Rollover on U.S. 84 sends four to hospital

A one-car rollover on U.S. Highway 84 Tuesday sent three Sudan men and a teenager to the hospital, two in critical condition.

Brandon Galvan and Joe Gonzales, both 21, were transported by helicopter from Muleshoe to University Medical Center in Lubbock in critical but stable condition with head injuries.

The two men were released from

UMC Wednesday, according to a hospital spokeswoman.

George Mota, 21, was admitted to Muleshoe Area Medical Center and was listed in good condition Thursday. Steven Gonzales, 15, was treated and released Tuesday at MAMC.

The four were travelling west on U.S. 84 shortly before 6 p.m. in a 1995 Monte Carlo being driven by

Galvan.

The driver lost control of the car, which crossed into the median and flipped onto its roof in the eastbound lane about six miles east of Muleshoe, according to police reports.

Galvan, Mota and Joe Gonzales were ejected through the back window of the vehicle and landed on the road, according to Department

of Public Safety trooper L.G. Kirk.

A tractor-trailer travelling eastbound narrowly avoided hitting the three men laying on the pavement, skidding off the highway and onto the shoulder. Kirk said that skid marks from the truck indicated it missed the head of one of the men by just two feet.

MHS clips 'Cats in nailbiter

Carlton Lewis knows how to end a half — and a game.

Lewis hit a 12-foot jump shot as time expired Tuesday, lifting Muleshoe to a hard-fought 54-52 win against Littlefield in the District 2-3A opener for both teams.

The buzzer-beater helped Muleshoe (13-7) overcome an inspired effort by the Wildcats, who used a rugged man-to-man defense and 10 3-pointers to control the momentum most of the game in front of a packed house at WJHS gym.

Lewis, a 5-8 senior point guard, also beat the halftime buzzer with a shot from near halfcourt.

"We were under fire the whole time just because of the intensity of the game," Muleshoe coach Ralph

Mason said. "We knew they were going to come in here pumped up because whoever won the game would gain the inside track to the district title."

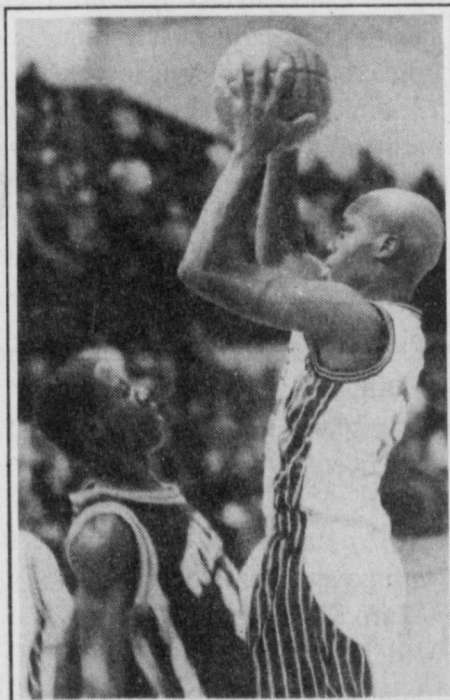
Dustin Cleavinger, a 6-6 senior, rebounded from a frustrating first half to finish with 21 points and 11 rebounds for Muleshoe.

Senior post Steven McCain led Littlefield (15-6) with 13 points while Micah Pratt and Morris Randle had three 3s each.

After trailing most of the game, Muleshoe took a 52-50 lead with 1:22 left in the game on a pair of Matt Turney free throws.

Littlefield answered with two free

South Plains experiences normal December weather

The weather across the South Plains during December was near normal, with highs averaging in the mid 50s and lows lingering in the upper 20s, according to the National Weather Service in Lubbock.

