## Firemen Honored at Banquet

Harold Britton was named "Fireman of the Year" at the Firemen and Firemen's Wives Annual Banquet held at 7 p. m. Monday at the Earth Community Building. Britton was praised for his civic work and the work he had devoted to the Volunteer Fire Department in the past nineteen years. It was said that since he came to Earth in 1952, he had done an outstanding job with the fire department.

Don Layman was named "Outstanding Fireman". Layman was praised for the work he had done all through the years as an expert mechanic in keeping the VFD fire engines in fine shape.

Clarence Kelley and Don Layman were each presented plaques for twenty years of continuous service with the fire department. They will also receive lifetime firemen benefits such as lowered water rates.

Bud Matlock praised the two men for the work they had done with the VFD and how they responded to calls and worked without conflicts to put out fires and save lives.

Troy Layman, secretary of the fire department, introduced the officers and complimented them for their work.

Bill Scott, fire chief and emcee of the banquet explained that behind every fireman stands a good wife. He pointed out in a comical manner that the wives get out the boots, wake the fireman up, and push him out the door. He stated that the wives could consider themselves paid back for their work during the year as they had been fed.

Harold Britton was called forward to read a letter that the fire department had recently received from Mrs. Ray Kelley. While Britton was coming forward it was explained that the only means of buying fire fighting equipment for the department was through donations.

Mrs. Kelley's letter complimented the men and she explained that she had no idea what the fire department was like until she recently had reason to see for herself that the men were eager, willing, hard workers who contribute a great deal to the community.

Mrs. Kelley thanked the department for recently saving the Kelley home and a check for \$125, signed by Mr. and Mrs. Kelley, was enclosed in the letter.

Bill Scott pointed out that on the night of the fire at the

Kelley home 97% of the local firemen turned out to work, which is typical of response to all calls.

He said that Ray Kelley stated that he was glad to know that the firemen knew what to do and that he was pleased that the fire was put out with no more damage than was received.

Guest speaker was John Belew of Plainview, who has been a paid fireman at Plainview for 19 years. Starting as a regular fireman, Belew has advanced through the ranks to the position of fire chief. He is also a director of Public Safety at Plainview and is serving as president of the Panhandle Firemen's Association of which he has been an officer for six years.

Belew began his talk with a patriotic joke before reading a story entitled "As You Pass By". Written about one of the earliest volunteer fire departments, nearly 100 years ago, the story pertained to the New York City volunteer fire department that worked hard in the unpaved alleys of New York City and had to roll the fire wagons by hand. He stated that there was

no difference in VFP's now because they all loved the towns and put shoulders to the wheels working side by side.

The Plainview fireman praised the local fire department for the work they do without pay, sometimes with very little praise and sometimes with criticism.

He went on to say that he thought he was a fireman until he met volunteer firemen who did work for nothing and placed their lives on the line each time they responded to an emergency call.

Very often volunteer fire departments have difficulty in obtaining equipment because they have no means of raising funds. Belew was amazed because sometimes small towns do not have a lot of equipment, but the men are willing to give their time and effort, therefore the speaker feels that towns should be willing to see that fire departments have the equipment needed to do the job.

He stressed the fact that anytime or anywhere firemen have the opportunity to receive any

## Area City Elections Scheduled for Saturday

A mayor, two aldermen for regular terms, and one alderman for a one year term, to fill the unexpired term of Larry Tunnell who resigned to run for mayor, will be elected.

Candidates for mayor are E. C. Kelley, for re-election and Larry Tunnell.

Vying for the regular terms of aldermen are H. S. Hickman for re-election, Homer Starkey, Glenn Bullis, and Donald Runyon.

Calvin Wood has filed as a candidate for the one year term of alderman.

In city elections Perry Martin will serve as election judge and Jay Winders will act as alternate judge.

Qualifications for voting in

city elections are: one must be an American citizen, must be 18 years of age and a registered voter, living in Texas one year and in the city 6 months preceding the election.

City Elections will also be held at Springlake Saturday.

Residents there will elect a mayor, five aldermen and a city marshal.

Candidates for that election are Wayne Davis for re-election as mayor; W. B. Hucks, Phil Neimast, N. O. Drake, David McCallif, and G. H. Miller for election as aldermen; and Earl Watson for election as city marshal.

