The Springlake-Earth Wolverines busted the Shallowater Mustangs 39-12 Friday night at the Wolverine Stadium.

The Wolverines first two scores were set up by fumble recoveries with Jake Miller from the one for the first touchdown and Brad Barden going in from 26 yards out for the second TD.

Rodney Geissler scored in the second quarter on a one yard plunge up the center.

In the third quarter Doug Jones scored from three yards out.

John Cleavinger went over from the six in the fourth quarter.

Larry Dear scored the final TD for the Wolverines after the Mustangs fumbled the kickoff.

The Mustangs two TD's came in the first and fourth quarters. Jon Gates traveled 90 yards in

the first quarter on a kickoff return and added the second TD on a 30 yard pass from Bobby Reeves in the fourth quarter.

The Wolverines had a total of 342 yards rushing and 137 yards passing.

They also had a total of 120 yards in penalties.

Shallowater had a total of 284 yards rushing.

Jake Miller took the honors in most yards rushing with 129 yards. Doug Jones had a total of 105 yards for the night.

Rodney Geissler had 61 yards, Terry Hood, 35 yards; Brad Barden, 26 yards and John

Cleavinger, 12 yards.

The Wolverines had a total of 16 first downs and the Mustangs a total of nine first downs.

The Wolverines will take a rest this week, and will open district play against Vega in the Wolverine stadium, next week, Friday, October 18 at 8 p. m.

## Hunting Season Regulations for Lamb, Bailey and Castro

SQUIRREL season is now in effect and will conclude on December 1 for Lamb, Bailey and Castro counties. Limit is five per day, and each hunter may have only five in his possession.

TURKEY hunting for the thru county area is October 1 through October 16. However hunters may hunt again between the dates November 23 and December 1. Limit is one turkey to each hunter. (Archery, either sex, regular gobbler of bearded hen.)

Deer season for Lamb, Bailey and Castro counties opened October 1 and will continue through October 16. This is for archery only.

The next season for deer is slated November 23 through December 8. Limit is one mule deer buck and one white tailed deer buck.

QUAIL hunting opens Novem-

ber 16 and continues through February 16. Limit for hunters is 12 per day and only 36 in their possession.

PHEASANT hunting is December 14 through December 19. Limit is set at two cocks per day and only four in possession.

FISHING limits 20 hooks on all devices combined, limit one trotline.



## October is National Co-op Month

Bailey County Electric Co-operative will join with co-operatives all across the nation in observing October as Co-op Month, according to Manager J. W. Coppedge.

"We especially like this year's theme, 'Partners for Progress,'" Mr. Coppedge said, "It expresses the kinship and objectives of co-op people, particularly rural electric co-op people."

Some 50 million Americans are members of cooperatives of many different kinds, providing a wide variety of goods and services.

Mr. Coppedge explained that for almost forty years rural electric co-ops have continuously demonstrated how progress can be made through partnership. "When the rural electrification program began, less than ten per cent of America's countryside had electric light and power. Rural people got together, organized co-ops, set poles, strung lines, worked their heads off. All together, as partners--that's the point."

"The idea, and the enthusiasm of those early groups, caught on. Now, there are nearly 1,000 rural electric systems serving well over 20 million consumers in 46 states. We can say proudly that more than 98 percent of the country's rural areas is electrified."

Mr. Coppedge pointed out that in order to maintain high quality service at reasonable cost for their consumer-members, rural electric systems must continually update their knowledge and techniques to meet the changing needs of changing times. "We're concerned these days," he said, "with meeting the challenges presented by the energy crisis, environmental issues and community development. By working together in partnership to achieve common goals rural electric cooperatives will grow as viable forces in their communities."

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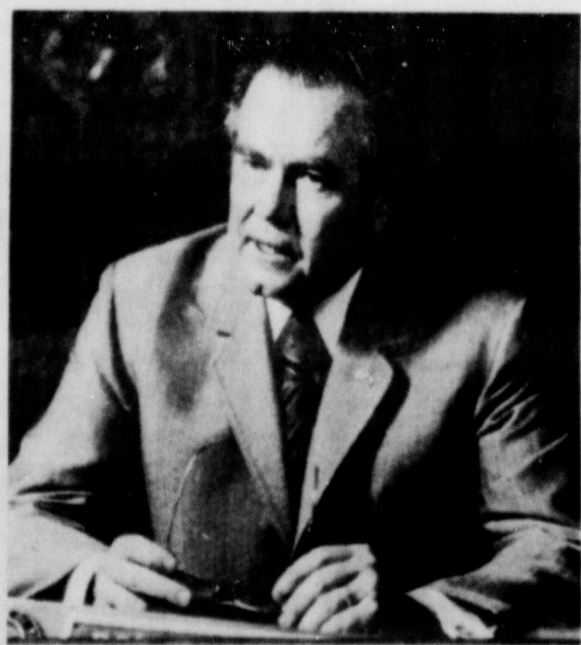
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## Plane Crash Thursday Seriously Injures Mrs. George Taylor

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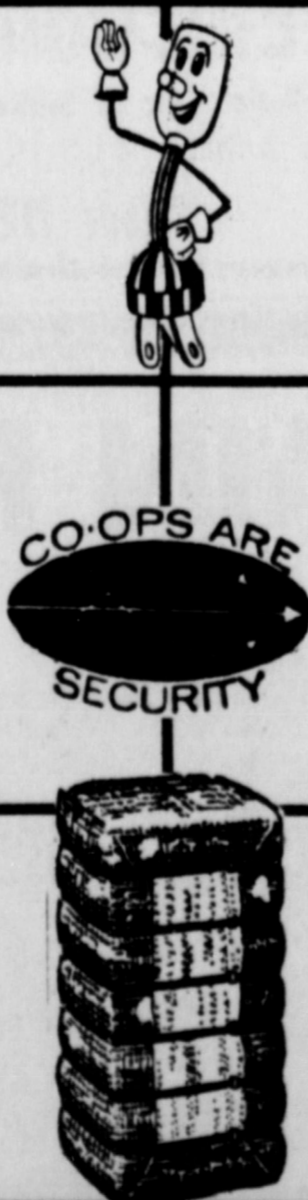

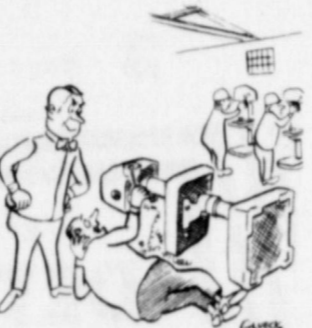
Jimmy, Johnny and Eddie Alaif had their motorcycles stolen last Sunday night, but they were recovered. Considerable damage had been done to them when found.
