Parade at 4 P. M. Today; Rodeo Begins 8:30 P. M.

The 18th Annual Earth Amateur Rodeo will be kicked off Thursday (today) with the biggest parade yet seen in Earth.

Entries for the Earth Rodeo parade, which will begin at 4 p.m. are steadily coming in to the Chamber of Commerce office, reports Mrs. Zou Wilson.

The parade will form at the Kimbell Gin and will go from there to the Phillips 66 Station at the east edge of town where the line of March will begin promptly at 4 p.m.

More entries are expected this year to compete for trophies and cash prizes.

A number of riding clubs have accepted invitations to compete for first, second, and third place trophies. They are Cochran County Sheriff's Posse, Roosevelt County Mounted Patrol, and others.

Competing for cash prizes of \$15, \$10 and \$5 for first, second, and third places will be the Earth Lions Club, Earth Floral, Rainbow Girls, Unique Fashions, Boy Scouts, and Springlake Lions Club.

Not in competition will be Stephens and Sons M.M., Dent Farm Supply, Brown-White Equipment Co., Earth Oil and Gas Co., Earth Pump and Machine, Gatewood Ford Sales and Thompson Chevrolet Co.

The Earth Chamber of Commerce will sponsor 11 prizes and trophies for the parade.

A free barbecue will be held at 6 p.m. following the parade, at the FFA barn for all attending the first performance of the Rodeo. The barbecue is sponsored by the C. of C., meat will be furnished by the Earth Roping Club, and members of the C. of C. and the Earth Lions Club will serve.

Each evening performance is scheduled to begin at 8:30 p.m. Admission is \$1.50 for adults and 75 cents for children.

Ratjen Bros. of Happy, will furnish the rodeo stock. Barton-Watson, Inc., adjoining the rodeo grounds will be Rodeo Headquarters. Entries will be taken from 9 a.m. to 6 p.m. Wednesday, July 11 and on Thursday, July 12 from 9 a.m. to 12 noon.

Trophy buckles will be awarded to first place winners in each event.

Merchants donating belt buckles are Barton-Watson, Brown-White, Earth Elevator, Earth Dry Goods, Layman Bros., and Earth Oil and Gas Co. The Cowboy Store in Levelland is donating a buckle for best all-around cowboy and the City Shoe Shop and Western Wear will present a hat to the Hard Luck Cowboy.

The Earth Jaycees are sponsoring a Shetland pony to be given away during the final performance Saturday night. Tickets can be obtained from any Jaycee and Charles Dunn, Jaycee president, who says tickets are rapidly being sold.

