



the petition to call an election. An estimated number of 712 has been reached for qualified petition signers. Involved in the election would be Precincts 12 and 16, both of which extend beyond the city limits of Littlefield.

The election would pertain only to residents within the city of Littlefield. Absetnee voters must be included and the number of absentee voters on record include \$ all qualified persons who

voted in Lamb County.
Proponents of the election have 30 days after Oct, 20 to secure the required amount of qualified voters signatures and to file the petition. According to the Code, it it the duty of the county clerk to check the names of the signers "to determine whether or not the signers are in fact qualified voters," The petition is then presented to the Commissioner's Court at the next regular meeting, and if the re-quired 25 percent is obtained and in order, the Code states it is then required that at that session the Commissioner's Court order a local option election. Regular sessions of the Commissioner's Court are each second Monday of the month,


