Since I am the button responsible for the motion that started this \$800,000.00 bond issue which is to be voted on Saturday, I am convinced more than ever that the voters would almost be guilty of a crime if they fail to carry it.

During the last few years Texas has been taken over by a tribe of self-styled "political independents" - perhaps better described as party off-breeds or half-breeds.

These are boys who had grown so fast and so big under the party of their forefathers that they could not resist the siren call of the rich man's party-Republicanism-disguised under the magic name of Eisenhower.

Clean Nesting

Materials

Save Labor

More than half the work on a poultry farm is made up of collecting eggs and getting them ready for market. Dirty eggs provide the greatest problem to the poultryman, says Ben Wormell, extension poultry husbandman, Texas A & M College.

Clean litter and correct management of nests offers the greatest opportunity for preventing egg soilage. One nest should be provided for every four hens, especially in the warmer Texas climate.

A good nest size is 12 inches wide, 14 to 16 inches deep and at least 14 inches high, says Wormell. This is large enough for comfortable laying space. Nesting trays at the bottom of nests should be 4 to 6 inches deep providing high enough sides to hold a good cushion of nesting material, he adds.

Nesting materials should be fine and highly absorbent. Results of a Missouri study of seven nesting materials show that where a fine material such as shavings, oat hulls, sawdust, or

excelsior was used, the percent of clean eggs ranged from 83.4 to 88 percent. Where coarser materials such as ground corn cobs, sugar cane pulp and straw were used, clean egg percentage ranged from 77.6 to 79.7 percent. It was found that it took more time to clean the nests when straw was used than when shavings was the nesting material.

A higher percentage of clean eggs was obtained from drakened nest, states Wormell. Ninety one percent clean eggs were gath from well lighted nests.

Eggs gathered four times a day showed a percentage of 85 percent clean eggs, where only 69 percent clean eggs were secured when gathering eggs only once.

The poultryman who gives the nests uncommonly good care will profit from the savings in time needed to clean eggs and in the increased market value when sold to the trade, says Wormell.

CRIMINAL DEFENDANT HAS CONSTITUTIONAL RIGHT TO BAIL

In the U. S. a defendant in a criminal action is presumed to be innocent until his guilt is established beyond a reasonable doubt. His guilt or innocence is established at his trial—not when he is arrested.

With this concept in mind it is not hard to see why the right to bail in criminal cases is guaranteed by the Constitution of the United States, with the exception of capital cases. A capital crime is one which the punishment may be death. In Texas murder, treason, rape, and robbery with firearms are capital offenses.

All prisoners are bailable in Texas except where the proof is evident that a capital offense has been committed and it is probable that the jury will assess the death penalty.

An officer making an arrest is required by law to take the accused promptly before a magistrate. It is the duty of the magistrate to examine into the truth of the accusation made. He determines whether the accused should be discharged or bailed or held without bail. If bail is set for the defendant, the magistrate must determine the amount. The law provides a procedure for reviewing these decisions before the Court of Criminal Appeals.

When an accused is on bail when his trial commences he has a right to remain on bail during the trial of his case. Where the punishment of an accused has been assessed at confinement in the penitentiary for fifteen years or less the defendant has the right to remain on bail pending the appeal of his case. If it is more than fifteen years the defendant is held in custody

from the moment the jury returns its verdict.

The Constitution also says that bail cannot be set in excessive amount. What is considered a reasonable amount depends largely on the circumstances and the risk involved. Bail must be set high enough to assure the court and the state that the person will not run away, but will return and submit to the trial on the date set.

The judge usually will ask the prosecuting attorney for a recommendation as to the amount

of bail. The accused's attorney may then ask that the amount recommended be reduced, giving his reasons. The judge will settle on an amount he believes reasonable to assure the accused's presence at the trial.

Occasionally we read of someone "skipping bail." This means that he failed to show up at court at the required time. In such a case the court can order his bail forfeited. The person is still subject to re-arrest and prosecution however.

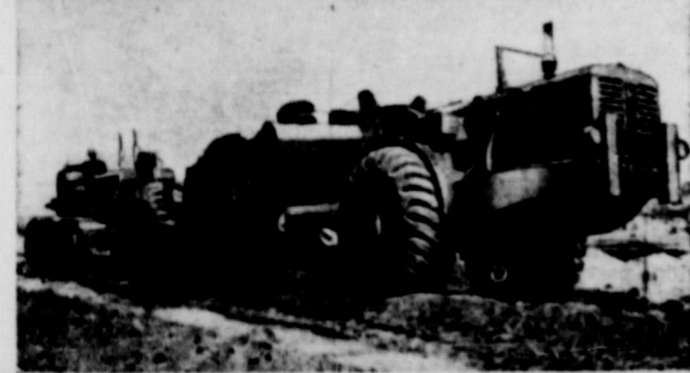

A few junk parts and considerable ingenuity is all it took for Harold Dunson of Seagraves, Texas, to make an automatic electric water trough cleaner. This unit makes cleaning the water troughs in his caged layer house an easy silent job. Mr. Dunson finds this advantage important in caring for his 1,140 laying hens.
For the power unit he used a discarded portable ironer. After removing the ironer roll and cylinder, he mounted a 12" squirrel cage blower from a discarded evaporative cooler.
To make the cleaner unit, he took a 10-inch bolt on which he mounted three cubes of sponge by forcing the bolt through the centers. To separate the sponges he used a one-half inch water pipe cut in lengths of about 1 1/2 inches for spacers between the sponge cubes. Also, as an additional aid to cleaning, he placed a one-half inch wide square steel wool at the forward end of the center sponge.
One length of fishing string connects the forward end of the bolt to the drum on the power unit. The other length of string connects the opposite end of the bolt to the rewind reel. When the power is turned on, the electric motor silently and efficiently pulls the bolt cleaner through the trough by winding the string around the drum. When the cleaner has travelled the length of the trough, it is removed; and the two strings are tied together for rewinding. The rewind reel simply pulls the fishing strings back through the trough to the starting position, where they are then in position for the next cleaning operation.

Mr. Dunson exhibits his automatic trough cleaning machine. The laying hens are not disturbed in any way when this equipment is in operation.



This hand operated rewind reel keeps the fishing string from tangling and keeps it ready to be used again. One length of the string remains in the trough between cleanings.

As the strings are wound around the drum, the cleaner bolts are pulled through the water troughs. The ironer provides slow, steady power for the cleaning operation.

By placing the power unit in line with the center trough, additional troughs can be cleaned by duplicating the cleaning bolts and strings. The ironer motor has enough power to pull several cleaners at one time. Mr. Dunson cleans three troughs at one time.

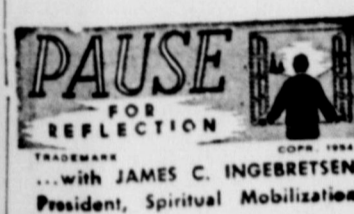
