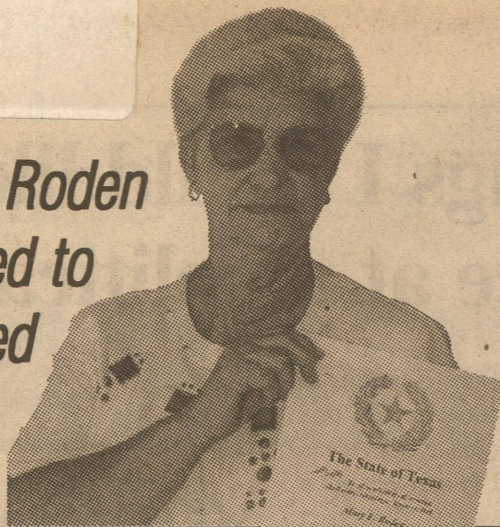
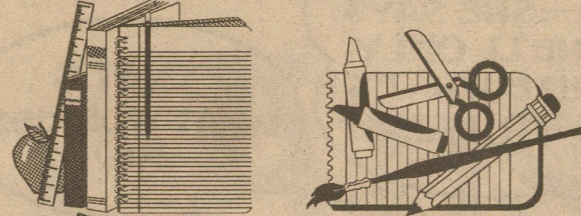

Del Rio-bound traffic faces 41-mile detour

Motorists traveling to Del Rio from Eldorado will be facing a longer drive beginning in September. That is when traffic between Sonora and Del Rio will be detoured through Rocksprings as an 8-month long upgrade of US 277 is carried out north of Loma Alta in Val Verde County.

According to Robert Parker, Area Engineer with the Texas Department of Transportation (TxDOT) office in Del Rio, travelers can expect to drive 41 additional miles while the work is being carried out. The estimated \$8 million project is slated to begin September 15 and should be completed by May 15, Parker said.

The plan calls for reconstructing a narrow and winding portion of the road, leveling out some of the hills and adding a shoulder. When the road is closed, southbound traffic will be detoured onto Texas Highway 55, approximately 22 miles south of Sonora. At Rocksprings, the traffic will routed onto U.S. 377 which will return drivers back to U.S. 277 north of Del Rio.

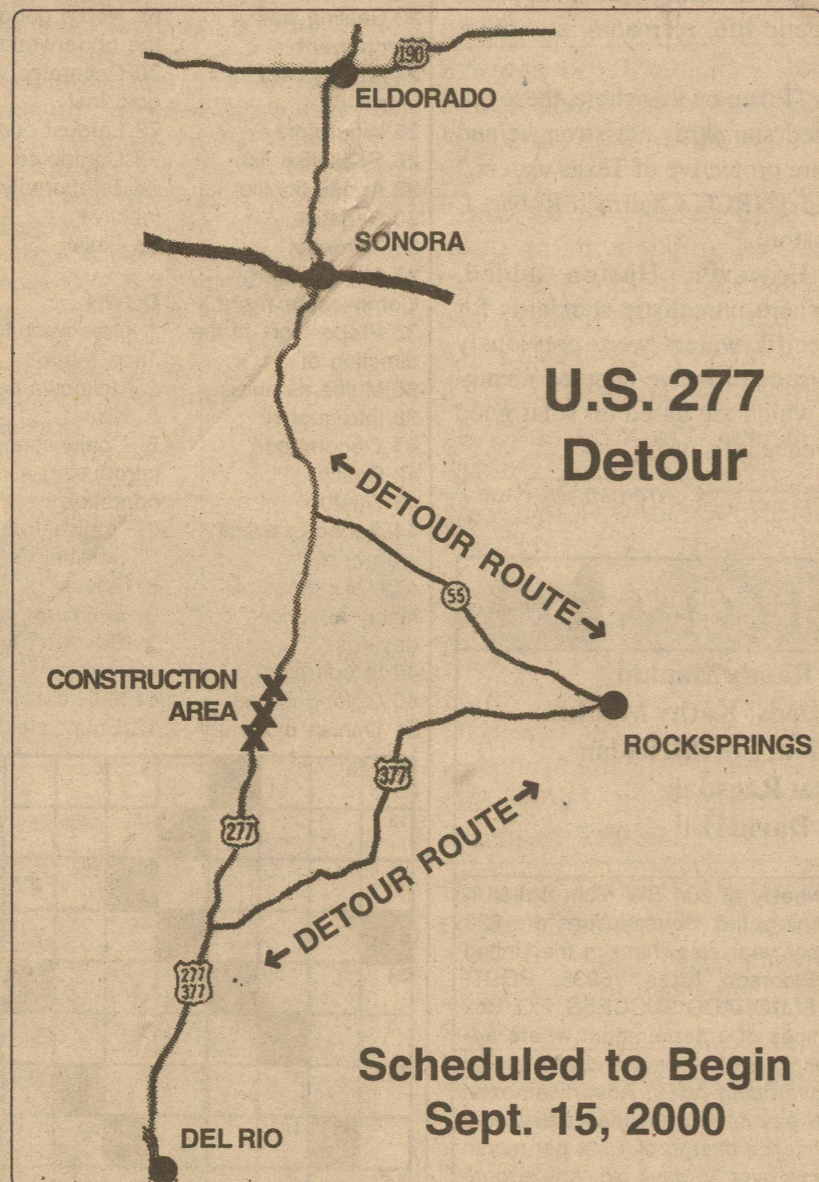
TxDOT officials give two reasons for the long detour. First, workers won't have to deal with

