Candidates for statewide offices are getting set for the final week of their campaign.



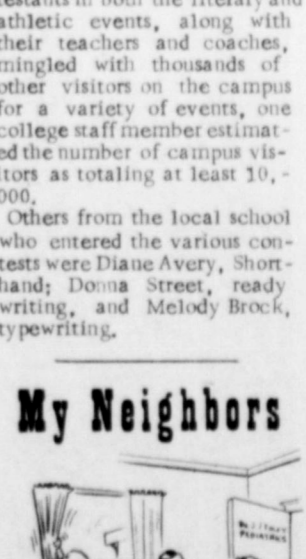

ANDY ROGERS' VIEW POINT ON ISSUES

Due to the Federal Courts ultimatum your Texas legislature was forced to re-district. The old 30th District I have represented for nearly 14 years has been greatly enlarged -- 300 miles across. This job of State Senator belongs to YOU, the people, not to me or any other candidate. The whole object of filling this post is that YOU elect the person best able to serve you -- not necessarily the most popular, best known and certainly not just the one who can spend the most money in a campaign.

I wish very much to see and visit personally with everyone, and will do so, as much as is humanly possible.

However, the huge size of our district, very limited money resources and the work and responsibility my Seniority places on me limits this personal contact, by me, quite severely.

Therefore, I sincerely request you to examine my record, satisfy yourself and help me spread the word to others.

I am a farmer, stockman, and small businessman, 41 years of age, have been active in church, lodge, civic work and farm and Veterans' organizations. My wife, myself, two daughters and one son are native West Texans, of the area including our Senate district. I served three years in the United States Army during World War II and have seven years of college - Texas A&M and the University of Texas.



ANDY ROGERS

It is dangerous in our State Legislature not to be a "go along to get along" person. It is dangerous to speak loudly and firmly against some big officeholders when you do not agree with them 100 per cent of the time or oppose some of their programs you believe harmful to your District or State. It is dangerous to seek to really stop pollution of our surface and ground waters. It is, perhaps, even more dangerous to raise your voice against corruption in high places when it arises or to oppose the great out-of-state owned corporations who have so much power in Austin -- those who seek to evade their fair share of taxes and seek to shift an ever greater burden to the worker, farmer and Texas-owned businesses.

Andy Rogers has done all of these and therefore is on their list for extermination.

When I first ran for the State Senate in 1952 -- there was then a great hue and cry to clean up the "mess in Washington." I was an oddity among candidates THEN, as I charged that "Austin is as rotten as Washington" and that "moral integrity is needed most."

I further demanded a law to require state officials and legislators to file for public record, a statement showing their income and its source.

This wasn't, and still isn't, the way to be very popular in Austin and certain other circles.

In 1954, I, and a few others, urged investigations into several matters, including the Insurance Commission, certain land transactions and certain state contracts. For our efforts we were slandered.

A few months later the lid blew off. I have authored and passed legislation against obscene, dirty literature, pep pills and narcotics.

Yes, I have made many good friends among those who work for the interest of our District. I have also made many good enemies of those selfish minority blocs who interests conflict with those of our District.

In two of my more recent races they have used every trick; deceit, slanderous anonymous mail and threats to me and my closest friends.

During this race they have, so far, at least, been more subtle. But their money and power behind my opponents become more obvious each day.

This is not to say that my two opponents would employ or use these tactics -- they both seem like nice guys -- but they don't have to use them -- some others will gladly and freely do this for them if they think it will work.

These methods of deceit, etc., have been perfected to an art.

And, as has been said, "the perfection of art is to conceal art." But look closely -- it is obvious they are at work -- not necessarily because all of them love my opponents, but because they seek to destroy an old and proven enemy, Andy Rogers.

Meanwhile, my opponents readily seek and accept campaign money from various ones of these enemies of the people. I and my family and some friends have suffered economically, socially and politically at the hands of some powerful lobbyists and others. But, I have not run from them in the past -- I will not do so now; or in the future.

ISSUES
1. So the first real issue in this race for the 30th Senate District post is, can those who deceive the people and try to manipulate the Legislature and other state officials to their advantage, finally succeed with their tactics and limitless money.

