 more yards. But the drive stalled after an incomplete pass Barton was sacked for an 8 yard loss on a bootleg. Furr under pressure threw an interception on 3rd down on the halfback pass and at halftime the score read 8-0 for the Bobcats.

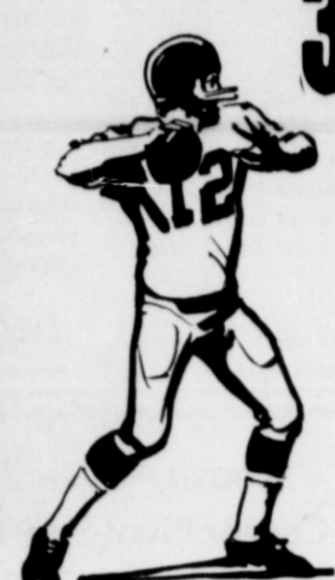
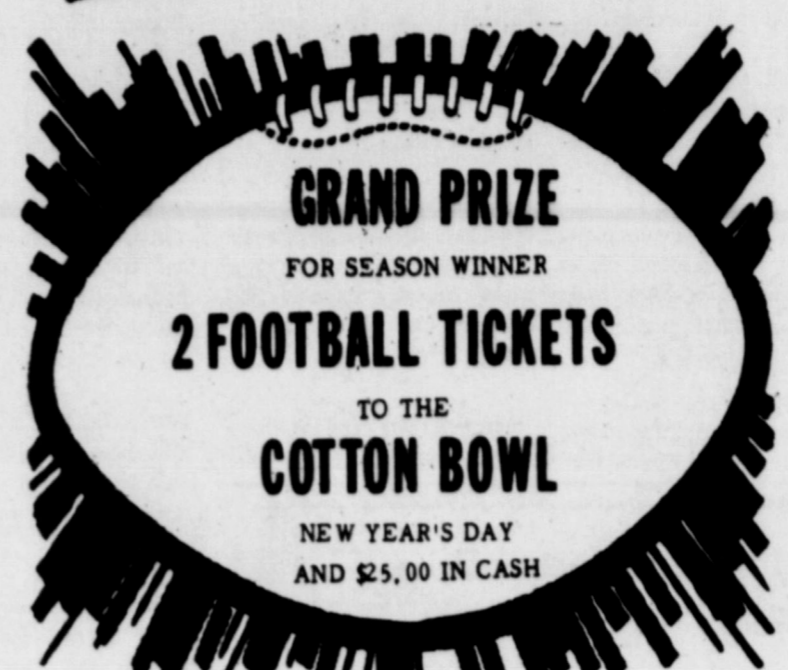
Dimmitt received the second half kickoff and moved to the Wolverine 37 where Latham, Furr and Bills made three good plays to stop the drive. Espinoza's punt went for a touchback and the Wolverines touched the football for the first time with only 5:36 left in the third quarter. They quickly picked up two first downs but the drive stalled on their own 47. Wood's 41 yard punt put the Bobcats at their own 19. A holding call moved the ball to the 9. Mayberry got 7 on a trap, but Brent Been threw the QB for a nine yard loss and Mayberry only got 3 after a delay of game penalty.

The Wolverines forced a bad punt and set up shop on the Bobcat 33. Furr got 10 and a first down, but Barton and Geissler fumbled the handoff and Lawson recovered for Dimmitt on its 19. Mayberry got 4 as the third quarter ended with the score still 8-0. A reverse got 5 and Mayberry got 2 and a first down at the 30. Bossett got 5 but Mayberry fumbled and the Wolverines got another chance at the Bobcat 35.

Barton lost 1 on the option and on 2nd and eleven. Furr fumbled the ball back on the Cat 31. Bossett got 1 and on 2nd and 9 from the 32, Dulaney found Washington in the flat on a roll out and after a block that was close to a clip he rambled 68 yards for the TD. 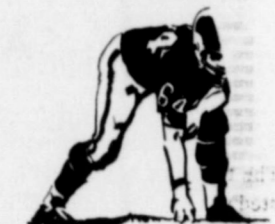

## SPEAKING OF SPORTS

The mark of any true champion is when they have been knocked down, to pick themselves off the floor and take the fight to their opponent. An old coaching cliché states that "when the going gets tough, the tough get going." The Wolverines will have a chance this Friday to prove to themselves and to their fans that they are a championship club.

While pre-district games don't count for "all the marbles" as the saying goes it will be a challenge for the Wolverines to rebound from their defeat against Dimmitt. For the Wolverines to accomplish this, they must eliminate mental mistakes and costly fumbles which have killed 15 drives inside the opponent's 30 the last three games. While taking nothing from Dimmitt, because they came to play and physically whipped the Wolverines, the loss of the ball at the Bobcat 20, 18, 19, 31, 20, 34 and 10 shows that the Wolverines had ample opportunity to score but could not overcome mistakes.

