Lyna Pitts To Attend National 4-H Congress

Lyna Pitts, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Kirk Pitts, will be attending the 47th National 4-H Congress in Chicago. An estimated 1,600 boys and girls, all top-notch 4-H Club members, will arrive in the Windy City the Saturday after Thanksgiving. They are state delegates to the congress which will convene December 1 through 5 at the Conrad Hilton Hotel.

Lyna will fly to Dallas November 28 where she will meet with the other Texas delegates at the Baker Hotel. Friday the group will travel by charter bus to Ft. Worth, where they will board a train and continue their journey to Chicago.

The delegates have distinguished themselves in some 40 different 4-H categories, and were selected as congress delegates on the basis of superior project work. As winner of the State Dress Review, Lyna was chosen as a delegate and will represent Lamb County.

While in Chicago, the youths will hold assemblies to discuss the congress theme: Commitment to Responsibility. A colorful pageant written around this theme will officially open the session on Sunday afternoon, December 1.

In two half-day sessions the delegates will hear an address by Senior Editor of Reader's Digest, Charles W. Ferguson; and Judge of the County Court of Philadelphia, Juanita Kidd Stout. Judge Stout last year was honored as one of eight former 4-H members to receive the national 4-H Alumni Key award presented by Olin Mathieson Chemical Corporation.

Among other speakers will be Dr. Harold Sponber, president of Eastern Michigan University, and Dr. Luther S. Roehm, president of Merck Chemical Division, Merck & Co., Inc. The firm sponsors the national 4-H horse program.

Delegates to the Chicago meeting will see, hear and learn many things which will expand their horizons and contribute to their education. They will tour several of the city's famed museums such as the Science and Industry, Natural History, Aquarium, and the Art Institute. Entertainment will include a Pop Concert played by the Chicago Symphony Orchestra under the baton of Arthur Fiedler, a world-renowned conductor of the Boston Pop Orchestra. The Singer Company, a 4-H sponsor, will be the host for this musical treat. The recently restored Auditorium Theatre will be the setting for another exciting evening, courtesy of Tupperware, also a sponsor.

The spiritual program centers around the historic Chicago Sunday Evening Club where Bishop John E. Hines of the Episcopal Church, New York City will be the guest speaker. Sunday morning the traditional 4-H service will be conducted in Central Church by the Rev. Kenneth Hildebrand.

Vaccine Against New Hong Kong Flu Available In Late November

The Surgeon General of the Public Health Service, Dr. William H. Stewart, said today that first supplies of a vaccine against the new Hong Kong influenza strain will become available by the latter part of November.

Dr. Stewart urged that the first supplies be used exclusively for persons over 65 years old and those who have some chronic illness. These are the people to whom a respiratory infection is most harmful.

He said a single dose of the new vaccine will be recommended for protection.

Manufacturers have informed Dr. Stewart that first supplies of the vaccine will be available to meet all reasonable demands later in the winter.

Dr. Stewart praised the manufacturers for their emergency efforts to make the new vaccine, noting that soon after the new strain of A2 appeared in the Far East, and was proven different enough from older strains to call for a new vaccine, he wrote to all of the influenza manufacturers asking them to consider emergency production.

"They have responded with an excellent effort," Dr. Stewart said, "so that if the Hong Kong strain appears to get a foothold in the United States in the weeks ahead, we should be able to achieve enough immunization of the high risk group to prevent serious illnesses and possible deaths."

Dr. Stewart also noted that the

American Medical Association and other groups had already passed on the recommendation of the Public Health Service that the older people and chronically ill be given first priority, and he reiterated the hope that practicing physicians will assist in this effort.

"The manufacturers, respond-

ing to the Government's request, have moved fast to help protect the most vulnerable portion of our people and we believe that normal healthy people and their doctors ought to hold off-if they really feel the need to be protected-until we have taken care of those who need it most," he said.