2. In Wichita Falls, the main population center of our district, a group there, several of their number extremely wealthy, pretty well control their city and county. Now they intend to control your Senate representation in Austin. Recently, a banker, and very rich oilman, among their number called a "SECRET" meeting in Wichita Falls to rant and rave how horrible Andy Rogers was and to raise money for one of his opponents. He didn't bother with the facts. MORE IMPORTANT, he didn't tell why he was really against me. The truth is that in 1959 your then Senator George Moffett and other leaders in Wichita Falls asked me to sponsor a law creating a pollution authority to control oil field pollution as Wichita Falls HAD to seek a new water supply and the proposed new lake would be worthless until firm pollution control was initiated.

I passed this bill for Wichita Falls and neighboring towns and it has brought wonderful people. But the banker and oil man who called the "SECRET" meeting did not explain how he had been and still is considered one of the worst violators of pollution control.

Most of our oilmen, including the major companies have cooperated wonderfully with the pollution authority -- but not this gentleman.

He regularly contacts our legislators and other state officials to try to destroy the pollution authority. He is regularly known to be one of the major political contributors to candidates on every political level.

Shall we let him destroy Andy Rogers who passed the bill to protect our water for all our citizens??

3. The "Iron-Curtain press" in my 18 consecutive years in politics I have never encountered any news media as stunted and biased as the Wichita Falls newspaper.

They have persisted in making "news" for their favorite son and denied every opportunity possible to let their readers know there are even other candidates running.

They have so arrogantly and flagrantly denied the public of its "RIGHT TO KNOW". Shall the voters reward this un-American like Institution??
4. Seniority. If a candidate has a voting record to please most of the voters, the next most important thing in his ability to represent them, is his Seniority.

Andy Rogers now ranks 6th in Seniority in our Texas Senate by virtue of four years in our House of Representatives and nearly 14 years in our State Senate.

Seniority in our Senate is the most important factor in determining which committees a Senator will serve on and the ones of which he will be chairman -- and there fore his ability to serve.

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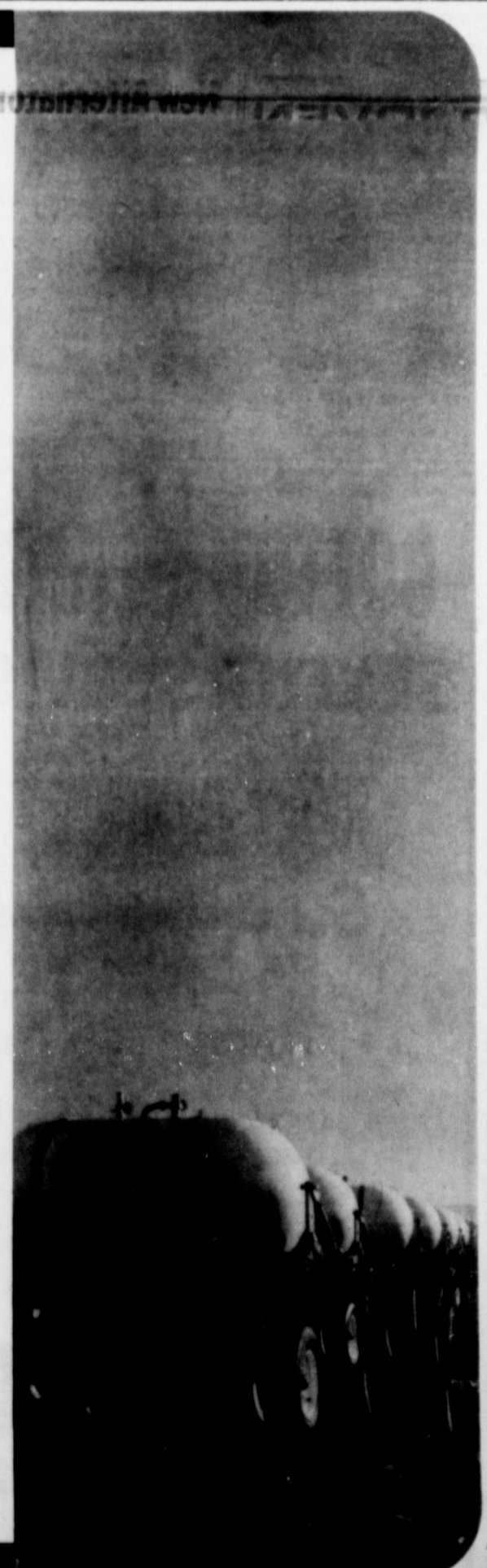