Granddaughter of Earth Resident Dies In Oklahoma

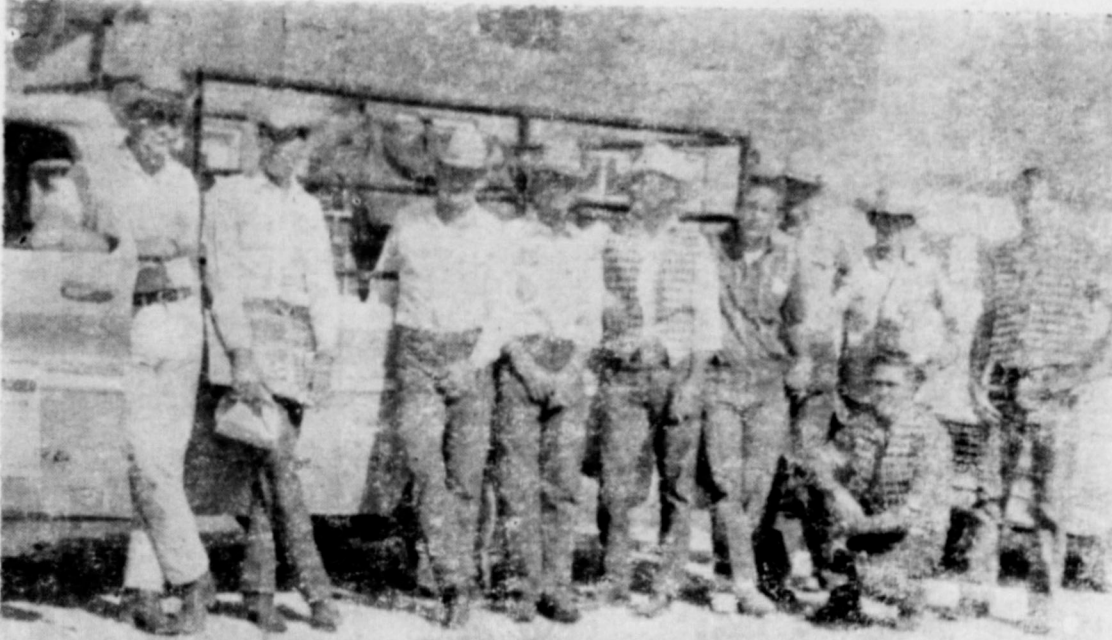

Farm Laborer Killed By Bolt Of Lightning Tues.

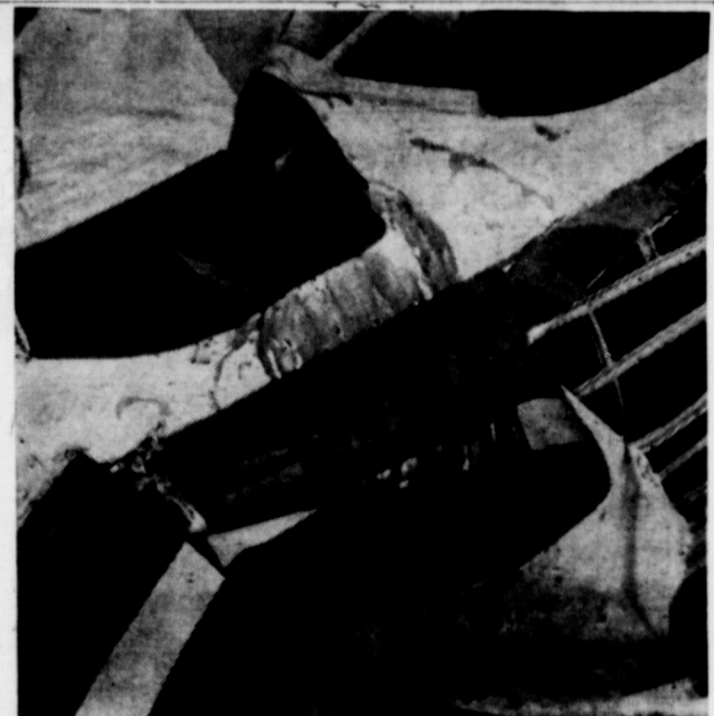
A forty year old farm laborer was struck by a bolt of lightning Tuesday afternoon on the Ronald Cleavinger farm 2½ miles north of Springlake.

Victim of the tragedy was Ricardo S. Robles, who was working with three members of his family hoeing feed in a field.

