Our kids have had 3 different head coaches in basketball in the past 3 seasons. Next year hopefully they will be more comfortable with my style and game plan and things should be a lot easier. Experience will be another

strength in that we will return 8 lettermen who played a lot this year and did well.

I am proud of our Eagles and look forward to the 1994-95 season.

Eldorado Hosted Brady In First Baseball Game Of Season

Eldorado hosted Brady in their first baseball game of the season. "Typical baseball season opener weather" said one bystander, recalling a time when their family sat through a snow storm in Hobbs watching her husband's team play - out here in West Texas we can nearly always count on a slight breeze of 20 mph, that with the clouds and the 40 degree weather had everyone lining the new field with cars. Some of the really tough fans were wrapped in blankets Indian style on the bleachers. Students and adults alike all supported our team Friday evening.

Brady had first bat. Carruth led off with a walk by pitcher Casey Triplett. Bemell came up to the plate with a sacrifice bunt and was thrown out at first. Carruth advanced to 2nd base. Leading off for Eldorado was Reagan Bownds. With an 0-2 count, he got a solid little hit, but was thrown out at first. Johnny Arispe batted second and got a single to left. Clay Butler batted third with a sacrifice bunt between the pitcher and third base. He was thrown out at first. Arispe advanced to second. With two away and one on base, Farley Dakan came in to bat and clean up. Dakan struck out for out #3. This left the score Brady-3, Eldorado-0 at the end of the first inning.

Garza led off the 2nd inning for Brady and walked. Back at the top of the batting order, Carruth popped up and Casey Triplett caught the ball for out #1. Bernal came to the plate and hit a single. Bernal stole 2nd. The overthrow at 2nd brought Garza in and Bernal to 3rd. Hill came to the plate, and with 2 balls, no strikes, popped up behind the plate. Clay Butler caught the ball for out #2. Wilson came in and hit a single. Morrison flied out short right for out #3. Brady picked up 2 runs that inning to make it 5-0, Brady.

The last half of the second inning was filled with excitement for the Eagles. Hunter Preston led off with a single. Gutierrez singled to left,

Preston to second. Casey Triplett bunted, with a force at 3rd. There was an overthrow and Preston hit 3rd and ran home. Gutierrez ran to 3rd. Robert Sanchez hit a single. Gutierrez holds at 3rd. Digger Fuentes for a base on balls to load the bases - no outs. Bownds came to the plate for the 1st out in the bottom of the 2nd. Arispe had next bat with a count of 1 and 2 and got on 1st and stole 2nd. Clay Butler walked. Pinch runner Pepper Nix went in for Butler. Dakan hit a grounder by short stop to advance the runners. Digger was out, Preston finished the inning

for out #3. At the end of the 2nd inning, it was tied for 5-5.

The 3rd inning was scoreless for Brady. Eldorado came back to add one more run by Ricky Gutierrez. Joe Sanchez went in to pitch. Sammy Prater went in at 1st base.

Brady rolled back in the top of the 4th with 4 runs to make the score 9-6. Eldorado's Jason Clark walked. We were scoreless in the fourth.

The game was called after the 4th inning. The next game will be in Comfort for a tournament this weekend.

Secretary of Agriculture Mike Espy announced the national average price support rates and advance deficiency payments for the 1994 crops of wheat of feed grains on Friday, February 25th.

The 1994 wheat and corn price support levels are \$2.58 and \$1.98 per bushel, 13 and 17 cents, respectively, above the 1993 levels. These higher levels will provide producers with greater opportunities to finance their farming operations. "An increase in loan rates will mean more money in the pockets of agricultural producers. It also demonstrates the commitment of this Administration to increase farm income which, in turn, will have a positive economic effect on rural areas," said Espy.

Producers may request 50 percent of their estimated deficiency payments for 1994 wheat, feed grain, cotton, and rice during the sign-up period, which begins March 1 and ends April 29. Estimated deficiency payment rates were announced on February 18. Total wheat, feed grains, ELS and upland cotton and rice deficiency payments will be about \$2.4 billion: for wheat, \$785 million; for corn, \$1,050 million; for

grain sorghum, \$105 million; for barley, \$75 million; for upland cotton, \$340 million; for rice, \$75 million.

