

## Rain Storms Hit Earth, S. L. Area

Weather takes the top news of the week, as more rain fell in the Earth and Springlake area again Monday and Tuesday afternoons. Rains followed an electrical storm Monday sending down mighty bolts of lightning and heavy rainfall, measuring up to 3 inches in 40 minutes in the Dodd community north of Earth.

### RECEIVES SHOCK FROM LIGHTNING

C. O. Taylor, Earth businessman and farmer was near a tractor in his field, Monday afternoon, when a bolt of lightning struck him, drawing him up off the ground. His wife who was standing near by also received a shock. A prominent Olton farmer, Lee Poteet, was killed by lightning Monday afternoon on his farm between Springlake and Olton.

### TRAILERS DAMAGED

Two trailers on the Orbie Armstrong farm nine miles north of Earth was picked up by high winds and one crashed against a tandem disc. Both were completely demolished.

### SOME CROPS RECEIVE HAIL IN THIS AREA

Gus Parish of Springlake reported 300 acres of his cotton crop hailed out, and that about 600 acres in that vicinity would have to be planted over.

Hail was reported to have fallen on the Buddy Free farm 1 mile east and 1 mile south of Earth. Damages is not known at this time.

Fred Clayton reported one and one-half inches of rain fell on his farm north of town, Monday. Virgil Williams and Clarence Mitchell's cotton was hailed out. These farms are located one and one-half miles west and one mile north of Springlake. Also Bill Stanford and Cecil Williams farms five miles south of Springlake was hailed out.

The Joel Jones farm located 3 miles east and 1 mile north of Earth, received approximately two and one-half inches of rain Monday and Tuesday, but no hail was reported.

The Ennis Harper farm reported 1.7 inches of rain, Monday and the Roy Gover and Robert O'Hair farms reported 2 inches. These farms are located northwest of Earth.

Pat Montgomery, six miles west and three north of Earth received two inches of rainfall Monday. David Johnson reported about two and one-half inches of rain on his farm near the McBride and Sons Gin west of Earth.

Farmers were able to shut down irrigation wells, due to the much needed rainfall.

### Billy Graham To Visit Earth June 9 On Screen in 'Souls In Conflict'

"Souls In Conflict," the west film released by Billy Graham Evangelistic Films, Inc., will be shown in Earth on June 9 at 8:00 p.m. Local arrangements are in charge of Cecil Meadows, who has secured the First Baptist Church for the special showing. All seats are free.

"Souls In Conflict" was filmed during Graham's world publicized London Crusade. ## Plan For Future Safety In 4 - Lane Highways State Hiway Commissioner Tells Group

"We always fail to plan large enough," Highway Commissioner, Marshall Formby of Plainview began his talk to the group attending the highway meeting held in the Springlake Baptist Church Tuesday night.

Civic leaders representing each city in the County met, seeking answers to the arising question on the \$500,000 Bond Election, which has been called for June 23. For the purpose of securing money to purchase some 62 miles of right of way on U. S. Highways 70 and 84. And to acquaint themselves with the position of the State Highway Commission and the Commissioners Court.

Formby pointed out that four lane highways for the nation was long overdue in order to take care of our increasing traffic. He pointed out the number of motorists registered in the nation had increased from 200,000 to 63,000,000 since 1928, and that our highways were inadequate to provide safe motoring for that great increase in traffic.

Safety is of interest to the nation as a whole, he said, and is likewise of interest to Lamb County. He stated that four-lane divided highways were twice as safe as our present two-lane roads.

Formby said that most of our highways were built back when the average speed was 28 miles per hour.

The state official said that \$43,000 was appropriated to build a 12 mile strip between Hockley County line on the east to about 2 miles of Littlefield. And \$53,000 is waiting to build three miles of Superhighway on the west end of the county adjoining Bailey County. That it was up to Lamb County to secure the right-of-ways for 84 and 70 to give her the right kind of highways to take care of the rising traffic over the county.