traffic, thereby allowing work to progress faster. Secondly, the Black-capped Vireo, a bird on the List of Threatened Species, nests in the area which is slated for construction during the summer months.

In 1994, authors N.J. Collar, M.J. Crosby and A.J. Stattersfield noted in their book "Birds to Watch 2: The World List of Threatened Birds", that the Black-capped Vireo's numbers had declined to less than 2,000 mature birds in Texas and Oklahoma. There is some dispute among experts, however, about the total number of mature birds which do not migrate north from Coahuila each year.

TxDOT officials note that the Black-capped Vireo will not be nesting in the area while most of the work is being carried out.

Parker noted that he has had discussions with the contractor Allen Keller Company about ideas to reduce to overall construction time. "Right now we're looking at eight months barricade time," Parker said. "There's a chance we can reduce that somewhat. But for now most folks should plan on the detour lasting eight months."



Water system maintenance slated for Monday evening

City Administrator Randy Mankin announced this week that water service will be cut off city-wide at 11:00 p.m. Monday, August 7th, for water system maintenance. The water will remain off until approximately 3:00 a.m. on Tuesday, August 8th. Mankin explained that the work is scheduled for the evening hours in order to minimize the inconvenience to city water

customers. Individuals and businesses with a critical need for water service during this time are encouraged to store water in advance. Also, fire department personnel have been advised and will have water standing by in tanker trucks in the event of an emergency. Questions should be directed to Eldorado City Hall at 853-2691.

