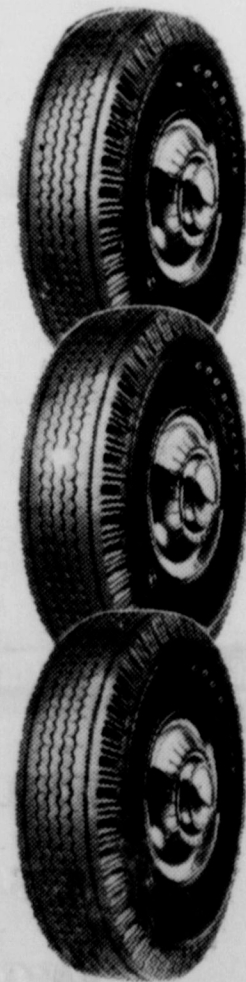

"We honor the memory of the stout-hearted men and women whose vision and prayers and high courage, whose sense of honor and love liberty, whose self-reliance and perseverance against overwhelming odds and under tremendous difficulties, and whose prodigious labors and sweat and tears and blood have given us our precious Texas heritage.

"All Americans should realize that the broad, rich, prosperous and happy land, extending from the Gulf of Mexico to the Pacific Ocean is our physical heritage from the Texas pioneers.

"Our heritage is the tradition of courage and devotion to duty, of love of liberty and faith in God, the tradition of vision and imagination and self-reliance and resourcefulness and perseverance.

"That tradition is a challenge to you and me, a challenge to every Texan, a challenge to every American;

"It is a challenge to meet the problems of this day in every field of business and endeavor, in public and in private life;

"It is a challenge to accept the responsibilities of world leadership in an age of supersonic speed and unlimited atomic power with the same vision and courage displayed by our ancestors;

"It is a challenge to build for posterity a Texas and an American future that will be worthy of our glorious past."

The Texas State Historical Survey Committee, of which the Colonel is president, is composed of eighteen members, appointed by the Governor and confirmed by the Senate, who serve without pay.

**A Call To Texans To Observe March 2 Through April 21**

A call to all Texans to observe the period from March 2 to April 21 by re-dedicating their hearts and minds to the spirit of those fifty destiny-determined days was made by Colonel Charles R. Tips, Dallas, President of the Texas State Historical Survey Committee.

Colonel Tips urged Texans to attend the 123rd anniversary celebration of the signing of the Texas Declaration of Independence at Washington on the Brazos Mon, March 2, to visit the Alamo in San Antonio March 6 to pay tribute to the men who died there, to visit Goliad March 27 to mourn for the men who were massacred there; and to attend the meeting on the San Jacinto Battle Ground April 21, celebrating the great victory won there.

Few Americans realize that the decisive period from the Declaration of Independence to the San Jacinto victory led to the acquisition by the United States of almost one third of the American nation. Included in the million square miles of territory were the States of Texas, New Mexico, Arizona, Nevada, California, Utah, and parts of Colorado, Wyoming, Kansas, and Oklahoma. All of these states should join in celebrating April 21, Colonel Tips said.

All teachers and pupils are invited to celebrate Texas Independence by reading, on March 6, the immortal message sent by Travis from the Alamo: "We will never surrender or retreat. Victory or death;" and by reading, on April 21, the story of the Battle of San Jacinto.

"We Texans cannot help but be humble," Colonel Tips said, "when we stop to think of the sacrifices made for us by the pioneer Texans who settled a wilderness and, to protect their homes and loved ones, signed the Texas Declaration of Independence and fought at the

**Farm Bureau President Meets With Area Farmers To Discuss Grain Support Prices**

J. H. West, president of the Texas Farm Bureau, stopped at the Eldon Hestand home Tuesday afternoon enroute to Olton. Hestand is Farm Bureau director for Springlake community in Lamb County.

West discussed current grain sorghum problems. Among these is the controversial price support of \$1.52 per hundredweight announced by the U. S. Department of Agriculture last week.

Several Farm Bureau members also met at the Hestand home, in-

cluding Donny Clayton, J. W. Dear, Kenneth Boone, Floyd Crawford, Bob Boone, all of Springlake; V. M. Peterman of Amherst and Buddy Hedges of Olton.

West was asked questions on the maize problem. West, himself a grain sorghum producer at Bishop in the Coastal Bend area, is recognized as one of the foremost grain sorghum authorities in the nation. Texas is the largest producer of grain sorghum in the U. S.

Texas Grain Sorghum Producers are disturbed about the announced price support level for their crop, which is 31 cents per hundredweight lower than last year. Before the U. S. D. A. announced the 1959 level, most experts had predicted that it would be set at about \$1.85 to \$1.90 per hundredweight, due to the fact that corn price support was announced at \$1.12 per bushel, or \$2.00 on a hundredweight basis.

