

#### Springlake Students Attend Career Day Program Friday



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### WHAT SHALL I DO WITH JESUS?

This question was asked by Pilate as the Christ stood before him to be tried. Pilate tried to be neutral in the matter, even though he knew this Jesus was innocent of the charges made against Him. Taking a basin of water. Pilate washed his hands before the people and told them he was free of the matter. But he wasn't! Pilate was guilty of crucifying the Lord! What had be done with Jesus? He killed Him! By trying to remain neutral when he had the opportunity of helping Jesus. Pilate answered his own question of "What Shall I Do With Jesus?" by contribeting to His death.

The question is before is today. We must answer it; we are answering it day by day. It is impossible to be neutral in religion. Either you are for Jesus or against Him. Jesus said. "He that is not with me is against me; and he that gathereth not with me scattereth." Matthew 12:30.

What have others done with Jesus? Peter denied Him. He was ashamed to stand by the Lord when it meant ridicule and shame. Many times we are willing to stand for Christ when we are in the company of those who believe as we do. But when we are in the company of those who ridicule Christianity and Jesus we are prone either to say nothing in defense of Christ, or enter into the ridicule ouselves. What have we done with Jesue by so doing? We have denied Him.

Thomas doubted Jesus. Many of us claim absolute faith in Christ and His power, but then show doubt by worry and anxiety. We exemplify to an unbelieving world our own unbelief by not reiging on the Lord in all things.

some claim to believe in Jesus but fail to obey Him. Jesus said, 'And why call ye me, Lord. Lord, and do not the things which say?". Luke 6:46. What are you doing with Jesus when you fail to obey Him? You are doing the same as Pilate. You are trying to hold on to Christ with one hand and to the ways of men with the other. There is only one way to salvation, and that is through Christ. He said "I am the way, the truth, and the life . . "Let us answer the question, "What Shall I Do With Jesus", by following in His way daily. Remember, we are answering, may it be according to the New Testament.