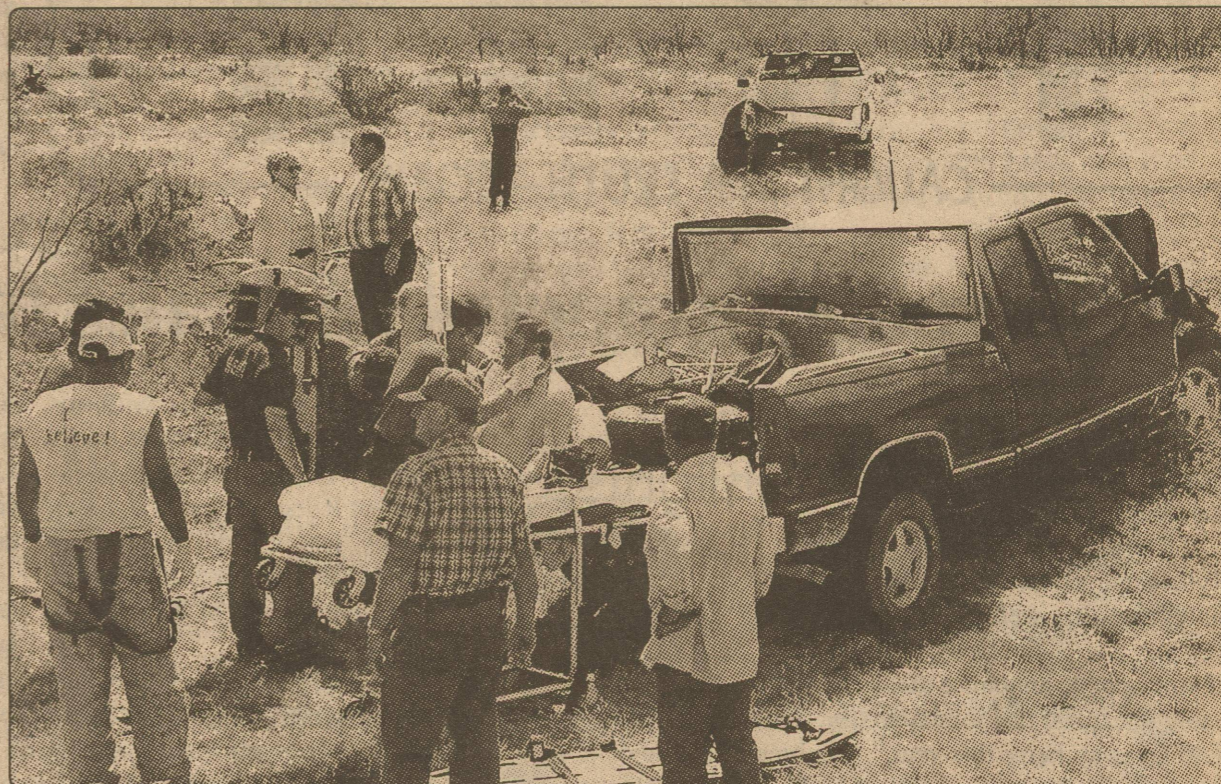

San Angelo man hospitalized following highway construction zone collision

Roxanne Arispe, 26, of Eldorado was driving northbound on U.S. 277 last Thursday when she approached a highway construction zone approximately 13 miles north of town. Texas Department of Transportation (TxDOT) summer employee Anthony Leal, who was working as a flagman at the site, directed Arispe to stop and wait as southbound traffic was allowed to pass through the zone.

However, Joe Hudson, 43, of San Angelo, who was following Arispe's pickup, did not see the construction zone. His 1997 Chevrolet pickup struck the back end of Arispe's 1997 Ford pickup which at the time of the impact was at a complete stop. According to witnesses at the scene, Arispe, noticed Hudson's pickup approaching and

turned her wheels, moments before the crash. That probably saved the life of Leal who was standing in front of Arispe's vehicle.

Schleicher County Chief Deputy George Arispe arrived at the scene to find that his daughter-in-law and three grandchildren were involved in the wreck. DPS Troopers Matt Mull, Carlo De La Rosa and Terry Neal took over investigation of the wreck.

Also responding to the scene were units of the Eldorado Volunteer Fire Department and the Schleicher County Volunteer EMS. Shannon Hospital's AirMed-1 helicopter, enroute to Del Rio for a patient transfer, was in the area at the time of the accident. Responding to a radio call from Paramedic Tim Vasquez, the helicopter diverted to the scene of the crash,

setting down in the roadway near the two vehicles.

Fortunately, Arispe's three young girls were all secured in child safety seats. Their mother was also wearing a seatbelt at the time of the accident. Hudson, who was also wearing a seatbelt, was also protected when his airbag deployed. He was taken by AirMed-1 helicopter to Shannon Medical Center in San Angelo where he was hospitalized overnight. Arispe and her children were taken by ambulance to Schleicher County Medical Center where they were treated and released.

Coincidentally, Arispe's husband, Jorge Arispe, Jr. works for Hudson who is a toolpusher for Patterson Drilling Company. Hudson was cited by Trooper Mull for failure to control speed.

Sheriff urges caution as local children head back to school

Schleicher County Sheriff David Doran announced this week that his officers will begin patrolling school zones next week as Schleicher County children head back to school. He explained that the school zone on North Divide Street runs from West Warner Avenue to West Brooks Street and is marked with signs and flashing yellow lights.

"From 7:30 a.m. to 8:30 a.m. on weekdays, the school zone lights will be flashing and a 20 mile per hour speed limit will be strictly enforced," Doran said. "The school zone will also be in effect from 11:30 a.m. to 1:00 p.m. and 2:30 p.m. to 4:00 p.m."

Doran explained that during the morning hours of 7:30 am to 8:30 am and the afternoon hours of 2:30 pm to 4:00 pm there will be a school crossing guard posted on West Fields Street at the cross

walk nearest the school administration building as well as at the cross walk at the intersection of North Divide and West Fields. He asks that drivers keep a watchful eye out for children who are

headed back to school. Doran also urged caution as drivers approach school buses that are loading or unloading children. "The transportation code

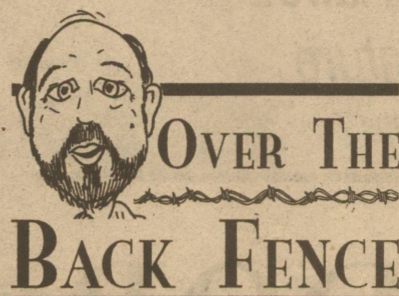

Comptroller promotes 2nd sales tax holiday

AUSTIN - Texas Comptroller Carole Keeton Rylander last week reminded Texans that the second annual sales tax holiday is Aug. 4-6.

Rylander urged families to take advantage of this well-deserved tax break.

"I am happy to announce that I was able to expand the holiday to include layaway items this year," she said.

Eligible clothes and shoes placed in layaway during the sales tax holiday weekend may be taken out at a later date tax-free.

"This will allow hard-working Texas families with limited budgets

to pay for their purchases a little bit at a time and still receive the tax break," she said.

During the sales tax holiday, most clothing and footwear priced at less than \$100 is exempt from state and local sales taxes. Though the holiday is timed to help families outfit their children to go back to school, the tax break isn't limited to children's wear.

The tax exemption applies to

school uniforms, work uniforms, pajamas, robes and slippers, socks, underwear, and jackets and sweaters, but it does not apply to accessories, jewelry and watches, or items that are carried, such as wallets, hand-bags, briefcases and backpacks.

