A five-year construction and improvement program which envisions an investment of more than \$144-million between now and the end of 1976 to stay ahead of the electric service needs of this area was announced today by Roy Tolk, president of the Southwestern Public Service Company.

"We see nothing but growth - real growth - in the future of our area. It is not a question of a 'created demand' for electric power, which is the current battle cry of the uninformed critics of our industry, but it is a true growth based on the development of the area's economic potential and customers' need for more electrical power. There really wouldn't be much sense in planning to invest nearly \$150 million if all you were doing was trying to make headlines."

"This region, and the nation as well, needs more electric power not only for growth, but for environmental considerations. Electricity is the cleanest of all energies at the point of consumption, and we will need more and more clean energy for sewage and water treatment, disposal of wastes and the solution of other environmental problems," Tolk said in announcing the construction plans.

Generating station additions scheduled for the five-year period will add more than 600,000 kilowatts to the company's power production capability. At the present time, the 11 major power stations produce a little more than 2,000,000 kilowatts.

The first of these capacity additions is already under construction as the second unit at Jones Station, southeast of Lubbock. A 256,000 kilowatt unit, it is scheduled to be in service for the summer of 1974. The first Jones Station generator, also a 256,000 kilowatt unit, went into service earlier this year.

The generating unit planned for 1976 operation is slated to be the company's first 350,000 kilowatt machine. However, the company has "reserved" three capabilities - 250,000, 350,000 and 450,000 - with the manufacturer, and the final decision will be made after all growth factors have been weighed.

"We have some interesting options with this 1976 unit. In June of 1972, we will complete

an intertie between our company and the Public Service Company of Oklahoma. This is our first major interconnection with another utility. The tie line offers us the opportunity to exchange power; to sell power into power-deficient areas; to install units with larger capacity, and to locate units where fuel and water resources and load balances are most favorable. These are factors of efficiency and economy which are important to our customers, as these factors will be combined to provide the least costly kilowatt hour for the customers," Tolk said.

Also, in its continuing efforts to conserve the resources of the region, the company plans to install a combined cycle unit at its Riverview Station, near Borger, in 1973.

The combined cycle unit is a gas turbine capable of producing 25,000 kilowatts of electric power.

The heat that remains in the gas turbine exhaust, after the electric power is produced, is used to provide a major part of the steam requirement of a steam turbine unit at the plant.

The result is that more power is generated with less fuel and water as a result of the combination than could be accomplished with the two units operation separately. So there is both fuel and water conservation.

Expanding on the intertie with Public Service Company of Oklahoma, Tolk said that the 230,000 volt transmission line would run from Southwestern's Nichols Station, northeast of Amarillo, to Elk City, Oklahoma.

"We have been responsible for providing our own power resources since this company was formed. I'm happy to say that we have always had an adequate supply and ample reserves. This new tie will make us members of the Southwest Power Pool and will provide a market for any excess power we might have at off-peak times. It is conceivable that, by the process of transformation from one adjacent area to another, our excess off-peak capability will make it possible to help other companies meet their needs as far away as the east coast," Tolk pointed out.

Tolk went on to say that the company was projecting a 22% reserve margin of available power for the peak demand expected in the summer of 1972.

This is a relatively high margin, but Tolk pointed out that 1972 will be the first full year of operation of the Jones Station first unit, which was installed to meet three years of normal load growth, and that it is normal for the reserve to be higher at this time.

"We'll be right back down to normal reserve capability when it is time for the 1974 unit to come on the line. Then, we'll have additional new capacity to assure our reserve position again. Once you get started in the utility business, it's like perpetual motion, you must stay ahead to meet your obligations to your customers," Tolk said.

Southwestern Public Service Company serves 230,000 customers in a 45,000 square-mile service area running from the southwest corner of Kansas

across the Oklahoma and Texas Panhandles, the South Plains of Texas to the Clovis-Portales and Pecos Valley regions of New Mexico.

When I read in Chapter 29: 7-25, I get the distinct impression Job was right proud of himself. In fact, it has been suggested he had become proud of his innocence. Count the 1's in the material mentioned above and you will come up with approximately 16. That is to say nothing of the me's. Job's problem was his pride allowed him to be come self-centered. Perhaps he couldn't find God because self had obscured his vision. When you are full of self there is no room left for anyone else including God.

Are you self-centered? Has pride so puffed you up that all things must go exactly as you want it or you will not cooperate? That is exactly what breaks up families, churches, communities and nations.

Jack Taylor in his book,

The Key to Triumphant Living says, "The course of self is pre-plotted. It will look at everything with an eye as to how it will be affected. It will always magnify itself. It is touchy, sensitive when not recognized, and always struggles for the position of highest honor and praise. It cannot bear to be rebuked or corrected. It is full of self-defense. It pushes its claims and petty notions on other people. It is destructive and deadly."

Sam Shoemaker in an article entitled "Twelve Steps to Power" says something that might help us. "Do you know what most people do who think they believe in God? They stand right where they are and ask God to bless what they are doing. They do not turn their wills and lives over to God, tell Him they are willing to change and be different and ask Him what He wants them to do. That is why many professing Christians are not

converted and why they have no power.

"Self-surrender is man's part in his own conversion. We cannot and do not convert ourselves; we offer ourselves to God in surrender, and He does the converting by his Holy Spirit, bringing us forgiveness and new life."

Since you haven't had any luck eliminating your self-centeredness why don't you let God do it for you? Can you think of any good reason why you shouldn't?