The 1958 law directs the Agriculture Secretary to support sorghums at a level he determines fair and reasonable in relation to the level made available for corn, taking into consideration such factors as comparative feed value, supply, and demand.

In January, West told Washington USDA officials that if Agriculture Secretary Benson set corn support at \$1.12 per bushel (which he later did), the sorghum support should not be reduced below the 1958 average of \$1.83 per hundredweight.

West said that maize is expected to sell on the market at just below the corn price support. As feeders will consider such factors as comparative feed value with corn.

The Farm Bureau is the largest general farm organization in the world. Texas has a current membership of 76,036. Texas ranks fourth in the American Farm Bureau Federation. Lamb County's current membership totals 881.

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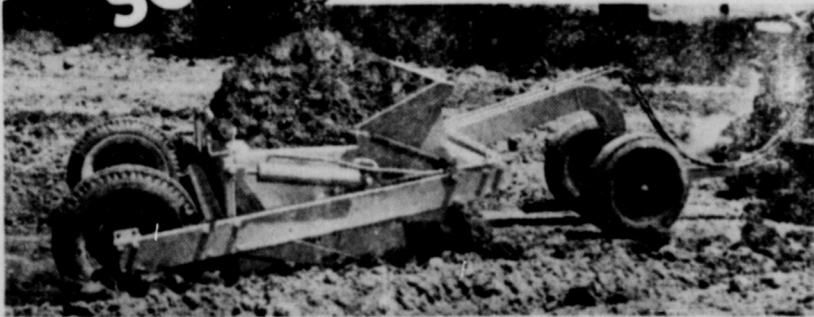

## Cotton Farmers To F. U. Board Blasts 'B' By March 16 Select Plan 'A' Or Ezra Benson For Recent Price Cuts

For 1959 and 1960, each farm operator who has an upland cotton acreage allotment will have a choice of selecting Plan "A" and Plan "B". This selection must be made in writing by March 16, 1959. The choice made is effective for only one year. The notice you received around the first week of February which stated the price per pound. (National average, 20.40c for "A" and 24.70c for "B") will suffice for the selection to be made in writing.

All that will need to be done is to place an "X" in either box in the lower lefthand corner, sign and return the notice back to the ASC office. If no selection at all is made by March 16, the farm operator is automatically on "A" Plan Cotton Farm.

Plan "A" is your regular cotton acreage allotment for 1959 and the level of price support cannot be less than 80 percent of parity. Price support to farmers who elect this choice will be available only through a purchase program. The purchase program will be handled through approved purchasers such as banks, ginners, and some buyers. The ASC office is automatically approved. The escalator clause, under which the minimum price support level is determined on the basis of the supply percentage, remains in effect for the 1959 and 1960 cotton crops. However, the minimum national average support for the 1959 crop cannot be less than 80 percent of parity (of which you already know the price) for growers who comply with their regular acreage allotment.

Plan "B" is an increase of 40 percent of your regular farm allotment (allotment under plan "A") with price support at 15 percent of parity lower than the level determined for the farmer who elects Choice "A" (65 percent of parity). If a farm operator rents more than one farm on which there is a cotton acreage allotment, regardless where in the U. S. the operator must elect Choice "A" or Choice "B" for all farms he operates — he cannot elect Choice "A" for one farm and Choice "B" for the others.

The additional acreage produced on a farm under Choice "B" will not be considered "history" in establishing future acreage allotments for the farm, county, and state. The Choice "A" allotment shall be the only acreage considered for purposes to future state, county and farm allotments.

After 1960, farmers will receive their regular cotton acreage allotments, and price support will be available at levels determined by the Secretary within the following limits:

- (1) For 1961, at a level of from 70 percent to 90 percent of parity.
  - (2) For 1961, at a level of from 65 percent to 90 percent of parity.
- The escalator clause under which the minimum support level is determined on the basis of the supply percentage is REPEALED EFFECTIVE WITH THE 1961 CROP. Beginning with the 1961 crop, price

support will be based on the AVERAGE QUALITY of the crop instead of Middling seven eighths. Beginning with the 1959 crop, the minimum national acreage allotment for cotton is 16 million acres.

In any case where a person is a cotton farm operator for 1959 on March 16, 1959 and has elected Choice "B" allotment, such election shall apply to any farm for which such person becomes the operator after March 16, 1959. In any case where a person is a cotton farm operator for 1959 on March 16, 1959, and has elected Choice "A" allotment, and becomes the operator of a different farm after March 16, 1959, for which Choice "B" allotment is in effect on March 16, 1959 such person may elect Choice "A" or "B" allotment for all farms which he operates by filing written notice thereof with the County Committee within fifteen (15) days after becoming the operator of such different farm. In the event of failure of the operator to file such written notice with fifteen (15) day period, he shall be deemed to have elected the Choice "B" allotment for all farms which he operates.