Rylander said she will recommend to the Texas Legislature, which convenes in January, that the sales tax holiday be extended for a longer period of time and cover more items, such as backpacks and fabric, buttons and zippers.

During the first sales tax holiday last year, Texas families spent more than \$400 million on tax-exempt clothing and shoes, saving more than \$32 million in sales taxes. This year, the savings are expected to add up to \$37 million.

This year, local communities had a chance to opt out of the sales tax holiday, if they notified the comptroller's office by March 31. Only one taxing jurisdiction, the city of Sunset Valley, south of Austin, opted out.

It Still Pays to Shop Around

If Texans would just take a few minutes to compare auto insurance rates, company by company, they could save a lot of money.

In a recent survey that included 6,171 Texas residents, Progress

sive Auto Insurance found that respondents could have paid up to \$558 less every six months for coverage from a provider other than their present provider.

The Texas data was among that collected from some 90,000 consumers across the nation who called Progressive or visited the company's web site between Jan. 1 and June 30 and received a "premium variance" rate comparison for Progressive and three other leading insurers.

"It's simply amazing what people will do to save a few cents here or there, but they won't even consider the savings on automobile insurance," said Willy Graves, president of Progressive County Mutual of Texas.

Water Quality Standards Set

The Texas Natural Resource Conservation Commission last week adopted updated standards for surface water in Texas.

The standards are intended to protect drinking water supplies, aquatic life, recreation and other uses.

"Taken on the whole, these updated standards are stronger and more protective of Texas waters," said TNRCC Chairman Robert J. Huston.

However, Huston added, "Where unrealistic standards for specific waters were previously presumed, we've adopted changes which are based on what good science tells us."

You Can Travel The World in Texas

Texas has a number of towns with foreign names. Like Tokio. "We've all been taught that it's an Indian name," says Ila Trout, postmaster. Although the Tokio post office is in Yoakum county, the town is in Terry county, two miles east. "There's nothing in Tokio now," says Ila. "They even sold the Baptist church, the last main building there. A long time ago there were families on every 160 acres and the town had two churches and a school."

During World War Two some people tried to change the name of the town, but those wanting to leave the name alone won out because of the Indian spelling.

McLennan county has a Tokio, too. It was changed to Wiggins in the 40's, then in the 80's went back to being called Tokio.

Texas has some towns with Italian names. Roma is down on the Mexico border. It had two previous names: Buena Vista and Garcia Ranch. During the civil war, Roma was the westernmost port on the Rio Grande. Flatboats and steamers carried cotton downstream. The movie, Viva Zapata, starring Marlon Brando, was filmed in Roma.

Milano is near Cameron. Although some people say the name is of Italian origin, Garland Bullock of Milano says when the people of the community filed for a name, they chose Milan. It was written out in script and the Post office department read it as Milano. Another story says some people were passing through the area and the man asked his wife if she wanted to settle down there and she replied, "My Land, No!"

south of Dallas. It's the birthplace of Dale Evans, the singing cowgirl. Wharton county has a town named Egypt, named during a drought in the early days of Texas when some colonists found fertile farmland there and called their good fortune "going down into Egypt." Kaufman county has an Egypt and Dallas used to have an area called Little Egypt, named by former slaves who were delivered from bondage.

Nueces county has a London, named for Sam and Fanny London. Rusk county has a London and a New London, named by English settlers. Kimble county has a town named London with a famous dance hall that attracts well known musicians every Saturday night. Billy Ivy, who owns the hall, says male patrons used to relieve themselves out back on a tree that finally died. When she installed a men's bathroom she painted a tree over the urinal.

Several towns in Texas are named for countries: China, Cuba, Holland, India, Ireland, Israel, Mexico, Puerto Rico, Scotland and Turkey. These towns in Texas are named for cities: Amsterdam, Antioch, Athens, Belgrade, Berlin, Bethlehem, Bogata, Cadiz, Carthage, Chihuahua, Corinth, Delhi, Dublin, Florence, Gethsemane, Havana, Hebron, Heidelberg, Hereford, Jericho, Kent, Kingston, Madras, Mannheim, Marathon, Moscow, Meunster, Naples, Nazareth, New Braunfels, Palestine, Paris, Rhome, Saltillo, Segovia, Stockholm, Trinidad, Troy, Tunis, Victoria, Vienna, Warsaw and Westminster.

The largest city in Texas with a foreign name is Odessa.

