The books are all carefully


screened, and range from light fiction to reference books. The bookmobile is stocked with all levels of books, ranging from pae-school through adult.


City Has 3 **New Sirens**

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

Springlake School faculty attended the County teachers meeting in Littlefield Monday night and heard a very informative speech on School Drop Outs," by Dr. Berlie J. Fallon, Professor of Education at Texas Tech. Dr. Fallon stated that only 1/3 of students in grade 9 through 12 finish school. The later junior high school years and early high school years are very crucial ones. The average age of the drop-out is 16 years of age. The problems of the dropouts are three fold.

-low mental ability (un-) unusually)
-poor reading ability
-sees nothing in the school program that relates to everyday living.

-dropouts are, many times pupils that must move about from school to school.

-financial need -poor health -marriage (especially is this true with girls) -attitude of parents unfavorable toward school

(3) Personality -he feels insecure -dosen't make friends easi--antagonizes teacher

The school's problem is to keep the student and that is the only way he can be help-The items mentioned by characterize the dropouts were -poor work and study habits poor in reading

-lacks initiative -will not accept responsibility -feels no need for education

-a poor listener -poorly prepared lessons Dr. Fallon then gave the students' qualifications of a good teacher.

-friendly

-clarity of expressions

-fair

-enthusiasm for subject taught -good classroom control -relaxed atmosphere in class-

Dr. Fallon went on to say these students have two strikes against them when they come to school. It is up to the teacher, what the third ball will be. "Will he throw this stu dent a curve ball or will he throw it across the plate and really strive to help the stu-

Dr. Fallon also pointed out the earning power in dollars and cents of the high school

and college graduates in com-parison with the non-graduates. The drop-out is the first to feel the scarcity of jobs that require unskilled labor.


