Stewart Bragg, better known to friends as (Doc) Kerr, 57, passed away at his residence here, Tuesday, September 14, at 10 o'clock following an illness of only a few hours.

Kerr, accompanied by L. L. Harris, had gone to the east end of the county hunting in the late afternoon Tuesday and while there complained of feeling ill. He drove his pick-up home and lived only a few minutes after entering the house.

Mr. Kerr was born in Mason County, October 9, 1886. He came to Schleicher County in 1920 and had been engaged in ranching since that time. He was a member of the First Baptist Church.

Funeral services were held at the Fundamental Baptist Church Wednesday evening at 6 o'clock with the pastor, Rev. B. A. Jonas assisted by Rev. Kelly Neal, pastor of the Presbyterian Church conducting the services.

ARMY APPEALING FOR SCRAP

Several months ago, residents of this community cooperated splendidly in a nation-wide newspaper scrap metal drive. Scrap, which in all probability would never have been located except through your efforts, was collected and shipped to the steel mills where it was rushed into production. But when this particular campaign was over, most of you more or less rested on your laurels as having participated in a job well done.

But, citizens, the job is not over nor will it be until the war is won. The need for scrap is urgent and vital, and its collections must be continuous and constant. Our steel mills are faced with an extreme shortage of this material and a shortage of any one metal exacts a shortening toll on the production line. This must be prevented at all costs and to guarantee that this will not happen, the Army is moving in. It is taking over. The army will see that the mills obtain an ample supply of scrap.

In a couple of weeks the Army Mobile Collecting Salvage Unit of Goodfellow Field, trained and equipped for the collection, segrega-

tion and removal of scrap, will move into Schleicher County to collect your scrap metal. We urge you to give them every support and help them in any and every way possible.

This year must see our steel production reach the unprecedented total of one hundred million tons. Half of steel is actually made of scrap metal and it is from you that the Army must obtain its reservoir or backlog of scrap. We must double the combined output of the axis nations and we must keep our assembly lines pouring out a never ending flow of war implements.

The Army will provide the necessary labor and transportation for the removal of scrap patriotically donated to the government.

The Army appeals to you to aid Lt. Don R. Parsons, the officer in charge of this Mobile Unit, by piling your scrap metal in front of your mail boxes, and if your scrap is too heavy for you to move, leave a note in your mail box directing the soldiers to the location of your scrap contributions.

FARMERS AND RANCHERS TO GET AMMUNITION

Schleicher County farmers and ranchers may purchase during any calendar quarter 100 pounds of .22 caliber long rifle cartridges or other rim fire cartridges; 40 rounds of center fire cartridges such as .30-30 caliber and 25 rounds of any gauge shotgun shells by executing Certificate No. 4 of L-286 according to Joe B. Edens, Chairman of Schleicher County USDA War Board. The War Food Administration has been concerned for some time about the shortage of ammunition for use by farmers in controlling predatory animals and birds, Mr. Eden said. The amount available for the past year has been so inadequate that many farmers have been unable to obtain the small quota permitted under War Production Board Limitations Order L-286.

A program has been adopted under which approximately 100 million shotgun shells, 12 million center fire rifle cartridges and 120 million .22 caliber rim fire cartridges will be available for

distribution.

Farmers and ranchers who need ammunition should execute Certificate No. 4 which can be obtained from their dealer or from the Schleicher County USDA War Board. Those needing a larger amount of ammunition than can be secured by using Certificate No. 4 may purchase a special quota (50 rounds of .22 caliber long rifle cartridges, 20 center fire rifle cartridges, and 25 shotgun shells) by using certificate No. 5, provided they secure these amounts prior to October 1 or their written orders are in the hands of the dealer by that date. If a farmer or rancher needs a larger amount of ammunition than can be secured by using Certificate No. 4 and 5, he may apply to the Government Division, War Production Board, Washington, D. C. using Form PD-860.