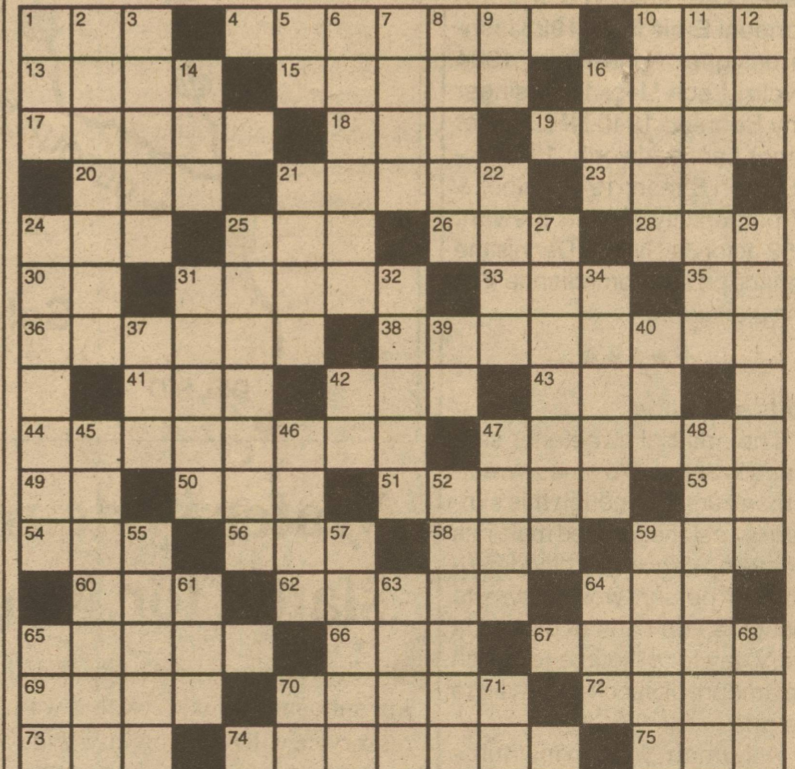

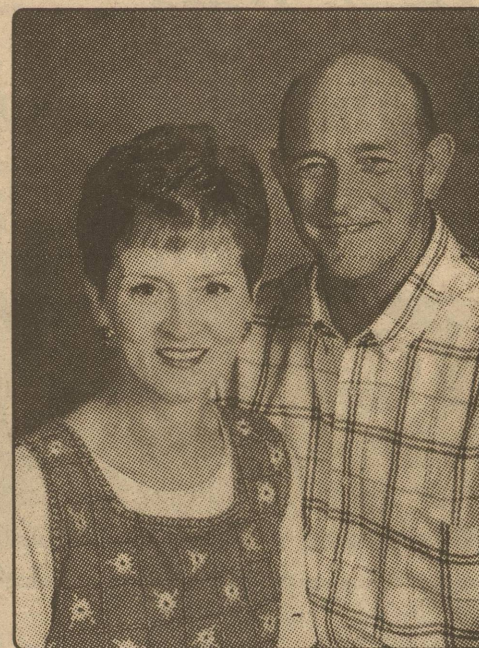

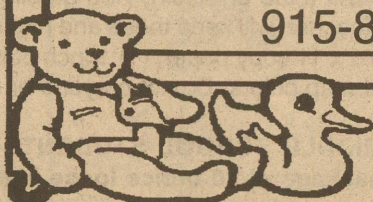

College-bound students should register for ACT exam by August 18

The next ACT Assessment will be administered on September 23, 2000. College-bound high school students must register for the college admissions and placement exam by August 18 - the deadline for having your registration postmarked. There is a late registration postmarked deadline of Sep-

tember 1, but an extra fee is charged for late registrations.

ACT scores are accepted by virtually all U.S. colleges and universities, including all Ivy League schools, and are used along with other student information, such as high school grade point average, for admissions decisions and to help

place students in appropriate courses for their academic achievement. The test fee is \$23 (\$26 in Florida).

Students can register for the ACT by getting information from their high school counselors or online at ACT's website -- www.act.org. The website also has helpful information, sample tests and the opportunity to order test prep materials including an interactive CD-ROM, ACTive Prep, which contains actual, timed tests and helps students build a study plan.

