

Past Fifty Years See Many Changes Made In Springlake Schools

As we sat in the High School auditorium on Friday afternoon and as we walked to the cafeteria afterwards, noting the beautiful campus as we went along, I was filled with the spirit of reminiscing of what great changes can take place in a new country in fifty years, for it was that long ago when I was a student(?) in the one-roomed building that was the first Springlake school, then

in its second year. There was one teacher, eight grades and seventy pupils the first two years, then a new room was added. (The last vestige of those early years was removed last summer when the apartments behind the old gym were moved away. They were moved to the present campus in 1924). But the number of pupils fell off sharply soon because so many families having lost all they owned because of draught, had

gone back where they came from to start over again. My parents were among these, but never left their children a heritage of religious faith and ideals much more valuable than gold.

When I returned in 1917 after a few years away in school and teaching, the school situation was much the same as it was when I left. My job was with the first 4 or 5 grades, the rest with a

nother teacher. My salary was \$60 a month which was \$10 more than the first year I taught near Dawn, Texas.

With the exception of a family or two who walked to school, everyone came in buggies or on horseback and there was a barn at the back of the school where the horses could be cared for.

The closest to a locker in those days were nails on the wall at the back of the room for wraps

to hang on and our lunch buckets under our seats. I say lunch buckets, if you had a real lunch bucket you were the envy of all the others. Mostly if was syrup buckets.

Fun at recess and noon consisted of playing blackman, red rover or ante-over the school house. Nearly every day some two would run into each other playing the latter and knock the breath out of each other. Oh, we played and we taught here together

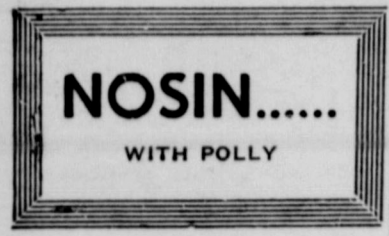
scrub base ball too, and basket ball on outside courts. Interschool games were unheard of.

Literary societies were the big events in school life then and they usually met once a month. There the children put on the program and parents would come from miles around to see them give dialogues recitations and hear them sing.

A few years later when Mr. Hinson was back from the war (1921-22) now well I remember

the day when a blizzard blew up and it was so bad that a number of the children had to spend the night with us. The parents had enough faith to know we would take care of them.

We have come a long way since then and we have a school plant now that we could never have dreamed of 50 years ago. But we still have men of vision for trustees, dedicated teachers and youth eager to learn. Please God may it always be that way.

Three Car Wrecks In Four Day Period at Earth

Three car wrecks in less than a week is entirely too many.

Luckily no one was injured in either of the three wrecks which occurred in, and near Earth this week.

The first of the series of accidents occurred Sunday afternoon about 3:30 p.m. when J. B. Eagle driving a Ford truck with a grain bed and traveling south on the farm to market road, north of Earth, made a left hand turn into the H. N. Seymour place.

Jessie Becks, colored, also traveling south attempted to pass Eagle, just as he made the turn, hit the back of the truck with minor damages to the truck.

Becks was driving a Chevrolet pickup. Damages to the pickup were estimated at approximately \$700.00.

The wreck was investigated by the Highway Patrol assisted by deputy V. L. Smith Jr.

The second accident occurred about 11:30 a.m. Tuesday, when a diesel refrigerated truck driven by Clayton Bailey, Dallas, traveling west on main street collided with a pickup driven by L. A. Glasscock, Earth.

The accident occurred near the Justice of Peace office as Glasscock pulled out from the curb in front of the truck.

The truck hit the left side of the pickup. Approximately \$500.00 damage was estimated to the pickup.

Highway Patrolman John Bentley, Muleshoe, investigated the accident.

The third accident occurred Wednesday morning at 8:50 a.m. in the intersection of Main and Cedar streets.

A 1952 model pickup driven by Gary Bulls was in collision with a 54 model Chevrolet driven by M. O. Carter.

Bulls was traveling east on main street and Carter was traveling north on Cedar, crossing main. The pickup was hit on the right rear fender.

Estimated damages were approximately \$100.00 to the pickup and \$150.00 to the car.

Deputy V. L. Smith investigated the accident.

