

Health Warning Issued

(EDITOR'S NOTE: Press dispatches this week indicate in a very impressive manner that infantile paralysis is again on the increase in regard to the number of cases. Although there has been no cases reported in Schleicher county there are cases in adjacent counties. In the interest of safety to citizens of the county, and especially the safety of children, this publication wishes to emphasize the immediate necessity of prevention measures. This, as is indicated by Dr. George W. Cox, State Health Officer, should be done NOW. No greater move could be made on the part of residents in helping in the war effort than taking preventitive measures against the disease. It will perhaps save loss of life, save the crippling of innocent children, and too, will save much money used in the treatment of the disease which otherwise could be invested in War Bonds and Stamps, thus helping the war financing program. Let's all adhere to the admonition of the State Health Officer, and to the pleadings of hospitals in Texas, now over-run with cases of Polio, to prevent as many more cases as possible. Start now to clean up your premises to prevent this and other diseases, as well as fire hazards.)

SUGGESTIONS REGARDING CONTROL OF POLIOMYELITIS (INFANTILE PARALYSIS)

Until recently it was generally believed that this infection is transmitted by means of discharges from the respiratory tract. It is now believed that poliomyelitis is primarily another of the several gastrointestinal infections. Therefore, control measures must emphasize clean-up campaigns and improvements in

Strict sanitary measures must be observed in all communities. Stringent efforts should be made to eliminate the house-fly and to destroy its breeding places. All mosquitoes and mosquito breeding places must be eliminated at once. Every effort should be made to institute approved garbage collection systems immediately. Safe water supplies must be assured. Where adequate municipal sewage disposal systems are not in operation, it is vitally important to promote and maintain sanitary septic tanks and outdoor privies.

All swimming pools should, under rigid supervision, maintain those standards approved by the Texas State Department of Health. This necessarily included maintenance of proper chlorine level. Where such standards are not maintained, those pools should be closed immediately.

All raw foods and vegetables should be washed thoroughly before use and protected from flies, filth and insects. All eating and food handling establishments should adhere strictly to the State Law concerning the sterilization of dishes and utensils. the present emergency, those restaurants with insufficient personnel to maintain approved sanitation should close one or two hours a day so that employees can assist in maintaining cleanliness and high sanitary standards.

Every effort should be made to secure approved milk. Rats and mice should be eliminated. Maintain in the home the same sanitary standards that are necessary in community life. Particular attention should be paid to personal hygiene. Excreta from cases and contacts should be handled and disinfected with the same scrupulous care as in typhoid fever or

bacillary dysentery.

Over-exertion in children should be avoided. Children should not visit homes where there is a sick child. Cases should be quarantined for 14 days and adults who work in food establishments should be particularly instructed in personal hygiene. It is advisable to reduce to a minimum all human contacts especially in children during an outbreak of this disease. It is not advocated that schools, churches, and theaters be closed.

Early symptoms of infantile paralysis are headache, fever, vomiting, drowsiness, followed by stiffness in the neck and back. When suspicious symptoms appear, a physician should be called immed-





REAL CONSERVATION

Americans are learning the meaning of conservation. They are learning from an exacting teacher—war. War has in a matter of months switched this country from a nation of abundance to a nation of scarcity, as far as civilians are concerned. And where there is scarcity, there must be conservation. Automobile owners cannot burn up their cars with speed as they were wont to do a few years ago. Housewives cannot carelessly demolish household appliances, or toss out surplus food.

The new effort to conserve must reach farther than slow driving and eating the last crust of bread. It must reach into one of the most important existing fields of conservation—fire prevention. Several hundred millions of dollars worth of property is destroyed each year by fire. The bulk of that loss is sheer criminal waste, brought about by indifference and carelessness on the part of individuals. This carelessness can be eradicated by education; by learning that preventing a property-destroying fire is as great a step toward conservation as driving your auto slowly to save tires. Fire prevention authorities have emphasized that: "The development of a safety awareness that will control the daily actions of the individual is necessary if preventable fires and conflagrations are to in the post war rebate. Until our individual conservation efforts are effectively directed toward curbing fire hazards in the home, in the factory, on the farm and every place else where life and property are involved, we have not learned the lesson of conservation.

amounts to \$100.00. During 1943 you paid \$50 on what you considered your 1942 tax liability. This means you will owe \$50, due December 15, 1943. The 1942 Tax payment is forgiven only when the tax liability is \$50 or under and the 1942 tax liability is smaller than the 1943 liability is smaller than the 1942 liability. An important point to remember is that the smaller tax due is considered to be 1942 and all or a portion is skipped. If the smaller year's tax bill, which in most instances, will be 1942, is above \$50 then only \$50 or 75 per cent, whichever is larger is forgiven by the Government. The 1942 tax liability can be paid in two installments on March 15, 1944 and March 15, 1945. Of course the total amount can be paid on March 15, 1944 if the farmer so de

sires.

The victory tax beginning Jan. 1, 1943 is 5 per cent of net business profit above \$1248 if joint returns are made and \$624 if separate returns are made. Deductions for dependents are not allowed as such for the victory tax, but credit is given ried couples get a postwar credit of 40 per cent of their Victory tax and single persons get 25 per cent. A deduction of \$100 or 2 per cent whichever is smaller, of the Victry tax is added to the postwar credit for each dependent. 