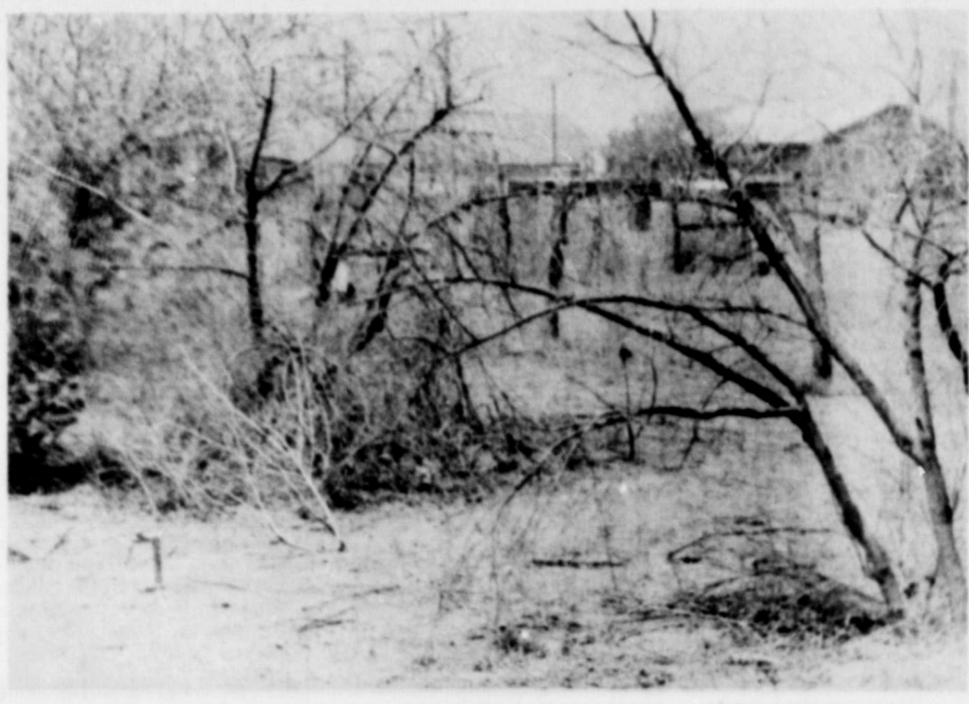

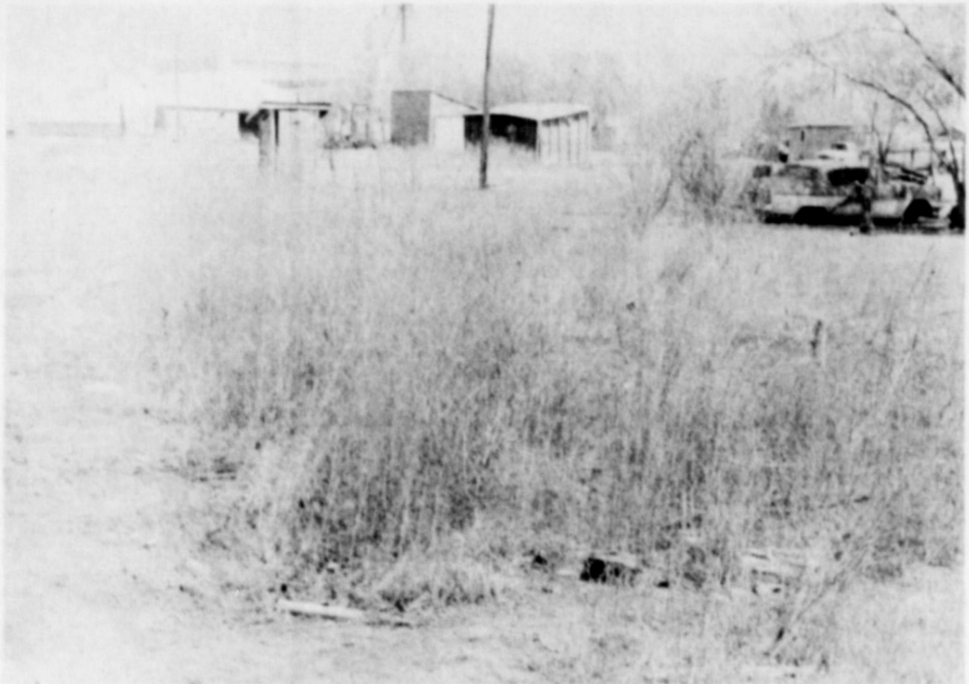

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TORNADO Safety Rules

TO KNOW WHAT TO DO WHEN A TORNADO IS APPROACHING MAY MEAN THE DIFFERENCE BETWEEN LIFE AND DEATH!

- I If you are near a tornado cellar:**
When time permits, go to a tornado cellar, cave or underground excavation which should have an air outlet to help equalize the air pressure. It should be kept fit for use, free from water, gas or debris; and preferably equipped with pick and shovel. THERE IS NO UNIVERSAL PROTECTION AGAINST TORNADOES EXCEPT UNDERGROUND EXCAVATIONS.
- II If you are in open country:**
1. Move at right angles to the tornado's path. Tornadoes usually move ahead at about 25 to 40 miles per hour.
2. If there is no time to escape, lie flat in the nearest depression such as a ditch or ravine.
- III If in a city or town.**
1. Seek inside shelter, preferably in a strongly reinforced building. STAY AWAY FROM WINDOWS!
2. In homes: The corner of the basement toward the tornado usually offers greatest safety, particularly in frame houses. People in houses without basements can sometimes be protected by taking cover under heavy furniture against inside walls. Doors and windows on the sides of the house away from the tornado may be opened to help reduce damage to the building.
3. Standing against the inside wall on a lower floor of an office building offers some protection.
- IV If in schools:**
1. In city area: If school building is of strongly reinforced construction, stay inside, away from windows, remain near an inside wall on the lower floor when possible. AVOID AUDITORIUMS AND GYMNASIUMS with large, poorly-supported roofs!
2. In rural schools that do not have strongly reinforced construction, remove children and teachers to a ravine or ditch if storm shelter is not available.
- V Keep calm.** It will not help to get excited. People have been killed by running out into streets and by turning back into the path of a tornado. Even though a warning is issued, chances of a tornado striking one's home or location are very slight. Tornadoes cover such a small zone, as a rule, that relatively only a few places in a warned area are directly affected. You should know about tornadoes though, "just in case."