He further stated that in case the bond election carried, that \$4 would be taken care of first, as their traffic was greater. That 70 had not yet reached the 3,000 daily traffic count, which is the gauge that places them in that category of needing four-lane highways. The west part of 70 has less traffic than the east, therefore in case of constructing four-lane highway the west end would be completed last.

The state sets up a program over two years, and Formby said 70 was not listed on this two year period, but it might be in the very near future, especially if the county voted the bonds. But it was impossible for him to make any promises, as the daily traffic count would be the deciding factor as to when construction would begin.

During the question and answer session that followed Formby's talk. The big question of how the right-of-way money would be divided was discussed. County Judge Bob Kirk told the group that according to the traffic count 84 deserved to be completed first, and he felt certain that \$400,000 would be more than adequate to buy right-of-ways on 84, and promised the group that at least half of the money would be held up for 70.

This promise of Judge Kirk was questioned by representatives from Olton as to its holding good without it being in writing in case a new Commissioners Court took office in the coming election. Kirk said he felt reasonably sure it would, but had not yet found a legal way of getting it in writing.

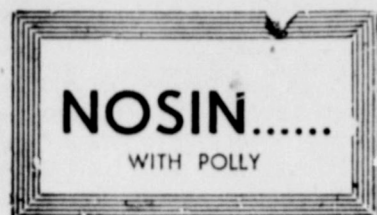
### Highway Contract To Be Let June 13, Work Expected To Begin Late June

## Lt. Gov. Ben Ramsey Outlines Campaign

SAN AUGUSTINE, Tex. — Soil and water conservation and greater protection for Texas families through good service and stability in government are the major issues on which Lt. Gov. Ben Ramsey will campaign for re-election this summer.

Ramsey, who is touring the state preparatory to officially opening his campaign, said, "Soil is the storehouse of agriculture and industry. Water is the key to both. People throughout Texas have made great strides in soil and water saving practices in the past 10 years." He added, "The state must give full assistance in equitable plans for conservation at the local level if we are to maintain a sound economy and reach our true potential."

On plans for protection of Texas families, Ramsey said the government must effect field and exacting controls over blind forces of influence. Ramsey cited the need for (1) strict curbs on lobbying; (2) stiff narcotic penalties, with life imprisonment or death penalty for the second conviction on charges of selling to minors; (3) eliminate loan sharks; and (4) an unceasing watch to assure families their insurance policies are sound.

Ramsey spearheaded the move to rid the insurance industry of "parasites" and eliminate frequent investment schemes, said the results have been tremendous.

"Time and experience," Ramsey said, "will determine whether the barricades in our economy are high enough and solid enough to keep ruthless speculators from preying upon the public. The scavengers will be back at the next session of the Legislature in attempt to gain back their lost special privileges."

"My ambition," Ramsey said, "is to wage the fight through to complete protection to the public in

Eventually, blazing ambition took its toll. Joan suffered a series of nervous breakdowns, after the most recent of which she sat down and took stock of the situation. It seems that a long-ago-learned lesson starting, "What doth it profit a man," kept creeping into her consciousness. Soon this was to take ominous form as an insistent accuser. It was while in search of the answers to many perplexing questions that Joan one night found herself in Harringay Arena listening to the evangelist, Billy Graham.

What transpired that night on the stage and her counselor, who turned out to be none other than Mrs. Billy Graham herself, will ever know. Cynical acquaintances said Joan "got religion" to get a part in the proposed Graham phases of government.

"SOULS IN CONFLICT" was produced for Billy Graham against the backdrop of his London Crusade by Great Commission Films, Hollywood, in association with Anglo-Scottish Pictures, London. Its story is a case history trilogy of three troubled lives, that of the actress and of a jet test pilot and a factory mechanic, played by Eric Micklewood and Charles Leno, starred with Joan in the production. Dick Ross both wrote and directed the picture.

