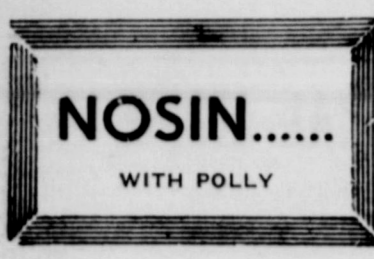




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Dust Covers Earth, Worst Duster In Years Hits Area Tuesday



It felt mighty good to we Earthites Tuesday when we were able again to see the business places across the street after the wind died down to about 50 miles an hour, and the dust had let up a little. One should never weaken enough to attempt to put on paper the feeling one has when visibility is zero and one cannot detect an object as large as a business building across the street and all that breaks the monotony of the dust is an occasional tumbleweed blowing along down the street at a high

The first dust storm of the year rolled into the area Tuesday with its full intensity observed by mid-morning with zero visibility at intervals throughout the day. One of the worst in years according to old timers.

An estimated 70 mile-per-hour wind blew down T. V. antennas, shingles were ripped from roofs, a wench truck at Earth Pump and Machine was overturned by the wind and the East end of the tile fence at the new Earth swimming pool was blown down.

Towns all over the area reported light to heavy damages from the wind.

The blowing dust reminded old timers of the early 30's.

The skies were filled with dust which slowed traffic almost to a crawl, until after nightfall when the fierce winds began to cease.

Clean-up began as soon as the winds died down, housewives begin the chore of digging out. Then come Wednesday a day just made to order, the kind of a day that can only be had in West Texas, a sunny warm day, pleasant and pleasing to all.

However he did say that along about noon, he was making his way toward the community building to attend Lions Club and seeing a building floating through the air that looked something like the community building, he took after it, when it finally landed, he discovered it wasn't the Lions building at all, but one of those New Mexico honky-tonks.

However, the Clayton Brothers can tell a pretty good story about this dust storm, and this one is true. The boys had purchased a new winch truck just recently, and had gone out Monday and picked up a well house and had it



hanging from the gin poles on the back of the big truck. Tuesday the wind got up to 70 miles an hour and whipped in under the well house and flipped the big winch truck completely over.

They were almost afraid to tell that for the truth, but really it happened.

Me, I need no proof now that Texas can do things bigger and better. Texas can stir up more dust in a matter of minutes than covers Oklahoma. (That state we call home, where mama is).

We left the office about 6:30 p.m., after working our way through the tumbleweeds to the car and went home. Right away we could see the advantage of living in a tent, (at least it would blown on through).

Pictures tell more than a 1000 words, but, I will say I swept up sand off my vinyl floor which was in some places well over an inch deep. The tables and stove were covered an inch deep in that gritty dust.

I've always heard the old expression "Footprints in the Sand of Time," I don't think I really fully knew and appreciated what that meant. Now, I know, it's footprints in the sand, and IT TAKES TIME TO GET IT ALL OUT.

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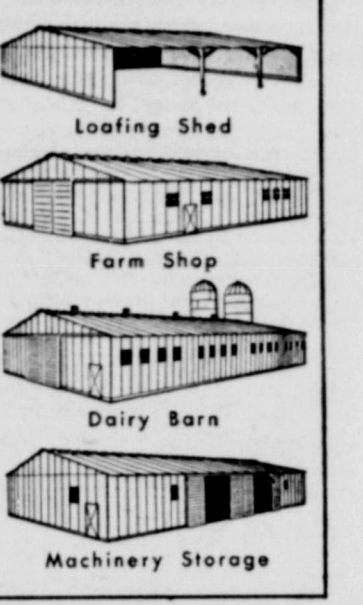
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L. C. C. D. Renders Report On Crop Residues

Land owners and operators throughout the area are getting their farming operations in full swing in preparation for next year's crop. Preparation of crop residues are very important from now until the seedbed is prepared.

Residues on dryland soil should be left on the surface until about April 1. Adequate residues will give maximum protection against wind erosion.

When inadequate residues are produced emergency tillage should be practiced leaving the soil as cloddy as possible to break up the wind action. Some tillage may be helpful or necessary to prevent some of the loose residues from blowing away. Residues not only protect the land from blowing, but also help conserve valuable moisture by cutting down on evaporation and holding snow.

When present crop residues are inadequate to give protection other residues such as cotton burs may be applied to reduce soil losses from wind erosion.

Increased water infiltration may also be expected from the application of cotton burs.