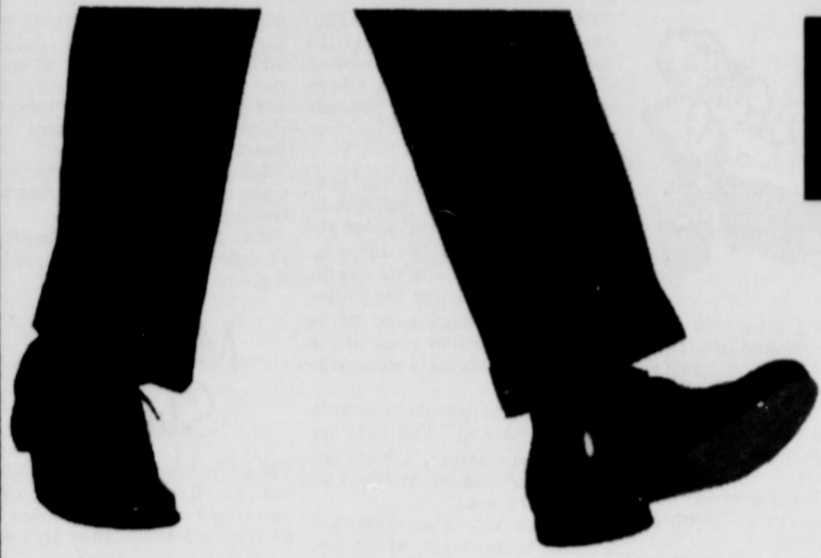

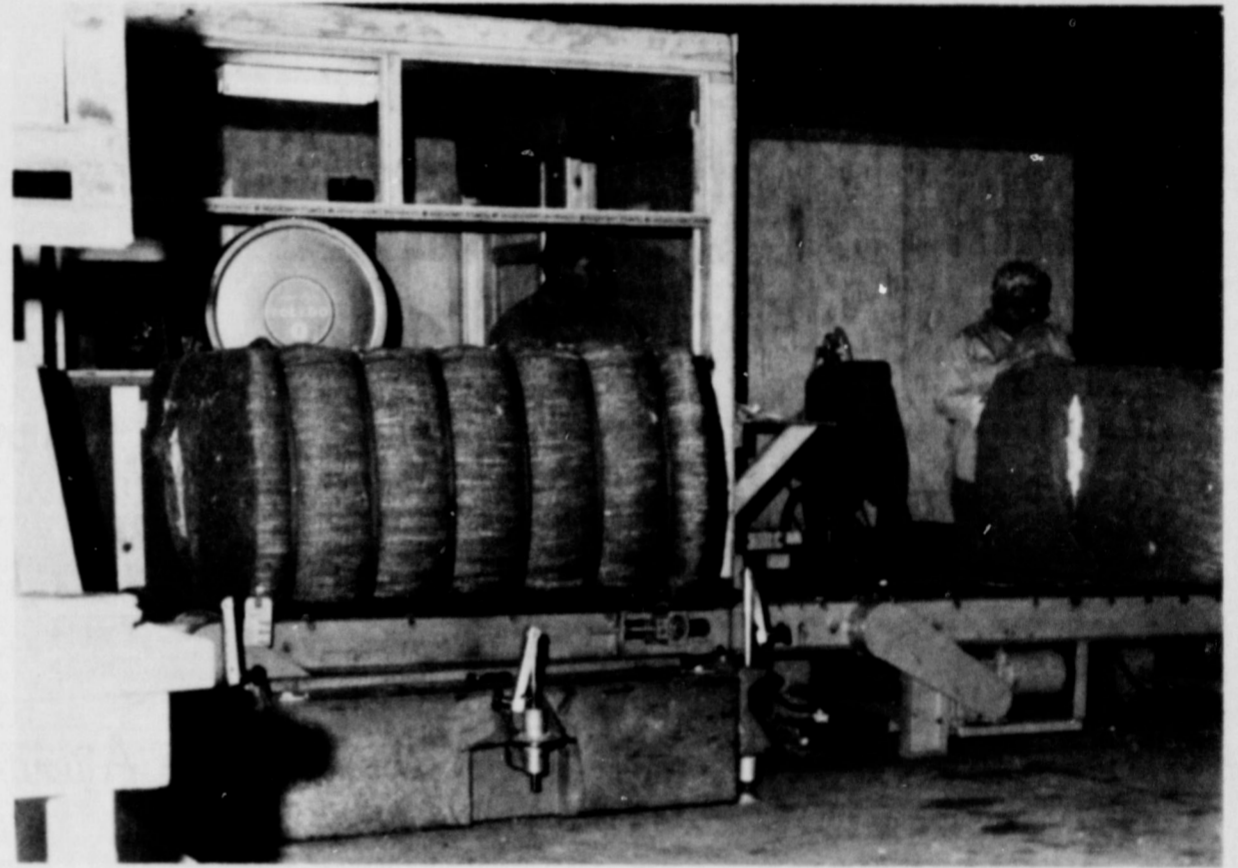

The Senior High MYF met at 5:15 p.m. Sunday to continue a Bible study on Matthew. The topic for the evening was the Beatitudes.