It would be easy for the "Saturday morning QB" to second guess and say that the offense lacks imagination deep in enemy territory. But how do

you keep fumbles from occurring other than just holding onto the ball? The veer offense is one of the hardest to master because of timing and more handling of the ball on wide options. Once the QB's and halfbacks master the pitch the wide game will begin to compliment the inside veer. The offensive line, young inspoos, has shown considerable improvement in each game and will get better once they gain confidence.

Speaking with backs Rodney Geissler and Jimmy Furr each felt that in the veer the hardest assignment for them was "reading the blocks of the linemen and cutting off that block through the hole." Furr added that "staying up with the QB on the wide options in case of a pitch was also difficult." Brent Been, offensive center, "felt that the blocking assignments for him were not much different than in the wishbone, but that in the veer you needed to hold your block to allow the back time to cut." All three players felt that Dimmitt was the hardest hitting team they had faced, but added that Sudan would be tough and that the Wolverines would have to be up to win.

The defense has carried the Wolverines so far, and again Friday night, played a sound

game. But as with any team that is experimenting with personnel was fooled on occasion. The defense must continue to be aggressive and allow the offense to catch up.

Against Sudan the Wolverines will be facing a straight T and wing T attack led by Danny and Jerry Williams who have put plenty of points on the board this year. The Hornet defense features a split 6 or stacked 5-3 but has been the weak part of Sudan's game.

The Wolverines will be without Bryan Taylor and Brad Barden, both with head injuries, but will have Andrew Monreal for kicking chores.

The younger Wolverines got a good test against Dimmitt and if they can shrug off the defeat, learn from their mistakes, then the Wolverines will rebound against Sudan.

The Wolverines can prove if they are of championship caliber by working hard this week in preparation and then by playing four quarters of inspired football against a tough Sudan squad.

They have something to prove to themselves and the Wolverine fans.

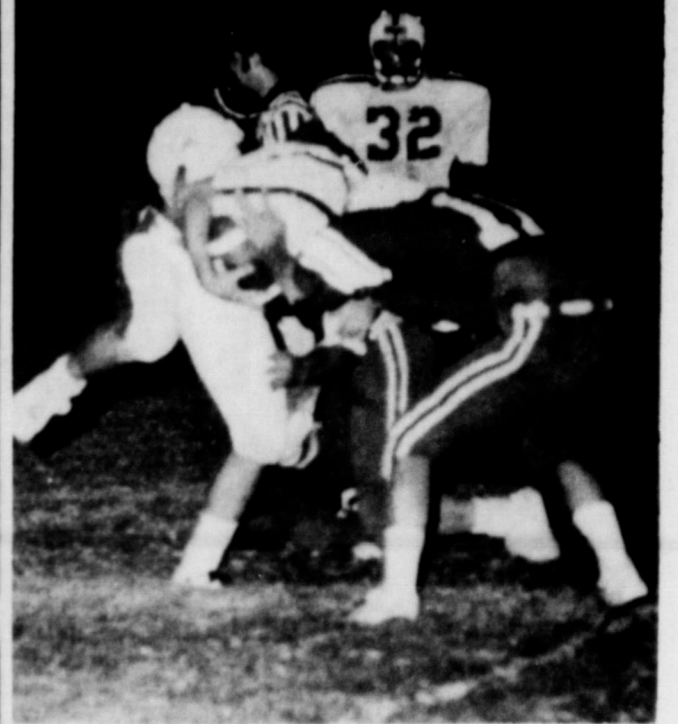

tion of infiltration techniques FHA 504 loans. Monitor and insulation solar heating models evaluate activities performed.

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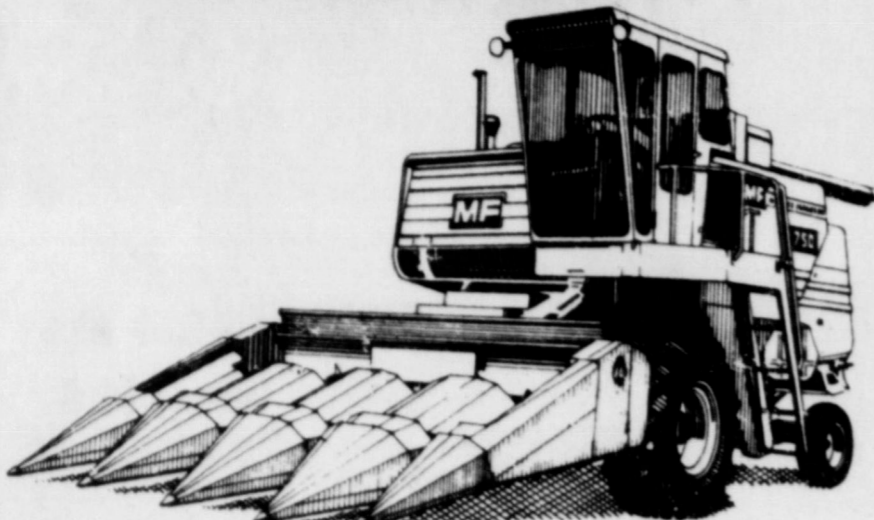