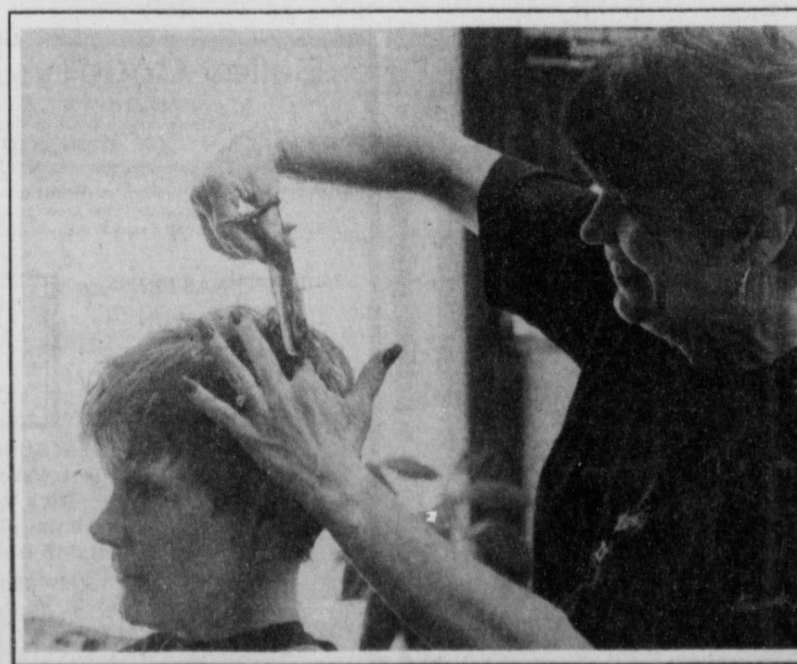
Maximum temperatures averaged 0.1 degrees below normal. Lubbock set a record for the latest hard freeze, which was recorded Decemehr 8. The previous record was Dec. 3 set in 1933.

Muleshoe's high for December was 79 degrees on Dec. 3. Christmas Eve was the coldest day with the temperature dropping to four degrees, with a high of only 16 that same day.

The month had varied highs—between 40s and 60s, and lows dipping into the teens. The first of the month was the warmest with temperatures in the 70s, followed by cool weather in the middle of the month with temperatures hovering in the 40s. Toward the end of the month, Muleshoe warmed up to around 60.

The closest variance in degrees was on Saturday, Dec. 22 with a high of 40 trickling down seven degrees to 33. The largest margin was the next day, reaching a high of 67 and then plumm-

USDA lowers crop insurance premiums

WASHINGTON— Agriculture Secretary Dan Glickman last week announced an estimated 30 percent premium reduction for farmers on their crop insurance policies.

To ensure that all farmers have the opportunity to benefit from this one time premium reduction this year, crop insurance companies will accept insurance applications on crops having sales closing dates that have already passed.

For example, an insured winter wheat farmer in Texas having a sales closing date of Sept. 30, 1998, for crop year 1999 coverage, now has until March 15 to evaluate the benefits of increased

protection at a lower cost. Producers choosing not to insure last September will have the same opportunity to use the discount to obtain "buy up" protection. "Buy up" protection is an amount of coverage that is at least 50 percent of a farm's yield and 100 percent of an established market price.

The funds for this one-time incentive are part of the \$2.375 billion that Congress appropriated to assist farmers suffering from crop and economic losses. This initiative is the first element of USDA's plan to strengthen the farm safety net.

The application period will provide eligible farmers time to

take advantage of the discount by either applying for insurance or increasing their protection. The final percentage of premium discount will depend on how many farmers choose to insure or increase their protection and will be announced after sales have closed.

Farmers growing crops with sales closing dates between July 31 and Feb. 15 are eligible to increase their protection or obtain crop insurance by March 15.

Farmers should contact a crop insurance agent to obtain more information and discuss their options. A listing of crop insurance agents is available at local Farm Service Agency offices.

Scoring has been as spotty as West Texas weather for the Muleshoe Lady Mules most season — showers of points followed by long droughts.

But the Lady Mules got on a roll early Tuesday against Littlefield and kept pouring it on, tying their season-high for points in a 69-41 romp.

Lindsey Field tallied a game-high 22 points and seven Lady Mules scored at least four points in the District 2-3A contest at WJHS gym.

After sharing the position with now departed Matt Mason for two years, he has the job of quarterbacking the Mules' offense all to himself.