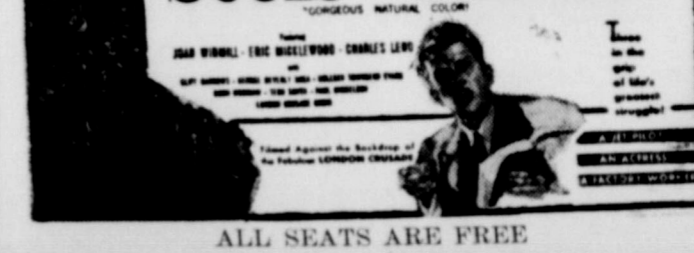

**Will Wilson Resigns From Supreme Court To Make Campaign For Attorney General**

Supreme Court Justice Will Wilson has resigned his post on the state's highest tribunal to launch a fighting campaign for Attorney General of Texas. His resignation was made effective June 1.

"The most compelling call to duty for me today is to serve the people of Texas as their Attorney General," Wilson said.



With a career as Dallas racket-busting district attorney, followed by six years on the Supreme Court, Wilson said he left the court "with reluctance." However he surprised few Capitol observers in responding to the challenge to serve as Texas' number one law enforcement officer.

"I have been asked why I am willing to leave the Supreme Court," Wilson commented. "Like the old cavalry general, I've always believed in riding straight for the sound of the guns."

"Certainly I know that I am deliberately turning my back on the security of a quiet harbor and certainly the course we will steer lies through troubled waters. But that's where the need is greatest."

"Texas' greatest need today is vigorous enforcement of our Texas laws. I believe I can serve best in filling that need."

Most seasoned observers agree that Judge Wilson would have been re-elected without opposition to the Supreme Court. Both of his colleagues up for re-election are

**Dutch Style Chicken Corn Pie**  
1 small onion, chopped  
2 tablespoons butter or margarine  
1 can (1 1/2 cups) condensed cream of chicken soup  
1 can (5 ounces) boned chicken (or 1 cup diced cooked chicken)  
1 cup cooked whole kernel corn  
1 package (5 ounces) pie crust mix or enough pastry for a 2-crust pie

Cook onion in butter, blend soup, chicken and corn. Roll half of pastry dough on floured board and line a 9-inch pie pan; pour in chicken filling. Roll remaining pastry into circle, place on top of filling; pinch edges together and make several slits in top to allow steam to escape. Bake in moderate oven (375° F.) about 1 hour. 6 servings.

Note: In place of a top crust, cut

and chicken soups, pieces of the pastry and place on top of the filling and bake.

Serve this tasty bit of Pennsylvania Dutch cookery with spicy bread and butter pickles, tiny white onions and fresh bread.

Toss a salad of lettuce, carrot rounds, radish chips, a ripe olive here and there, and a "P.D." hot salad dressing.

Have a pitcher of nice cold milk ready for refilling the "milk mugs".

For dessert, dish up some almost thawed red raspberries and serve with cream; have the brim filled family cookie jar near by.

