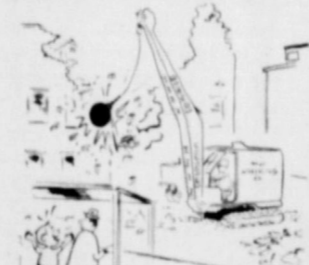
The Farmers Co-op Assoc. in Springlake report that they have ginned about 14 bales.

The band received a beautiful trophy for excellence. There were only 6 bands out of 18 that participated in Class A receiving a 1 rating. These included Segreaves, Kress, Shallowater, Petersburg, Hale Center, and Springlake-Earth.

The judges for the contest were Warren Thaxton from Abilene, Wayne McDonald of Eldorado, and Tom C. Rhodes of Fredericksburg. Each gave the Wolverine Band a 1; the comments and criticisms they made were superb.

Thaxton commented, "A very colorful group--pretty uniforms--good drum balance--good execution on step two drill--spacing problems and alignment problems between yard lines. A very well trained band--marches very well, students know the show--good changes of pace and tempo. I would like to have heard a little more sound, but better to play it safe--good balance--I enjoyed your performance."

"This is a beautiful band. Good marching style and you play very well. Good sound and well balanced most of the time. Listen to some players on turns and when facing Press Box. Nice change of pace--well done. This is a very fine performance. Good teaching and shows PRIDE and SPIRIT. Congratulations!" wrote McDonald.

Rhodes had this to say about the Wolverine Band. "Some nice spirit evident by entrance. Band has nice ensemble sound. Careful of pitches 6/8 march (Salutation). Would like to see you work for a little style--knee lift on 8 to 5. Good on tempo changes. A well planned routine with some very nice work evident. Keep it up students and director. Good luck."

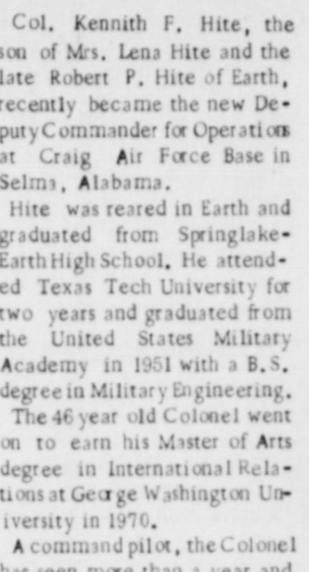

**Trustees Discuss Full Agenda, Plus Teacher Evaluation**

The seven Springlake-Earth School Trustees and Superintendent Bill Mann discussed various phases of school business at a regular meeting of the board Monday night prior to dismissing the news reporters and five guests present, in order to go into an executive meeting for a teacher evaluation session.

During the open business meeting, the group discussed the number of days salary and return of retirement pay to the two custodians, Mr. and Mrs. Reeves, who resigned and left shortly after they had moved here and assumed the position.

They also discussed work on the tennis courts, the purchase of a car for the school and the disposal of the old car, payment of current bills, and the latest enrollment figures as well as looking over the list named to the local textbook committee.

The group each received their folder with minutes of the last meeting. After glancing over the minutes, the meeting opened with the discussion of settling up with Mr. and Mrs. Reeves.

The question seemed to be (I was not present for the first few opening minutes) as to whether Mr. and Mrs. Reeves received all the salary and a refund on all teacher retirement dues deducted, that they had paid in.

Ardis Barton asked Mr. Mann if he would like to venture a guess that Mrs. Reeves received all retirement pay deducted from her salary.

Supt. Mann said he felt sure she did. He said that Jerry Hinchliffe had the figures, and would be glad to explain it to him.

Barton replied, "The agreement and settlement was acceptable to Mrs. Reeves?"

Mr. Mann replied, "I didn't talk to her, I couldn't say."

Edd Dawson explained that she was paid two extra days. She worked Monday and was paid through Wednesday according to the check he signed. (Dawson came in later to say they had worked Monday and Tuesday and were paid through Wednesday, correcting his mistake of thinking they were paid two extra days, instead of one.)

