Only female mosquitoes suck blood and they only do it when absolutely necessary since they are immediatly subject to being swatted when they strike.

There are currently about 2,700 species of mosquitoes. More than 50 species of mos-

quitoes are currently resistant to

The average mosquito weighs between 2 to 2.5 milligrams.

The average mosquito drinks about 5 millionths of a liter of blood

Mosquitoes locate their victims by sight (they observe movement); by detecting infrared radiation emitted by, warm bodies; and by chemical signals (mosquitoes are attracted to carbon dioxide and lactic acid, among other chemicals).

Human scent can attact mosquitoes from 20 to 35 meters

The average mosquito can fly an

estimated 1 to 1.5 miles per hour. A film of oil on water kills mosquito larvae by clogging up the snorkel through which they breathe.

Dewhurst pushes alternative fuels

AUSTIN-Texas Land Commissioner David Dewhurst, as Chairman of the Texas Alternative Fuels Council (TAFC), today an-Mown on the Farm nounced three grants from the TAFC to improve air quality by using clean-burning alternative fuels. The grants were approved at today's meeting of the TAFC in

> "The air in Texas under Governor George W. Bush is better today on a per capita and per square mile basis," Dewhurst said. "We still have a smog problem which we're all working to solve, and these grants will bring us closer to clean air in Houston, Galveston, and other non-attainment areas." Grants include:

• \$200,000 to the Houston Advanced Research Center for a demonstration project using an electrochemical fuel cell to produce electricity for docked cruise ships at the Port of Houston Authority (POHA). "Visiting cruise ships can generate up to a ton of nitrogen oxide (NOx), a prime constituent of smog, plus substantial amounts of other airborne toxins, each 12hour period. That's a real problem for Houston, Galveston, and our port cities. The fuel cell uses cleanburning propane or natural gas for fuel, and can clean up our air."

• \$25,000 to POHA to buy five propane-powered 'yard hustlers,' heavy-duty tractors used to move freight from ships. Propane reduces pollution emissions by more than 50 percent compared to diesel engines.

• \$150,000 to the Southwest Research Institute in San Antonio to develop a prototype of a propane-fueled tractor engine which will primarily be used in non-attainment areas, such as Houston/ Galveston, Beaumont/Port Arthur, Dallas/Fort Worth, and El Paso.

TAFC was created by the Texas Legislature in 1993 to promote the use of environmentally beneficial alternative fuels. Funds were provided from a \$4.5 million settlement with companies that had underpaid oil and gas royalties to the
