## City Dads Hear Plans For Survey Of Earth

The City Dads met Monday night in a general session at the city hall and heard Ken W. Larsen, of the Kenneth Larsen and Associates, planning consultants of Albuquerque, N. M., explain and show slides of the comprehensive plan for Earth.

The proposed cost for the survey is \$11,820. Earth's cost of the survey is estimated at \$4,490, plus an additional \$1,666.78 if a planning consultant is provided to meet with the city council or planning commission for a period of one year following the completion of the comprehensive plan.

The balance of the cost of the survey is expected to be financed through a Federal Grant in accordance with the planning assistance program provided for by the Federal Housing Act, if the city accepts this project.

The group voted to charge a \$5.00 fee for the return of any tagged dog that is impounded by the city.

The commission discussed at length the necessity for collecting the approximate \$14,000 in delinquent taxes now on the city books. A vote was made to proceed with the same process of collecting taxes as applied by the Springlake School. Letters will be mailed by the city Dads within the next few

days asking for the payment of Delinquent tax. If this plan fails to provide results, an attorney will be secured to proceed with collecting delinquent taxes.

The group discussed cleaning and painting the water tower, and the need of a paving project in Earth. Both these projects were tabled until a later date. The question was brought up by a city alderman, as to what recourse if any, could the city take to keep delinquent tax payers from filing as candidates for city office. No lawful recourse was offered so the matter was dropped.

The group also brought up the intentions of General Telephone Company to remove all their equipment from its present location, near the Sunshine Laundry, to a new location in the city.
