



ORDINANCE NO. 51 ORDINANCE FIXING THE MAXIMUM RATE OF SPEED FOR MOTOR VEHICLES: AL-LOWING FOR SPEED ZONES: PROVIDING FOR PENALTY; AND DECLARING AN EMERG-

WHEREAS, the City Council of Earth, Texas, upon the basis of engineering and traffic investigation, find it necessary to establish maximum speed limits, and create ing music, singing and Indian speed zones in certain areas, all in the corporate limits of the City The Cubs and Scouts are indebt.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY OF EARTH, TEXAS: SECTION 1. Speed limits of Thirty (30) miles per hour; It shall hereafter be unlawful for any person to drive or operate a motor vehicle upon any street, roadway or highway in the City Limits of the City of Earth, Tex-as, at a greater rate of speed than Thirty (30) miles per hour, except where speed zone signs are erect-ed indicating a higher or lower rate of speed, in which case the speed indicated by the speed zone signs shall be the maximum speed permitted. And it shall be unlawful for any person to operate a motor vehicle in excess to the speed limits indicated on any offic-

cial speed zone sign.
SECTION 2. The speed zones established by this Ordinance shall include all of U. S. 70 within the Corporate Limits of Earth, Texas; the maximum legal speed limits shall be as follows:

Beginning at the west city limit the maximum legal speed limit for both eastbound and westbound traffic shall be 50 m.p.h. for a distance of 0.300 miles; thence 35 m.p.h. for a distance of 0.486 miles to the center line of Elm Street; thence 40 m.p.h. for a distance of 0.210 miles; thence 55 miles m.p.h. for a distance of 0.300 miles; thence 60 m.p.h. during the day-time and 55 m.p.h. during the nighttime for a distance of 0.200 m.p.h. to the east city limit, the center line of the county

And all Ordinances and parts of Ordinances in conflict herewith are hereby repealed.

SECTION 3. The speed zones established by this Ordinance shall include all of F. M. 1055 (Amherst Street) within the Corporate Limits of Earth, Texas; the maximum legal speed limit shall be as follows:

Beginning at the north city limit, center line of a county road, the maximum legal speed limit for both southbound and northbound traffic shall be 60 m.p.h. during the daytime and 55 m.p.h. during the nighttime for a distance of 0.200 miles; thence 55 m.p.h. for a distance of 0.385 miles; thence 50 m. p.h. for a distance of 0.200 miles to the center line of North West Third Street; thence 40 m.p.h. for a distance of 0.432 miles to the center line of South East Third Street; thence 55 m.p.h. for a distance of 0.282 miles to the south city limit.

SECTION 4. Any person violating any of the provisions of this Ordinance shall, upon conviction thereof, be fined in any sum not less than Ten (\$10.00) nor more.

That the hazards, dangerous to public health and safety, creates a necessity requiring all rules providing that no ordinance shall be finally passed on the day of its introduction be suspended; and this Ordinance is declared to be an amergency measure, to take effect from and afterre, to take effect from and after the date of its first publication.