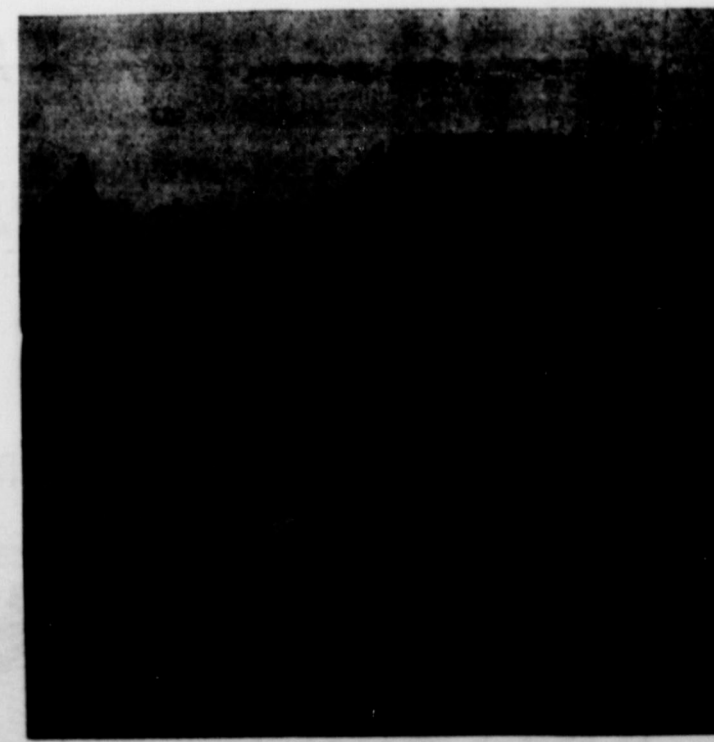

Walter McMahan, 40, who farmed 8 miles west of Earth, died shortly after arrival at West Plains Hospital.

McMahan had borrowed the World War II Stearman biplane from E. T. Jennings of Pritchard and had flown to Muleshoe to pick up Milsap. They flew over the farm home of Mrs. Milsap's parents, Mr. and Mrs. Oscar Allison.

Milsap's wife, Susan, stood in the yard and waved as the red and white plane circled low. On the third pass, relatives heard the motor stall and the plane went into a nosedive, crashing less than ¼ mile from the house.

Milsap was riding in the front cockpit and McMahan, believed to have been giving Milsap a flying lesson, was in the back cockpit. Both men remained in the open cockpit as the plane buried into the ground. It has not been established as to who was in control when the crash occurred.

Milsap is survived by his wife and two daughters, Loveta Jo 2, and Carol Sue, about 1.

McMahan is survived by his wife, Peggy, and a 15 year old daughter, Ramona.

Farm Facts

Flax fiber is the chief raw material of the cigarette paper industry. This means added income for flaxseed farmers from a substance that once was thrown away. Now it brings about \$3 million a year in farm income. (Flaxseed long has been used for linseed oil, an important ingredient in paints and linoleum.)

Flax fiber is used for cigarette paper.



Flax is grown on about 2.5 million acres in Minnesota, the Dakotas, and California. In Europe, and other parts of the world it is grown largely for the fibers which are used in making linen.

At decorticating plants, the fiber is separated from the woody portion and cortex of the flax plant and is pressed into bales.

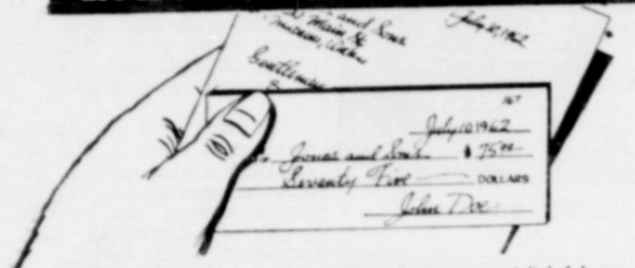
The fiber is then shipped to the paper mills to be processed into pulp and finally into rolls of paper weighing about 4,000 pounds each.

70,000 to 85,000 cigarettes.

Rolls are cut into "bobbins," or reels, about one inch wide. A bobbin weighs 8 1/2 pounds and will wrap

Cigarette paper must be pure, white and strong, porous to a specified degree, and not over a thousandth of an inch thick.

A little girl woke up from a nightmare, screaming from her terror and fear. "Oh, help me, save me! Two big bears are going to get me!" she cried.

Her parents rushed into her room to try and calm her, but no amount of reassurance and comfort could soothe the little girl. She had become thoroughly terrified and neither dad's strong arms around her nor mother's loving words could convince her that two ferocious bears were not about to get her. Her parents tried every way they knew to calm her, and still she kept screaming, "Oh, help me. The bears are about to get me."

But her older brother came to the rescue. "What's wrong, Sis?" he asked.

"The bears are about to get me," sobbed the little girl.

"Where are they?"

