Only 5,451 vehicles have been inspected in Lamb County. This indicates that many motorists continue to postpone having their vehicle inspected. By failing to do it now, drivers face the possibility of waiting in line to obtain their stickers.

Drivers operating vehicles registered in Texas on public roads after April 15 without the 1961 stickers will be subject to arrest and a fine of up to \$200 plus court costs, Johnson stated.

Trailers with a gross weight exceeding 4,000 pounds also must be inspected.

The inspection stickers may be obtained in Earth from Gatewood Ford Sales and in Springlake from Busby Motor.

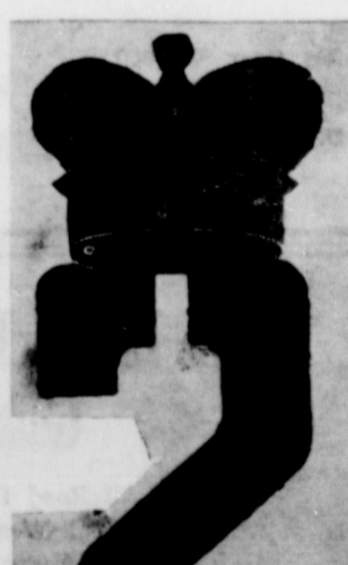

National Automobile Show

Thinking of buying a new car? Or do you just like to browse? Either way, you'll like the 43rd National Automobile Show. It will be in Detroit, Oct. 15-23 - the first major public exhibit at the city's brand new Cobo Hall.



The first show was held in 1900. The idea was to have one every year, but in 1940 World War II broke the string. The only show held since that time was in 1956.

At the first show in 1900, American automobile manufacturers had a problem. Before they could sell cars they had to sell people the idea that the automobile was here to stay. There was already a thriving automobile industry in Europe - especially in France - but American innovators were still tinkering with "horseless carriages."

How to promote a new kind of travel? Get people to try it. So the sponsor of the first show - the Automobile Club of America - offered demonstration rides on a track of wooden planks laid down in New York's Madison Square Garden.

There was no track at the second show. The big thing was the three-way contest between the electric motor, the steam engine, and the "explosion" engine (as it was then called).

Incidentally, in those days everyone who drove was called a "chauffeur." There were no women drivers, so no "chauffeuses."

