## Sailor Glad to be Home After Year in Antarctic

At least one person, seen around Earth and Springlake the past few days, don't mind West Texas dust. In fact, Engineer First Class, Dale Miller, home from 12 months duty in the Antarctic, says West Texas dust is indeed a pleasure after living in the cold darkness of the Antarctic.

Miller, glad to be back home visiting his parents, Mr. and Mrs. George Miller of Springlake, says it's also good to visit with various friends and neighbors in the area after spending a year with the same bored crew, with only rare occasions where new personalities were flown in for a short stay through the summer months.

Miller said the primary purpose of the base there was to support the United States-Antarctic research program. This program was set up in order to study wild life and ice formations. The summer months, which are reverse to our seasons, are from October 1 to February 28, at McMurdo where he was stationed. During that time there were usually from 700 to 1000 men stationed there. Of this number, there were usually 200 scientists. During the winter months, from Feb. 28 to Oct. 1, there were approximately 150 there, of this number 11 were scientists.

The past winter was a little unusual, he said, as there were two planes in during the winter months. Usually there is no one flying in during the winter. These planes brought in College Professors to check growth on the bottom of the ocean. He explained the procedure, saying a hole was cut in the ice and they dived under the ice to check undergrowth. This was normally done during the summer months, but they wanted to see if the growth continued the same in the winter as in the summer.

The arrival of a plane brought great joy to the Navy Personnel stationed there as it brought in fresh fruit and vegetables and mail. He admitted he never knew he missed these items from his 342 until he was forced to be without them.

They were asked when the planes arrived, which they were most anxious to receive, the mail or fresh vegetables. The answer was as always to the kids overseas. Mail is always number one. The crew were fortunate, Miller explained, as they had Ham Radio at the station and could call home quite frequently. Picking up an operator at New Orleans or Corpus Christi.

Miller said the most depressing thing he could remember during his year at McMurdo, was the three long months of total darkness. "This is an event one cannot get ready for," he said, "but it comes just the same, no matter how hard you try not to let it bother you. After awhile the cold darkness just gets to you."

This total darkness is followed by three months of total daylight. After this three months period of daylight the days and nights gradually get shorter until twilight time, and darkness begins again. Daylight, three months is not so bad, but cold darkness becomes depressing. The daily apparel of the Navy Personnel weighed about 15 to 20 pounds and consisted of Thermo lined coversalls, Thermo lined jacket with a hood, even Thermo lined boots. He said temperatures at the base ranged from 40 above to 50 below 0. Speaking of events that happened during his stay there, he told of a member who tried to drive a truck over a crack in the ice. As he made the attempt the ice formation moved slightly and the vehicle was lost through the crack. Another event he clearly remembered was when the showers burned down. The buildings were all located on the ice

at the Air Strip. Miller has had nine years service in the U. S. Navy. He was head-quartered for more than three years at Long Beach, California, one year at Kodiak, Alaska. He also spent one year aboard the U. S. S. Impfist and 15 months aboard the U. S. S. Garnett.

Miller's brother, Noble, is also in the armed forces currently stationed with the Air Force in Okinawa. He entered the service in 1964. Both men are graduates of Springlake-Earth School.

## General Telephone Cuts Rates On Long Distant Calls

General Telephone Company of the Southwest and Southwestern States customers will share in a \$120 million annual savings for telephone users in the nation.

The seventh long distance rate reduction in five and one-half years went into effect November 1.

The new rates will apply to station-to-station interstate long distance calls (between states). Under the new after-midnight economy rate schedule, customers will be able to call the furthest point in the U. S. -- excluding Hawaii and Alaska -- for 75 cents, not including overtime charges and taxes.

Savings also will be realized by customers because the lower priced rate periods have been extended to include more hours. Station-to-station calls will have day rates Monday through Friday from 7:00 a. m. until 5:00 p. m. (Present rates cover a period from 4:30 a. m. until 6:00 p. m. daily.) However, calling periods will not be changed for intrastate messages (within the state).

New evening rates will be in effect from 5:00 to 7:00 p. m. Monday through Friday, and the night rate is scheduled to be Monday through Friday from 7:00 p. m. to 7:00 a. m., plus all day and night on Saturdays, Sundays, New Year's Day, July

this information because it tells the age of certain young ladies who at this time probably have children in a somewhat higher grade.

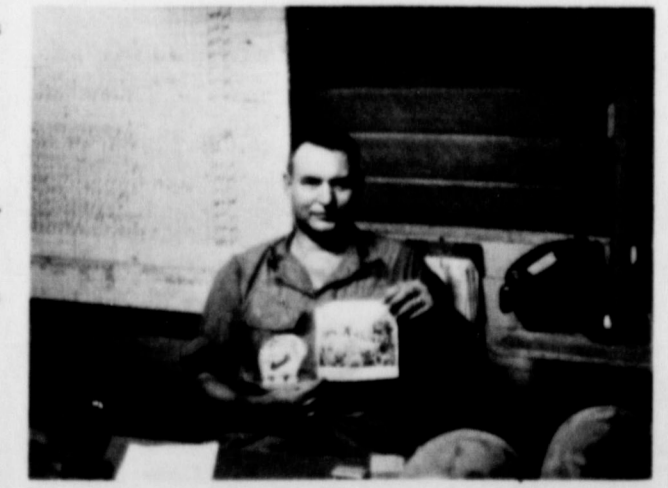

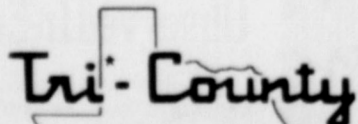

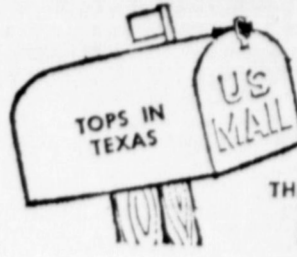

the petition to call an election. An estimated number of 712 has been reached for qualified petition signers. Involved in the election would be Precincts 12 and 16, both of which extend beyond the city limits of Littlefield.

The election would pertain only to residents within the city of Littlefield. Absentee voters must be included and the number of absentee voters on record include all qualified persons who voted in Lamb County.

Proponents of the election have 30 days after Oct. 20 to secure the required amount of qualified voters signatures and to file the petition. According to the Code, it is the duty of the county clerk to check the names of the signers "to determine whether or not the signers are in fact qualified voters." The petition is then presented to the Commissioner's Court at the next regular meeting, and if the required 25 percent is obtained and in order, the Code states it is then required that at that session the Commissioner's Court order a local option election. Regular sessions of the Commissioner's Court are each second Monday of the month.
