Three Vehicles Involved In Accident Saturday

An accident, involving three vehicles and a cotton trailer occurred around 6:30 P. M., Sat., sending 4 persons to hospitals and leaving ungnined cotton and wreckage strewn across the highway at the edge of the Earth City limits, west of town.

Bill Angel, investigating officer was unavailable for complete details of the accident at press time Wednesday. However unofficial reports indicate that the mishaps occurred as Billy Braden driving a 62 chevrolet station wagon was, waiting the passing of a pick up, pulling a trailer load of cotton east toward town, before turning south into the driveway at his residence was struck from the rear by Mrs. Darrell Sawyer, driving a 61 chevrolet.

Two ambulances from Parson Funeral home in Olton and two from Singleton Funeral Home in Muleshoe, were called to carry the injured to the hospitals.

Muleshoe Man Seriously Hurt In Accident

One person was seriously injured Tuesday afternoon, 2 1/2 miles east of Muleshoe on highway 70, in a smashing two car collision at 2:55 P. M.

The accident occurred as Shelton C. Caldwell, Rr. 1 Muleshoe, driving a 62 chev. north, pulled across the high way from a dirt road into the path of a 63 ford pick up, driven by Gene Templeton of Earth. The Templeton pick up hit the right side of the Caldwell car broadside, completely demolishing the vehicle.

Mr. Cladwell was rushed to West Plains Hospital in Muleshoe, with serious head injuries and lacerations at press time he had failed to regain consciousness since the accident.

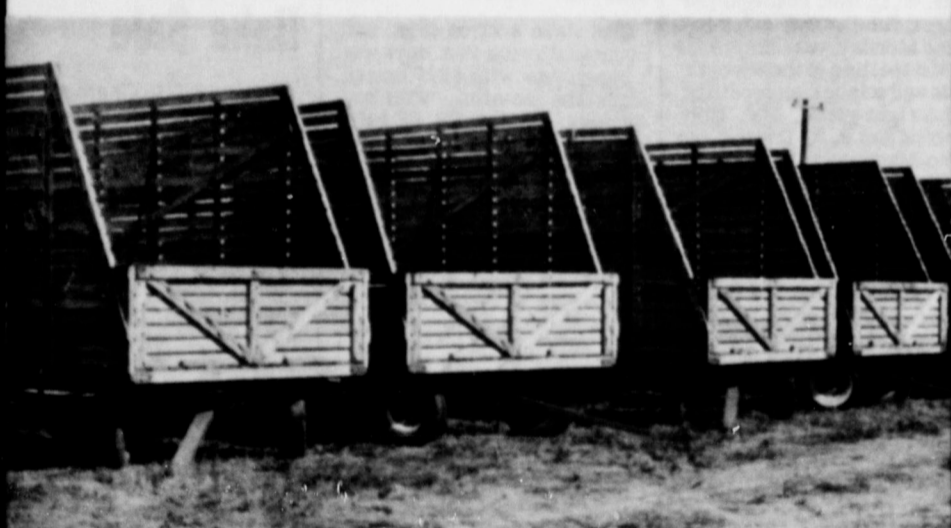

Cotton Quotas Up For Vote December 10

The cotton quota vote coming up on Dec. 10 will mark the eleventh consecutive year in which growers have voted on marketing quotas for their upland cotton crop, Harvey D. Vann, Chairman, County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committee, said today.

"Beginning with the referendum on marketing quotas for the 1954 crop, growers have approved quotas for each year cotton crop," he stated, "In the vote last year, on quotas for the 1963 upland cotton crop, 93.7 percent of the growers voting approved the quotas."

