The Springlake City Commission and Lions Club have begun an all out push to obtain telephone service for the Rural Area surrounding the city of Springlake as well as improved service for the city of Springlake.

The present telephone service to the city of Springlake is very poor, there is now, according to J. J. Coker and Billy Clayton, about 30 telephones serviced on the two Springlake lines leading into Earth. These two lines plus the one to El Paso Natural Gas Co. are the only lines serving any of the Springlake area.

Springlake area people have for a long time felt they were sadly neglected by the Telephone Co. and rightly so as the City of Springlake is little more exposed to telephone service itself, and there is a strip about six miles in diameter and running ten miles in length in the area around Springlake, that no telephone service has ever been made available.

The boundaries for the proposed telephone service on the west stretches from the Springlake school road to four miles east of the city and will extend in length seven miles to the Sunnyside exchange and south of Springlake two miles to the sandhills. This they hope to gain with toll free service to Earth.

J. J. Coker and Billy Wayne Clayton have talked with both Fred Mathis, Business Manager of General Telephone at Littlefield, and D. B. Lancaster, Manager of Bailey County Electric Cooperative in Muleshoe, in an effort to impress them of the need for telephone service of that area, and to offer full cooperation from the City of Springlake in this effort to bring telephone service to this area.

Springlake was incorporated about two years ago and since their incorporation have begun a City Water Works, which will see its completion within a short time. Their second project is this all out effort to obtain modern day Telephone Service for the Area.

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**WHAT SHALL I DO WITH JESUS?**

W. E. (Bud) IRVINE

This question was asked by Pilate as the Christ stood before him to be tried. Pilate tried to be neutral in the matter, even though he knew this Jesus was innocent of the charges made against Him. Taking a basin of water, Pilate washed his hands before the people and told them he was free of the matter. But he wasn't! Pilate was guilty of crucifying the Lord! What had he done with Jesus? He killed Him! By trying to remain neutral when he had the opportunity of helping Jesus, Pilate answered his own question of "What Shall I Do With Jesus?" by contributing to His death.

The question is before us today. We must answer it; we are answering it day by day. It is impossible to be neutral in religion. Either you are for Jesus or against Him. Jesus said, "He that is not with me is against me; and he that gathereth not with me scattereth." Matthew 12:30.

What have others done with Jesus? Peter denied Him. He was ashamed to stand by the Lord when it meant ridicule and shame. Many times we are willing to stand for Christ when we are in the company of those who believe as we do. But when we are in the company of those who ridicule Christianity and Jesus we are prone either to say nothing in defense of Christ, or enter into the ridicule ourselves. What have we done with Jesus by so doing? We have denied Him.

Thomas doubted Jesus. Many of us claim absolute faith in Christ and His power, but then show doubt by worry and anxiety. We exemplify to an unbelieving world our own unbelief by not relying on the Lord in all things.

Some claim to believe in Jesus but fail to obey Him. Jesus said, "And why call ye me, Lord, Lord, and do not the things which I say?" Luke 6:46. What are you doing with Jesus when you fail to obey Him? You are doing the same as Pilate. You are trying to hold on to Christ with one hand and to the ways of men with the other. There is only one way to salvation, and that is through Christ. He said "I am the way, the truth, and the life . . . Let us answer the question, "What Shall I Do With Jesus", by following in His way daily. Remember, we are answering, may it be according to the New Testament.

# Postal Rate Increase Will Help

## Provide Better Mail Service Reduce Huge Postal Losses and Balance The Budget

Why Postal Rate Increases Are Needed Now

Postage rates are the same today as they were in 1932 for First-class letter mail; only 3 per cent greater for Second-class mail; and 38 per cent greater for Third-class mail.

Meanwhile, everything the Post Office Department buys and uses has more than doubled in cost since 1932, just as household and business expenses have.

The Post Office Department will lose about \$650 million in the

next fiscal year. Postal losses since 1945 total more than \$5 billion and now cost the taxpayers over \$100 million a year in interest alone on this part of our national debt.

Large drains on the General Treasury to support the Post Office Department are actually a postwar phenomenon, due primarily to higher costs of operating the Department.