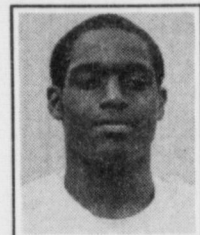
Lewis has responded in stellar fashion, helping Muleshoe to a 2-0 start in District 2-3A and a 13-7 record overall.

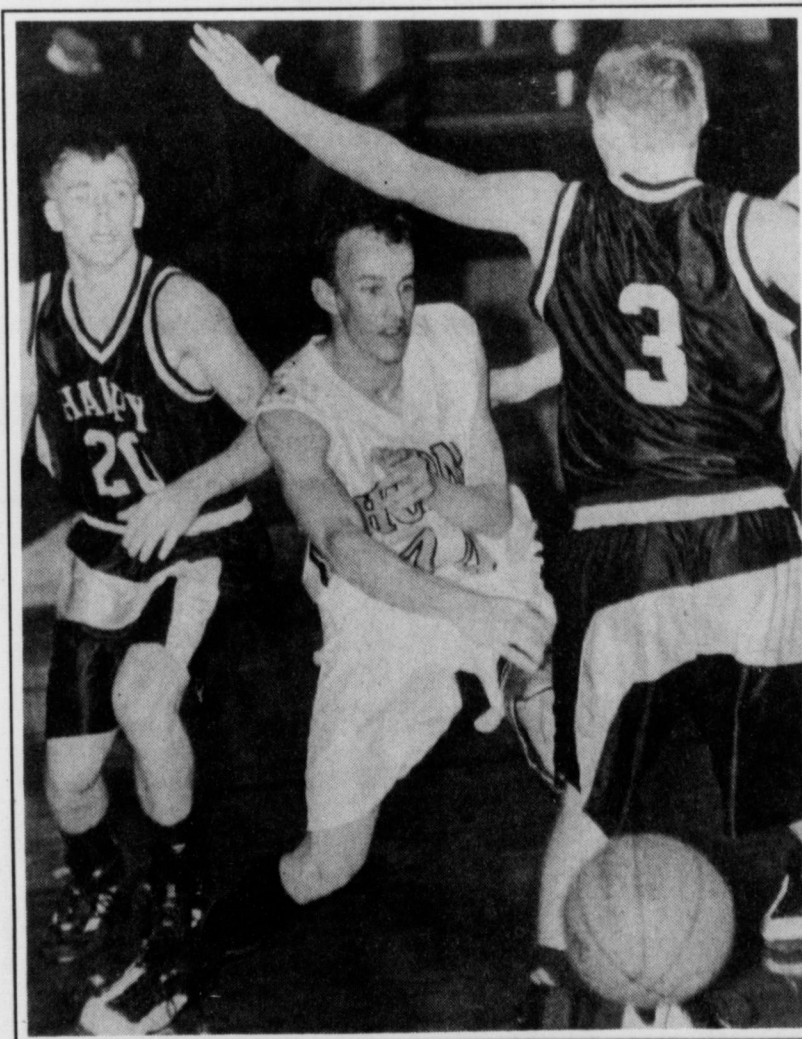
"We showed up to play," Lazbuddie coach Rich Powers said. "We struggled a little offensively, but I was real pleased with the way we played defense."