By law, quotas must be proclaimed by the Secretary of

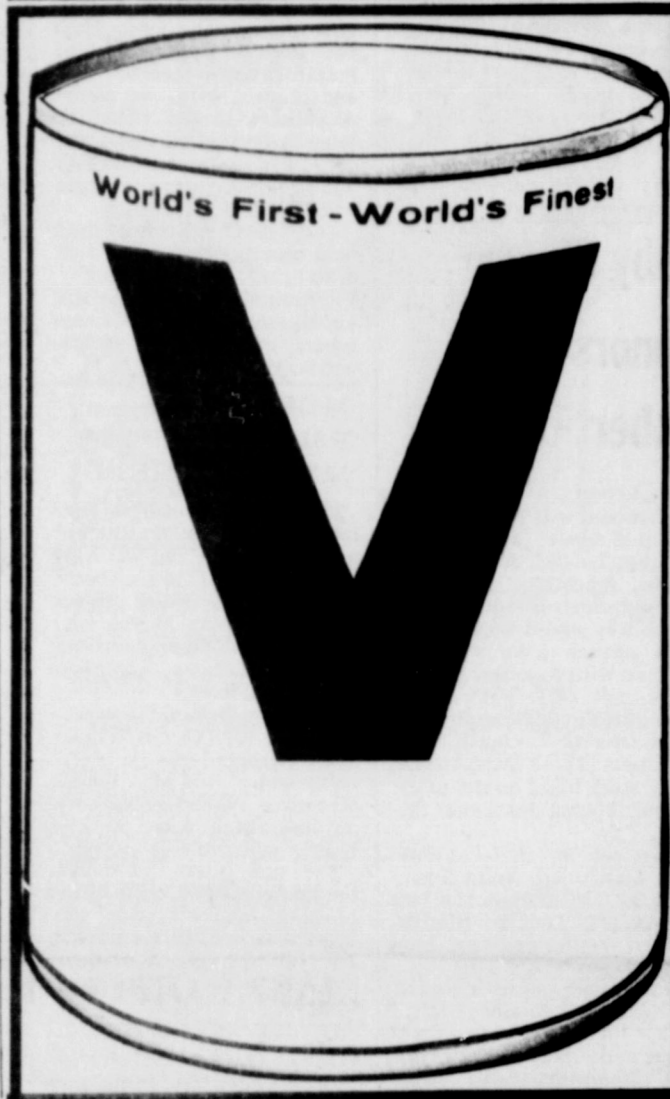
Agriculture in years when the cotton supply exceeds normal. The estimated 1963-64 total supply of upland cotton exceeds the estimated normal supply by 7.6 million bales.

If at least two-thirds of the growers voting in the referendum approve quotas for the 1964 upland cotton crop, price support at a level within the range of 65 to 90 percent of parity will be available to growers who comply with their farm allotments, and market quota penalties will apply to any "excess cotton produced" on a farm.

If more than one-third of the voters oppose quotas for the 1964 crop, the allotment program will remain in effect and price support will be available to cooperators at 50 percent of parity, as provided by law.

All farmers who engaged in the production of upland cotton in 1963 are eligible to vote in the Dec. 10 referendum.

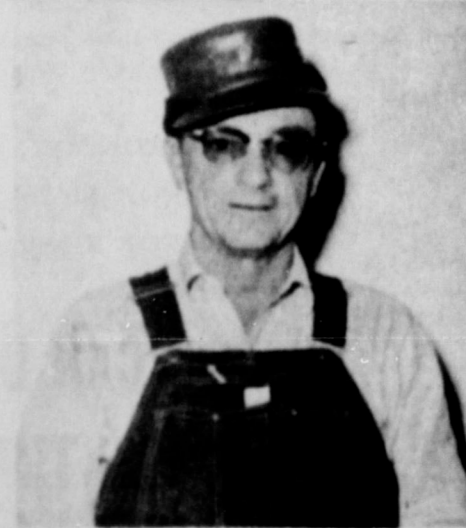

periods in numbers and arithmetic.

Dr. McCoy thinks the new approach will likely be accepted in most area schools within a few years. She has noted interest in the approach in conferences and institutes she has participated in recent years. This summer she was invited to attend a 24 day conference on topology and linear algebra which was sponsored by the National Science Foundation at Vanderbilt University. She has taught mathematics institutes at Baylor University and the University of Hawaii.

Although most workshopers describe the modern mathematics as "utterly fascinating," "creative" and "a challenge to the exceptional student," some reservations are expressed. Just because first graders can learn algebra and geometry as it is presented under the new system, it may not be wise to teach these concepts at such an early grade level, believe some local educators.

