Editorially, the Lubbock Avalanche said on November 21, 1954, quote:

LET'S FIGHT IT — And Get Started Now!

"The Santa Fe wants to eat its cake — and have it too. It is ready to file with the Texas Railroad Commission an application for permission to eliminate its passenger service between Lubbock and Amarillo . . . It wants to continue to make whacking profits off Lubbock by way of freight patronage, but it doesn't want to serve the convenience of the people. The City of Lubbock should fight the railroad to the last ditch, and there shouldn't be any holds barred either." End quote.

Most of you know the outcome of that historic "fight" Lubbock not only kept the passenger service which Santa Fe claimed was dead loss, but they goaded Santa Fe into replacing the old "doodlebug" train with a modern stream liner which was proudly paraded all over the Plains.

This story definitely proves one point; that Lubbock controls Santa Fe policy on issues involving LUBBOCK. That fact again became obvious at the meeting Thursday between the B. R. Water Commission and G. R. Buchanan, Vice President and General Manager of Santa Fe.

I was invited by officials of the Bi-State Water Commission to attend this meeting in which the Bi-State boys protested Santa Fe's action in granting Lubbock right of way along its properties for the 48 inch pipe line from Bailey county into Lubbock.

(All observation of that meeting expressed hereafter are purely personal and by no means should be construed to reflect the opinions of any other individual, living or dead.)

After screening the legal scum and all other mutual and customary lolligoes incident to this clamor, including a superb steak dinner at Amarillo Club (by Santa Fe), I think the old diplomat of the rails pretty well told his callers that they were well bunch of ginks but their logic was fuzzy; that wherever they thought they were going they had got there too late.

That after all, Santa Fe hauls more beans, machinery, bubble gum and aspirin into Lubbock every week than it does into Bailey county in a whole year.

That Santa Fe feels humbly indebted to Lamb and Bailey counties only to the extent that they provided a strip of land to hold up its tracks between two pay stations, Lubbock and Clovis that even this may be wasted gratitude since the Almighty created the strip of land and Santa Fe acquired it before some members of the Bi-State Water Commission were born.

That the cruel law of survival still governs corporations whose power, emaciated stockholders depend upon them for a measly Cadillac every year.

And finally, if in the cool, calculating process of obtaining this glorious reward for American enterprise, the hopes and dreams of a few thousand irrigation farmers must be sacrificed — what of it? Big business and big cities must continue to survive and grow. Farmers have no stockholders to appease. So to hell with them.

Tractor Accident Fatal To Earth Farmer Monday Morning

Dewey Daniel Green, 46, a Lamb County farmer who lived seven miles northwest of Earth, was killed at 8:30 a. m. Monday morning, July 23, as a result of a tractor accident. Green's death was one of three fatal mishaps involving a tractor on that day for the South Plains.

Green was pulling ditching equipment behind a tractor when the accident occurred. As he attempted to cross a ditch, the tractor reared up and toppled over on him. The steering wheel of the tractor crushed his chest, killing him instantly.

Steven Bustos, a Latin American who was riding on the ditching equipment, started waving frantically trying to attract some one's attention.

Betty Joyce O'Hair a neighbor's daughter, saw Bustos' motions and drove down to see what had happened.

J. H. Angleley and Price Hamilton, other neighbors were quickly summoned to the scene of the accident. The group was unable to move the tractor out of work Green's body free until a wrech truck arrived.

Green was born on January 19, 1910 in Earth Co. and lived in this community for a great number of years.

Funeral services were held at 3 p. m. Tuesday in the Earth First Methodist Church with the Rev. Cecil Meadows, pastor, officiating. He was assisted by John T. Williams of Springlake.

Burial was in the Earth Cemetery under the direction of Singleton Funeral Home of Muleshoe. Green is survived by his wife, Mrs. Odell Green; one daughter, Mrs. Bob Waide of Earth; two sons, Richard of the home and Pvt. Bobby D. Green with the U. S. Army in Korea; his mother, Mrs. M. L. Green of Earth; his father, V. R. Green of Mullins Texas; one brother, Ernest Green of Springlake; two sisters, Mrs. Johnny Truelock of Portales, N. M. and Mrs. Paul Lewis of Littlefield; and one grandson, Chester Elmore, Bruce Higgins, W. H. (Bud) Jones, Bob Knight, T. V. (Red) Murrell and Andrew Peters.