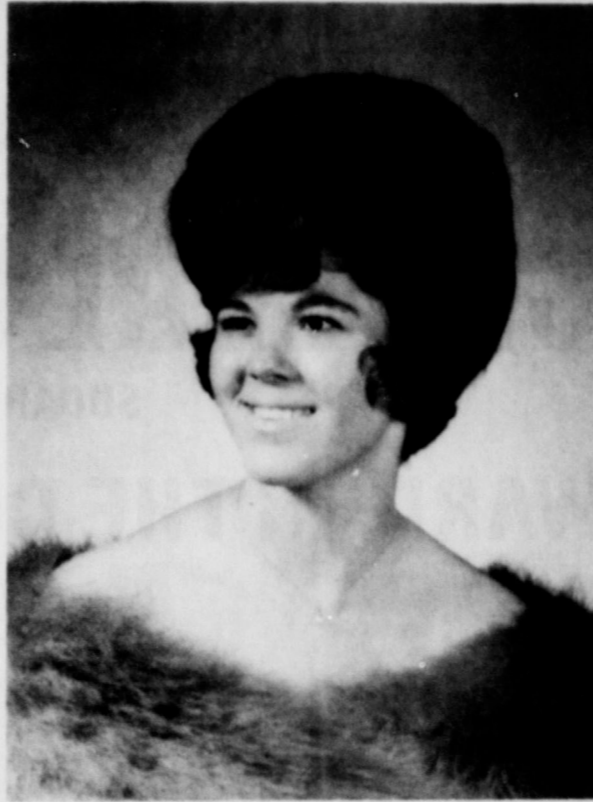

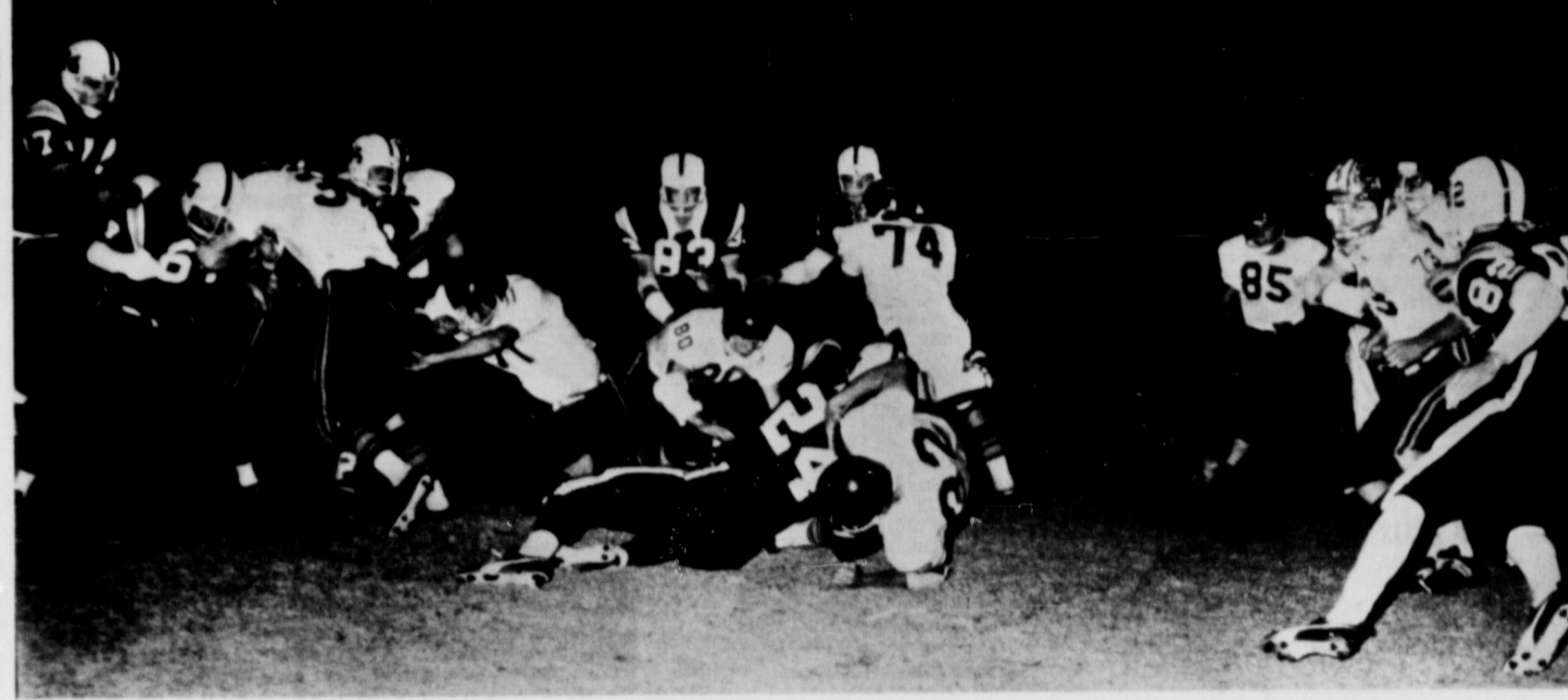

That election judges and clerks are directed to comply with Article 6.06, Election Code of the State of Texas, as amended (Section 2 of House Bill 181, Acts 1967, 60th Legislature, Regular Session, Chapter 482, Pages 1026, 1028), which provides that a square shall be placed beside each proposition in which the voter is instructed to place an "X" or other clear mark to indicate the way he wishes to vote; but which also provides that failure of a voter to mark his ballot in strict conformity with the directions on the ballot shall not invalidate the ballot, and the ballot shall be counted if the intention of the voter is clearly ascertainable, except where the law expressly prohibits the counting of the bal-

herein for such election. It is hereby found and determined that the EARTH NEWS-SUN is a newspaper published within the City of Earth, Texas, and is a newspaper of general circulation within said City of Earth.