- VI Keep tuned to your radio or television station for latest tornado advisory information.** Do not call the Weather Bureau, except to report a tornado, as your individual request may tie up telephone lines urgently needed to receive special reports or to relay advisories to radio and television stations for dissemination to thousands in the critical area.

Electrification Course Scheduled May 9-12 at Local School

A Farm Electrification short course on electric motors for adult farmers will be held May 9-12 under the sponsorship of the Springlake-Earth High School Vocational Agriculture Department, according to Bill Mann, Superintendent and E. G. Gaston, teacher of vocational agriculture.

Bob Jaska, Farm Electrification specialist with the Vocational Agriculture Division of the Texas Education Agency and the Department of Agricultural Engineering at Texas A&M University, will do the instructing in the course.

Jaska holds a Master's Degree in Agricultural Engineering. Since 1947 he has been prominent in research work in Farm Electrification at A&M University, in addition to teaching Farm Electrification in the Agricultural Engineering Department. His research and field work carried him over the entire state so that he is very familiar with all types of electrical problems on the farm.

"Many Farm Electrification short courses in various parts of the state have been taught by Jaska and all have met with outstanding success," according to Walter Labay, area supervisor

of vocational agriculture, Plainview. Arrangements for the adult education short course in Farm Electrification and in other fields are made through Labay's office.

The short course at Springlake-Earth is scheduled to begin May 9 at 8:00 p. m. in the vocational building. Other meetings in the series of 4 will be held May 10, 11 and 12. During the dates the short course is in progress, Jaska will be available to assist farmers with individual problems and to provide on-the-farm instruction, according to E. G. Gaston.