Earth's city secretary, Mrs. Betty McAlpine reported Tuesday morning that twenty-five absentee ballots had been cast in the city election.

Ralph Rudd, Springlake's city secretary, was unavailable to give a report on the number of absentee ballots cast in that city's election.

type of training that they should do so as training enables one to save their own life and the lives of others.

Belew explained that everyday new chemicals are being developed and no one knows about all the chemicals so everyone should keep abreast of the discoveries.

He advised the local firemen to send a different group of men to the conference each night. The speaker noted that it would be well worth the time and effort to attend the conference where training will be taught with actual equipment.

will be elected at the meeting and other items will be attended to.

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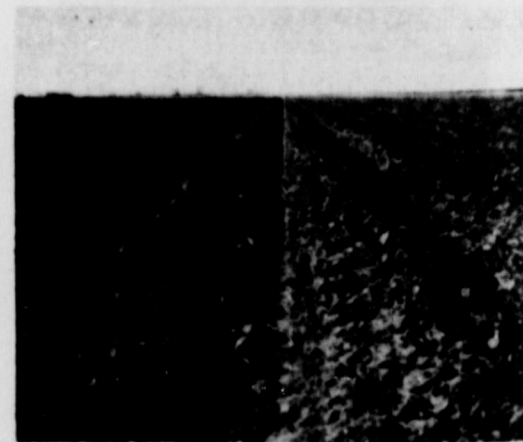
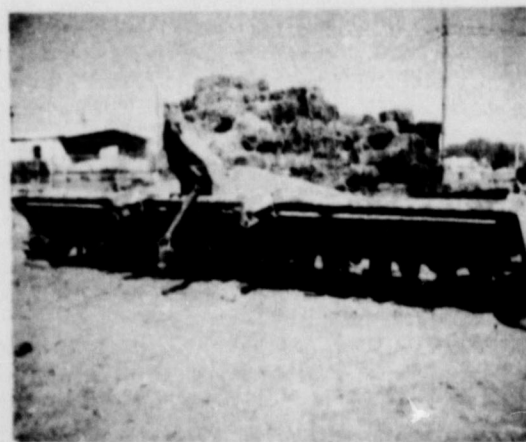


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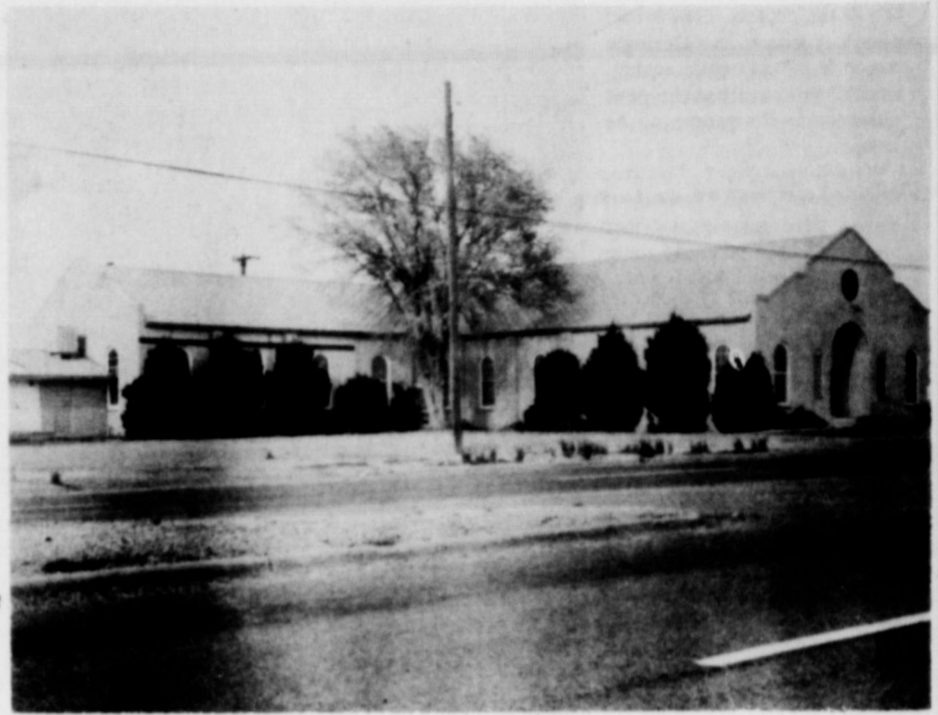

## Muscle Development Lacking in Children

Recently there has been an outcry against children watching too much television.