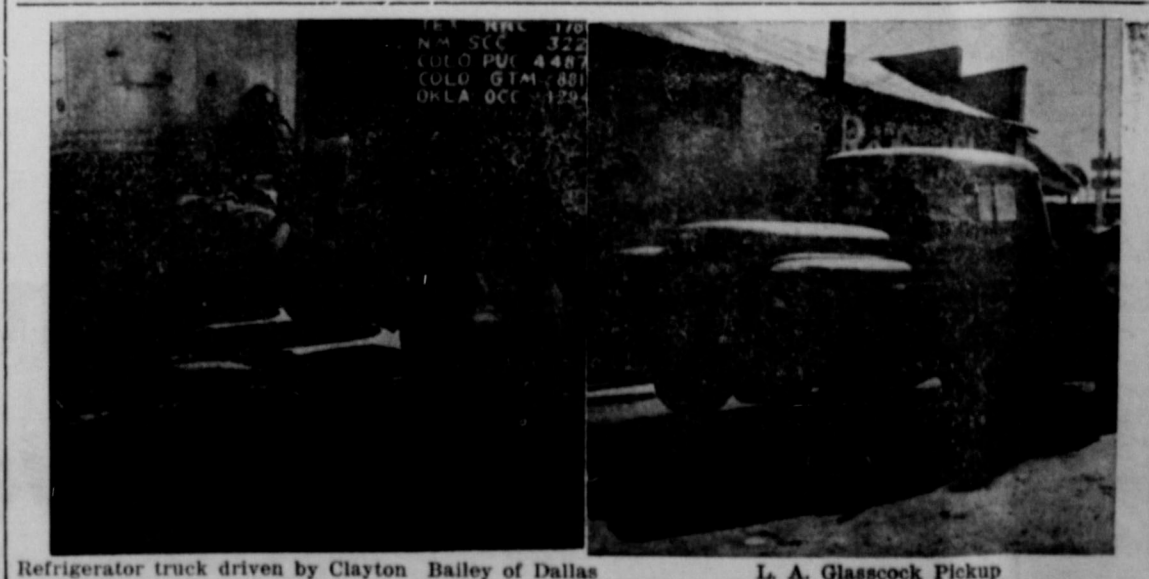

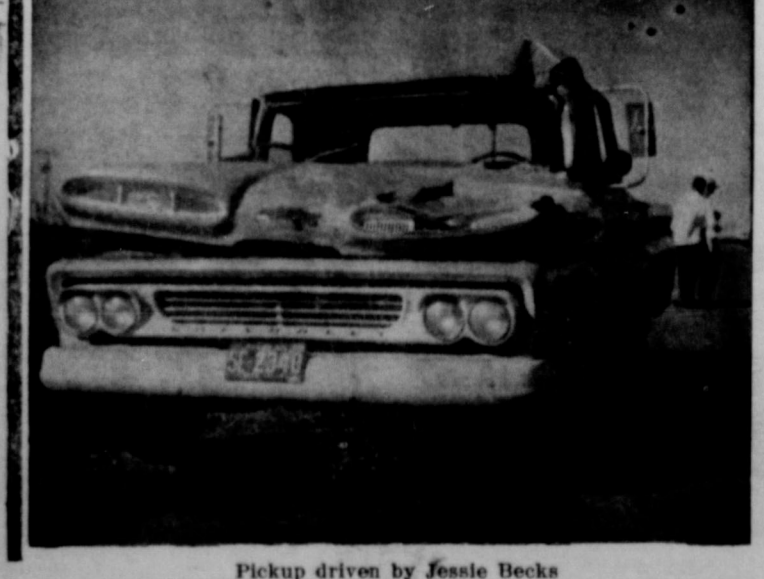

Hi-Plains Hi-Lights

NEWS from the High Plains Research Foundation

One hundred seventy-two bushels of corn per acre was top yield in the 1960 Corn Variety Test at the High Plains Research Foundation. The High Plains Research Foundation test was 138 bushels per acre, Dr. Earl H. Collister, chief agronomist, announced.

These 16 varieties were planted April 21 and were sidedressed with 120 pounds of actual nitrogen (Uran) on May 23. They were harvested September 21. The corn was irrigated three times plus a one half inches, with far above average rainfall during the growing season.

The percent of stalk breakage (lodging) ranged from 1.84 to 15.94 percent in the 16 varieties. Most varieties stood well until harvest with no root lodging. Early vigor ranged from good to poor. There was no significant difference between yields of the first seven varieties in the test.

All grain yields were calculated at a uniform moisture level at 14 percent. The yields in order were: PAG 485—172.01 bushels; Funks G711AA—171.30; Texas 28—167.82; Asgrow XP 2867—166.29; Watson 24-A—165.49; PAG 454—161.47; Texas 30—159.55; PAG 633W—155.63; Texas 36—155.28; Asgrow 105W—155.21; Asgrow XP 2890—146.54; Texas 17W—145.31; Watson 111—143.94; PAG 434—140.31; Texas 26—128.62; and Texas 34—128.09.