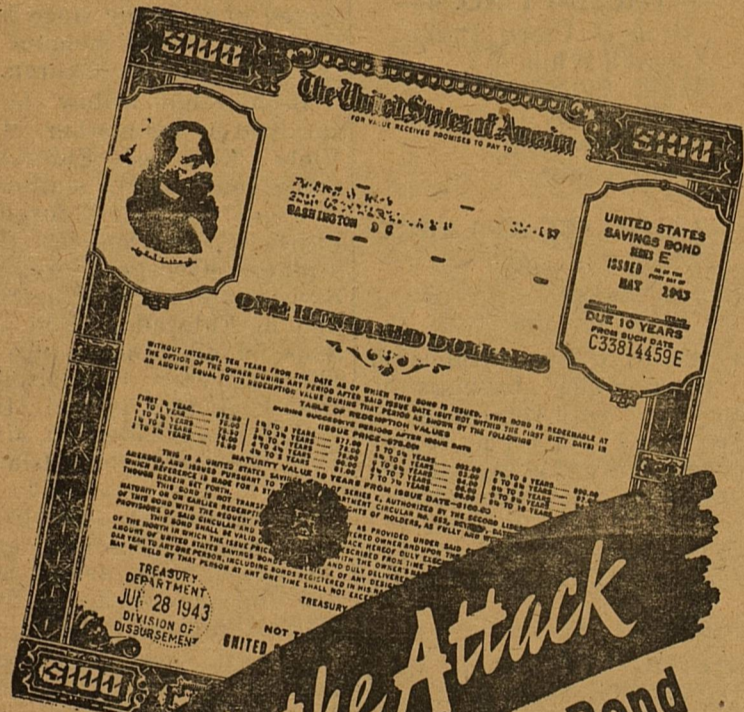

**Eldorado Divide Soil Conservation
District News**
REPORTED BY DISTRICT SUPERVISORS

The District Supervisors, in their regular meeting last week, approved completed conservation plans on 5 ranches, totaling 15,243 acres. Applications for planning assistance were approved on 18,560 acres.

Completed plans approved included ranches owned or operated by Jess Koy, Joab Campbell, Elvss Bawcom, Baugh Brothers, and R. J. Hill.

All District Supervisors were present at the meeting—J. Forrest Runge, J. E. Spencer, B. E. Moore, and E. E. Foster, Jr.

Plans were made for the election of Supervisors which will be held Tuesday, October 5, at 3:00 P. M.

Five acres of soybeans planted on a terraced and contoured field on the Otto Sauer farm are making good growth in spite of the dry weather.

Mr. Sauer states that he has grown soybeans before, and that they were usually outyielded by cowpeas.

Several of the soybean plants are on display in the Soil Conservation Service Office, and all who are interested in seeing them are invited to visit the Office.

Will Isaacs is constructing terraces on his cultivated land this week with his one-way plow. Most of the 1.2 miles of terraces worked on will meet specifications, with the remainder to be completed after a rain comes to settle the soil.

Mr. Isaacs has recently installed a new windmill and plans to start construction soon on the storage tank and water troughs. This new water development will encourage more uniform grazing over the pasture and contribute toward more beef and lamb.

The election of Supervisors for the Eldorado Divide Soil Conservation District will be held Tuesday, October 5, at 3:00 P. M., J. Forrest Runge, Chairman, announced this week.

The district, which includes all of Schleicher County and that part of Tom Green County drained by

the South Concho River, is operated by five Supervisors who are required by law to be qualified landowners living in the District. The District is divided into five zones, with each zone electing one Supervisor to represent it.

The Schleicher County portion of the District is divided into three zones, or subdivisions. Zone 3 includes the Northwest part of the County and is bounded on the east by the highway and on the south by the old Ozona road. Zone 4 includes the Southwest portion of the County south of the old Ozona road and bounded on the east by the Eldorado-Fort McKavett road and the Sonora-Fort McKavett road. Zone 5 includes the remainder of the County, which is that portion east of the highway to Eldorado, and east and north of Eldorado-Fort McKavett road. A map of the County showing the zones will be published later.

The present District Supervisors include: B. E. Moore in Zone 3, J. E. Spencer in Zone 4, and J. Forrest Runge in Zone 5. The Supervisors run the business of the Soil Conservation District in much the same manner as Trustees run the business of a School district. The Supervisors may request and receive technical assistance from any State or Federal Agency to help farmers and ranchers design and install soil and water conservation measures on their land.

Election meetings will be held at Eldorado for Zones 3 and 4, and at Adams School for Zone 5. It is not only the privilege, but also the duty, of every landowner (and his wife) to be present at the meetings and help elect a supervisor to represent his zone.

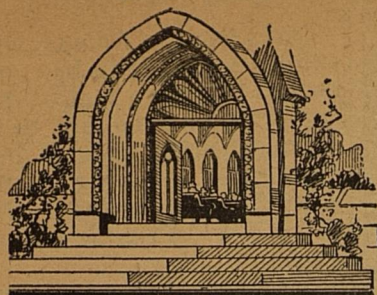

You will notice we have changed the time of our evening services.

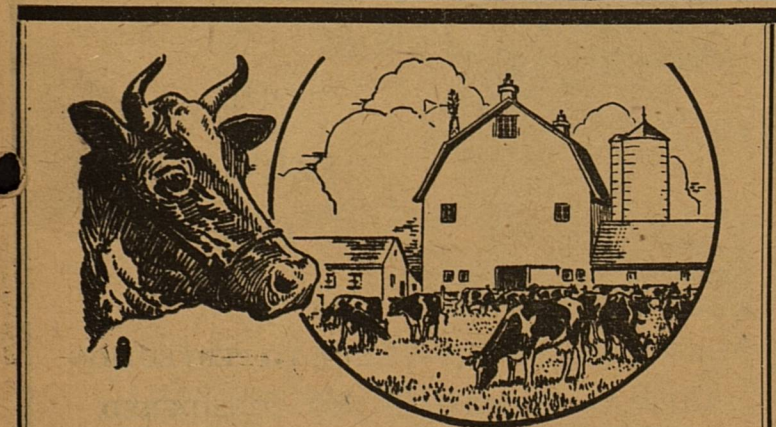
