COTTON FIRM LOCATES HERE

THE NEW HOTEL PRIDE OF CITY OF MEMPHIS

PUBLIC RECEPTION WILL BE HELD DURING THE AFTER-NOON FOR VISITORS

Memphis' largest and latest hotel, and one of the most modern in the Panhandle, formally throws its doors open to the public Tuesday. October 15, in a reception which is to be from four to five o'clock in the afternoon, and wind up with a banquet at eight o'clock. The New Memphis Hotel, the

last word in modern hotel building, a structure of imposing beauty and grandeur, its stately walls rising gray against the sky, is completed. It is ready from the bottom to the top to serve as the meeting place of this section of country. The building is complete in every detail. Nothing has been overlooked that might add to the comfort and convenience of the guests. It was built for that purpose by the owners, with the advice of the owner of the hotel, Col. Ernest Thompson, the famous hotel man of Amarillo and other Panhandle towns. During the past few days the finishing touches have been added, such as carpets, varnishing and painting.

While the hotel has been open to the public for some weeks, in order to take care of the people who demanded that class of hotel, the work of completion and finishing is just now coming to an end, and the formal opening Tuesday is the climax of many months' anticipation on the part of the citizenship. The business men of Memphis had planned to engage all rooms opening night as courtesy to the management, but the rooms have practically all been occupied for some two or three weeks.



Value of Organic Matter or Humus

Decayed vegetable matter of humus is very necessary and should be considered the life of the soil itself. Without humus ter how much plant food it may contain. It takes more than just plant food to produce crops. Some of the important benefits derived from humus are as follows:

(1) It improves the physical condition of the soil.

(2) It increases the waterholding capacity of the soil. (3) It makes a home for bene-

(4) It helps to dissolve plant

(5) It helps to prevent wash-

(6) It prevents leaching. (7) It gives largest returns

from the use of fertilizer. The humus content of the soil should be increased by plowing under stalks, weeds and trash. Cover crops and legumes in rotation should also be turned under or grazed off for the sake of the humus as well as the actual plant

food which they contain.

Legumes Legumes, such as cowpeas, velvet beans, Mung Beans, alfalfa and sweet clover, are particularly valuable as soil builders because they have the power to utilize nitrogen from the air. Legumes contain 40 to 50 pounds of nitrogen per ton of hay, and most of this comes from the air. That is as much as is contained in 600 to 700 pounds of cotton seed meal.

Manure No manure should be allowed to go to waste, as it is one of the most varuable soil builders we have. It is worth several dollars a ton, and the effects of it last for a number of years. The only trouble is that there is not enough of it, and even most of the availble supply is not being utilized. Manure supplies plant food, and in addition has a wonderful phy-