Section 7. SEVERABILITY. If any section or provision of this Ordinance shall be declared to be void, ineffective or unconstitutional for any cause whatsoever, such declaration or holding shall not affect the validity of the remaining Sections and provisions of this Ordinance.

Section 8. EMERGENCY CLAUSE. The fact that the City of Earth needs more revenue for the efficient operation, growth and improvements, constitutes and creates an urgent necessity,

requiring that this ordinance be immediately passed as an emergency measure and any and all rules, if any, requiring more than one reading are suspended, and this ordinance is passed as an emergency measure and shall be in force and effect immediately from and after its passage, and as required by law.

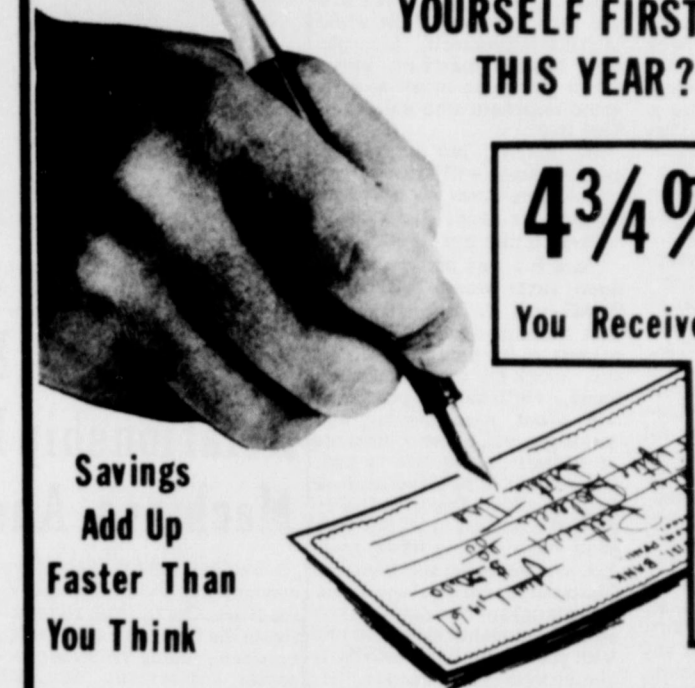

Cotton Harvesting Hints

Dry, high quality cotton at harvesting time is more than luck.