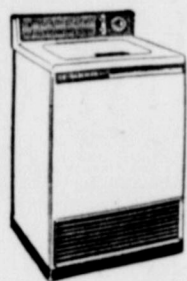

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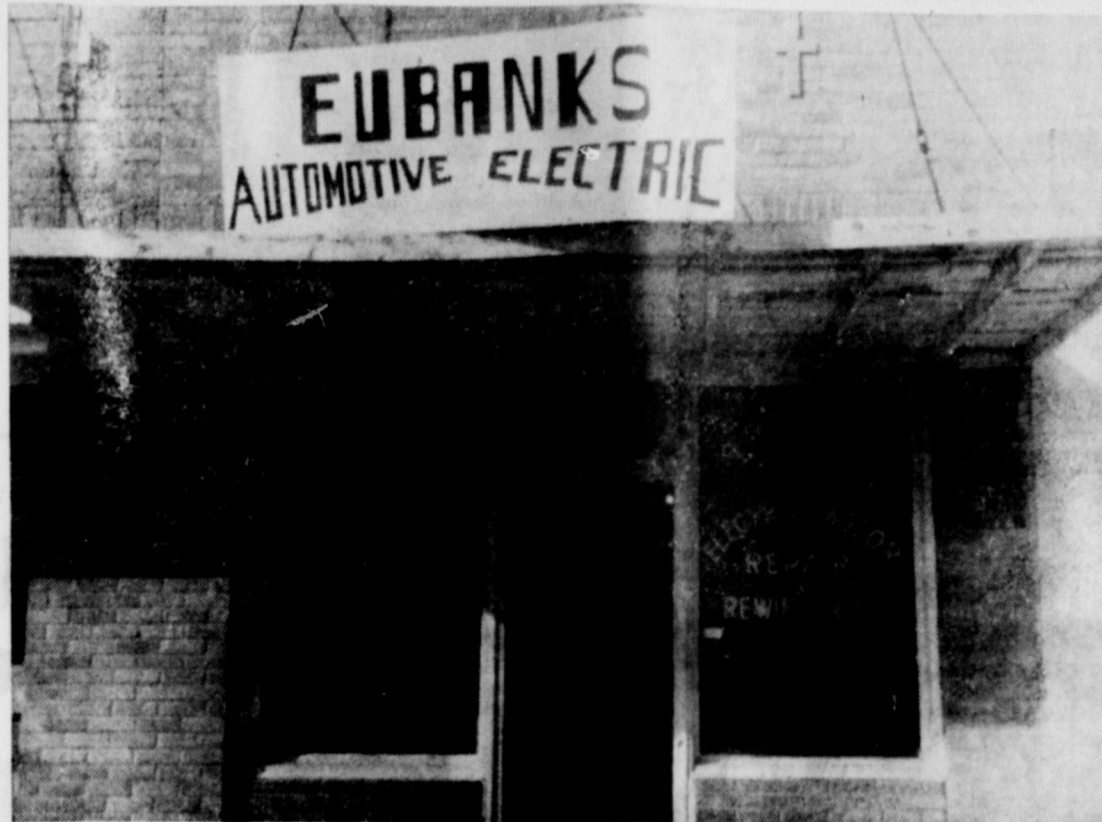

# IT'S THE LAW in TEXAS

## MARRIAGE DOES NOT CHANGE PROPERTY OWNERSHIP

June is traditionally the month of weddings, and many couples will be taking marriage vows within the next few weeks. But, while a certain symbolic transfer of "wordly goods" is often associated with the wedding ceremony, under Texas law, the act of marrying another does not give you the authorization to take control of his property.

Generally speaking, each spouse has the right to control and dispose of his or her own separate property. The separate property of a husband or wife includes owned by either before marriage, and that which is acquired after and that which is acquired by either after marriage by gift or inheritance. Any other property acquired by either party after marriage is to be community property until the contrary is clearly proved.

Aside from the ordinary community estate, there is a class of property known as the wife's "special community," which includes all the income from her separate real property, and probably the interest on bonds or notes, and dividends on stocks owned in her separate right. While the husband may have similar assets, the law accords the more particular distinction from ordinary community property.

Although the history of the matter is somewhat confusing, it appears that under present day law the husband has control of ordinary community property; but control of the wife's special property is reserved to her.

Certain restrictions are imposed upon both husband and wife in exercising such control. For instance the husband cannot legally dispose of community property in such a way as to defraud the wife, nor can he sell the homestead without her signature and acknowledgment. And the wife's sale or mortgage of her separate real estate, stocks or bonds is not valid unless her husband joins with her in the transaction — he must sign and execute the necessary legal papers along with her.

There are laws exempting the wife's separate and special community property from liability for debts incurred by the husband. Such liability is restricted to his separate property and the ordinary community property.

On the other hand, debts incurred by the wife in obtaining necessities for herself or the children bind all property belonging to either party, including the husband's separate property. For other debts which she has power to incur, only her separate and special community property are liable.

All of these distinctions emphasize the advisability of keeping proper records. By doing so the various classes of community and separate property owned by a married couple will always be easily distinguishable. Each category will then receive the special protection afforded to it by our laws.