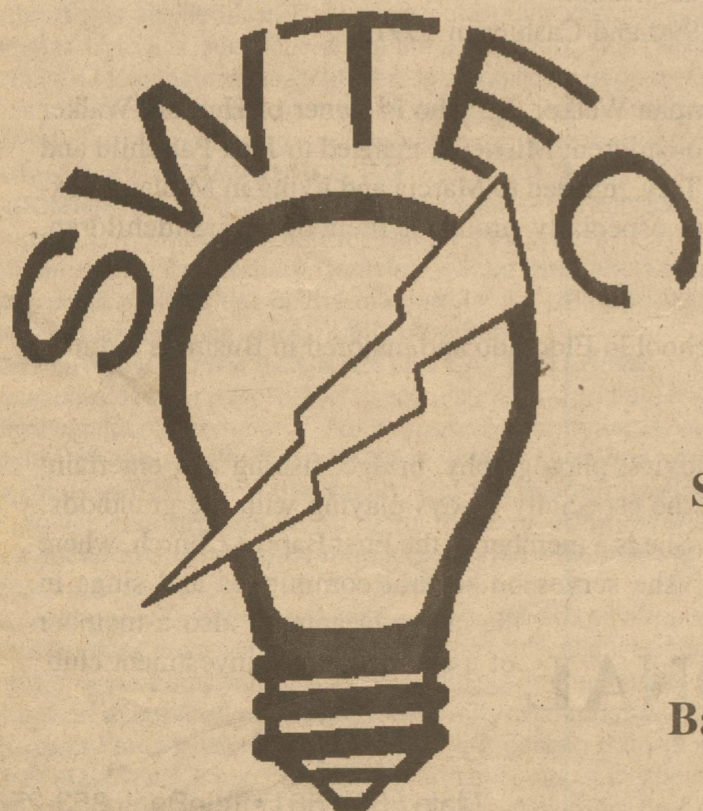

S.C.I.S.D. announces policy for providing free and reduced meals for children

Schleicher County I.S.D. today announced its policy for providing free and reduced meals for children served under the national School Lunch and School breakfast programs. Each school and/or the central office have a copy of the policy, which may be reviewed by any interested party.

The household size and income criteria identified below will be used to determine eligibility for free and reduced-price benefits. Children from households whose income is at or below the levels shown are eligible for free or reduced-price meals. Foster children who are the legal responsibility of a welfare agency or court may also be eligi-

ble for benefits regardless of the income of the household with whom they reside. Eligibility for the foster child is based on the child's income.

Application forms are being distributed to all households with a letter informing households of the availability of free and reduced-price meals for their children. Applications also are available at the principal's office in each school. To apply for free and reduced-price meals for their children. Application may be submitted anytime during the school year. The information households provide on the application will be used for the purpose of determining el-

igibility and verification of data. The school officials may verify applications at any time during the school year.

For school officials to determine eligibility for free and reduced-price benefits, households receiving food stamps or TANF only have to list their child's name and food stamp or TANF case number. An adult household member must sign the application.

Households that do not list a food stamp or TANF case number must list the names of all household members, the amount and source of the income received by each household member and the social security number of the adult

household member who signs the application. If the adult who signs the application does not have a social security number the household member must indicate that a social security number is not available by writing the word "NONE". An adult household member must sign the application.

Under the provisions of the free and reduced-price meal policy, The Food Service Director will review applications and determine eligibility. Parents or guardians dissatisfied with the ruling of the official may wish to discuss the decision with the reviewing official on an informal basis. Parents wishing to make a formal appeal for a hear-

ing on the decision may make a request either orally or in writing to George Blanch, P.O. Box W, Eldorado, Texas 76936 or Phone 915-853-2514.

Households that list a food stamp or TANF case number must report when the household no longer receives these benefits. Other households approved for benefits based on income of information must report increases in household income of over \$50 per month or \$600 per year and decrease in household size. Also, if a household member becomes unemployed or if the household size increases, the household should contact the school. Such changes may make

the children of the household eligible for benefits in household's income falls at or below the level shown above.

The Schleicher County Independent school offers a choice of healthy meals each school day. Children may buy lunch for 1.20 1.30 1.40, breakfast for 50¢, and after school snacks for N/A. Children who qualify under U. S. Dept. of Agriculture guidelines may get meals free or at a reduced-price of 40¢ for lunch, 25¢ for breakfast and N/A for after school snacks. All meals served must meet nutrition standards established by the U. S. Department of Agriculture. If a child has a disability, as determined by a doctor, and the disability prevents the child from eating the regular school meal, the school will make substitutions prescribed by the doctor. If a substitution is needed, there will be no extra charge for the meal. Please note, however, that the school is not required to make a substitution for a food allergy, unless it meets the definition of disability. Please call the school for further information; telephone number 853-3172 ext.526

Your children can get free school meals if you get food stamps or Temporary Assistance for Needy Families (TANF). Depending on your income, your children may be eligible for free or reduced-price meals.

How do I get free or reduced-price school meals for my children? You must complete the Application for Free and Reduced-Price Meals Form and return it to the school.

- Households getting food stamps or TANF. You only have to include your children's names and case numbers, and an adult household member must sign the form.
- Households that do not get food stamps or TANF. If you do not have a case number, you must include the names of all household members, the amount of income each person received last month and where the income came from. An adult household member must sign the form and include his or her social security number, or indicate that he or she has no social security number.
- Households with a foster children. You must include the children's names and the amount of "personal use" income the children received last month, and an adult must sign the form.

Will the form be verified? Your eligibility may be checked at any time during the school year. School officials may ask you to send written evidence that shows that your children should get free or reduced-price school meals.