According to B. G. Reeves, Extension agricultural engineer with Texas A&M University, cotton should not be harvested with a moisture content of more than eight percent because extra cleaning and drying in ginning can lower the value.

Cotton should not be harvested before dew has dried from the lint. This means producers should usually wait until about 9:30 a. m. before getting into their fields. At about 6 p. m. the lint moisture will begin to rise and stripping or picking should be delayed until the next day, the cotton ginning and mechanization specialist points out.

"Even on the smallest farms a hygrometer can be important in preserving the quality of the product. For about \$15 a cotton producer can get a hygrometer and set it in the field on a stake to observe the relative humidity," Reeves continues.

The instrument, set about boll height, will give the humidity in the field and will usually correlate directly with the moisture content of the lint in open bolls. Within a humidity range of 60 percent or less, fiber moisture will be eight percent or less, he says.

Taking the reading at boll height in the field is necessary because factors such as wind direction, wind velocity, soil moisture level, stalk size and condition of the cotton itself govern the humidity level in the field and in the fiber moisture.

FROM A MERCHANT'S POINT OF VIEW

Back when we were kids and went to the show on Saturday, we always knew that the bad guys wore black, the good guys wore a white hat, and that in the end the good guys always won.

That is not true anymore—the good guys don't always win. The good guys are closing their shops, their drug stores their grocery stores, their service stations, and moving to the big towns where the action is. Why? I'll tell you why—because of that old bug a boo call Volume.

The big towns have the volume. The little merchant goes broke, and presto! he moves to the big town to create more volume. What happened to that little town he moved out of? First of all, that little town was denied the goods and the service that merchant rendered. Second, your taxes went up—someone had to pay the taxes when he moved out, and guess who it was? No one wants to serve you any worse than that local merchant, but it is you who must provide buying power—for you see that what volume is—buying power.

Come on, now, be honest with yourself—its 70 miles to the nearest big town, and that good car you have will get about 14 miles to the gallon of gas—that 10 gallons of gas alone will cost \$3.50—plus the 140 miles on your car. Dinner will cost about \$1.50 and a babysitter for 6 hours will cost \$4.50 more. That big discount house where you are going to save all that money shopping wont have anyone there to

carry those groceries, there will be a nice long line at the check-out counter and they will just naturally forget to give you any trading stamps (If us local merchants forgot those stamps, whew!!) Don't forget that the city is going to get a 1% tax so they can build a greater city. By the time you add it all up you've gotten a 140 mile trip out of it and you may have saved as much as the sinner will cost, if you buy only the specials for that day. You see that discount house is just like every other merchant—he has to make a profit to stay in business.

Have you tried taking any of the merchandise back to those folks when it doesn't work? You see, those folks don't know you as we do, and they are not sure you didn't mess up those works in that thing yourself. (Any ole hard headed merchant knows that a guarantee is just as good as the merchant who stands behind it.)

And maybe, just maybe that discount house will help you pay all of those taxes when we little guys are gone. He will all-right—in a pigs eye!

There is a way out you know—three little words—TRADE AT HOME—will do it. It'll tickle that merchant to death for you to mess up his nice clean floors and knock the merchandise around. He'll babysit your kids, talk about your troubles, and just in general make a nuisance of himself being nice to you. You wont have to stand in those long checkout lines, and when the bill is totaled he'll probably hand you a trading stamp or 2.

You see, he knows and likes you (thats the reason he's here in the first place) and besides he's honest! He sends his kids to school with yours, and he is usually in church with you on Sunday. He is the first man you think of when there is a boy or girl scout drive, and the last one you think of when you want to do business. He has more enthusiasm and less pessimism than anyone in town about his business and his town, if it's good enough to live in it's good enough to trade in!

But I forget—people being people, I'll probably be going to a funeral before long. You see, we're burying a town—named your town. Died from a strange disease called Lackavolume.