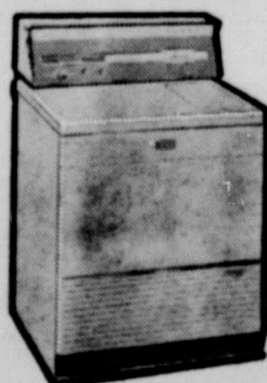
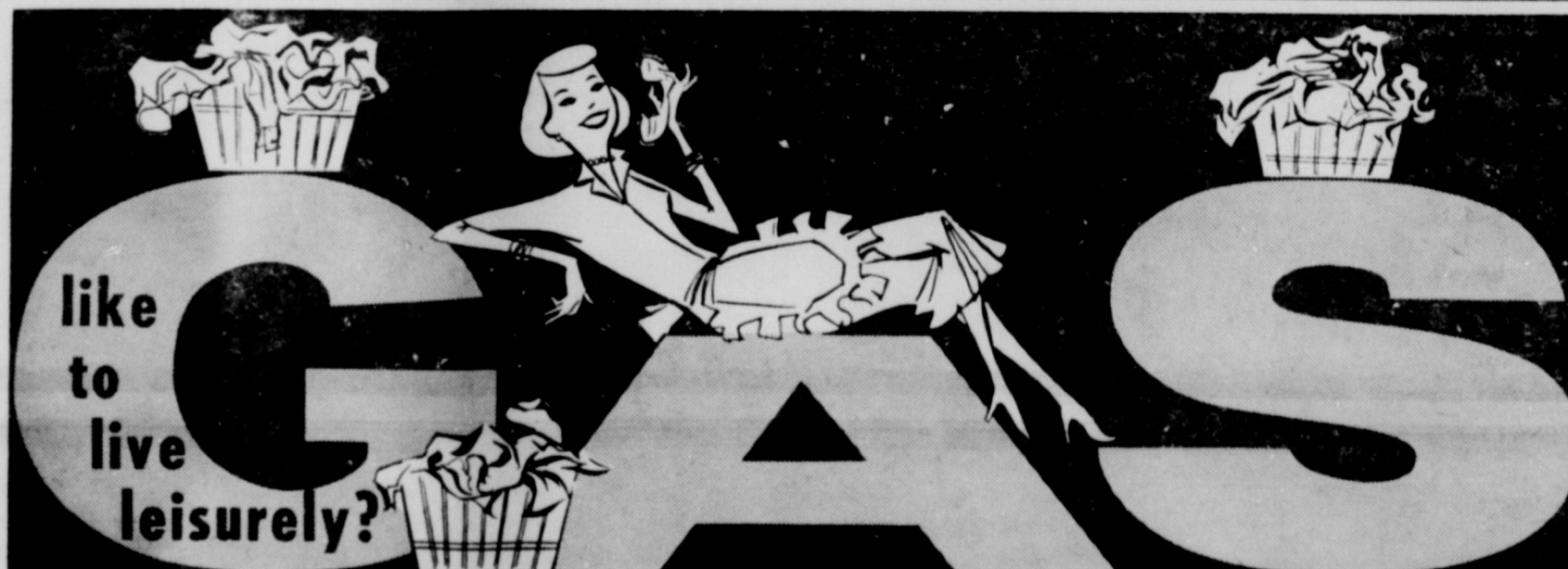

Marshall Formby Probable Candidate For 1962 Governor's Race; Friends Say

Friends of Marshall Formby say he will run for Governor in 1962.

Formby, Plainview attorney and former chairman of the Texas Highway Commission, had been a prospective candidate for Governor for 1960. Recently he announced that he would not run this year because he did not want to engage in the bitter, name-calling campaign it would take to win the race this year against the present Governor who is seeking his third term.

However, Formby has said that his decision not to run this year

does not shut the door on the possibility of a race two years hence.

"It's something like the West Texas farmer who gets hauled out or the dry weather ruins his crop," Formby said. "He always says, 'There will be another year.'"

"I hope that most of our state's financial problems will be solved during the next two years," the Plainview attorney said. "Certainly so long as the Legislature has to spend its entire time trying to solve our financial mess, there will be little time to do anything else for the state."

"If I run in 1962, I shall have a tax program that will bring in

sufficient revenue to finance our state, a tax program that will increase as the state grows so we will not have to have a tax fight every two years.

Formby stated that he regretted he and his friends did not deem it advisable to make the race in 1960. He said he and Daniel had many friends in common, and that many had received favors from the present Governor and naturally would owe him their loyalty.

"And I don't like to put my friends on the spot. Besides a bitter campaign this year would have brought further division among the members of our Texas Democratic party. I believe we need unity and harmony."