Can I appeal the school's decision? You can talk to school officials if you do not agree with the school's decision on your form. You also may ask for a fair hearing by calling or writing to:

Must I report changes? If your children get free or reduced-price meals because of your income, you must tell us if your household size decreases, or if your income increases by more than \$50 per month or \$600 per year. If your children get free meals because your household gets food stamps or TANF, you must tell us when you no longer get these benefits.

Will information on my form be kept confidential? We will use the information on your form to decide if your children should get free or reduced-price meals. We may inform officials with other child nutrition, health and education programs of the information on your form to determine benefits for those programs or for funding and/or evaluation purposes.

Can I apply for free and reduced-price meals later? You may apply for free and reduced-price meals at any time during the school year. If you are not eligible now but have a change, like a decrease in household income, an increase in household size, become unemployed or get food stamps or TANF, complete another form then.

We will let you know if you are approved or denied.

Forty-one new members of the THSL were sworn in by Texas Secretary of State Elton Bomer on July 25.

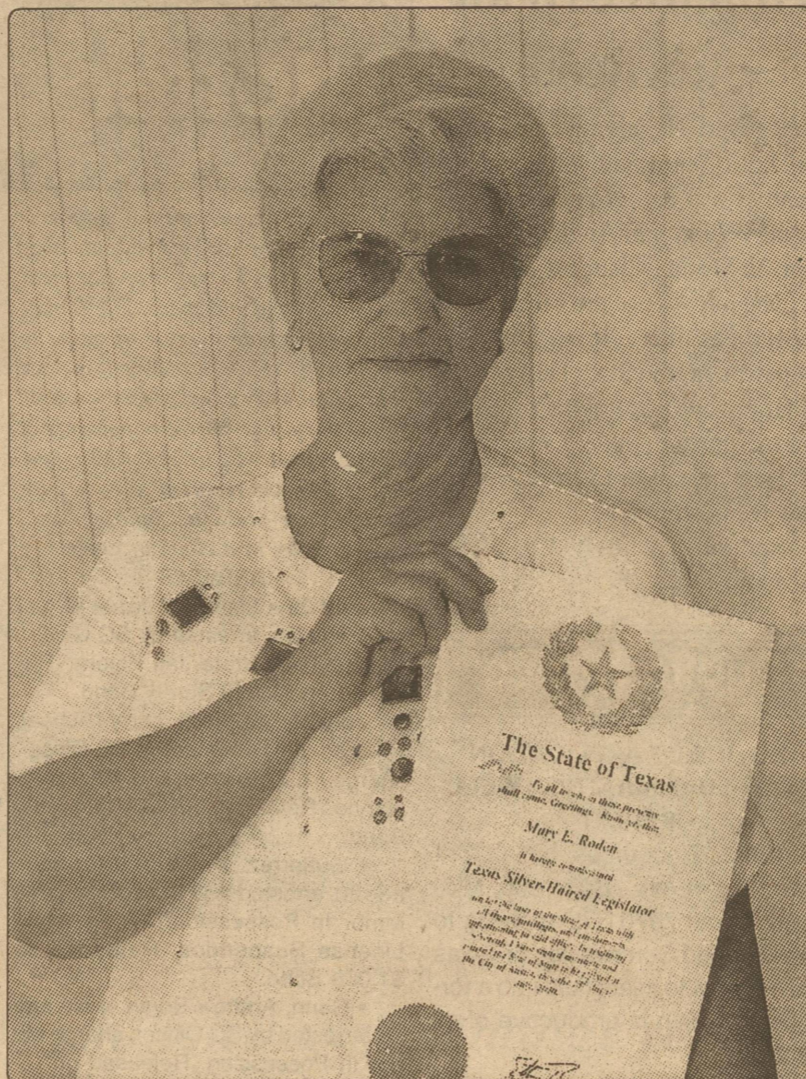

The Texas Department of Health has launched efforts to detect and monitor the West Nile virus, which can be transmitted by mosquito species likely to feed on birds migrating from the northeastern United States through the Gulf Coast. Mild infections of mosquito-borne encephalitis may occur with only a headache. More severe infections may include headache, high fever, neck stiffness, disorientation, coma and tremors.

Texas Parks and Wildlife will conduct a series of public meetings in August to gather input on proposed changes to its white-tailed deer Trap, Transport and Transplant permit program. At its Aug. 31 meeting in Austin the agency is expected to make a final decision on the proposals.