From 1900 to 1940 postal losses averaged only \$33 million a year. Between 1946 and 1956 losses increased fourteen fold—to about \$450 million a year. Unless present trends are halted, postal losses may soon be \$1 billion or more a year.

Do Present Postal Losses Include Franked Mail, Airline Subsidies And Public Services?

The present huge postal losses no longer include the subsidies formerly paid the airlines approximately \$70 million yearly. These costs were transferred to the CAB by law in June, 1953.

Since August, 1953, the Department has been paid in full for handling "franked" Congressional mail (approximately \$1.5 million yearly) and "penalty" mail of Government agencies (approximately \$35 million yearly) which were formerly carried free.

The Department backs H. R. 5206 now before Congress, which identifies the cost of various public services it performs, (such as free mail for the blind, reduced cost rates for religious, fraternal and educational publications, etc.) and provides for reimbursement of currently approximately \$26.4 million annually for these services from the General Fund of the Treasury.

If this legislation is passed, then the public and the Congress will know the actual costs of the identifiable public services the Department performs at the taxpayers' expense and with their consent. These unquestionable subsidies will then no longer be included in the deficit of the Department.

What Rate Increases Are Now Proposed?

A long-range, clearly-defined financial policy for the Department and postal rate increases to yield \$462 million in Fiscal Year 1958 and eventually \$527.5 million a year in new revenues was submitted to Congress on March 7, 1957. Legislation to accomplish these re-

sults was introduced into the Senate (S. 1534) on March 8, 1957 by Senators Olin Johnson and Frank Carlson, and in the House (H. R. 5836) on March 11, 1957 by Congressman Tom Murray.

The proposed rate increase in First-class letters from 3c to 4c an ounce and from 2c to 3c on post cards and drop letters would produce \$348.5 million yearly in new revenues.

Increases from 6c to 7c an ounce on Air Mail letters and from 4c to 5c on Air Mail cards would yield \$17.4 million a year in new income.

Second-class zone rates on magazines and newspapers would be increased by four successive annual 15 per cent increases to provide additional revenue of \$7.3 million in Fiscal year 1958 and a total of \$31 million at the end of the fourth year. Adjustments in the minimum per piece rate and in transient rates would produce \$2 million of new revenues in fiscal year 1958.

Rates on Third-class mail (largely direct mail advertising circulars and small parcels up to 8 ounces) would advance to yield \$128 million in additional revenue by 1960. These include a two-step increase for the minimum piece rate under bulk mailings from 1.5 cents to 2c this year to 2.5 cents on July 1, 1959.

Increase in book rates from 8c to 10c for the first pound and from 4c to 5c for additional pounds would provide no new revenues since this category would be broadened to include manuscripts, and other materials which now pay higher rates of postage. Increases in controlled circulation publications from 10c for 8 ounces or under and 11c for over 8 ounces, to a uniform rate of 12c per pound would yield \$700 thousand more revenue a year.

Present rates for both Second and Third-class matter sent by non-profit religious, charitable, fraternal and educational organizations are not increased by the current proposals. Newspapers with circulation of 5,000 or less are also exempted.

Rate proposals for Fourth-class Parcel Post are not included in the current recommendations since this class of mail now pays its way, as required by law.

Why Increase Letter Postage to 4c First-class mail is now losing money at the 3c rate.

is 4c on Letters Unreasonable. No. At 4c the letter rate will still be the world's greatest bargain, whether used for a single letter or for a large mailing by business. Actually three-fourths of all first-class letters are sent by business. Many segment of our business community — which use the mail for profit—prefer to pay more of their share of the postage used rather than pay in taxes.

The additional cost of a 4c letter rate to the average family would be only 15¢ per month. In return, the average American would benefit since the huge postal losses would be reduced and no longer added to his already heavy tax load.

When postal rates are increased the users of the mails will pay a larger share of the costs of the postal services they use. This will end an economic travesty where by American taxpayers pay for postal losses that will soon approximate \$1 billion a year.

Why Worry About Losing Money When Other Government Departments Don't Pay Their Way?

The Post Office Department is different from other Departments of government which perform services which benefits to all the people. The nature of those services is such that there is no way to measure them, person by person, or, in many cases, to break them down into measurable units.

