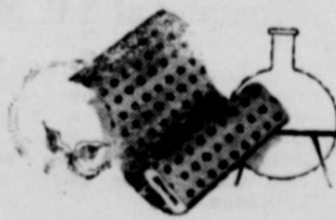

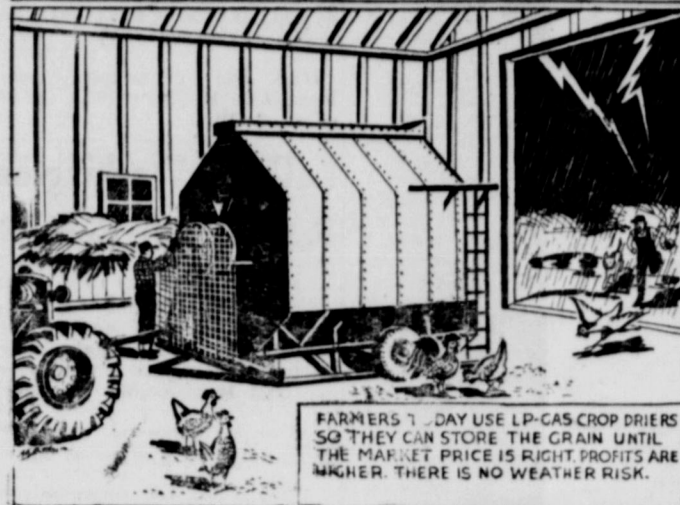

# Wheat Referendum Set For July 21

College Station. — In line with currently controlling legislation, Secretary of Agriculture Benson has proclaimed marketing quotas on the 1961 wheat crop and set July 21 as the date for a referendum to determine producer approval or disapproval of quotas.

The Secretary also proclaimed a national wheat acreage allotment of 55 millions acres, the minimum permitted by law and announced State shares of the allotment. Texas' share of the allotment was set at 4,047,136 acres. This compares with 4,092,251 acres in 1960. An announcement was also made that the minimum national average support price for the 1961 production will be determined before the wheat referendum in the basis of the latest available supply information.

If producers approve marketing quotas, under the proclamation announced, the national average support price available to eligible growers in the commercial area will be not less than the minimum support to be announced before the referendum. On basis of the present supply of wheat and present legislation, the legal minimum wheat support price for the 1961 crop would be at 75 percent of parity.

Individual farm marketing quotas will be the normal production or the actual production from the farm acreage allotment, whichever is larger. Growers in the commercial area who stay within their allotments will be eligible for price support on their entire production. Growers who exceed their acreage allotments will be subject to market quota penalties if they have more than 15 acres of wheat for harvest.

Growers who sign applications for exemption under the feed wheat provision permitting 30 acres or less to be used exclusively for feed on the farm will not be subject to marketing quota penalties.

If marketing quotas are not approved by the necessary two-thirds of the voting producers in the July 21 referendum, there will be no restrictions on wheat marketing. Acreage allotments will remain in effect as a condition of eligibility for price support at 50 percent of parity as required by law.

# Galveston Psycho Hospital Repairs Cut Charity Aid

Galveston — Texas doctors are being notified by mail this week that until major renovations to the Galveston State Psychopathic Hospital are completed, in about one year, no more indigent patients can be admitted.

Target date for resumption of admissions of the normal patient load of approximately 100 is June, 1961. Meanwhile, the staff of the hospital will continue with the care and treatment of private patients by utilizing temporary facilities of The University of Texas Medical Branch's Faculty House, some sections of the R. Waverly Smith Pavilion and by opening the completely remodeled Randall Pavilion, which has been under repair for more than a year.

Preparing for the temporary bed shortage necessitated by air conditioning and remodeling of the 175-bed main building for the mentally ill, curtailment of indigent patient admissions began early last month. The renovation is the second phase of important rebuilding of psychiatric hospital facilities, and part of a broader expansion & modernization program it started with the conversion of the former Negro hospital into the newly-named Randall Pavilion, now completed.

This will be occupied by staff and patients of the medical branch's psychiatric unit starting in mid-June.

Plans for renovating another building used by the psychiatric division will get underway as work starts on the main psychiatric hospital. Meanwhile, other renovation work is proceeding throughout major areas of the 40-building complex of structures comprising the Medical Branch.



## First Class Mail Delivery Service Speedup Announced by Postoffice

Postmaster General Arthur E. Summerfield today announced sweeping improvements in mail service for Earth and 121 other communities in the Amarillo and Lubbock metropolitan areas, covering over 37,000 square miles.

Discussing the program at a meeting of postmasters in Amarillo, Geo. A. Gray, Regional Operations Director, said that 900,000 people in the 40 Texas counties would benefit by better mail service.

Barring infrequent delays in media of transportation and occasional distribution errors first-class letters mailed at designated collection boxes or in the post office before 5 p.m. on a business day will be delivered on the first delivery at any office in the areas on the following business day.

"Tests just concluded," Mr. Gray said, "proved the mail pattern to be highly successful. Approximately 600,000 first-class letter originate on an average business day in post offices within these two metropolitan areas. Approximately 66 per cent of this mail is destined for points within the area. We have tested our newly changed operations with highly gratifying results."