Barton asked, "How did we come out on the \$50.00 she said was owed her?"

Mann replied, "I assume less, but this would only be a guess."

The interest was moved on to the next issue as to whether work had begun on the tennis courts. Dewayne Jones explained that arrangements had been made but no work had begun as yet, as it had rained ever since and they do not want to have the big trucks drive across the school yard.

Dewayne explained that one court was to be removed and repairs and patch work on the other half. Both Jerry Kelley and Jones indicated they felt the men hired to accomplish the task would do a good job.

Jimmy Craft reported that both he and Jones had looked at cars at various places and both agreed that the one selected was a good buy. Other 1970 cars of comparable model and mileage were priced \$500 to \$700 more. The Board decided to dispose of the present car by taking sealed bids which should be in by December 10th in order for the Board to open them

at the next regular meeting. They, however, retained the right to refuse any and all bids if they so desired. They voted to run two ads in the paper for "Notice of Bids" on the car prior to December 10. They also discussed running the car through an auction, but decided on the sealed bids.

The group took a breather to read over the previous regular board meeting minutes. Jones and Washington made and seconded to approve the minutes, which were approved by the board. The group then spent several minutes reading over minutes of the called meeting last week.

Dawson spoke up to say, Jerry, it might be said we met in the office before meeting officially in the library.

Jerry asked if there were any additions to the minutes or any to be taken from.

the group to approve and Jones seconded the motion and the minutes of the called meeting were approved.

Dawson asked that Mr. and Mrs. Cleavinger be sent a letter from the board as to the way the decision was made since they were not present at the time the board handed down their decision.

The group turned to the current bills and began their study. Barton, looking over one bill, asked if they were still having alternator trouble. "They were," Supt. Mann said, "alternator and regulator trouble on the International. The bill was (I imagine) \$145.00 on a new one and \$85.00 on a rebuilt one as this was the figure implied. Mann went on further to explain the mechanic has been trying to get more testing material together to see what really is wrong with the alternators.

Barton asked about a bill, listed on his sheet of bills, this one was from the Clovis Sign Company.

Mann stated, "It is for painting numbers on the buses, some changes in the numbers had to be made."

Washington asked about a bill to someplace or other. Mann indicated it was for stereo equipment and other items for the band.

Jerry Kelley asked about a cosmetic bill.

Supt. Mann indicated it was make-up used by the speech

class for plays. Washington asked what the school was doing buying sheep shears?

The answer was the FFA bought those getting ready for the shows.

Someone asked about a bill from Furrs. Supt. Mann said that the teachers went down and bought record players, etc. to be used in the Migrant Program. He said they could get them cheaper there than any place else.

A used sewing machine was explained to have been purchased, as Mrs. Slover had thought it a good buy and they got it for the FFA.

Washington made a motion with Jimmy Craft voting a second that the bills be paid.

The group looked over the enrollment figures to find they were up four over the previous month. Enrollment currently totals 784. The group looked over the 14 names on the local text book committee.

Dawson asked if these names were rotated or did they remain approximately the same each year?

Mann indicated he thought they were changed some.

Supt. Mann named over the books that were to be selected.

Ray Joe Riley made a motion that Mrs. Gladys McGord be added to the list to make two teachers from the elementary grades, since the local school could have 15 on the committee and there were only 14 on the list shown. Washington seconded the motion and it carried.

Kelley went on to the next item on the agenda which was the teacher evaluation.

Riley asked if they might delay that part of the meeting if there was anything else to discuss before the visitors were excused.

Barton indicated he had asked before for some information on substitute teachers and wondered if everything was being done to get the best qualified substitutes available.

Mann replied, "I suppose they do the best they can."

Riley asked if the teachers had on file all information about the substitute or a list of names to select from.

Barton indicated the substitutes without degrees had substituted more than those with degrees, and he wondered why.

There was a discussion about what the state required to be a substitute teacher.

Supt. Mann stated, "The principals have a list but I don't know how many names are on it."

