Dr. F. B. Faust summoned to the scene, said Murdock probably suffered fractures of the vertebrae, ribs and skull. He was rushed to Methodist Hospital in Lubbock by Parsons Funeral Home Ambulance called from Olton.

The accident occurred about 11:45 a.m. Monday at the Earth Gin yard. Murdock and two other truckers, all employees of Thomas Motor Freight of Dallas, were unloading pipe at the time of the accident.

The truckers had hauled the pipe from Houston for use in Earth by Pioneer Natural Gas Co. The pipe weighs an estimate 18 pounds per foot.


An excellent base for many frozen desserts is low-calorie dessert topping mix combined with a variety of flavorings and colorings. Try the recipe given here, then, using the same measurements for flavor and color, make your own version to fill some extra paper cups and store them in your freezer.

Mint Chocolate Flake Cups  
1/2 cup milk; 1/2 teaspoon vanilla; 1/2 teaspoon peppermint extract; 3 or 4 drops green food coloring; 1 package Dream Whip; 1 square candy making chocolate, shaved.

Combine milk, vanilla, peppermint extract, food coloring and dessert topping mix in a small bowl with narrow bottom. Blend, then beat until mixture forms soft peaks. Fold in shaved chocolate. Spoon into small paper cups and freeze about 4 hours. Makes 4 to 6 servings.



## Farm Allotment Base For Upland Cotton

Farm Allotment Ease for Upland Cotton

Beginning with 1961 Farm cotton allotment work the full amount of the preceding year allotment will be used as the base only if an acreage equal to at least 75 per cent of such allotment is actually planted to cotton or is regarded as planted under the release provisions or the conservation reserve or Great Plains Program. Where this 75 per cent requirement is not met, the farm base will be the average of (a) the preceding year allotment and (b) the sum of uses made of the allotment determined for purposes of applying the 75 per cent requirement just mentioned. For example: If a farm with a 20 acre allotment for 1960 has only 10 acres of uses for that year for purposes of the 75 per cent rule, the base to be used to establish the 1961 farm allotment will be 15 acres (20 plus 10 divided by 2).

Under present law, each old cotton farm is guaranteed an allotment of not less than the smaller of 10 acres or the 1958 farm allotment. The bill provides that farms protected by this minimum allotment provision shall also be subject to the 75 per cent provision discussed in the preceding paragraph. For example: If a farm received an 8 acre allotment for 1960 because the 1958 farm allotment was 8 acres, and in 1960 only 4 acres were planted or regarded as planted on the farm, the minimum allotment base for purposes of establishing the 1961 farm allotment will be reduced from 8 acres to 6 acres (8 plus 4 divided by 2).

The provision used in the 1951, 1955, and 1956 allotment programs for cotton giving farms history acreage equal to the farm allotment if as much as 90 per cent of the farm allotment was planted,

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

The recent decline has not been surprising when one considers that in most presidential election years stocks have reached their high points early in the year and subsequently declined: in fact, in three presidential years following World War II (1948, 1952 and 1956) stocks reached a high point in January and then declined an average of almost 8%. Subsequently in the year, however, they reached new highs.

The pattern of the stock market in a presidential election year is so compelling that it cannot be ignored. In 14 of the past fifteen of these particular years, the market has sold higher at some later point in the year than it did in the first part. Only in 1949 when France fell during World War II and stocks took a drastic decline in May did the averages fail to exceed the high ground they had chartered previously. On the basis of these historic patterns initial highs may normally be expected in January and February or in March. The high in the year generally comes after the first of August. Therefore, the writer believes that this is a good time to buy common stocks selectively.

There are eight stocks which are recommended at the present time. It is felt that these stocks may be purchased and held at least six months for long term capital gains. **Copperweld Steel**, which offers a good statistical value and has promising growth ahead with its "Alumoweld", should do considerably better this year than in previous years.

**Rockwell Standard** should be a good participant in an excellent auto and truck year. Besides the company is diversifying into other interesting fields. **Royal Dutch** appears to be the most attractive of the oil companies. **Island Creek Coal** is a relatively strong coal company which will serve the steel industry, other heavy industries and ship coal overseas and should experience a sharp rebound in earnings.

**Harbison-Walker** should do well with its refractory business in a year when the steel mills will be almost taxed to capacity. **Ford Motor Co.** is considered the best stock of the auto manufacturers to participate in what may be the second largest year in the passenger car industry. **Garrett Corp.** seems to offer the best value in the so-called space issues. The stock looks relatively attractive at the present time yielding almost 5%. It should be recognized, however, that any company heavily dependent on military contracts has a certain element of speculation.

## Earth C. of C. Teans Up With National Chamber For Better Service To You

Business men in Earth, Texas have teamed with 2,700,000 others throughout the nation to work for good citizenship, good government and good business.

By joining the Chamber of Commerce of the United States, the Earth, Texas Chamber of Commerce takes its place with more than 2,800 chambers and some 600 trade associations in an organization which wields a powerful influence in national affairs, and which will bring to Earth, Texas the advantages of pooled information, ideas and advice also improving the local community.

Thus, the Chamber of Commerce of the United States came into being. Its beginnings were small, but as business men in cities and towns over the nation came to know of its work the membership grew. The bulk of the country's trade associations came into the membership so as to give voice to specific industries. The local chambers gave representation to business geographically and to give interests as represented in the activities of local chambers.

Today, the Earth, Texas Chamber of Commerce is a part of this far-flung fabric of business representation — big and little — which might be called the nation's "business front."

The National Chamber interprets to government the considered views of business on issues of national importance, and in turn interprets to its business membership the moves of the legislative and administrative branches of government. It has helped to create within local chambers of commerce more than 1,000 committees on national affairs which conduct continuous campaigns for more efficient government.

At all times, the national organization is ready to survey business opinion in the interest of applying business experience for the solution of economic problems. 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## Internal Revenue Service Reports On Tax Problems

Every taxpayer owning depreciable property used in his trade or business is faced with the problem of determining the useful life of each asset.

There is no standard life of farm property, says Bob Cherry, extension farm management specialist. Useful life in each case must stand on its own merits. For example, a barbed-wire fence with untreated posts on the Gulf Coast might do well to last 10 years, whereas the same fence in the Trans-Pecos area may last 30 years.

"Useful life" means useful life to the taxpayer, the specialist explains. An automobile might be charged off in three years by one taxpayer with heavy usage, while his neighbor's vehicle of the same make and model will last for six years because of light usage.

Factors to be considered in determining useful life include the amount of use, age when acquired, policy as to repairs and upkeep, climate, and operating conditions. For example, dusty operating conditions would be a prime consideration in the useful life of a tractor.

As a guide, the Internal Revenue Service has published average useful life figures for property in the United States in Bulletin "F". It is a guide only, Cherry notes, and has no official status for validating specific cases. The guide can be obtained from the Superintendent of Documents, Washington, D. C.

This Bulletin should prove very useful to persons engaged in farming and ranching. Your local county agent has a list which gives estimated life of many items found on farms and ranches. Cherry adds.

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