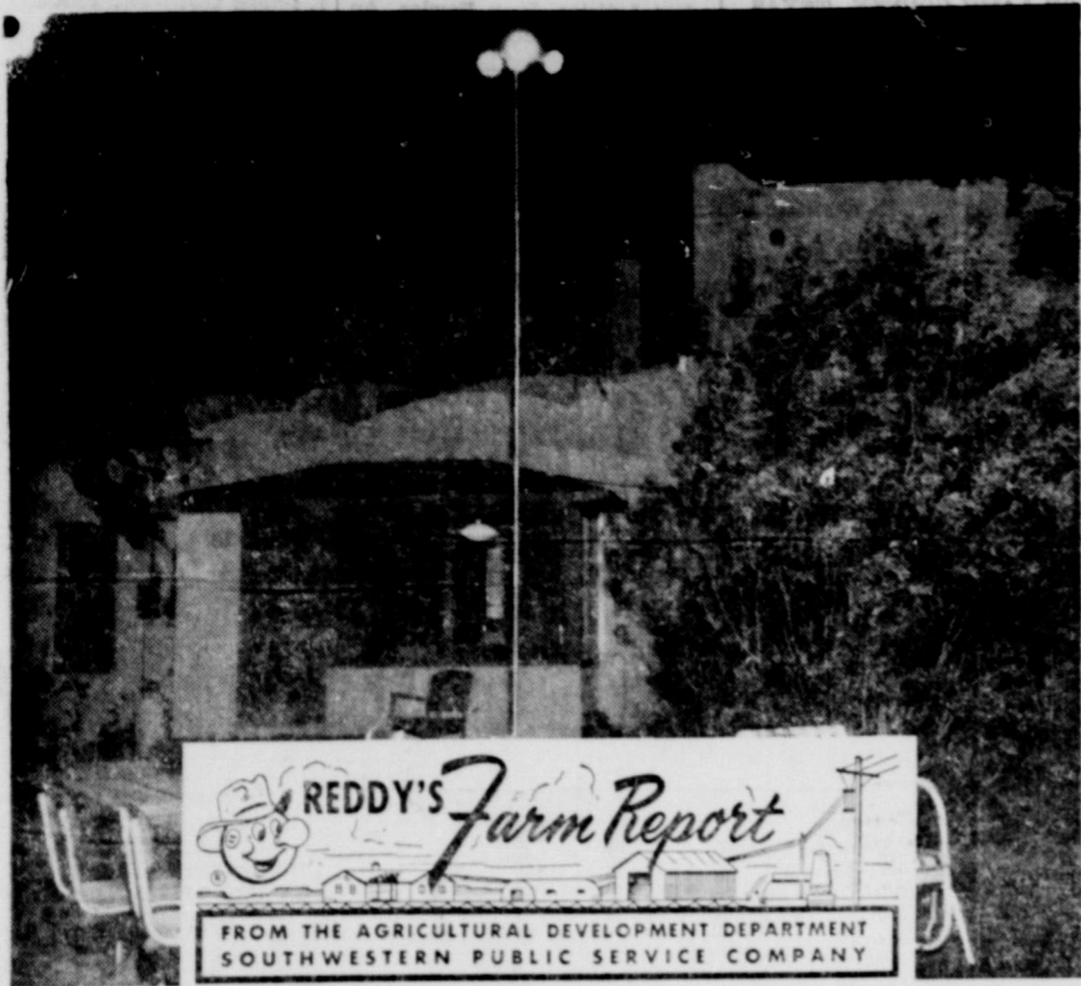

PORTABLE LIGHT TURNS NIGHT INTO DAY FOR WORK OR PLAY

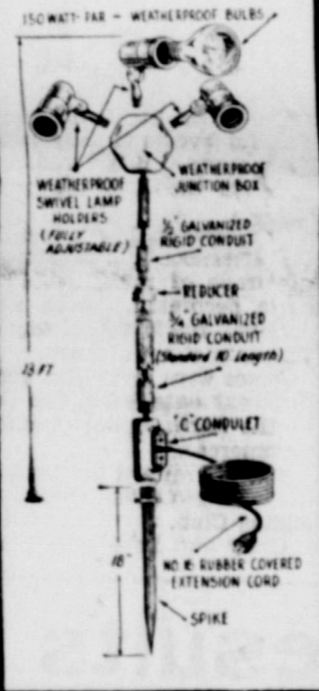

Also, night-flying insects tend to go to the light source; consequently, they stay up high (13 feet) and annoyance is reduced.

The pole components for supporting the light fixture equal about 13 feet; and to

the pole, single or multiple adjustable lamp holders can be attached. The flexibility of these units makes it possible for you to get as little or as much light as you need. Weatherproof PAR lamps (150 watts) complete the unit. These lamps are available in either flood or spot. Normally the flood lamps are used in yard lighting.

For those who are unable to make similar units, most electrical supply stores either carry them in stock or can order them for you. But, whether you make or purchase the units, you are sure of comfort, convenience, utility, beauty and safety in the farm outdoor areas every night.

Drawing below shows components of portable outdoor light. Measurements can be changed to suit personal necessity. The unit may be stored under the eaves or any other convenient place when it is not in use.

Premiums Totaling \$26,008 To Be Offered At South Plains Fair

Premiums totaling \$26,008 will be offered exhibitors at the 39th Annual Panhandle South Plains Fair, announced President R. E. Gee. The total value of premiums is \$1,974 higher than the 1955 total and is the highest ever awarded in the history of the Fair.

Fair officials announced that Guernsey cattle would be added to the Cattle Division this year. Premium in the Cattle Division will be awarded as follows: Aberdeen Angus, \$2,960; Herefords, \$3,320; Milking Shorthorns, \$2,945; Jerseys, \$2,700; Holsteins, \$2,700; and Guernseys, \$2,700.