Dawson asked if the board could receive a copy of the list of substitute teachers to date, and if this list could be included in with the minutes when they were mailed out to them.

Mann stated that he could go look for them now.

Dawson said, "If you have enough copies for each member, if not, it will be fine just to mail them out with the minutes."

Someone asked if there were any names to add to the list. Mann explained it was hard sometimes to get substitutes when everyone is busy.

The group moved on to another subject with Dawson asking about the morale of teachers since Monday night. Mann replied, "Concern, don't know if I could say exactly, haven't discussed it much."

Dawson said, "I was wondering if they were feeling a little insecure and maybe a bit hesitant to discipline students since last week?"

Supt. Mann said, "I couldn't say, I have asked my principals to go along with past methods of discipline and not allow these outside problems to interfere with discipline."

Washington said, "I got many calls from teachers and they appreciated the board's decision. It boosted their morale to know the board backed the teachers. Only one called to disagree with the board's decision and she did."

Dawson said he had in mind when he asked the question if teachers wondered if that could happen to them, that they might have trouble if they tried to discipline.

Mann said he asked them not to fall apart when a storm came up but to go ahead as usual.

Dawson asked if he should like to begin to formulate new plans so the discipline would be certain to all to omit this reoccurring.

Mann said, "There was no way to put down all misbehavior like spitting in the hall."

Dawson replied, "Are there other handbooks that principals have for guide lines to administer discipline?"

Mann, "I think through the years that practice and experience are used mostly."

Dawson said, "Are there any standard guidelines for principals to go by other than the school handbook, like the State handbook."

Mann replied, "By in large how detailed the faculty wants to be. I don't think the first offense would have as much punishment or as severe as a second offense."

Dawson asked, "Is there more detailed policy needed, maybe, for better relations between teachers and the school board? We could all get together and informally talk it over and all have a better understanding."

Mann replied, "There is no reason for that, for they have always done this sort of thing. The principals could take another look at discipline problems."

Barton asked, "Couldn't teachers get together and form a classroom teachers association where they could deal with these problems?"

Supt. Mann replied, "I don't know if they want one or not."

Barton asked, "Haven't they in the past?"

Supt. Mann replied, "Not as much now as they used to in the past."

Barton said, "Is there a local unit of teachers association they could form?"

Mann replied, "We have a Lamb County Teachers Association and TSTA, largest Texas Classroom Teachers Association--where there are too many associations there is not much done."

Dawson said, "All all local teachers members of the Texas County TSTA?"

Mann replied, "100% of the teachers here belong."

Riley asked if they could have a local TSTA.

Mann replied, "Not that I know of."

Dawson asked what percentage of teachers or what procedure would be necessary to do that. Mann replied, "No percentage I don't imagine, just if they wanted to they could."

The subject was dropped there

and the board moved along to the subject of drugs with Dawson asking, "What drug policy do we have here?"

Mann replied, "None, and I think we should, we keep thinking it couldn't happen here and I don't know that it has, but we need one."

Dawson said, "I don't think we need to rely on verbal policy to deal with drugs."

Riley and Jimmy Craft made the motion and seconded it, that a drug policy be for study.

Dawson asked if it were permissible with the board if any of the visitors present had anything to say if they might do

The board agreed with the request, but none of the visitors spoke.

The Board moved on with Barton asking, "If a student is failing, isn't there a time limit to let parents know, and in what manner are they notified, called, failing slips, etc.?"

Mann replied, "Yes, I believe there has been a time limit in the past."

Dawson said, "I think it is supposed to be in the 4th or 5th week, before the 9 weeks period, because, at the end of the nine weeks period, the parent hardly has time to help the student then."

Someone on the board asked if this could be done by letter.

Barton said, "There is some indication this had not been done in the past."

The visitors were excused and the board was to go into executive session to discuss teacher evaluation when P. A. Washington spoke up to retain the Press as he made a motion that if legal action is taken against the board on the decision that was made last week on the hearing at this time, we grant the president of the board, and the superintendent of the school the authority to secure a lawyer to defend the board's action if need arises. Jimmy Craft seconded the motion.