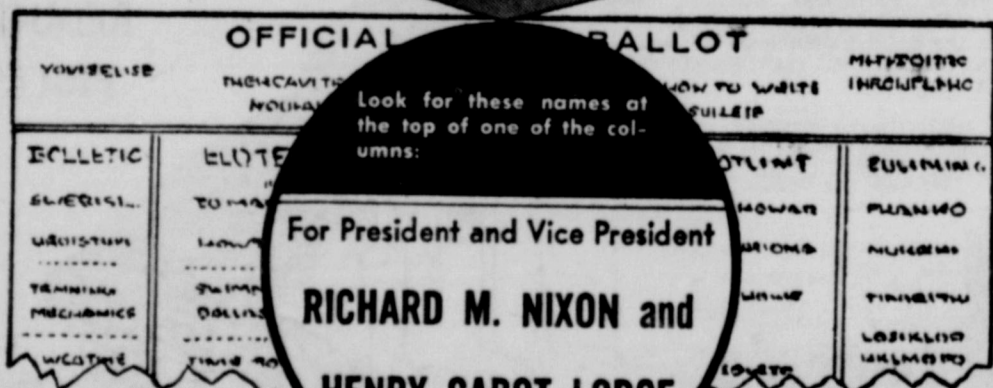

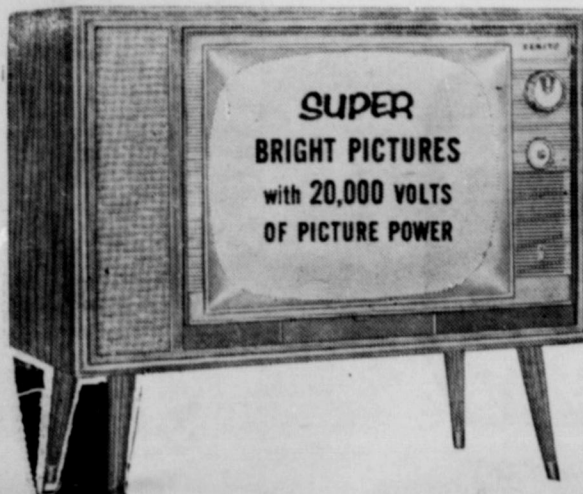

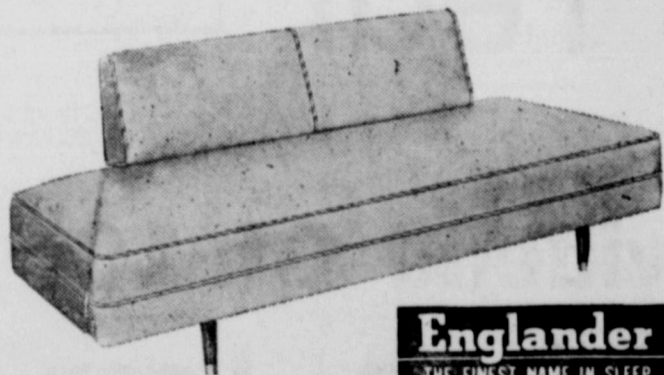
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What Party Shall It Be On Nov. 8

Editor's Note: This article crossed my desk some weeks ago, written by Tom Anderson, well known writer for Farm and Ranch Magazine, under the title of "Straight Talk."

Southern Conservatives (and American patriots anywhere) who stay in the Democratic Party remind me of the two skeletons in the closet. One turned to the other and rattled: "What are we doing in here?" "I don't know," the second skeleton replied, "but if we had any guts we'd get out!"

John Kennedy is a ruthless, cold and cocky kid trying to buy the office with his daddy's money. (Presidential elections have been bought before, but not by one family.) I am a Methodist, and if Kennedy were a poor, mature Methodist bishop from Mississippi, I wouldn't vote for him for dog-catcher because I'd be afraid he'd either socialize the kennel or give it to some foreign country. I think less of Johnson, an All-American hypocrite of such unusual ability he's a modern American menace.

The issue is not Republican vs. Democrat. The issue is not segregation vs. integration. The issue is FREEDOM. Both parties are moving toward an all-powerful international Socialistic dictatorship. A centralized welfare state brings slavery, not freedom. Property rights is the very basis of "human rights." The right to self-determination of associates is the essence of "human dignity." Forced equality is not democracy but dictatorship. Equal men are not free and free men are not equal.

Nixon and Kennedy are young opportunists on the make, riding the Socialist wave as far as it will take them. Neither has the necessary character — but then we haven't had that in any President since Hoover.

Creeping Brinksmanship
I have been a little unfair at times in the past, saying the difference between the Democrat and Republican Parties is merely "which twin has the Toni?" There is a difference, particularly now that Kennedy has taken over. But the difference is not enough to get my vote. I don't believe in creeping Socialism any more than I do in creeping integration.

Depend on Nixon-Lodge to save this country from the international Socialists? Nixon reminds me of the airplane pilot who, with both motors on fire, donned his parachute and soothingly purred to the passengers: "Don't anybody panic! I'm going for help now." Nixon is a politician. Politicians can't save this country. They brought it to this brink of disaster and defeat.