Farmers interested in attending the short course should write or call the superintendent of schools, Bill Mann, or the teacher of vocational agriculture, E. G. Gaston. An entry fee of \$3.00 will be charged. Farm Electrification Short Course Certificates are to be presented to each farmer who attends all the training sessions.

Jaska states that the short course can be adjusted to wishes and interests of the farmers enrolled, but that he expects to cover such subjects as safety, how to properly choose wire sizes and install motor circuits, how to choose, protect, and ground electric motors, how to reverse

and change motors from 120V to 240V, and how to calculate the cost of operating electrical equipment. Demonstrations will be given and class enrollees will have the opportunity to perform the skills demonstrated.

\$20,000,000 Grain Milling Plant To Be Built In Dimmitt

Houston Lust, president and chairman of the board, announced a special called stockholders meeting, Monday night April 25, 1966, of the Dimmitt Wheat Growers, Inc. voted overwhelmingly to recommend to the Board of Directors the construction of a Wet Grain Sorghum Plant.

At 9 a. m. Tuesday, April 26, Aaron T. Isaacs, secretary and general manager of the Dimmitt Wheat Growers, Inc. announced at a special called press conference at the associations office at Dimmitt, that after three years of careful engineering and marketing studies, by Dimmitt Wheat Growers, Inc. that a Wet Grain Sorghum Milling Plant would be constructed at Dimmitt, Texas. Total capital investment to exceed \$20,000,000.

The plant to be constructed adjacent to the present Dimmitt Wheat Growers Elevators at Dimmitt.

It is designed to grind 20 thousand bushel per day, approximately 7 million bushel per year, operating around the clock with expandable features.

Union Starch and Refining Co. Inc. of Columbus, Indiana will design supervise construction, oversee construction, manage operation of the plant and market the product.

The plant is divided into two main areas with the railroad siding between them connected by a weatherproof service bridge. The building and area will cover 2,000,000 square feet over a 30 acre tract.

Mr. Isaacs stated the plant will be the most modern, automated Grain Processing Plant in the world today.

It will employ some 100 plus people with an annual payroll in excess of \$1,000,000. Isaacs further stated that the plant is 100 percent cooperative owned by Dimmitt Wheat Growers, Inc. which is made up of over 700 farmers in the Dimmitt area, whose grain sorghum production capacity exceeds the expected needs of the proposed mill. These farmers operate farms in and around Castro County, Texas, which is acknowledged to be the grain sorghum capital of the world since this area is uniquely suited to the growing of sorghum.

Construction time is estimated at one and one half to two years. It will be approximately 6 months before construction will begin on the plant.

Union Starch and Refining Co. Inc. is headed by Ted R. Reed, president with general offices at Columbus, Indiana. Plants at Granite City, Illinois, Mexico City, Columbia, Peru, and the Philippines as well as a Cyclamate Plant at Edinburg, Indiana. Union Starch and Refining Co. Inc. is one of the most respected wet millers in the industry.

The objectives of this association are to secure the highest available price for the farm products, its farmer members produce, after a careful study of the declining income of these members, it had become apparent that a new market must be found.

The proposed plant is an attempt by the farmers themselves to assure a reasonable profit from the production of grain sorghum.