Riley said he didn't think that the president and the superintendent should have all that on the two of them.

Mann suggested a committee be appointed to select a lawyer.

Riley stated he thought it should be a board action.

Mann asked if it would be all right for Kelley to appoint a committee.

Riley amended the motion to read that all board members to be on the board to select a lawyer, and the motion by Washington with the amendment by Riley was both passed.

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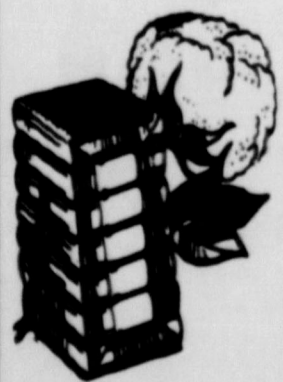
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## Bovina Rambles By Wolves 35-7

The only scoring done by the Wolverines was made by Larry Thomas who ran an early 75 yard touchdown.

Bovina got two of its touchdowns after recovering fumbles deep in Springlake territory. With five minutes left in the first quarter, Bovina forced a fumble on the Springlake 15 and Rundell promptly hit Shelby on

The High Plains Bookmobile will not run in our area Thursday, November 23, because of Thanksgiving. A schedule will again appear at a later date giving the schedule for December.



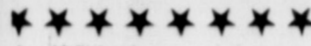

## Wilson Tours With Band

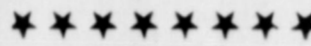

### Local School Personnel Attend Meeting

Wednesday, November 8, William L. Mann, Mrs. Norman Hinchliffe, and Mrs. Marvin Sanders attended a special meeting for superintendents and bookkeepers sponsored by the District XVII Education Service Center in the Citizens National Bank building in Lubbock.

The 59th Legislature authorized the State Board of Education to establish regional media centers in all sections of the state to provide education services to all school districts and to coordinate the educational planning in these regions.

In March, 1967, the State Board of Education in Austin approved a plan for the establishment of 20 educational centers in Texas.

District XVII (of which Springlake-Earth is a part) Education Service Center provides services to 67 school districts in 20 counties with a total of 86,000 students.

The services of the center is

- broadly classified as:
1. Direct Planning
  2. Pilot Planning
  3. Man Power Development
  4. Dissemination
- These services are available on an optional basis.
- The joint committees, board of directors, advisory committee, and the education service center staff a program of service that is offered to our schools.
- The meeting Wednesday was a school of instruction on Bulletin 679 Accounting System. This system will be used by all schools in Texas beginning with the 1972-73 school year.

