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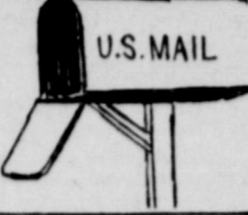

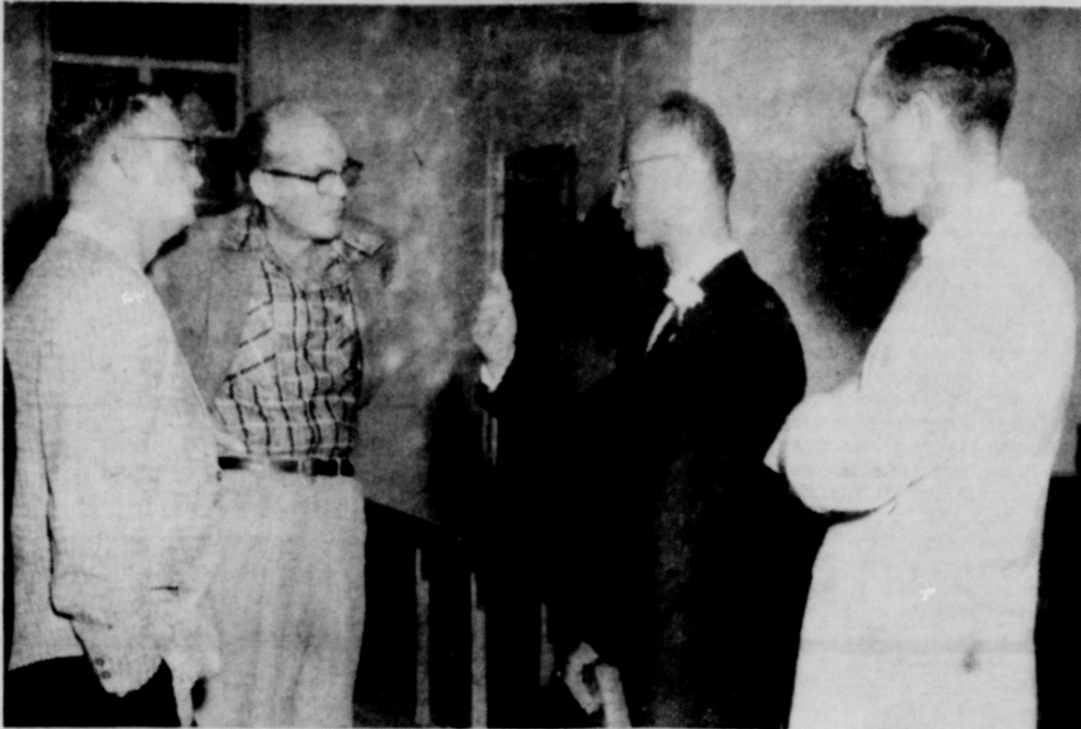

The gospel plan of salvation is certified in Mark 16:16; Acts 2:38; and Acts 22:16.