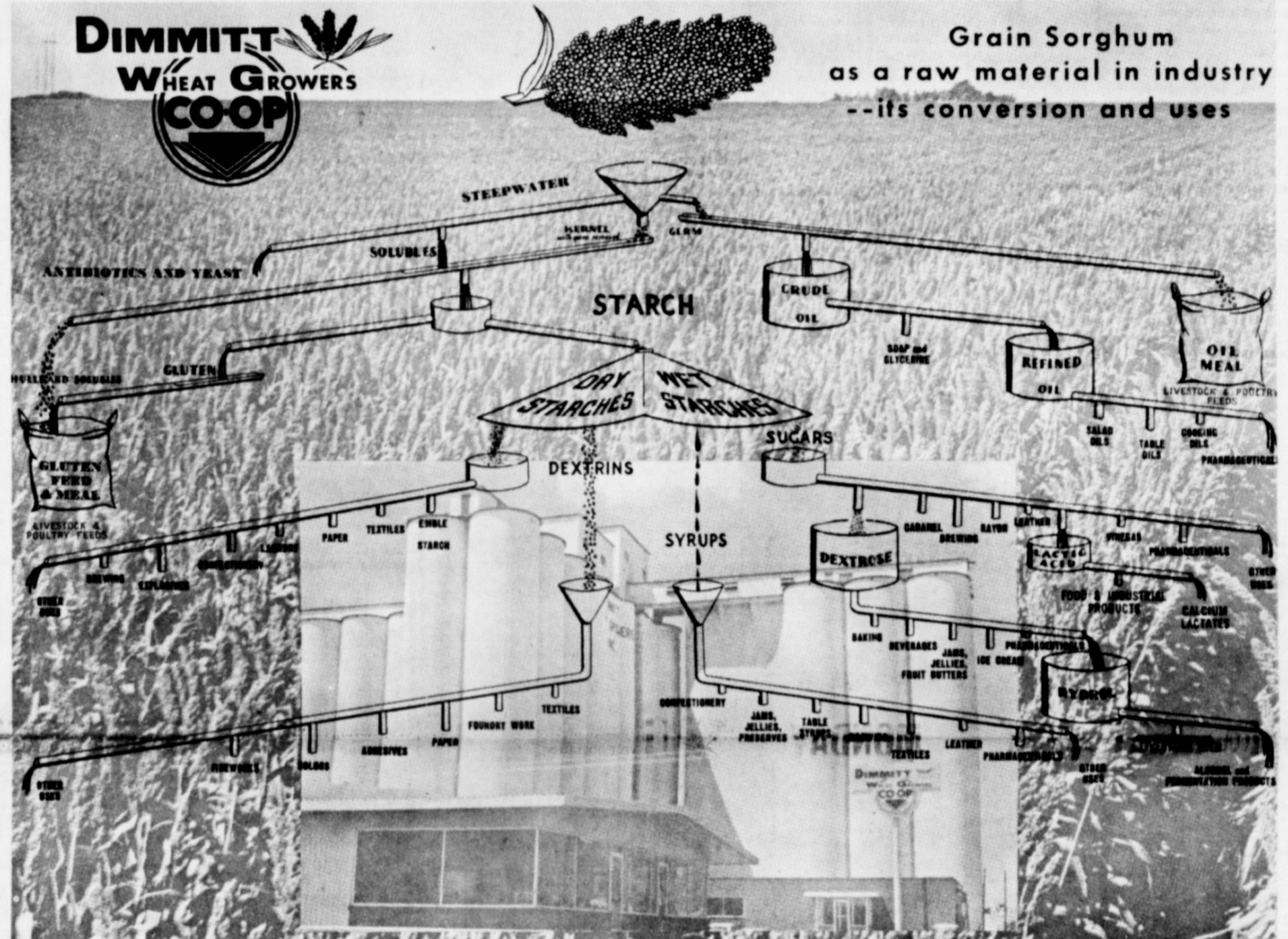

