Don Pinnell, calf roping contestant got his calf Thursday night in 11.2 seconds. In the saddle bronc riding, Kenneth Calwell of Springlake made an action filled ride on a bronc known as Humpy.

Dean Brewer of Roswell recorded a 7.2 seconds in the Thursday night bull dogging event. Pat McNatt, Plainview showed 18.8 seconds in the barrel race. Pete McKee made a good showing on bull no. 7 in the bull riding on opening night, but Friday night saw Elson Rose turn thumbs down on riding a ferocious bull named Speedy Gonzales. This bull has never been rode, and other producers have offered the Ratjen Bros. large sums of money, each wishing to purchase this well known bull.

Richard Walters, rodeo clown kept the audience laughing with his crazy antics and the unpredictable old car he was performing with.

A popular feature of each night's performance was the TV and Hollywood star, Arizona Dave and his amazing trick palomino horse, Comanche Son. The 15 year old horse performed many tricks amidst the applause of the audience.

Prosecuting the case was Jack Young, District Attorney, assisted by Curtis Wilkerson, Lamb County Attorney.

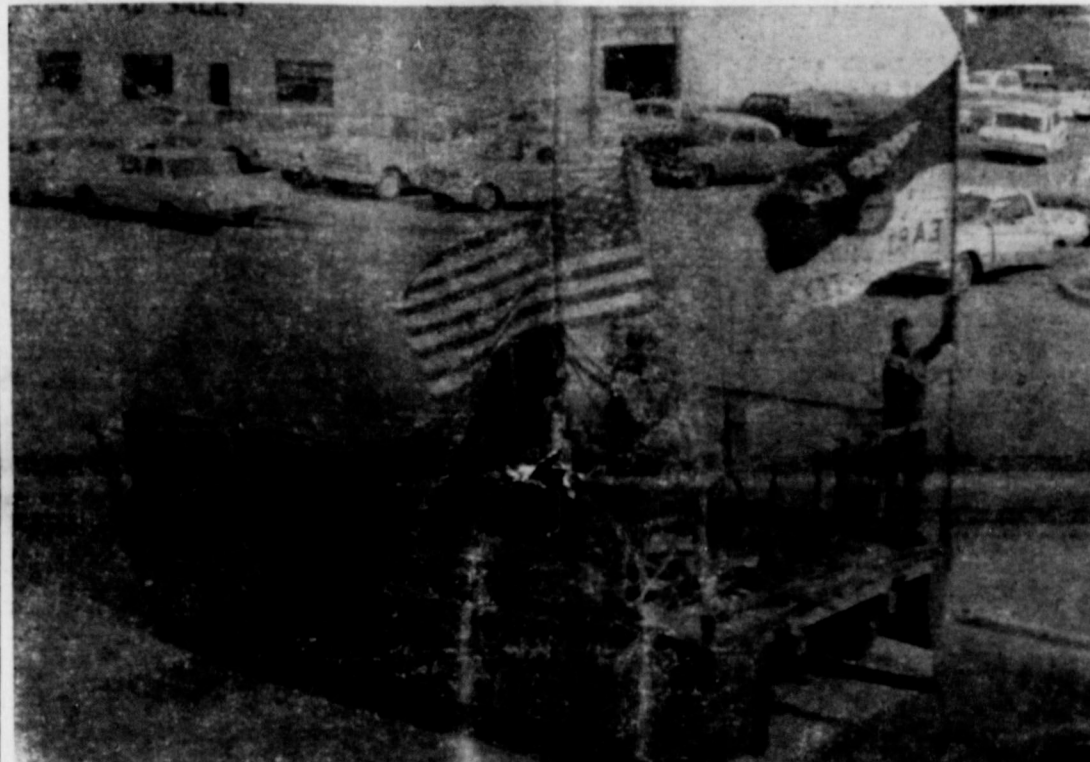
Defense attorney was Clifford Brown of Lubbock.

family may be saved if this life-saving piece of equipment is made available to the community. It can be used in emergencies such as smoke suffocation, concussion, drowning, brain tumor, gas poisoning, heart attacks, carbon monoxide, asthma and etc.

An incident occurred last December 9, when little 2 1/2 year old Anna Arter's heart stopped beating. Had not a quick thinking Scout

been close by to give mouth-to-mouth artificial respiration, the resuscitator would have proven invaluable. In this most worthwhile drive each volunteer fireman is responsible for a certain amount of the funds needed.

