Mrs. Joab Campbell Hurt In Car Accident.

LOCKHART - ELDORADO

LOCKHART, Dec. 8.—Caught unawares and scored on in the first few minutes of the game, the Lockhart Lions came back with a mighty push to defeat Eldorado, 31-6, here Friday. The victory gave Lockhart its first bi-district title, and the town is practically football dizzy.

Though things looked frankly unenterprising for the Lions at the opening, it soon became apparent that victory was only a matter of time. The West Texas boys, who had traveled all the way across the state from their little town which lies 45 miles south of San Angelo on the Del Rio road, just didn't have it. Besides, their captain and ace were crippled and much below par.

Lockhart Gets Score

Before his usefulness was entirely expended, however, this boy—Capt. Isaacs—put a scare in the Lockhart supporters. There had been one exchange of punts and Eldorado had the ball on Lockhart's 35-yard line. On the very first play, Isaacs broke through the entire Lion team, sidestepped and twisted into the clear and ran those 35 yards for the score. But he failed to add the extra point.

Then Lockhart started—from their own 29-yard line. First it was the great Capt. Bruns Schroeder, then Pete Moore carried the ball. Finally came a beautiful lateral pass—Moore to Schroeder to Fehr—and the ball was on the 12-yard line. On the third succeeding play Capt Schroeder plunged over to tie the count. But he failed to add the extra point on a plunge. Schroeder's touchdown plunge was the first play of the second quarter.

At this point Lockhart seemed to let down again and the Lions were almost caught flat-footed again. On the first play after Etheridge had kicked off and the ball was brought to Eldorado's 30-yard line, Hext tossed a magnificent pass to Kerr who ran to the Lockhart 24 before being pulled down. It was a 44-yard gain. On the next play Hext, who carried on when Isaacs left the game because of his hurt ankle, raced to the eight-yard line, but recovered for Lockhart. It was Eldorado's last threat.

Schroeder Shines

Lockhart's second drive started on Eldorado's 45 and it continued straight down the field with Petet Moore carrying the ball over from the one-yard line. Etheridge kicked goal to make the score 13-6.

Schroeder was the third touchdown all by himself. He broke off left tackle, fought his way clear and raced 62 yards for the tally. For all his 190 pounds he easily loped away from his pursuers. This was the first

While returning from the football game at Lockhart last Saturday afternoon, on the Sonora-Junction Highway near Roosevelt, the Ford car being driven by Mrs. Joab Campbell, turned over just after passing a truck. Mrs. Campbell sustained a broken rib. Her daughter Miss Nell was bruised some. Others in the car were Mr. Campbell, John Alexander, a nephew of Mrs. Campbell, and Miss Helen Stanford. All the glasses on one side of the car were broken out, but the occupants were not hurt other than Mrs. Campbell, only slightly.

The car after passing a truck ran into soft gravel just as Mrs. Campbell tried to turn it back on the highway it turned turtle. Mr. Campbell had one quick thought and turned off the switch as the car went over thus preventing it catching fire

score in the third quarter, and the failure on the try for extra point left the count 19-6.

Eldorado Opens Pass Attack
With the ball almost in mid-field, Pete Moore tossed a pass to Schroeder a minute later, and the Lion captain sped 40 yards for the touchdown which made the score 25-6. The try for point failed.

Eldorado opened a passing attack at the start of the fourth quarter which carried 35 yards in three plays, but Lockhart stiffened at this point and the ball came into their possession without being advanced further goalward. Then the Lions drove to the Eldorado 34 and from here Pete Moore raced down the sidelines for the touchdown.

The try for point after the fifth touchdown was blocked and the game ended a few minutes later with Eldorado in possession of the ball in mid-field.

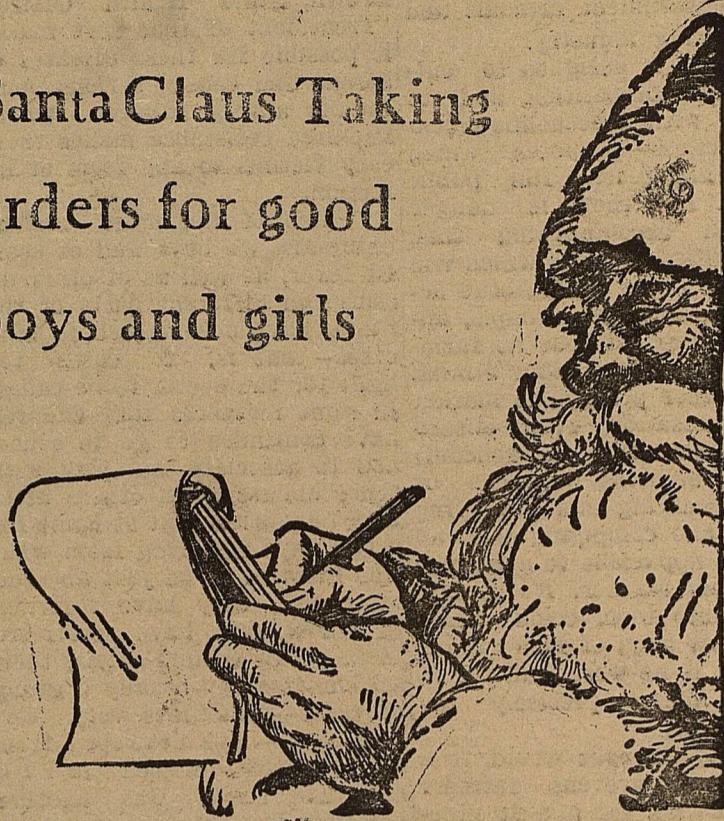
It's true enough that Lockhart's forward wall played good ball when they settled down to it, but the real power of the club rests in Schroeder and Pete Moore. Nearly every man was replaced at some time or other, but these two stayed on to the end.

Hext was Eldorado's outstanding man. He played himself out just before the end, and when he left the field, he collapsed from weariness. Isaacs came in at the beginning of every quarter, but his injury sent him back to the bench except in the last period when he also stayed to see it out.

The big, fast Lockhart Lions' team was caught unprepared and scored upon in the first few minutes of the bi-district game at Lockhart last Friday afternoon. Captain Isaacs ran thru the entire Lockhart team for 35 yards and made the Eldorado yards and made the Eldorado single touchdown of the game. He failed to make the extra point.

So scared was the Lockhart team, that they immediately began to knock out the smaller opponents. First, came Captain Isaacs with a crippled ankle, then R. J. Alexander was practically rendered useless by a badly twisted neck and finally Joe Hext, after playing a heroic game, was removed from the game for a like reason. This was the first game in three years that Captain Isaacs had been crippled and had to leave a game.

With the regular backfield players out, the Eagles continued a desperate, plucky fight but superior weight and too much reserve power gradually weakened them and beat them back. The much talked of Schraeder did not star so much in the game as did P. Moore, who made gain after gain for Lockhart. The final score was 31 to 6.