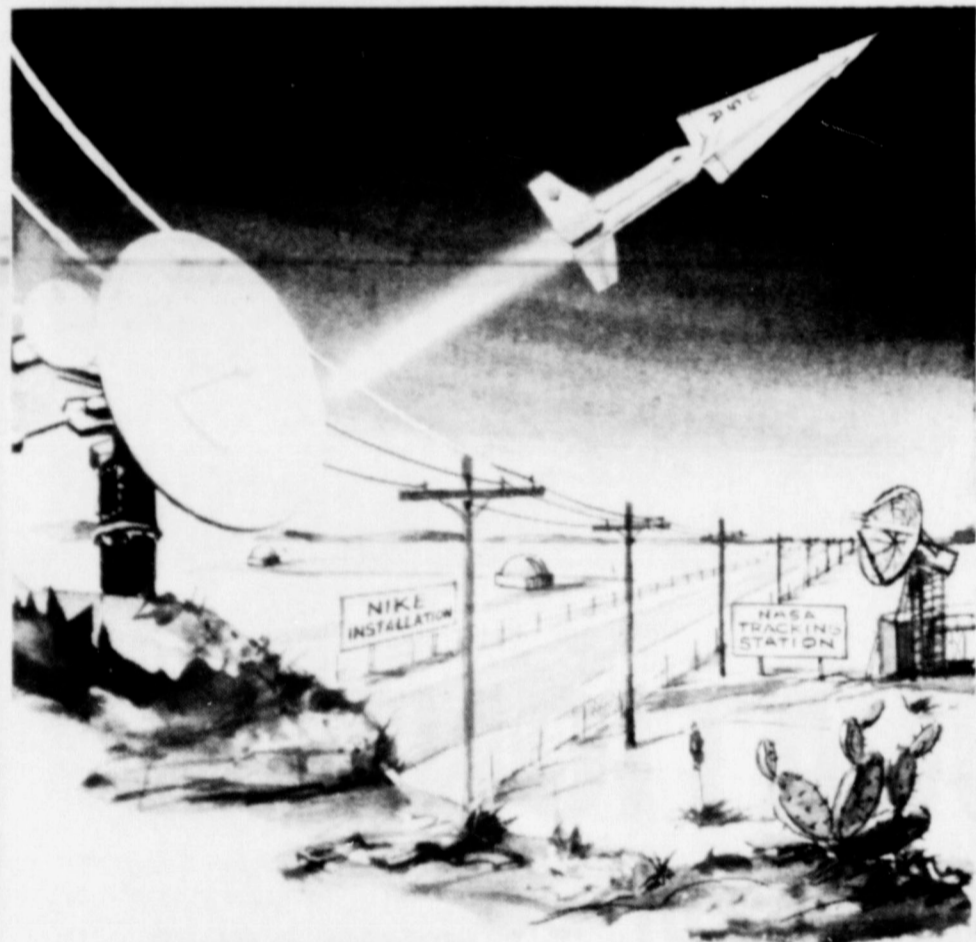

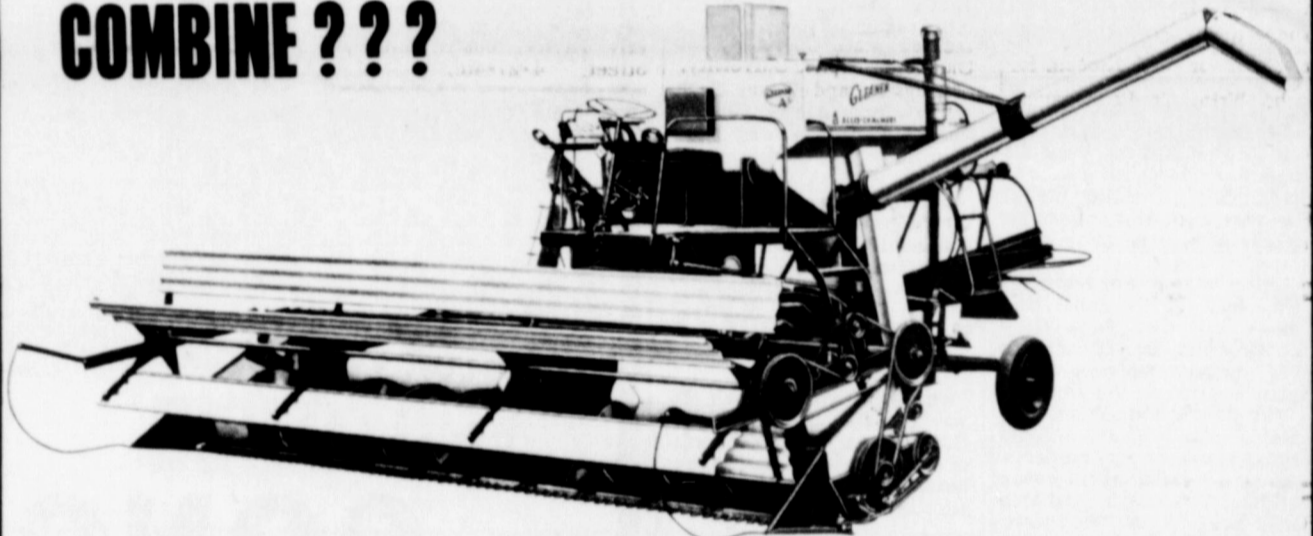