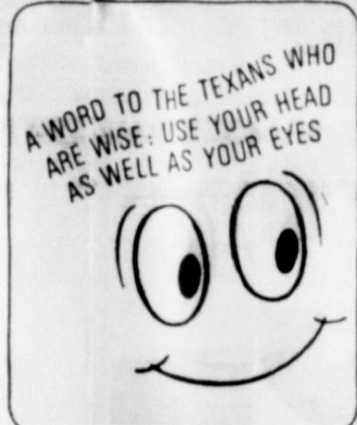

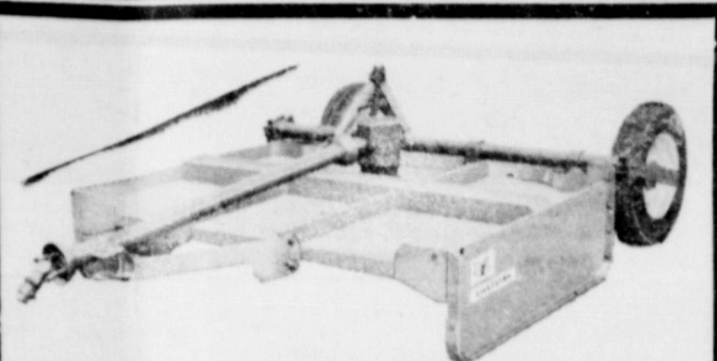


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Halfway Station Conducting Research On Sunflower Varieties

Farmers throughout West Texas may be growing sunflowers as a cash crop in the near future, if scientists at the High Plains Research Foundation are successful

in their attempt to breed improved varieties for commercial use.

The sunflower plant, which was being used by the Indians when the earliest European explorers discovered America, offers considerable promise as a potential cash crop for West Texas. Of particular importance is the fact that it is a drought tolerant plant well adapted to our soil and climatic conditions. It can be grown with less water than most other crops such as corn, grain sorghum, soybeans, cotton, and castor beans.

Several hundred plant types from Russia, Canada, Chile, Columbia and South Africa are under study at the Foundation. Dr. Earl Collister, chief agronomist, and Barry Love, assistant agronomist and Paul Belcher, technician, are conducting the plant breeding program. Superior plants are being self-pollinated for use in developing high yielding varieties adapted to complete mechanization. The goal of the breeding program is to develop varieties adapted that can be harvested with a regular grain combine.

The sunflower seed could be

marketed as an oilseed crop to oil mills, sold directly to feed mills, or consumed as feed for poultry and livestock. The whole seed is an excellent feed for poultry and livestock. It contains a higher percentage of total digestible nutrients, protein, and fat than many other feed crops, particularly corn, oats, and wheat.

Sunflower seed contain approximately 30 percent oil or fat, which is classified as a very high quality semi-drying oil and approximately 22 percent protein.

The oil is used in the manufacture of drugs, shortenings, salad dressings, oleomargarine, and liniments. The meal of flour from the sunflower seed is an excellent source of protein minerals, and vitamins. It contains above 50 percent protein, is unusually rich in calcium, an excellent source of thiamine or vitamin B1, and particularly outstanding in its supply of niacin. From the standpoint of nutritional value, sunflower meal would be a very desirable ingredient in human food products.

On commenting about the future of sunflowers as a crop for the future, Dr. Collister stated, "sunflowers could be an important cash crop for the farmers of West Texas, since it can be grown with less water than most crops." "With our declining water table throughout the High Plains of Texas, crops of this type will be essential in our farming program in the future."

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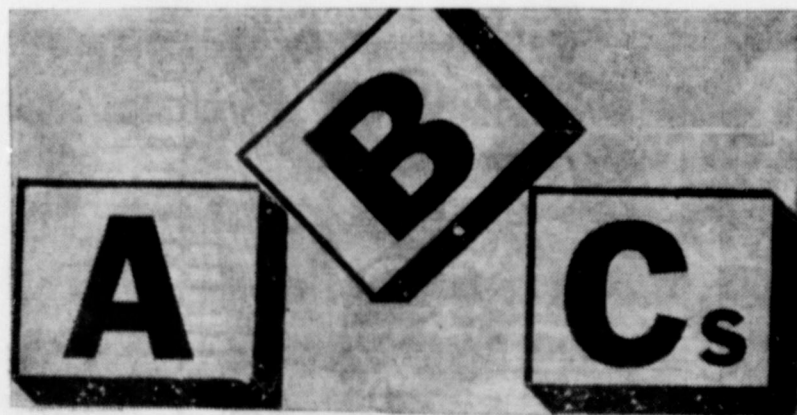
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Retired Pastor Guest Speaker At Tulia Reunion
