LEGAL NOTICES

An ordinance requiring all motor vehicle to stop for School Busses. When stopped to load or unload,

The driver of a vehicle within the city limits, upon meeting or overtaking from either direction any school bus stopped on the traveled portion of any street for the purpose of re-ceiving or discharging school children, shall come to a com-plete stop. After such stop, he may proceed at a prudent rate of speed not to exceed ten (10) miles per hour, and with due care and caution for the safety of such children. The driver of a vehicle upon

a city street or hiway having a separate roadway must stop when a school bus is stopped on a different roadway, or when the school bus is stopped in a loading zone which is a part of or adjacent to a street. and where pedestriars are cross-

ing at street crossing. It shall be the duty of the operator of every school bus to take the license number of any vehicle violating the provisions of this section and report such violation and the date, time and place to the proper Officer and to appear in court and testify to such violation Passed and approved, this the 6th day of February.




