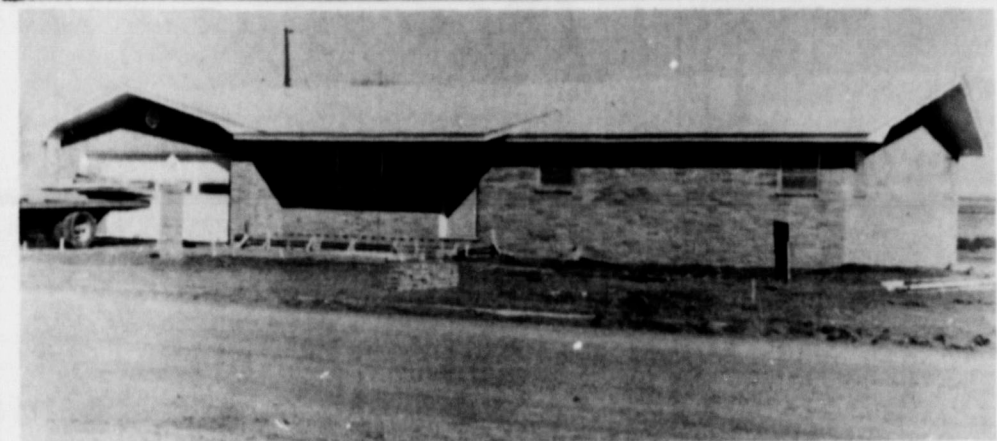

Bookmobile On Display Wednesday

Approximately 40 persons representing various organizations within the community met at the Earth Community Building Wednesday morning and toured the Bookmobile service truck that was on display.

The group discussed the possibility of securing the Bookmobile Library program to service this area.

The books are all carefully screened, and range from light fiction to reference books. The bookmobile is stocked with all levels of books, ranging from pre-school through adult.

Although the books would be available throughout the year, it would especially provide an excellent opportunity to area folks for reading during the summer months, as access to a local library is unavailable during this school vacation months.

The introductory offer of the Bookmobile is set up so that the state will furnish the Bookmobile unit, free of charge for the first 2½ years, providing the county commissioner's court will endorse to provide the mobile unit thereafter at an estimated cost of \$14,000 for the first year. The cost includes \$10,500 for the truck plus books and material \$2700, and \$800 for gas, oil and etc. This cost will be shared by five counties. These counties include Bailey, La. Min, Castro, Cochran, and Parmer. Baily County has already approved the unit.

Estimated cost to each county will be based on county's population. Lamb County's share will be 23½ percent of approximately \$3500.

Friends of the Library Club in Muleshoe have agreed to furnish a building to be used as headquarters for the unit to operate from.

No decision was reached in the meeting Wednesday. However a second meeting will be scheduled in the near future and further plans will be decided on at that time.

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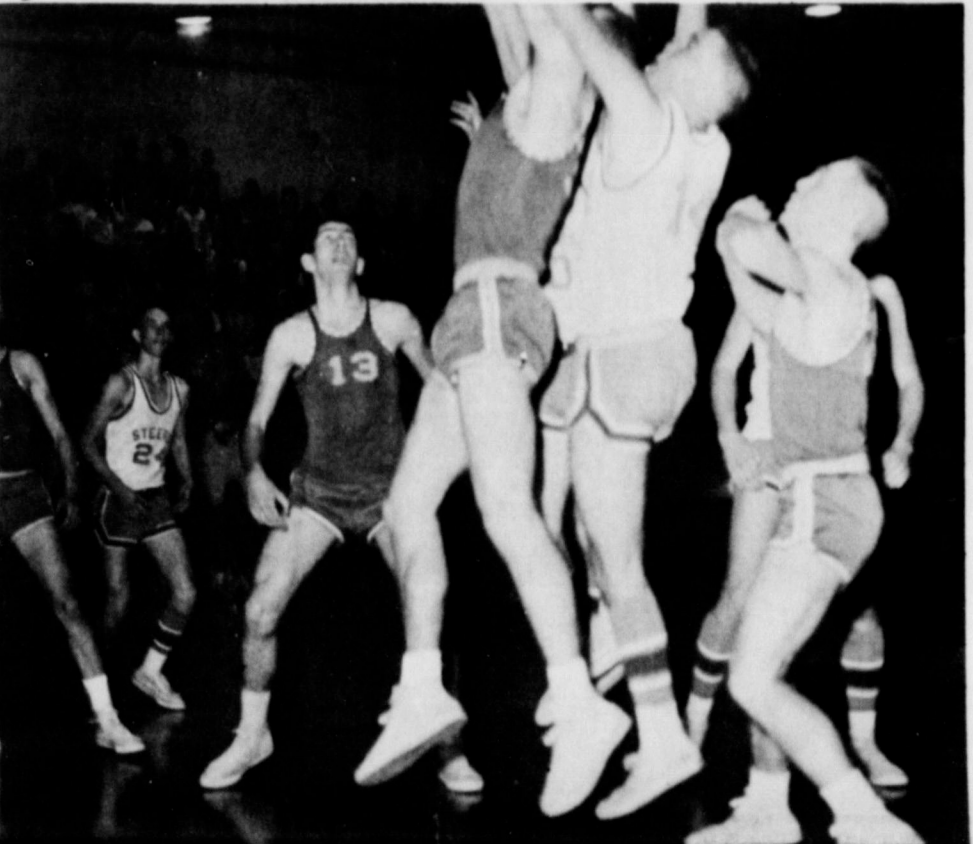

Dr. Fallon Speaks At County Teachers Meet In Littlefield

Several members of the Springlake School faculty attended the County teachers meeting in Littlefield Monday night and heard a very informative speech on "School Drop Outs," by Dr. Berlie J. Fallon, Professor of Education at Texas Tech. Dr. Fallon stated that only 1/3 of students in grade 9 through 12 finish school. The later junior high school years and early high school years are very crucial ones. The average age of the drop-out is 16 years of age.