He pointed out that mail for and from offices outside the area, all over the United States, will be expedited by the new arrangement. Accelerating the flow of mail in the metropolitan areas, it was explained, is part of the vast postal program which has next-day delivery between any two cities in the country as its long range objective. The revised mail pattern is based on the establishment of sectional centers to which mail from outlying offices is brought for consolidation, distribution and onward dispatch for connection with trunk line facilities, principally at Amarillo.

These sectional centers have been established at Amarillo, Childress, Lubbock and Plainview.

Post Offices near one of these sectional centers will send their mail to that point for processing. Fast non-stop service over the highway will carry the mail to Amarillo and Lubbock for dispatch to destination. Special connections have been established via fast truck service north of Amarillo.

Some towns could not be brought within the plan because of the distance involved; however, slightly earlier mailing would assure the mailer the benefit of metropolitan area service.

Mobile sectional centers which consist of mail distribution cars in trains and buses equipped for on route distribution, are also utilized in the program.

The plan required an intricate pattern of interlocking schedules.

with connection being made within a matter of minutes at many places. For instance, a letter from Roaring Springs to Levelland travels six different routes, including one train; it is transferred at five different locations.

Mr. Gray explained that the next-day delivery depends on the conscientious attention of postal employees as well as the closely integrated time table which governs the area's postal units and the transportation linking them together.

He said this improvement in letter mail service is the result of intensive study, and he credits the cooperation of dedicated postal employees in the 125 offices involved.

The counties in the area are Armstrong, Bailey, Briscoe, Carson, Castro, Childress, Cochran, Collingsworth, Cottle, Crosby, Dallam, Deaf Smith, Donley and Floyd.

## USDA Now Has Packers And Stockyards Div.

College Station, — Secretary of Agriculture Ezra Taft Benson has announced establishment of a Packers and Stockyards Division in the Agricultural Marketing Service of the U. S. Department of Agriculture, effective July 1.

"The scope of expanding activities resulting from the amended Packers and Stockyards Act, and its importance to livestock producers and the processing and marketing industries serving livestock producers, makes it advisable to concentrate the responsibilities and functions under the Act in a separate division," the Secretary said.

The Packers and Stockyards Act was amended in 1955 to bring under Department regulation all livestock transactions in interstate commerce. The Act also requires investigation and regulatory functions dealing with unfair, deceptive, discriminatory or monopolistic practices on the part of packers.

## What Does The Bible Say About "Buy The Truth"

Solomon the wise man said: "Buy the truth and sell it not" (Prov. 23:23). Though spoken 3,000 years ago, this is good 20th century advice. We need to acquire the truth, at all costs, and never let it go. Hear Solomon again: "Let not mercy and truth forsake thee; bind them about thy neck; write them upon the table of thine heart." (Prov. 3:3).

In almost every walk of life, men and women of integrity despise carriers of things hypocritical, the false, the sham, the counterfeit. Any man who joins himself to these things winds up the loser.

But, shouldn't we be just as careful about religious truth. Isn't it worthwhile for us to investigate and be certain that we have "bought the truth" in religion? Jesus said, "And ye shall know the truth, and the truth shall make you free" (John 8:32). Only the truth in religion will save us and make us free from our sins. However, we must love the truth and be willing to obey it. "Seeing ye have purified your souls in obeying the truth" (Pet. 1:22). You can know the truth but fail to obey it, and thus remain in your sins. Obedience to the truth will assure you of eternal salvation (Heb. 5:9).

a strong delusion, that they should believe a lie; that they all might be damned who believe not the truth, but had pleasure in unrighteousness." (2 Thess. 2:10-12). Think of it God allows some to plunge right into destruction! Why? THEY DON'T LOVE THE TRUTH!

God instructed the prophet of old: "Now go, write it before them in a table, and note in a book, that it may be for the time to come for ever and ever; that this is a rebellious people, lying children, children that WILL NOT HEAR the Law of the Lord; which say to the seers, See not; and to the prophets, prophesy NOT unto us RIGHT THINGS, speak unto us SMOOTH THINGS, prophesy DECEITS" (Isa. 30:8-10). This was a dark hour in the life of national Israel. Is there any wonder that this nation lost its glory and power in the world? —It is true "that happened a long time ago." But, let us learn the lesson today. Listen to Paul: "For the time will come when they will not endure sound doctrine; but after their own lusts shall they heap to themselves teachers, having ITCHING EARS; and they SHALL TURN AWAY THEIR EARS FROM THE TRUTH, and shall be turned unto fables" (2 Tim. 4:3-4). They want their preachers to speak things that are "smooth" which will please their "itching ears."

A true servant of God will preach the truth which people need to hear—not the sweet-sounding lies which they may desire. Paul said, "Do I seek to please men? for if I please men, I should not be the servant of Christ" (Gal. 1:10). Let every religious teacher "speak the TRUTH in love." (Eph. 4:15). Let him not shut to declare "ALL the counsel of God" (Acts 20:27). "If any man speak, let him speak as the oracles of God" (1 Pet. 4:11). Then let every hearer "search the scriptures daily" to see whether he is hearing the TRUTH (Acts 17:11). Let us one and all, "BUY THE TRUTH and sell it not" (Prov. 23:23).