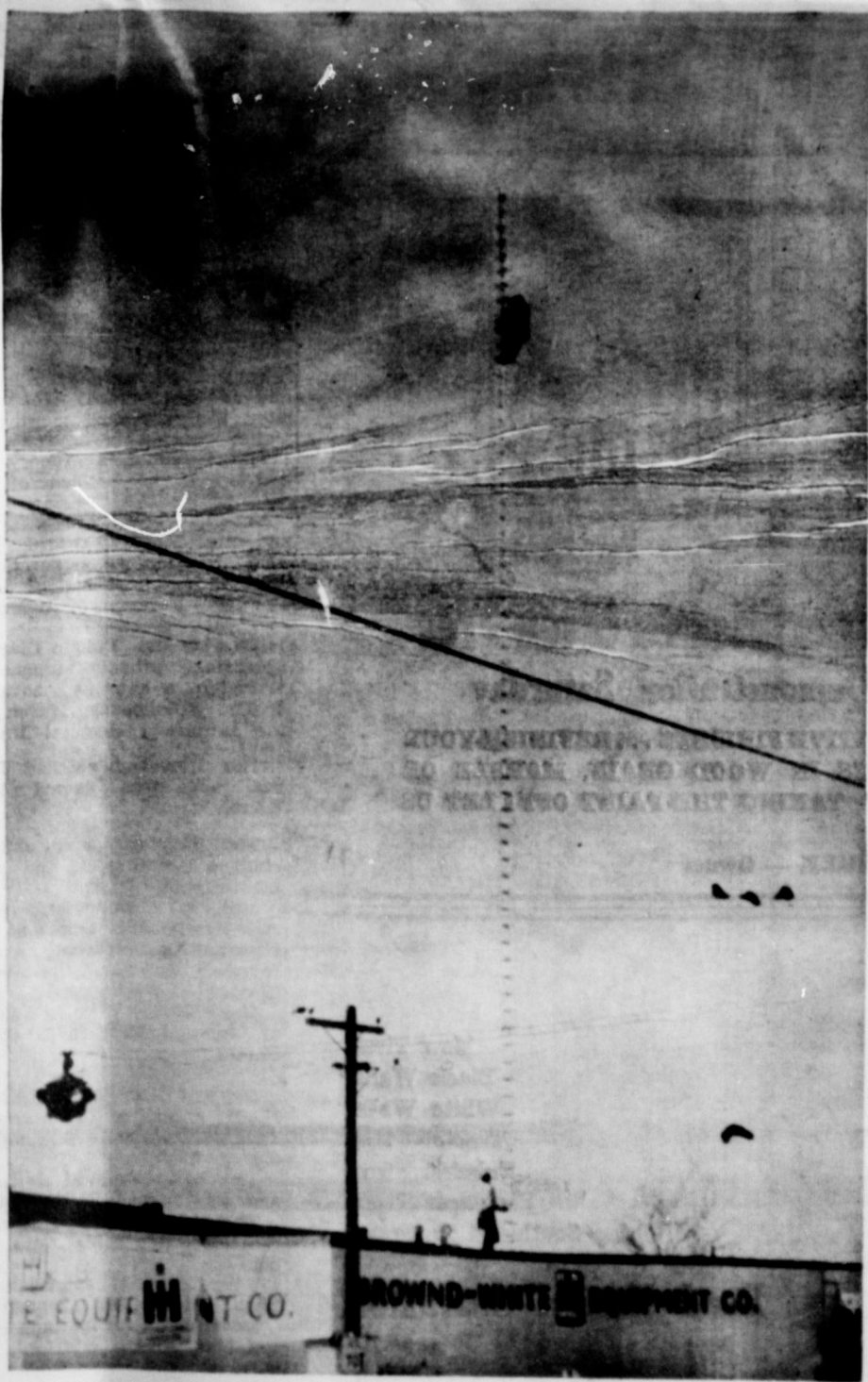

REPORT ON SUGAR BEETS

By George Mahon

Sugar Beet news from Washington is bad. The Department of Agriculture, the State Department and the House Committee on Agriculture are supporting a bill which provides for a 21-month extension of the present stop-gap Sugar Act as opposed to a 9-month extension which prospective sugar beet producers have been crusading for. Moreover, the bill does not undertake to deal with the new grower and the new-producer area problem in the United

States. In other words, the proposed extension act contains no language which will enable new growers to get into the sugar production.

A larger domestic quota is a must if West Texans and new growers elsewhere are to get into the sugar beet picture. Only 55 per cent of our present sugar requirement is presently being produced by American growers of beet and cane sugar.

The situation is further worsened by the fact that when the vote

comes on the extension bill on Monday, March 20, there will be no chance to offer amendments to change the pending proposal. Consideration of the bill comes under a procedure known as suspension of the rules. Under this procedure the bill loses unless it is approved by a two-third vote. Those of us who oppose the bill will muster all the votes we can. The outcome in the House is, of course, unknown. Supporters of the extension proposal will argue that quick action is necessary because the present law expires on March 31.

Indications are that the chance for limiting the extension to 9 months is better in the Senate

than in the House. House and Senate action will, of course, be required before the bill goes to the President for approval into law.

The proposed extension bill varies only slightly from the present stop-gap law. It permits shifting of beet acreage within the United States, to a limited degree, from deficit areas to other areas. This will not materially help new growers.

The Bill is bad because it provides for 21 months rather than a 9-month extension. Many Members of Congress from sugar beet areas feel as I do that domestic producers should be granted a substantial increase in the production of sugar consumed by the American public. This would still permit foreign countries to supply a substantial portion of the American market. Foreign producers now supply about 45 per cent of the American market.