The problems of the drop-outs are three fold.

(1) School

- low mental ability (unusually)
- poor reading ability
- sees nothing in the school program that relates to everyday living.
- dropouts are, many times pupils that must move about from school to school.

(2) Home

- financial need
- poor health
- marriage (especially in this true with girls)
- attitude of parents unfavorable toward school

(3) Personality

- he feels insecure
- doesn't make friends easily
- antagonizes teacher

The school's problem is to keep the student and that is the only way he can be helped.

The items mentioned by

teachers most frequently to characterize the dropouts were:

- poor work and study habits
- poor in reading
- lacks initiative
- will not accept responsibility
- feels no need for education
- a poor listener
- poorly prepared lessons
- Dr. Fallon then gave the students' qualifications of a good teacher.
- humorous on occasions
- friendly
- clarity of expressions
- fair
- enthusiasm for subject taught
- good classroom control
- relaxed atmosphere in classroom.

Dr. Fallon went on to say these students have two strikes against them when they come to school. It is up to the teacher, what the third ball will be. "Will he throw this student a curve ball or will he throw it across the plate and really strive to help the student's life."

Dr. Fallon also pointed out the earning power in dollars and cents of the high school and college graduates in comparison with the non-graduates. The drop-out is the first to feel the scarcity of jobs that require unskilled labor.

Again the third strike is up to the school and teachers. New officers of the Lamb County Teachers Association were elected at the meeting. Ed Hall of Littlefield, President, Olen Mahaffey, Littlefield, first vice-president, James Rinker, Springlake, second vice-president, Mrs.

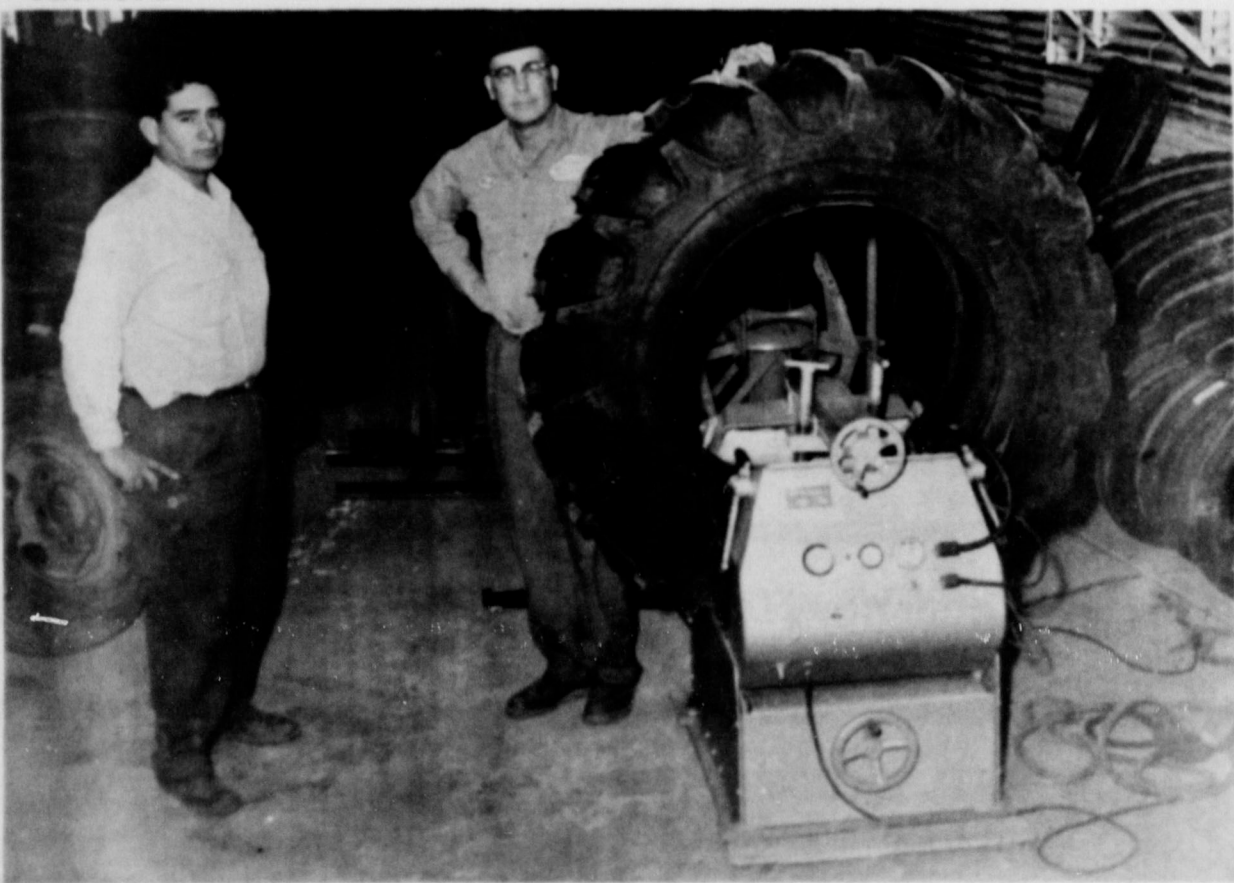