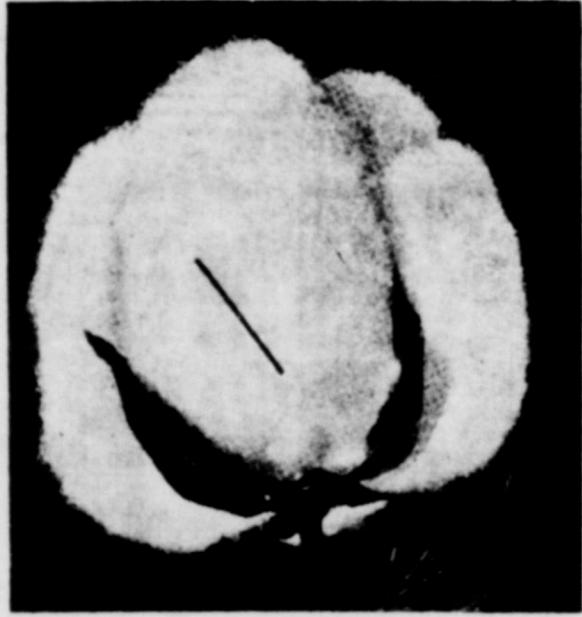

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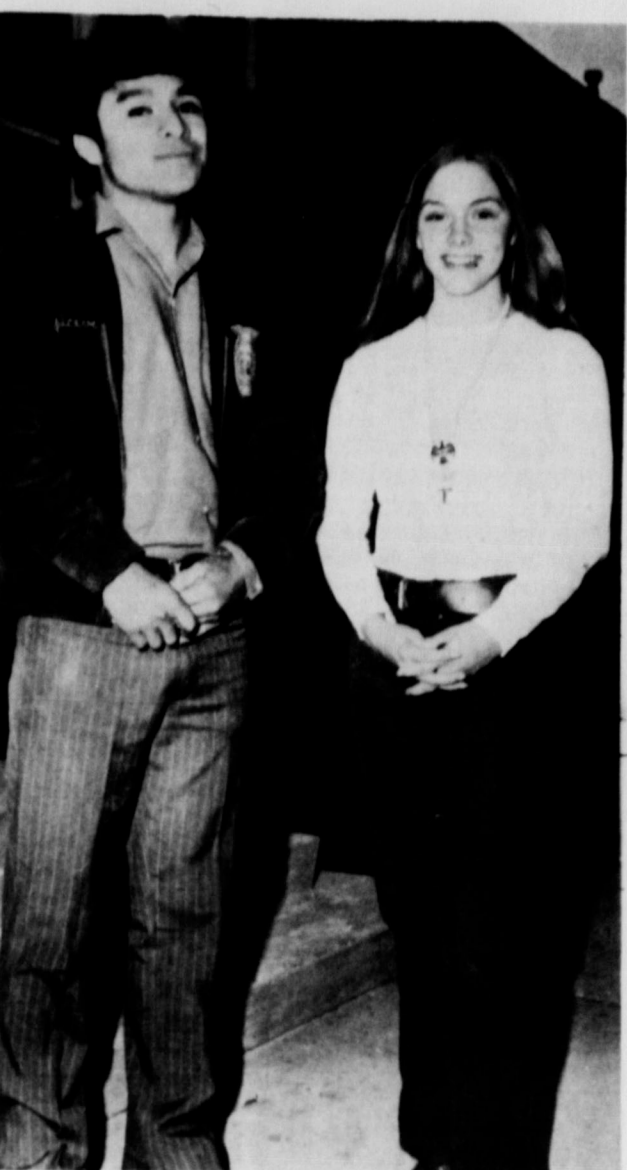

## Texas Legislature to Have New Faces

The State Legislature which convenes January 9 will be vastly different from the present one which has served through the 1971 regular and four special sessions.

There will be 77 new faces in the 150-member and 15 new members of the 31-member Senate. (Five of the House newcomers have served before the 1971 session, and six percent House members will be serving in the Senate.)

Dolph Briscoe, of course, will succeed Preston Smith as governor, and Bill Hobby will preside over the Senate, succeeding Lt. Gov. Ben Barnes. Rep. Price Daniel of Liberty will become speaker of the House, replacing Rep. Rayford Price of Palestine.

Basically, the House is expected to be a more liberal body than the present one, and the new Senate considerably more conservative.

Republicans, women and blacks increased their strength in the House; and the GOP added one more senator, for a total of three. There will be 17 Republican state representatives—seven from Dallas, seven from Houston, two from San Antonio and one from Midland. GOP senators were elected in Dallas, Houston and Fort Worth.

The House, which now has a single woman member, will have five (including two blacks) in January. Mrs. Betty Andujar of Fort Worth, wife of a physician, is the new woman senator. She is a Republican.

The Senate's only woman member at present is Miss Barbara Jordan of Houston, a black, liberal Democrat who was elected to Congress November 7.

Black membership of the House will increase from two to eight.

## Law Concerning Open Meetings

### Art. 6252-17. Prohibition on governmental bodies from holding meetings which are closed to the public

Meetings and sessions open to public; governmental body defined  
 Section 1. (a) Except as otherwise provided in this Act, every regular, special, or called meeting or session of every governmental body shall be open to the public.

(b) A "governmental body," within the meaning of this Act, is any board, commission, department, or agency within the executive department of the state, which is under the direction of three or more elected or appointed members; and every Commissioners Court and city council in the state, and every deliberative body having rule-making or quasi-judicial power and classified as a department, agency, or political subdivision of a county or city; and the board of trustees of every school district, and every county board of school trustees and county board of education; and the governing board of every special district heretofore or hereafter created by law.