One reason for the protest is that children sit quietly by the TV hour after hour and don't run, jump, climb or throw enough.

"In a sense, these children suffering from TV addiction simply don't get the proper exercise that helps large muscles develop," said Texas Agricultural Extension Service family life specialist Dorothy Taylor.

Miss Taylor said that muscle-developing activities are essential to a child's development.

"Parents can do much to provide children with a variety of activities that will help a child grow and develop," she said.

"It's been said that a child will naturally develop his muscles. This is true -- up to a point.

"It's still true that every parent who cares for his child wants the youngster to develop in the best way possible. A parent can stimulate and encourage the child to try new and different activities to aid muscle development."

The specialist told the story of a mother who visited a kindergarten and became very upset because four-year-old children were using real saws to saw soft wood.

"After the mother's initial flurry of words," Miss Taylor said, "the teacher explained why the children's use of the saw just might be a worthwhile activity. Children learn many things from using wood. They like to cut wood and are capable of learning how to use a saw carefully."

The specialist said that real tools are far better than some plastic tools that don't do anything except look like the real tool.

"But possibly the most important reason for the child's using the saw is that it helps him develop his large muscles and his large-muscle skills. He also learns how to control his muscles and use them in activities."

As a child develops his large muscles, he also gains confidence in his ability to deal with his environment. He gains confidence in himself as well.

Some activities that help a child develop his large muscles include: throwing balls through a hoop, throwing bean bags at a target, pounding nails, swinging in a swing, balancing by walking on low boards, climbing a tree or jungle gym and running -- sometimes barefoot -- on sand or grass.

"Each parent can praise his child as he acquires new skills and new coordination," Miss Taylor pointed out.

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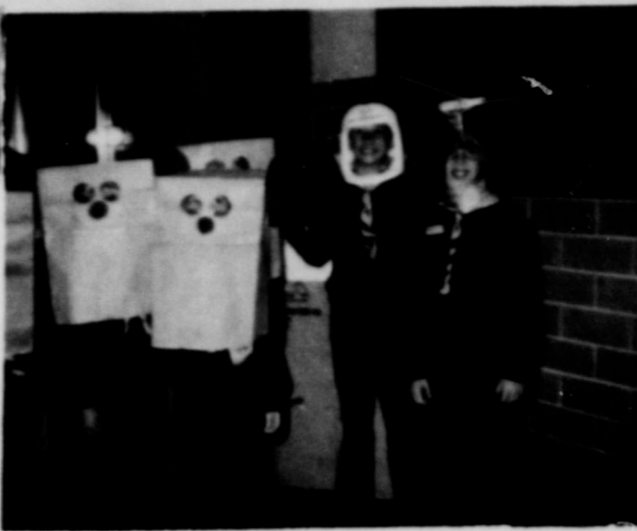

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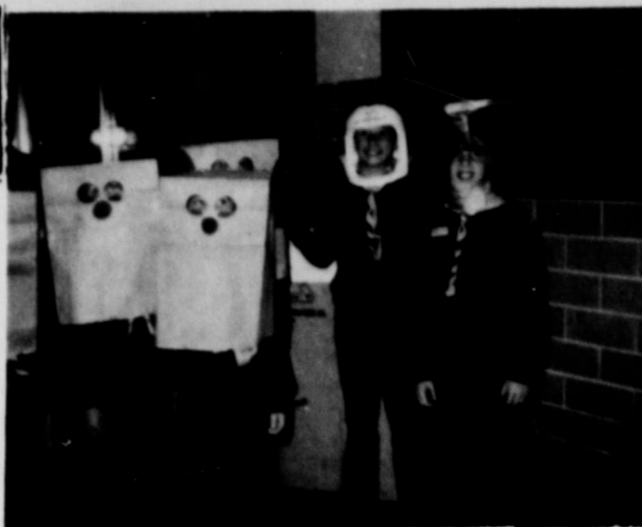