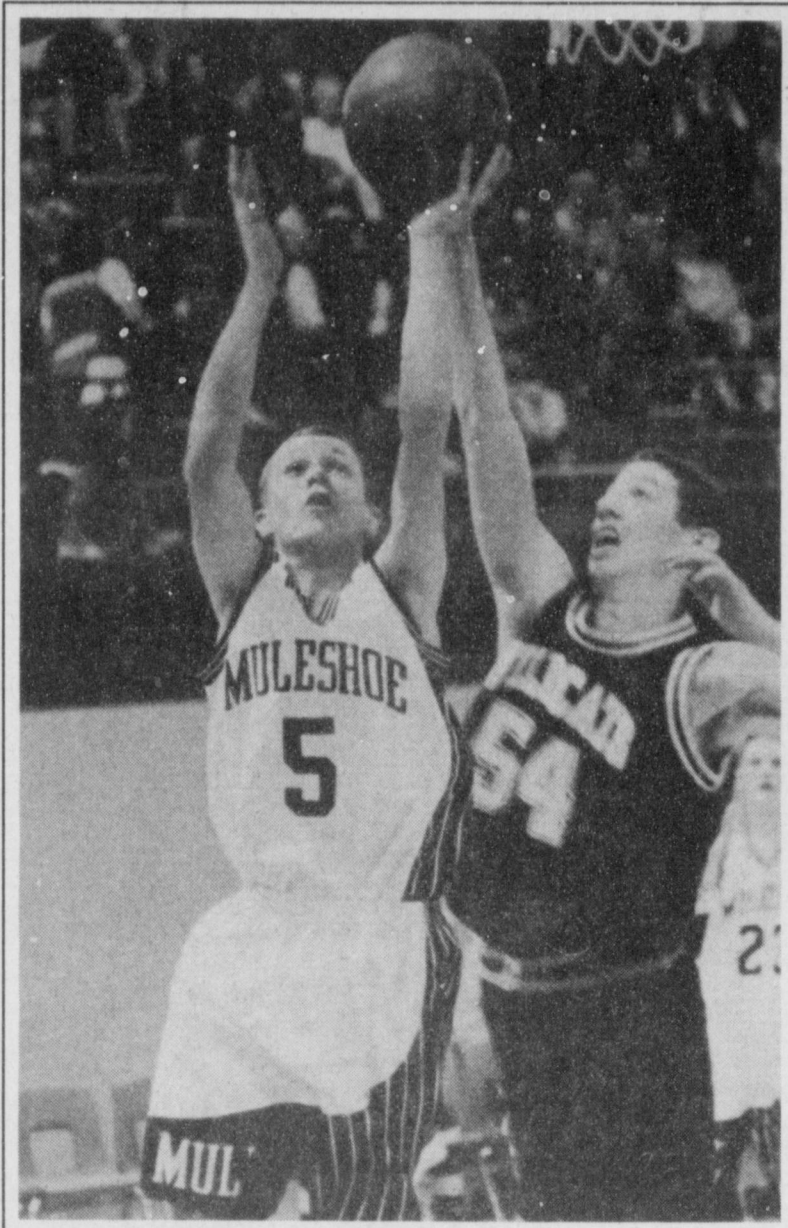

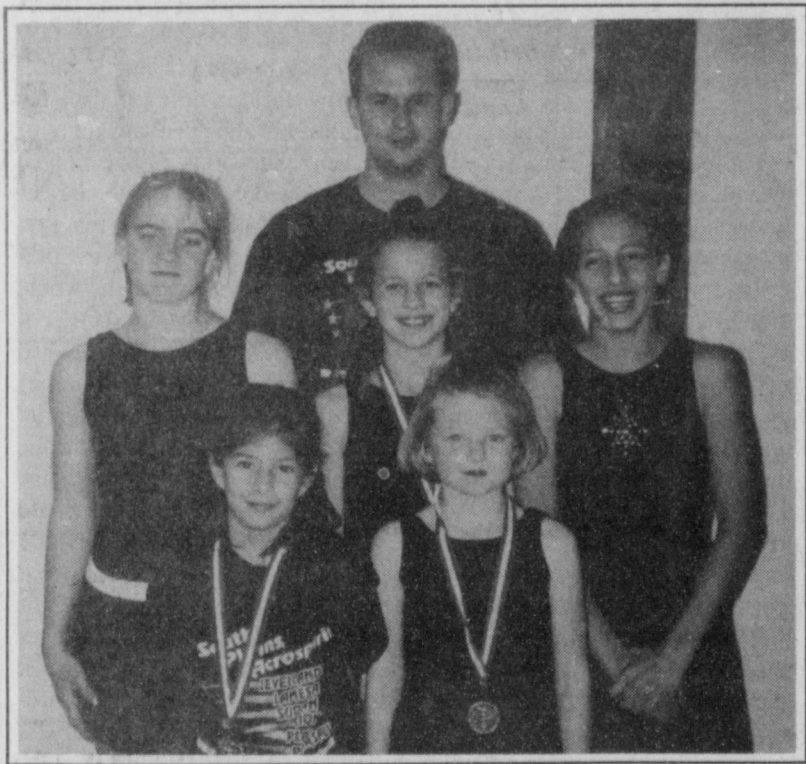

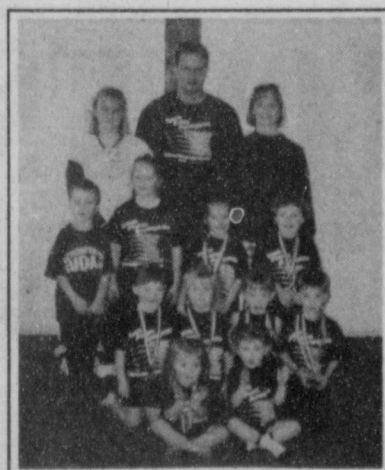

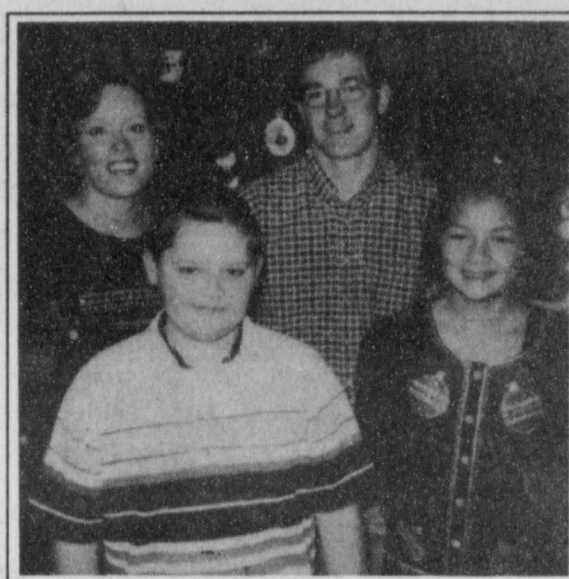

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Ruby Bridges Was Triumphant in Trouble

Years ago now, I wrote a series of short essays entitled "Triumphant in Trouble." How good it was, I don't know, but I do know one truth came through at least to me, if to no one else. To be "triumphant in trouble" requires far more than that we physically survive the pain life sometimes throws at us. It means that we survive without bitter-

problems, unless deeper than those scars is the spiritual deformity wrought by bitterness. Physical scars are one thing. The scars of the spirit are another.

I thought of these things as I read in *Christianity Today* about a little girl, who happened to be black, named Ruby Bridges. Six-year-old Ruby lived in New Orleans in 1960, a turbulent time when black was far from beautiful in the minds of many in New Orleans. Every morning as she walked to school flanked by federal marshals, Ruby Bridges was greeted by bigots hurling insults and curse words. (What kind of moral and mental pygmy hurls his fury at a six-year-old?) Day after day. Same pathetic scene.

ness. That can be difficult. The early Christians were not ashamed of physical scars. For thousands of them, the scars left by pagan whips were badges of pride, not shame. And those who died, burned on stakes to serve as the ghastly light for Nero's garden, torn apart by wild beasts to sate the bloodlust of Roman mobs? The Apostle John calls them "those who conquered." The early church not only survived persecution; it thrived under it. Early Christian author Tertullian could truly write that the blood of the martyrs was seed and that everywhere it was shed, new Christians seemed to spring up.

How did this little girl face the stupidity and cowardice of racism? She prayed. She prayed for the people who daily threatened to kill her.

When psychiatrist Robert Coles asked her why on earth she would even begin to pray for such people, she told him what she had learned in church: "The minister said that Jesus went through a lot of trouble, and he said about the people who were causing the trouble, 'Forgive them, because they don't know what they are doing.'"

And so a little girl prayed for hate-twisted men. Ruby Bridges faced trouble, and she faced it without bitterness. Like her Lord, she was triumphant in trouble.

Christians can survive scars left by swords and shackles, pain and
