A representative of the San Patt Vegetable Co. of Pharr, in South Texas, spoke at a county wide meeting of 125 farmers in the district courtroom at Littlefield Saturday, and indicated that his firm will set up contracts with local growers for 750 to 1000 acres of vegetables.

Sixteen farmers met with Benson after he had spoken to the larger group, and expressed their intention of signing contracts with the company.

Benson told farmers that he was impressed with this county as a vegetable growing area, and predicted the program could be expanded after the first year.

Present plans call for the company to send a representative to Littlefield in late February to supervise vegetable growing among the participating farmers. Benson said, under the plan of operation, his firm would furnish seed and supervision, also labor for harvesting and packing. Farmers would be paid for their vegetables as they are sold, he said.

Contracts with the growers would be largely for producing onions and carrots, with some lettuce growing included.

A steering committee was organized to study and plan the organization of a Lamb County Vegetable Growers Association.

The committee consists of F. E. Yohner and Buddy Bingham, both of Littlefield; Earl Parish, Springlake; Henry Aigaki, Olton and Frank Carver, Anton.

The meeting Saturday was sponsored by the Littlefield Board of City Development, the Littlefield office of the Texas Extension Service and the Littlefield Chamber of Commerce.

Noble Dudgets of Sudan is now employed at the B. and C. Pump and Machine Works.

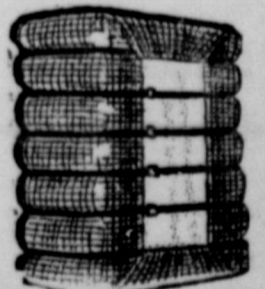

In spite of the tremendous responsibility of parents in raising their children, they are blamed too much when things go wrong. The active help of the community is a MUST for prevention, because we of modern society have made conditions so different from those of a few decades ago.

1. We (society) have made it so that there are few chores to make youngsters feel a necessary part of the family economic unit.

2. We have turned life into a complex, confusing rush, with nerves and hurry uppermost.

3. We have made a multitude of cars, taverns, etc., accessible to the youngsters we have idled, together with much easy money, many bad examples.

4. We can help organize more church youth groups, teen caucuses, Scout troops, etc., volunteering for the needed leadership.

5. Help provide more family counseling services, child guidance clinics, etc.

6. Help provide more paid or volunteer probation officers and more detention facilities.

Farm and Ranch Taxes In Texas Up For Tenth Year In A Row

College Station — Farm and Ranch taxes in Texas have risen for 10 consecutive years and agricultural prices have declined for four consecutive years, almost doubling the tax load of Texas farmers and ranchmen during the 5-year period.

L. P. Gabbard of the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station and Tommy W. Smith of the Agricultural Research Service, USDA, who made the survey said that the average tax per acre on farm and ranch real estate in Texas last year was 31.8 cents, an increase of .3 cent, or 2.6 percent over 1955.

It is the highest tax per acre yet reached in Texas, they pointed out.

While the average tax increased 2.6 percent for the state, it declined as much as 17.1 percent in some section of the Rolling Plains, and increased as much as 22.4 percent in the Corpus Christi cotton producing area.

The distribution of farm real estate taxes to the various types of governmental units remains practically unchanged as public schools, including junior colleges, received 56.7 percent of the total.

Farm personal property tax declined slightly, probably because of declining prices for agricultural commodities and prolonged drought.

Areas in which the average tax per acre decreased are, for the most part, devoted to grazing. This may reflect the economic stress on

ranchmen because of falling cattle prices and drought conditions.

Taxes have risen in Texas generally because of rising costs of local government. Property taxes are the main source of local government revenue, the economists concluded. Therefore, no relief is in sight for farmers and ranchmen, at least so long as property taxes are the primary source of support of local government.