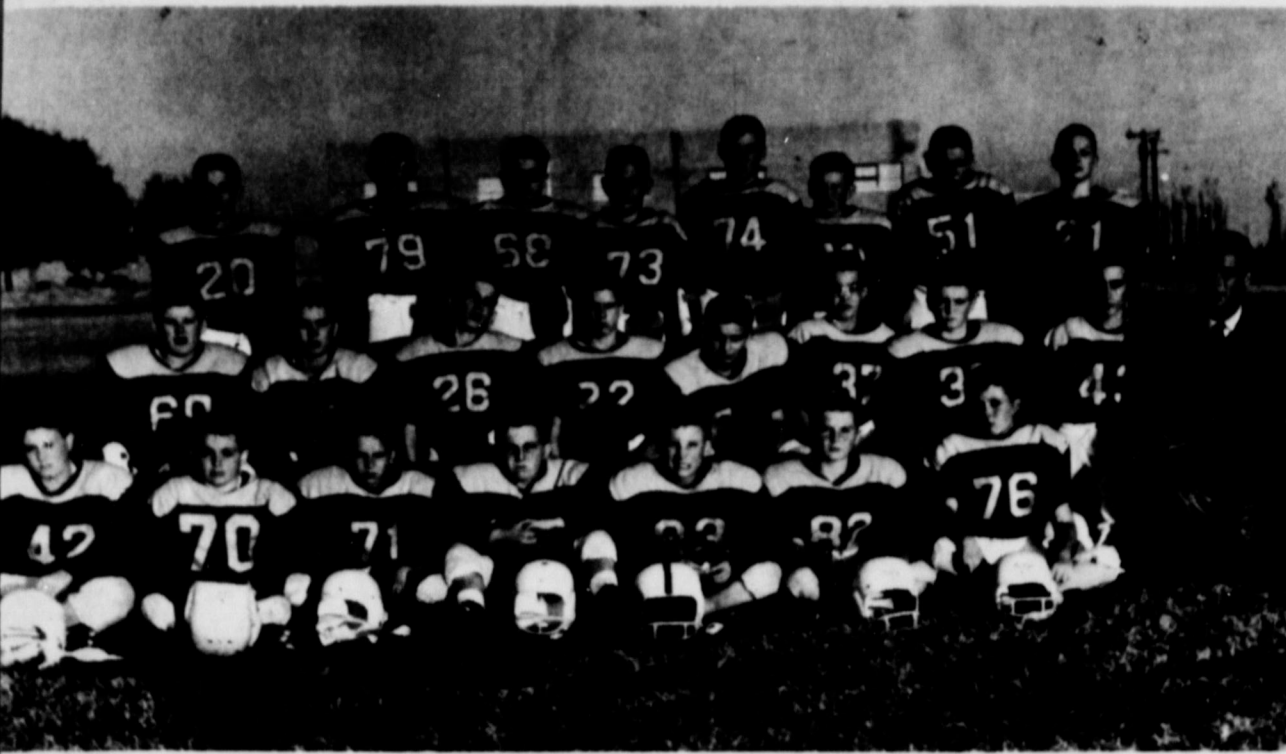

It was in the third quarter that the roof fell in on the Wolverines. Lovelace picked off a pass on the Farwell 40 yard line and returned it all the way for a touchdown. Lovelace missed the conversion but the Steers had a 9-6 lead, which they never let go of.

Early in the third quarter Farwell sprung fullback Jerry Herrington loose up the center of the line for a 65 yard gallop to the Wolverine six yard line before being overtaken by Floyd Bennett. A penalty wiped out a touchdown by Lovelace, and he had to settle for a field goal from the 24 yard line. At this point Farwell led 12-6 with both teams giving it all they had.

Moments later Springlake was unable to move the ball and was forced to punt. Jerry Don Sanders booted a beauty to the Farwell 15 yard line, where Danny Lindop fielded the ball and raced down the left side lines to about midfield, then cut to the sidelines and picked up blockers that sent him into the endzone standing up for a touchdown. The conversion was no good and the score was 18-6. Late in the third quarter Jerry Been broke loose up the middle of the field for a 60 yard touchdown run but had it called back for an off sides penalty that really left the Wolverines

feeling mighty low. In the fourth quarter the Steers held the Wolverines on the Farwell 40, then drove 60 yards in four plays to round out the scoring with an executed draw play with Herrington carrying the ball 45 yards for a touch down. Lovelace kicked the extra point to make it 25-6. Springlake came out with a 7-3 record, taking second place in district, but if this young club shows as much improvement next year as they have shown this year, heaven help their opponents!