The Swine Division will receive \$4,932 in premiums, with \$672 each going to six classifications: Berkshires, Chester Whites, Durocs, Hampshires, Poland Chinas, and Spotted Poland Chinas.

Exhibitors in the Junior Agriculture and Livestock Department will receive \$1,323 for displays of corn, grain sorghums, peanuts, cotton, breeding pig club, and dairy calf club. The Fair Association is also offering \$186 for individual exhibits, \$710 in the Vocational Agriculture Division, and \$352 in the Rabbit Division.

Each county having an agricultural display will receive a \$50 participation award.

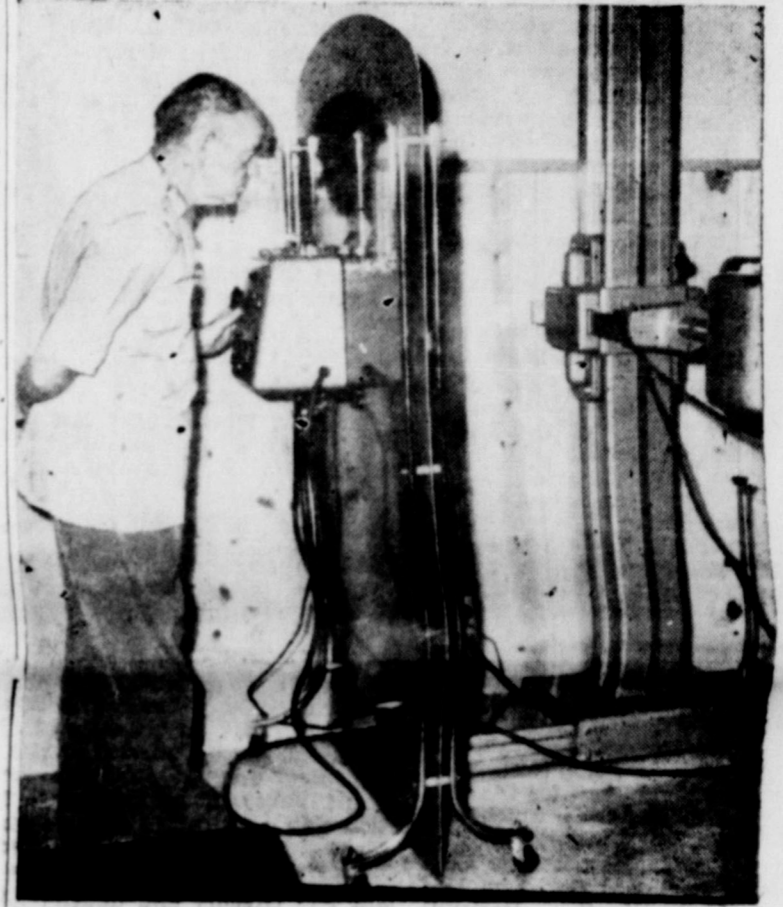

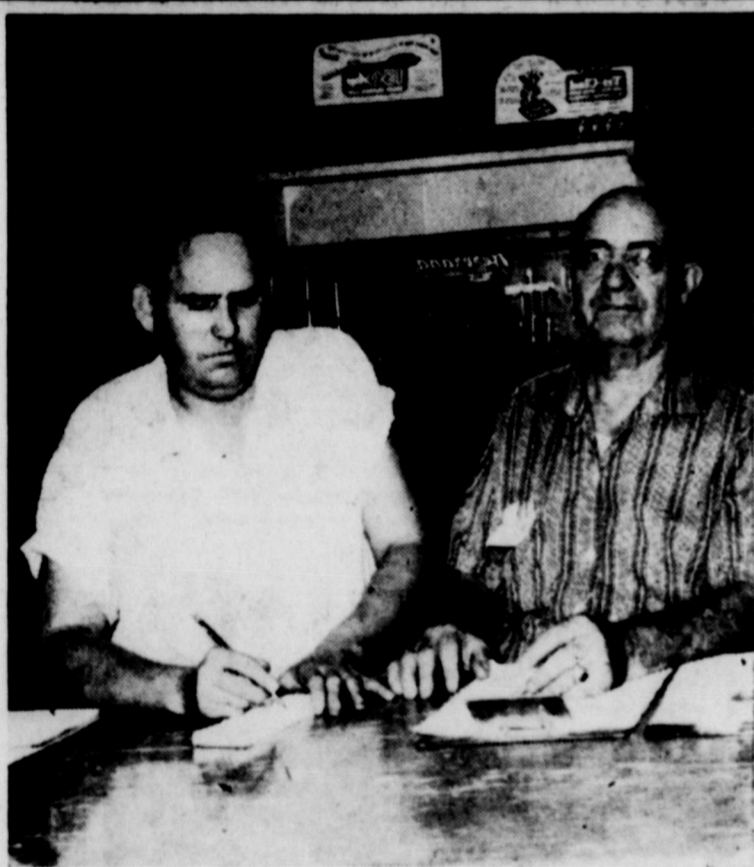