Another bad thing about the pending bill is that it further delays the time when new growers may have a chance to produce sugar beets. It makes it impossible for sugar beet refinery companies to make firm plans for new mills. It does not take advantage of the present situation in Cuba by providing that hereafter foreign quotas will be reduced moderately in order to give domestic producers a chance to supply a larger portion of the American market. The new grower demands can be met without excluding Cuban growers from future consideration when relations with that country improve.

I shall continue to do everything in my power to be of assistance to West Texans who are interested in growing sugar beets. The press and other news media will, no doubt, carry reports of what happens in this important matter during the next few days.

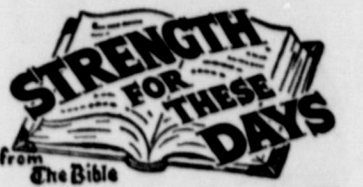

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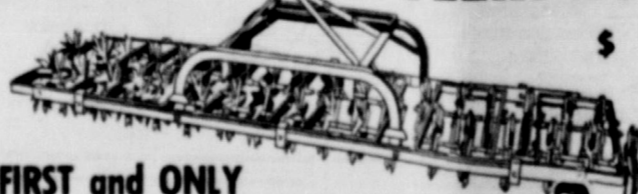

Tips on Touring

 Luggage Care

When the spring cleaning urge strikes, and you're straightening closets, chances are you'll find luggage. To get it in top shape for vacation, give it a beauty-and-health treatment—as follows:



Smooth leather (brown): use saddle soap, thorough drying, paste wax or neutral shoe creme. To lighten, add juice of 1/2 lemon and 1 cup of water; darken with several coats of lemon oil.

Colored leathers: mild soap suds, gently rubbed in, then a polish of neutral shoe creme.

Alligator leather: saddle soap and paste wax.

Rawhide leather: soap. For deep spots, fine steel wool. Reseal leather with shellac, then wax.

Coated fabrics: soap and water. For heavy soiled spots, 2 tbsps. ammonia plus 1 pint water. Finish with liquid linoleum wax, well rubbed in.

Miscellaneous: for scratches in glass fiber luggage, use fine steel wool. Use special metal cleaners for aluminum.

When done, store luggage away from extremes of temperature and humidity or dryness. Protect with luggage covers or heavy paper wrapping. Use name tags or write on paper for quick identification. Don't pile luggage, but stand it on reinforced side.

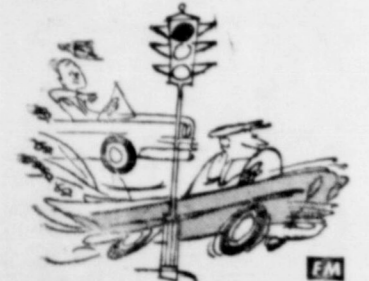

Good Drivers Get Good Mileage

Safe driving—like virtue—is its own reward. And there's a bonus, too: good gasoline mileage. These tips save money—and help avoid trouble.



Speeding wastes gasoline. When driving fast, you use more gasoline than you do at lower speeds because of the increased wind resistance and greater engine and tire friction.

A good driver keeps to a constant speed, and top mileage for most cars comes at a constant speed of 35 or 40 miles an hour. A car that gives 20 miles per gallon at 40 may give only 14 at 70 miles an hour.

Zooming away from stop lights is dangerous and fuel-wasting. So is speeding up to a stop light, then jamming on the brakes. A safe driver anticipates the stop and lets the car's momentum carry him to it. He burned gasoline building up the momentum—why not take advantage of it?

Here are some other tips on gasoline economy: Shift into high gear at the lowest speed you can—but don't strain the engine. If you've stopped for any length of time, stop the engine. Don't race the engine on cold mornings. Use electrical accessories only when you need them. All work done by your car, including generating electricity, takes gasoline.

Safety and economy depend on the same three words—take it easy.