"Every time I've run for office I've had a hard-fought campaign. I expect 'hard' campaigns and don't ever expect to run any other kind. But to oust the present Governor from his office would have required the type of campaign that is not good for the individual or for the state."

Formby supporters point out that few men with his qualifications ever offer themselves for the Governorship of Texas. They emphasize that he had been a Texas county judge, a state senator, spent four years with the army engineers in World War II, is a highly successful business man, has been a farmer, and as a member of the Texas Highway Commission for six years helped spend more than a billion dollars in highway construction.

Formby's views about the building of more Farm to Market Roads in Texas are widely known. He contends that the state must build several thousand more miles of FM roads for the benefit of rural Texans and for school bus and mail routes.

He is spending his time now in the practice of law at Plainview, and in looking after his business interests. He visits over the state

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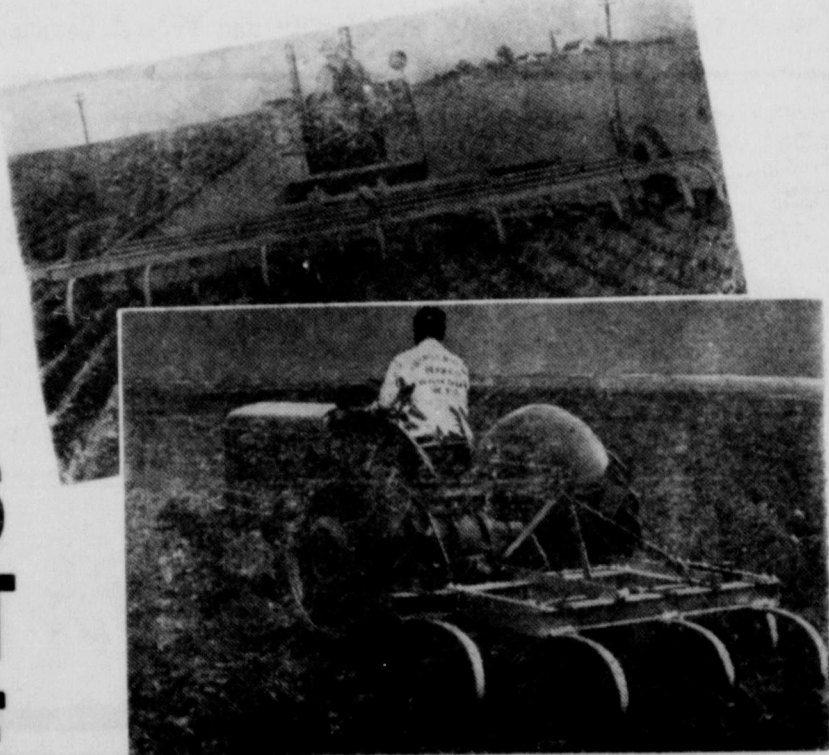

Mr. Hutton went on to say that there seems to be much misunderstanding about how incapacitated a worker must be to be considered disabled for social security purposes. He explained it in this way:

"This program is intended to be protection against loss of income due to complete inability to work in any capacity over a long period of time," Hutton said.

For the Coffee Break!

EVERYBODY will love these tempting little coffee cakes. Make them up ahead of time and freeze until "coffee break" time . . . then bake and serve at once. Or - if you bake the whole batch, we suggest re-heating either foil-wrapped in a moderate oven, or easier yet simply heat in the top of a double boiler.

Coconut Curls

2 tablespoons softened butter;
4 tablespoons brown sugar;
2 cups sifted flour; 2 1/2 teaspoons double-acting baking powder; 3/4 teaspoon salt; 5 tablespoons shortening; 3/4 cup milk (about); 2 tablespoons softened butter; 2 tablespoons brown sugar; 3/4 cup Angel Flake Coconut.

Prepare muffin pans by placing 1/2 teaspoon butter and 1 teaspoon brown sugar in each of 12 sections of pans.

Sift flour once, measure, add baking powder and salt, and sift again. Cut in shortening. Add milk and stir with fork until soft dough is formed (about 20 strokes). Turn out on lightly floured board and knead 30 seconds. Pat or roll lightly into 12 x 9-inch rectangle about 3/4 inch thick. Spread with 2 tablespoons butter; sprinkle with 2 tablespoons brown sugar and the coconut. Roll up as for jelly roll. Cut in 1-inch slices and place in prepared muffin pans. Bake in hot oven (450° F). 12 to 15 minutes. Makes 12.