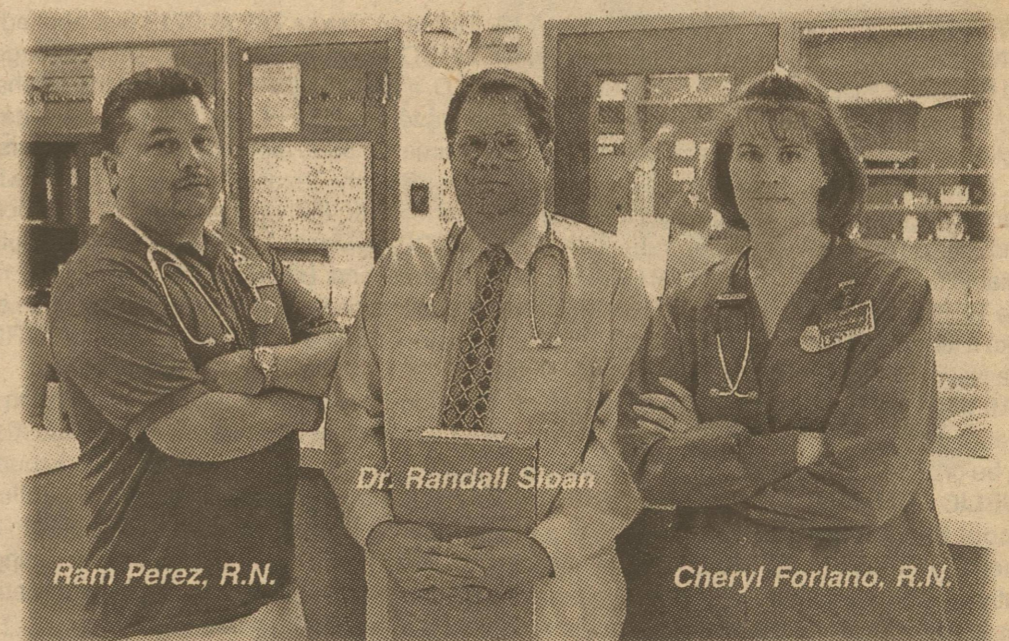

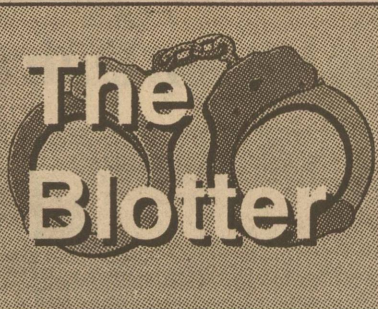

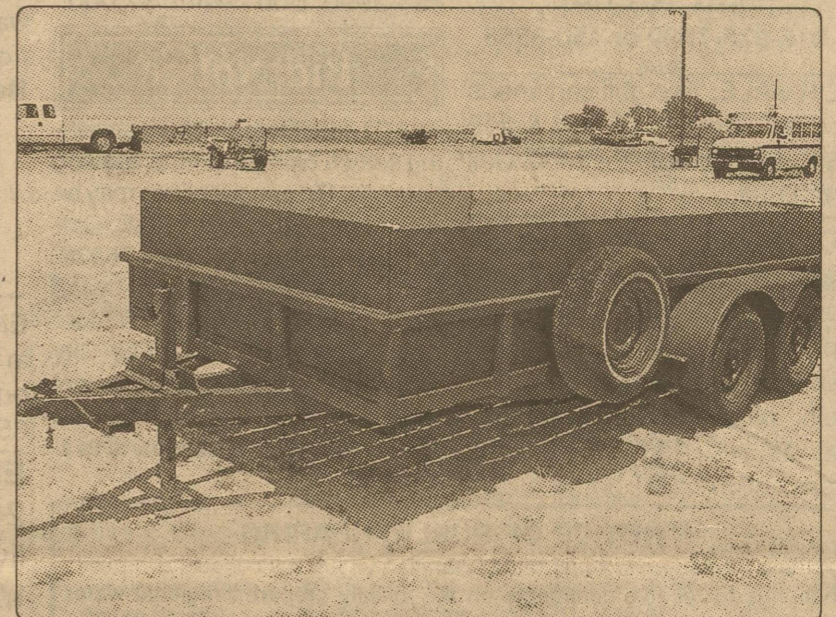

Registration problems lead to recovery of stolen trailer

The homemade trailer, which was constructed in 1991 is valued at \$1,800.00. Garza reportedly paid \$150 for the trailer and had spent additional money installing a new floor and painting the trailer.

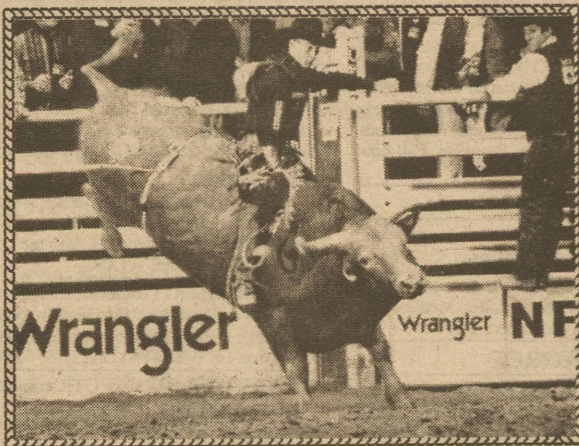