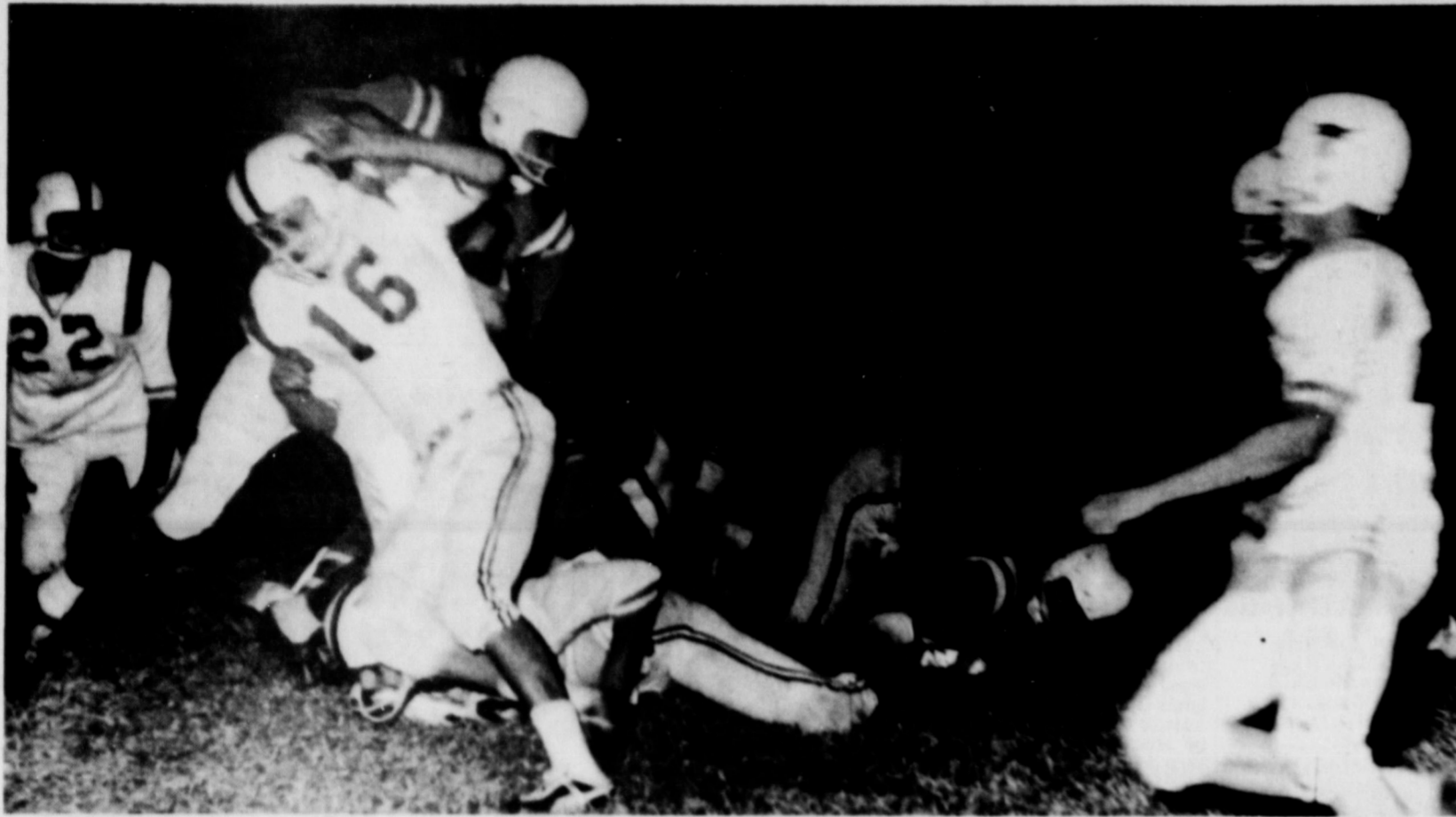