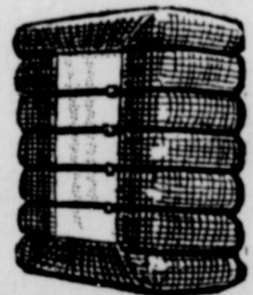

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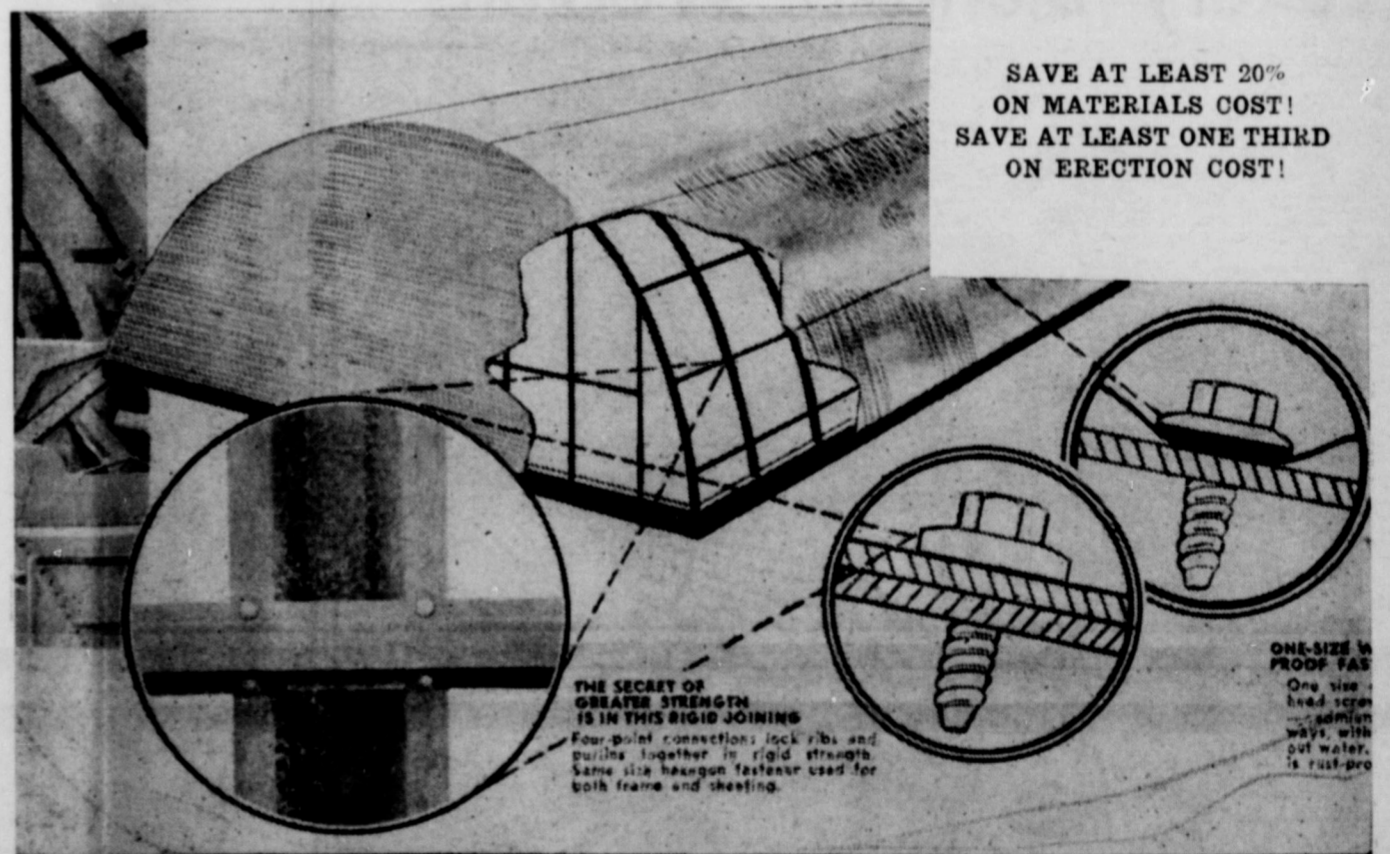

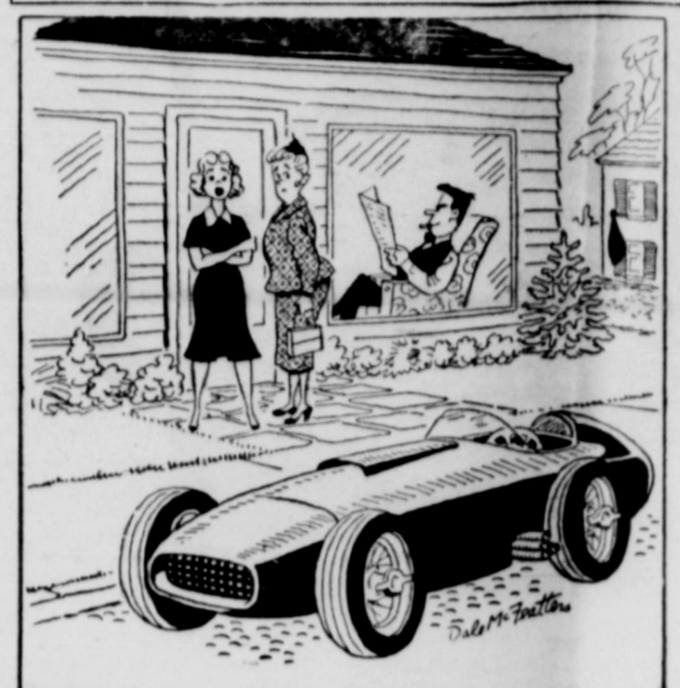