### Art. 6252-17 PUBLIC OFFICES Title 110A

#### Violations and penalties

Sec. 1. Any member of a governing body who wilfully calls or aids in calling or organizing a special or called meeting or session which is closed to the public, or who wilfully closes or aids in closing a regular meeting or session to the public, or who participates in a regular, special, or called meeting or session which is closed to the public without causing or attempting to cause his dissent to be entered in the record or minutes of the governing body, shall be guilty of a misdemeanor and shall be fined not less than \$25 nor more than \$200 on the first offense, and shall be fined not less than \$100 nor more than \$500 on each subsequent offense.

#### Application of act

Sec. 2. (a) The provisions of this Act do not apply to that portion of a meeting or session of a governmental body while the governmental body is actually engaged in:

(1) deliberations to consider the appointment, employment, or dismissal of a public officer or employee or to hear complaints or charges brought against such officer or employee, unless such officer or employee requests a public hearing;

(2) deliberations pertaining to the acquisition of additional real property; or

(3) deliberations on matters affecting security.

(b) A governmental body may exclude any witness or witnesses from a hearing during examination of another witness in the matter being investigated.

(c) Nothing in this Act shall be construed to affect the deliberations of grand juries.

(d) The provisions of this Act shall not apply to periodic conferences held among staff members of the governmental body. Such staff meetings will be only for the purpose of internal administration and no matters of public business or agency policies that affect public business will be acted upon.

(e) Nothing in this Act shall be construed to require school boards to hold meetings open to the public in cases involving discipline of public school children unless an open hearing is requested in writing by a parent or guardian of the child.

Sec. 2 amended by Acts 1971, 62nd Leg., p. 1401, ch. 381, - eff. Aug. 30, 1971.

#### Notice of meetings: exception

Sec. 3A. (a) Written notice of the date, place, and subject of each meeting held by a governmental body shall be given before the meeting as prescribed by this section.

(b) A State governmental body shall furnish notice to the Secretary of State, who shall then post the notice on a bulletin board to be located at a place convenient to the public in the State Capitol.

(c) A city governmental body shall have a notice posted on a bulletin board to be located at a place convenient to the public in the city hall.

(d) A county governmental body shall have a notice posted on a bulletin board located at a place convenient to the public in the county courthouse.

(e) A governmental body of a water district or other district, except

a school district, or other political subdivision covering all or part of four or more counties shall have a notice posted at a place convenient to the public in its administrative office, and shall also furnish the notice to the Secretary of State, who shall then post the notice on a bulletin board located at a place convenient to the public in the State Capitol; and it shall also furnish the notice to the county clerk of the county in which the administrative office of the district or political subdivision is located, who shall then post the notice on a bulletin board located at a place convenient to the public in the county courthouse.

(f) The governing body of a school district, water district, other district, or other political subdivision, except a district or political subdivision described in Subsection (e) of this section, shall have a notice posted at a place convenient to the public in its administrative office, and shall also furnish the notice to the county clerk or clerks of the county or counties in which the district or political subdivision is located. The county clerk shall then post the notice on a bulletin board located at a place convenient to the public in the county courthouse.

(g) Notice of a meeting must be posted for at least the three days preceding the day of the meeting. However, in case of emergency or urgent public necessity, which shall be expressed in the notice, it is sufficient that the notice is posted before the meeting is convened or called to order.

(h) The provisions of this section shall not apply to an agency wholly financed by federal funds.

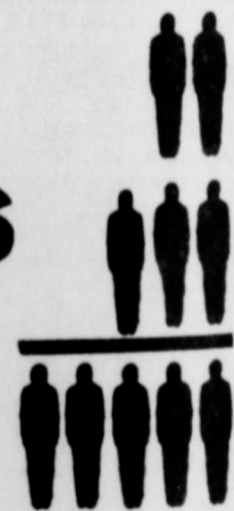
