Everyone in the community is urged to take the X-ray tests. Adults will be charged a fee of \$2, for an X-ray test, and a \$1 fee will be the cost of each student's X-ray test, Money made from the fees goes to help pay for bringing the mobile chest X-ray unit here, and for rendering this service to the community.