In any case where a person who is not a cotton farm operator on March 16, 1959, and becomes a cotton farm operator thereafter, such operator shall be deemed to have elected the choice which was applicable to the farm on March 16, 1959. PROVIDED HOWEVER, that in the event such person becomes operator of both Choice "A" and "B" farms, he shall be deemed to have elected the Choice "B" allotment for all farms which he operates.

If a farm operator who has Choice "B" desires to change back to Choice "A" the reason must be one of the following disasters: (1) Excess rain, (2) Flood, (3) Drouth, (4) Hail. Before the operator can file his request with the County Committee, it must definitely meet one of the mentioned disasters, file his request within 15 days after the disaster, as much as 40 percent of the acreage must be destroyed, and the disaster must have taken place after the normal planting time. In case of pump failure, water table lowering or any other thing which is contributed to failure of pumping facilities IS NOT considered a drouth.

for cotton, grain sorghum, oats, and rye.

The Farmers Union Executive Board urged all Texas farmers and ranchers who are not in accord with ever cheaper and cheaper prices for what we produce to join with other Farmers Union members in their consistent fight for a parity income price on all farm commodities. The Farmers Union has supported the production payment approach for all family farm production for more than ten years.

Another approach now being advanced by Farmers Union is a realistic bargaining power through production control. Such control would be in bushels, pounds, and bales on historic production records. We would in turn price our products in line with present cost of production to return farmers a fair margin of profit.

The Board said they could not understand the surprise and alarm being expressed by Texas farmers about the price support cut on grain sorghum and other feed grains. Most Texas farmers are members of the Farm Bureau which has been fighting for such a program for the past 20 years.

The Farmers Union Board said that we could not expect anything better in the way of a farm program so long as so many farmers pay dues into the big business controlled, Republican Farm Bureau that supports such programs.

The Farmers Union said they would be glad to meet with any group of farmers and explain their program of parity farm income. The state office is in Denton, Texas, and we can be contacted at any time.

### Rep. George Mahon Appeals To Benson Since Drastic Drop In Grain Sorghums

WASHINGTON, March 5 — Rep. George Mahon reports that the recently announced drop in support loans for feed grains has been a shock to the Members of Congress from grain sorghum producing areas.

The House Committee on Agriculture is making a study of the situation in preparation for a Committee hearing which will be held March 13. The support loan level announced for milo for the 1959 crop is 31 cents per hundred below the level for last year. The national average support for milo

last year was \$1.53 per hundred. The announced national average support for this year is \$.52 per hundred.

On February 18, 1959, the Secretary of Agriculture announced support loan levels for corn, milo, and other feed grains. In view of the language of the law, it was anticipated that the support price for milo in 1959 would be approximately the same as corn, inasmuch as both have approximately the same feed value. That is not the case, and an explanation is being demanded and ways are being sought to remedy the situation.

Mahon stated, "Since the drastic drop in support levels for milo was announced, I have appealed to the Secretary of Agriculture and others in the Department to reconsider the action taken. I have received complaints in regard to the situation from Mr. Frank Moore of Plainview, president of the Grain Sorghum Producers Association, and many others. If the drastic cut in supports remains in effect, grain sorghum producers will sustain losses totaling many millions of dollars. A more effective program for all feed grains is needed, but action is made most difficult by reason of the well known attitude of the Secretary of Agriculture."

### Range Fire On Stine Land Causes Heavy Damage

A range fire believed to have started about noon Sunday on the ranchland owned by Truman Stine Earth farmer and his father, C. N. Stine of Amherst, burning over one hundred acres of the Stine pasture and approximately two hundred acres of the Haisel ranchland located 7 miles north and one east of Amherst.

The origin of the fire was not known, but was believed to have been started by youths who backed a Ford Truck, belonging to Truman Stine upon one of the feed stacks, which was ignited from the

truck exhaust. The truck had been used for feeding purposes of the Stine's cattle, and had recently been equipped with new tires and truck bed.

A farm tenant on the Haisel land saw the fire in time to save the windmill. All the corrals, the truck, 5 or 6 thousand bundles of feed and over one hundred fence posts was reported to be a total loss.

Truman Stine said, he had not fully estimated the cost of the loss at this time, but was heavy. Stine also said there were no clues, and his cattle strayed to a high spot where the grass did not burn.

Fire departments from various adjoining towns answered the call to help put out the flame, which burned late into the night.

Both of the owners were away from home at the time of the fire.

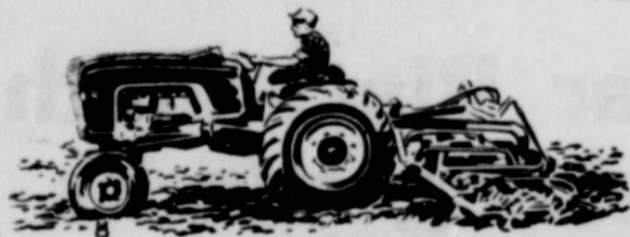