It is the proper role of taxation to assume the burden of paying for such unmeasurable services in the interest of the common good of all citizens.

In the Post Office services are performed in the form of individual transactions—all measurable, all distinguishable, each from the other.

It is not the proper role of taxation to assume the burden of paying the cost of an operation such as this.

That is why postal rates are charged. To follow the argument that the Post Office Department shouldn't be disturbed about its huge yearly losses, why should the Post Office charge any fees at all? Why shouldn't it carry everybody's mail free-of-charge and pass the costs on to the taxpayers?

Would the Postal Increases Proposed Balance the Postal Budget?

No. For the Fiscal Year 1958 these proposed rate increases on First, Second and Third class mail would yield about \$462 million in new revenues, but the Post Office Department would still lose approximately \$200 million in that year.

When the fair and long overdue rate increases proposed to the Congress are enacted into law they will be a long step forward towards:

(1) Constantly better postal service for 170 million Americans.

(2) More nearly break-even operations of the Post Office Department.

(3) Payment by business mailers of a larger share of the costs of the services they use for profit.

(4) Helping balance the Federal Budget so essential to the economic security and welfare of all our citizens.

Prefers to Do His Own Worrying

**Sen. George Mahon**  
**Confident Congress**  
**Will Cut Budget**

WASHINGTON (Special) — Rep. George Mahon of the 19th District of Texas said here this week he is confident Congress will cut a minimum of three billion dollars from President Eisenhower's budget.

The Congressman, in his capacity as Chairman of the House Subcommittee on Military Appropriations, has been conducting hearings on the President's request for 38 billion for the Army, Navy and Air Force since late in January.

Mahon said that "we will reduce the defense budget as far as this can safely be done. Of course, we must proceed with caution and no reduction can be permitted to imperil the security of the United States."

Defense officials have declined to recommend any cuts in the Defense budget, but they are preparing at Mahon's request a statement showing how a three and a half billion dollar reduction would be applied if made by Congress.

The House Appropriations Committee of which Mahon is a member, has upon his motion approved bills at this session reducing the President's overall budget in the sum of one billion dollars.

**New A. C. P. Signup Period To Start May 1 at County A. S. C. Office**

Lamar D. Aten, Jr., manager of the Lamb County ASC Office, in Littlefield, announced Friday that a new ACP signup period will start May 1, and any producer who has not used his \$300 per farm this year may sign up for any needed ACP practice on his farm provided the practice has not been started. Any practice that has been started is not eligible for payment.

Aten added that the signup will be carried out on a "first come, first served" basis, and when funds are exhausted no more applications will be taken.

**PENALTY MAY BE IMPOSED FOR SOIL BANK VIOLATIONS**

Lamar D. Aten, Jr., Lamb County ASC Manager, cautioned the farmers who have signed into the Soil Bank program on soil bank violations, and states that a civil penalty may be imposed upon any producer who knowingly and willfully violates certain provisions of the Soil Bank's Reserve program.

"Authority for imposing a civil penalty for certain violations of an Acreage Reserve agreement is conferred under Section 123 of the Soil Bank Act," Mr. Aten explained. "The violation drawing the penalty is for knowingly and will-

fully grazing or harvesting any crop from any acreage in violation of a Soil Bank agreement or contract."

# Mother Of Springlake Man Breaks Hip In Fall Sunday

AUSTIN, Texas— "Sine die" is the magic phrase around the Capitol nowadays. It's the phrase traditionally applied to the final adjournment agreed on by both houses of the Legislature.

Only three weeks remain of the 129 days recommended in the Constitution for sessions. After that (May 7) lawmakers' pay stops.

Sentiment appears strong for a sine die resolution set on or very near that deadline. It's been a rough session, say many members. Investigations, bribery charges, counter-charges and threat of more have frayed nerves, provoked hot words, deep rifts.

They've made it harder to plough through the usual hundreds of measures requiring study, debate and some sort of agreement. Many are still backed up in discouraging stacks.

Even so, say members, they hope to shove through the "musts" and go home on time. But likely differences of opinion on what constitutes "musts" promises even more tension and temper for the final weeks.