"Over in that corner," she pointed.

Pulling an imaginary revolver from his pajama pocket, her brother shouted, "Bang, bang. I got both of them!"

The little girl, her fears allayed, went back to sleep, feeling just fine.

This story is ridiculous. It is silly, you might say. But the point is, whether its cause is real

or imagined, fear is a terrible thing. It is a brutal, blighting, crippling force that often leaves its victims marked for life.

Many people today live in constant fear. Some are afraid of storms with thunder and lightning. Others are afraid of shadows and darkness. Still others are afraid of illness and diseases, such as cancer. Thousands are afraid of failure. I am told that one-half of all hospital beds are filled with people suffering mental difficulties and breakdowns. Their fears have dominated them and made them irrational.

The Bible says, "God hath not given us the spirit of fear; but of power, and of love, and of a sound mind" (2 Timothy 1:7). God does not want people to suffer the consequences of fear. In place of one negative force, fear, He has given us three positive ones; power, love and a sound mind.

The next time you are afraid and the world seems to be closing in around you, remember that fear does not come from God. God has given you power to overcome fear, love to lift you and a sound mind to deal with your problems. His words to you are, "Fear not, only believe."

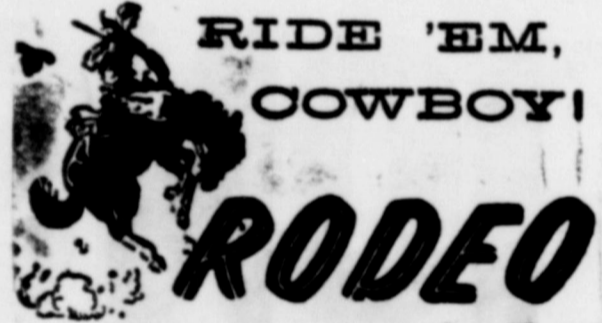

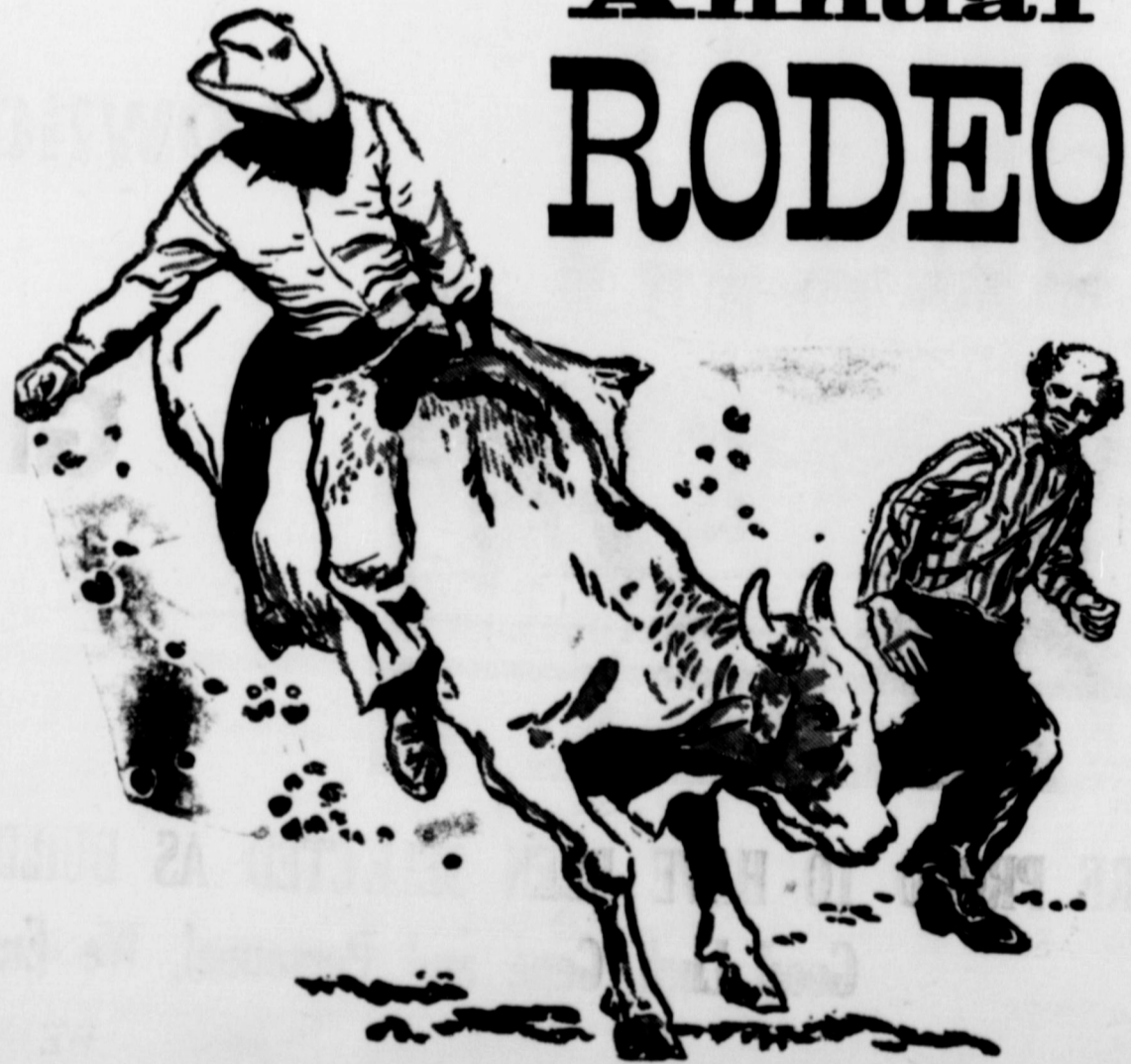

The blaze was discovered at 8:45 p.m. by small boys who noticed smoke boiling from the top of the housing of loading equipment. They ran three blocks away where Jody Blaylock called the fire department.

Cause of the fire had not been

determined early Wednesday, but it is possible that spontaneous combustion caused a dust explosion after loading operations all day.

Fire companies from Littlefield, Sudan, and Friona were called. The blaze was under control at 10 p.m. but the ruins continued burning past midnight.