Norman Thomas, who should know, has said that we've made more progress toward Socialism

under Eisenhower than even under Truman. Facts support this statement. Norman Thomas got 267,420 votes for President in 1928 and a little more than half of that in 1948. Thomas now says both candidates are satisfactory to him.

Nixon is lesser-of-evils. Lesser-of-evils is a wasted vote. Voting for lesser-of-evils is an endorsement of evil. There is no way to win, voting for lesser-of-evils. You are silencing your voice, disfranchising yourself if you vote for lesser-of-evils.

I'm not sure a Kennedy victory would be catastrophic. Just like I'm not sure the nation wouldn't have been better off if Norman Thomas had been elected in 1932, or Stevenson in 1952. These candidates are for what they call "human rights," the brotherhood of man, welfare state. They are for International Socialism, although some haven't the courage to call it that. If Thomas, Stevenson, or Kennedy or their like should get a chance to install their all-powerful federal state, then the people would have a choice. An opposition party would arise. (Of course, by defaulting each succeeding skirmish as it occurs. In fact, it may be better to join full-scale battle now — win or lose — than surrender on the installment plan. Otherwise, there'll be no final major battle to win. Just the firing squad. I believe in staying in any organization — and that includes my church — only so long as there is a chance to save it. The Democrat Party is not even worth talking about saving. Evidently Senator Goldwater thinks he can save the Republican Party. A party owned by Nixon, Dewey, Percy, Rockefeller, Lodge, Keating, Rogers, Javits — can't be saved from Socialism. Goldwater has as much chance of returning the Republican Party to Americanism, Constitutionalism and states rights as Neville Chamberlain had at Munich.

A platform is worth no more than the man who runs it. And that makes both platforms virtually valueless. A platform is like a wedding dress: used only once, and even then it sometimes flies false colors.

I went to both conventions. Delegates at both had this obvious characteristic: The Party comes first. Many of them would support a Castro-Cyrus Eaton ticket if it would get the most votes. The delegates of both parties are primarily self-seeking politicians, influence peddlers and limelight junketeers without the integrity or the courage to buck the tide. Letting these people decide who should save our country in these times

Don't Waste Your Vote

In some states it is relatively easy to get somebody to vote for on the ballot — an independent candidate or unpledged independent electors. Your clean-cut dissent in this way makes your voice heard.

There could be 57 free electors in the South. It takes 269 electoral votes to elect a ticket. In 1948, if those 57 votes had been taken from Truman, he'd have been 20 votes short. In that event, the House could have elected Strom Thurmond President. Unlikely? Yes. But there is a small chance. And I'll take that, however small, in preference to voting lesser-of-evils.

Some people say a third party can't be successful. That's not true. The most successful political party in this country is the Socialist Party. It hasn't lost an election since 1932.

Every Vote Important

(Clipped from Lubbock Avalanche-Journal)

WITH THE Presidential candidates on the homestretch, the necessity for arousing the electorate and getting out the full vote is being emphasized by leaders of both parties.

Yet, in spite of frenzied efforts to get people to the polls, it seems likely that a great many will stay home on election day.

This has been the story since the beginning in this country, which has the poorest percentage voting record of any of the great democracies.

One reason many fail to cast ballots is that they are not convinced their votes count for much. Many are inclined to ask: "Is my vote really important?"

Many times, in recent months, it has been pointed out that a single vote can be decisive in an election. In fact, it has been written about so much that the information has become almost

trite. It has been shown that at least five times, in the past 100 years, Presidential elections have been decided by votes from a single State. And sometimes, by a very small margin in that State.

But frequently overlooked is the fact that one Congressional vote gave Statehood to California, Idaho, Oregon, Texas, and Washington—and today, all the millions living in those five States are Americans by just one vote.

The story of what happened in the case of Texas is particularly interesting here. Texas is in the Union because one man decided to vote.

The story is that a grain miller in Indiana was on his way to work, too busy to vote. But somebody persuaded him to take off a few minutes and go to the polls.

The Representative from his town won by one vote. It was the State Legislator's one vote that sent Ed Hannegan to the United States Senate from Indiana. (In those days, U. S. Senators were elected by State Legislatures.)

Hannegan cast the deciding vote in the U. S. Senate admitting Texas to the Union.

If the grain miller hadn't voted for the State Legislator, who voted for Hannegan; and if Hannegan hadn't voted to admit Texas to the Union, this State probably still would be a Republic.

This may seem an extreme case, but it does emphasize the value of a single vote.

George Washington said in his famous Farewell Address: "The basis of our political system is the right of people to make and alter their constitutions of Government."

But the right is meaningless unless every citizen exercises that privilege—and duty—by voting.