TEACHER RAISE — One of the biggest issues still gathering steam in the Legislature is the teacher pay raise. Despite strong backing, the drive has been beset with stumbling blocks.

Public school teachers want a \$390-a-year boost. Total cost for the biennium is variously estimated from \$45,000,000 to \$70,000,000.

Sponsors have become increasingly impatient of delays. Bill was stymied by House rule which prohibits consideration of any other spending bill until the general appropriation bill is finally approved.

This is in conference committee.

Then the attorney general ruled the teachers' bill was not an appropriation bill. This seemingly opened the door to quicker action. But budget-watchers intervened. They said passage of the teacher bill would leave the treasury \$20,000,000 short of enough to cover the general appropriation bill.

This focused attention on Rep. Tom Joseph's "Just in case it's needed" tax bill. It would tax dedicated natural gas reserves, produce an estimated \$35,000,000 in two years. Gov. Price Daniel had recommended a levy of this sort should more revenue be needed.

But this one, by some slip, was introduced without an enacting clause. Joseph sought the necessary two-thirds House vote to permit a correction. Vote was 68-to-69 against.

ETHICS BILL ZIPS OUT — After weeks of haggling in the House, the code of ethics bill whizzed through the Senate in one day.

It goes to the governor's desk with 29-0 Senate approval.

Bill provides that no legislator, state official or employee shall engage in any outside activity "in substantial conflict with the public interest." Penalty is expulsion or dismissal.

NARCOTICS BILL PASSED — A possible death penalty for dope peddlers seems almost certain to become law.

House and Senate have passed the bill which was recommended by Gov. Price Daniel. It would permit juries to assess the death penalty on second conviction for sale of any narcotic drug to a minor.

AUTO REGISTRATION TAX — State car taxing system would be overhauled under a measure which won preliminary House approval.

If passed, the constitutional amendment would abolish the property tax on motor vehicles. Legislature would be given authority to increase registration fees by one-third. Revenue would be divided between school districts and city or county.

Meanwhile, Texas Research League released a study suggesting further revision of the registration laws. License fees based on weight result in inequities, said the League. It proposed a flat fee for all size cars.

FARM BILL SHELVED — A bill to replace Commissioner of Agriculture John White's office with a 21-member board went to House sub-committee.

White declared the bill was dead. Hearing brought prolonged and

heated testimony. Proponents of the measure contended lack of state-federal cooperation has resulted in inadequate crop inspection.

Opponents declared the 21-member board would be unwieldy and cost the state more in travel expense.

SEGREGATION BILL OKEYED — A bill regarded as the cornerstone of a program to maintain school segregation won its second-round House vote.

It would allow local board to assign pupils to school on basis of "qualifications, aptitudes," etc. An amendment also gives the boards authority to exempt a child from compulsory attendance at an integrated school.

SENATE CONFIRMS — Joe P. Gibbs will serve on the Board of Insurance Commissioners, until Sept. 1. Measures now before the Legislature would abolish the pre-

sent board and substitute a new get-up between now and Sept.

Senate quickly confirmed Gibbs' appointment and that of Brady Gentry and Tyler to the Highway Commission. Both were made by Gov. Price Daniel.

Also confirmed, after long debate, was the appointment of R. M. Dixon as a member of the State Board of Water Engineers. This appointment kept unbroken the record that none of the recess appointees of Gov. Allen Shivers has been removed from office by Senate rejection. Other Shivers appointees confirmed by the upper house were R. F. Newman of Borger to the Employment Commission, and nine other interim appointments made by the former Governor.

SHORT SHORTS — Board of Insurance Commissioners granted a second delay in the show cause hearing on Physicians Life and Accident Ins. Co. because the firm's president, Former Gov. Coke Ste-

He said the companies suffered a \$266,000,000 underwriting loss. Much of the loss was attributed to the bad record of Class 2 owners and operators—individually owned automobiles of male operators under age 25, used for business and non-business use. He pointed up the need for closer parental control of young drivers, and the need for driver training in Texas public schools as a method of improving this situation. In fact, a 10 per cent rate credit is given to passenger car owners who can give proof that every male operator under 25 years of age resident in the same household has suc-

cessfully completed a driver education course sponsored by a recognized high school or college and conducted by a certified instructor.