The portion which burned was built in 1949 and was valued at more than \$100,000, according to a company spokesman. Total damage may reach \$155,000.

Pool Lifeguard Suffers Overdose Of Chlorine Gas

Jack Rylant, son of Mr. and Mrs. W. J. Rylant, Sr. was overcome by chlorine gas at the City swimming pool last Friday about 10:30 a.m. when a bottle of chlorine gas was being used to chlorinate the pool water. He is employed as senior lifeguard.

The accident occurred after the automatic chlorinator failed and a large bottle of chlorine gas was being used by W. F. Williamson, City Water Engineer to replenish the chlorine supply, a state specification. Williamson

was holding the bottle and Jack attempted to turn it on with a large wrench, but the valve was too tight.

Jack, who was standing in the shallow water, attempted to hold the heavy bottle, but it slipped from his hands and upon impact, the valve opened and Jack received a heavy blast of the poisonous gas. One of his swimming class students Mike Tarver, 5th, of Lubbock who is visiting in the Virgil Robbins home, received a minor dose of the gas.

Jack and Mike were taken to Dr. Holt's office where both received oxygen. Williamson acquired a gas mask and succeeded in turning off the valve.

Jack evacuated the pool area before being taken to the doctor's office.

Farm Facts

Per capita consumption of food fats and oils in the United States has changed little over the last 40 years—averaging about 45 pounds annually. It amounted to an estimated 45.8 pounds (fat content) in 1961.

Reduced consumption of table spreads, according to the U. S. Department of Agriculture, has been about offset by an increase in oil or edible oils—mostly salad and cooking oils. Table spread use has averaged about 17 pounds per person in recent years, compared with around 20 pounds in the 1920's. Increased margarine consumption has just partially offset a decline in butter use.

