# Grass Fire Friday Last Week Lt. D. E. DeLong, Jr., Loses Life **Caused Loss of Grass, Livestock**

# To Conduct Revival

Stray bombs falling on the Ford Oglesby ranch early in the afternoon last Friday started another grass fire which caused heavy losses to Schleicher county ranchmen before it was brought under control.


Approximately two sections of grass was lost on the Ford Oglesby ranch. The fire spread rapidly on into the Sam Oglesby ranch burning about 100 acres of grass with considerable fence post loss felt. The wire was damaged to such an ex-tent that it will have to be

replaced before long. From the Sam Oglesby place the fire spread to the O. L. Woodard ranch burning four sections of grass, a large stack of feed and some forty head of sheep. The fire continued to increase despite the battle the ranchers and other citizens were waging to bring the fire under control.