The advance payment rate for ELS cotton is 8.48 cents per pound; upland cotton, 6.45 cents per pound; and rice, 47 cents per cwt.

USDA's currently projected 1994 grain prices are above the announced 1994 loan rates. Price support rates for 1995 will be reviewed next year based on supply and demand conditions.

Espy also said that upland cotton producers may plant designated crops, such as oilseeds (soybeans, sunflower seed, safflower, canola, rapeseed, mustard seed and flaxseed) and mung beans, on up to 50 percent of the announced 11 percent acreage reduction requirement. Producers must agree to forego deficiency payments on an acre-for-acre basis for each acre (or portion thereof) of the reduced acres planted to designated crops.

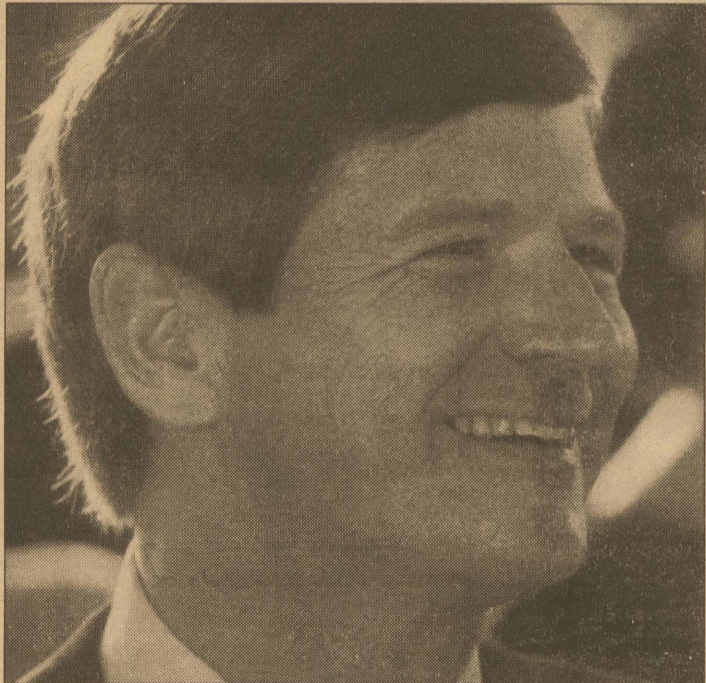

Bertha, the world's oldest and most prolific cow, stood aloof Monday as humans toasted her 48th birthday. Bertha, listed in the Guinness Book of World Records both for her age and her 39 calves, was given a bucket of apples to chew in her pen.

Dozens of residents celebrated at the village hall in Kenmare, Ireland, with songs, poems, a few drinks and a

HOMEMADE CROUTONS ARE EASY IN A MICROWAVE

Salads contribute color and variety to a meal. What goes in them is often a reflection of our own personal tastes. Different textures are what make a salad special and croutons add the extra "crunch" that tops off the best.

Homemade croutons are easy to make in a microwave oven -- and it's a good way to get rid of leftover bread. Just cut French bread into dice-sized cubes and place in an appropriate bowl. Add 2 tablespoons olive oil and stir to coat evenly. Season with garlic salt or other seasonings to your taste. Microwave on HIGH (100%) for 1-1/2 minutes. Stir and microwave 1-1/2 minutes longer. Allow croutons to stand for a couple minutes until crispy. Store in an airtight container.

Consider serving these as a topping to creamy soups. Add a touch of finesse to a basic canned cream soup, such as mushroom, cheese or chicken. Puree thawed, frozen chopped broccoli or spinach and add to prepared soup; top with homemade croutons. It's a quick lunch idea that's sure to please.







* Broken insulators on utility poles.

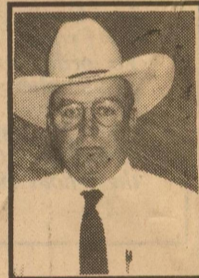
For your own safety and the safety