Per capita consumption of fats and oils in 1961 (actual weight) totaled 93 pounds for margarine, 75 for butter, 7.8 for lard, 13.2 for shortening, and 11.2 for other edible fats.

In 1921 the "other edible" category accounted for only 3.5 pounds per capita. Increasing consumption is mainly due to use of more

Annual fat consumption totals 45 pounds per person.



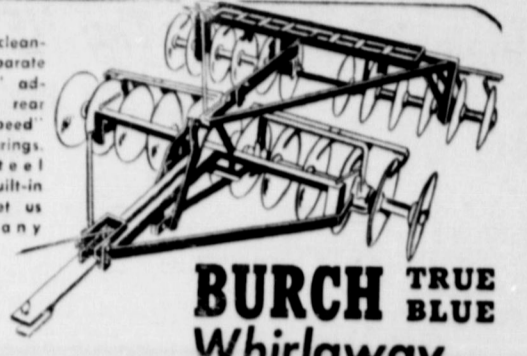

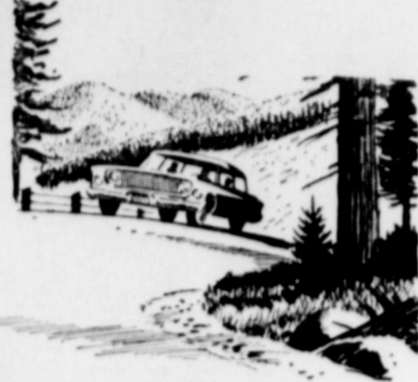

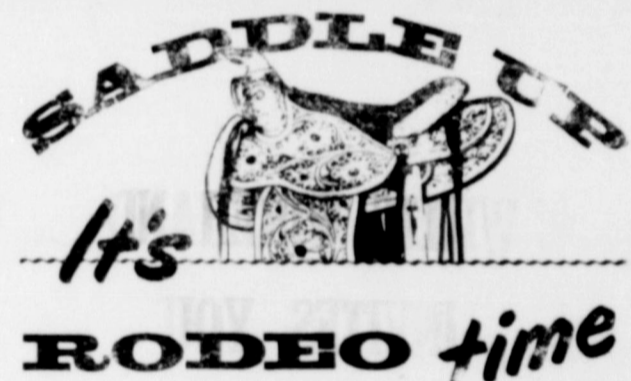

Farm Facts

The San Diego Evening Tribune points out that Khrushchev came to prominence as a farm expert and that's why an acknowledged failure of agriculture in the Soviet Union must be particularly galling for him.

He began his drive by merging small collectives into huge state farms, reducing the number of collective farms from 250,000 to fewer than 55,000 between 1950 and 1960.

State farms are owned and operated by the state with the help of hired labor working for wages. On collective farms, peasants share the proceeds on the basis of their labor contributions, after state claims have been satisfied, production expenses have been covered, and certain reserves have been built up.

But for all its ruthlessness, notes the Tribune, Soviet agriculture has not overcome the peasant's innate instinct for private gain.

"The main question remains unanswered: Will the peasant produce as much and as efficiently for the state as he

would for himself?

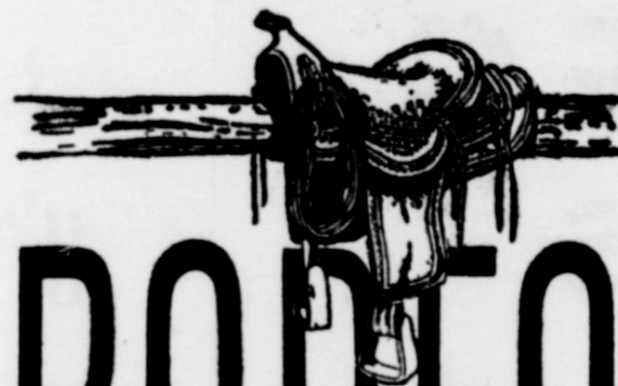
