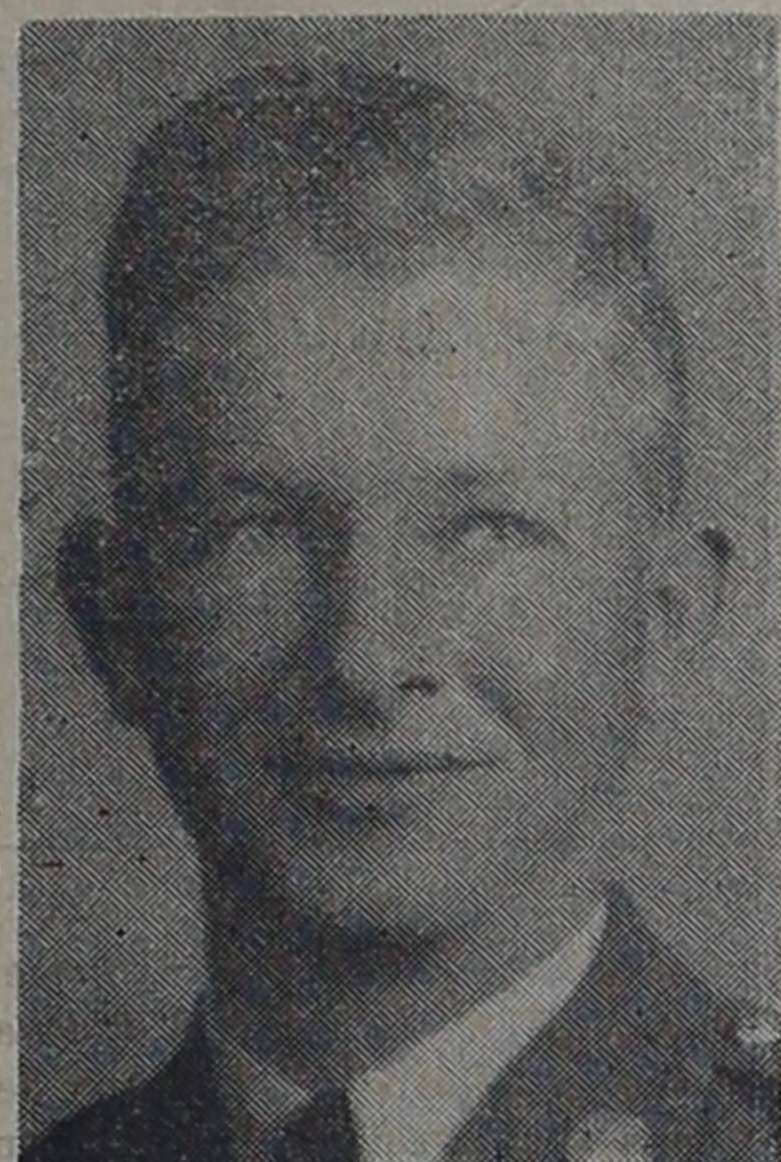

AIRPORT RECEIVES APPROVAL OF CAA

"The Eldorado Municipal Airport is now one of the best ports, with a possible exception of an Army field port in Coleman, that is to be found this side of Fort Worth," stated Guy Lavender, Flight Officer of Love Field, Dallas, and a former automobile agency manager in Eldorado.

Lavender made the statement following landing on the local runways after the field had been made ready after several years work by local enthusiasts and following an inspection and approval of the Civil Aeronautics Administration by a Mr. Turner, inspector for the CAA, who approved the field with the comment to Chester Wheeler, "You now have a field to take care of passenger and freight flying post-war, and with additional improvement made in the meantime, it will be excellent."

The port has three runways, two of them being 2,400 feet long and 200 feet wide, while the third is 3,200 feet long and 200 feet wide.

Prior to CAA inspection, members of the Lions Club had painted wooden post markers at the end of the field a bright orange and the rock markers running parallel with landing strips white, while runways were maintained and improved. Temporary designation of the field calls for daylight operations, and a permanent designation is now in hands of CAA for approval and is expected to be approved before the present designation expires on March 16. Two new gates for the port are being donated by Mrs. C. C. West and are to be hung by Fred Watson. One gate will accommodate vehicles, while the other is smaller for pedestrians.

Wheeler and Whitten have just closed a purchase for a two-place Aronca Trainer powered by a 65-horse Lycoming engine and plan to place the plane on the local port as soon as they can arrange to erect a hangar. Possibly other light craft will be purchased in the near future by other enthusiasts. Gasoline storage tanks and pumps to care for plane servicing has been arranged for and will be installed on the field following permanent designation of the port.

Local Man Rounds Out 27th Year With Life Insurance Company; Record Investments In Savings By Texans Is Report Of Company

A record investment in savings on the part of Texans is indicated in the forty-second annual report to policyowners of Southwestern Life Insurance Company released here this week by C. F. O'Donnell, president, showing the largest business gains in the company's history since 1928.

Insurance in force at the close of 1944 gained \$31,709,407 for a total of \$481,718,273. Assets now total \$108,940,511, a gain of \$10,751,769 over assets reported at the close of 1943.

Mr. O'Donnell announced that the company had invested more than \$50,000,000 in United States government securities since Pearl Harbor. This, he said, was pursuant to the policy of investing all new premium money in such bonds adopted by Southwestern Life Insurance Company at the start of the war.

Mr. O'Donnell's report noted an expanding interest in pension plans in Texas, through which both large and small business enter-

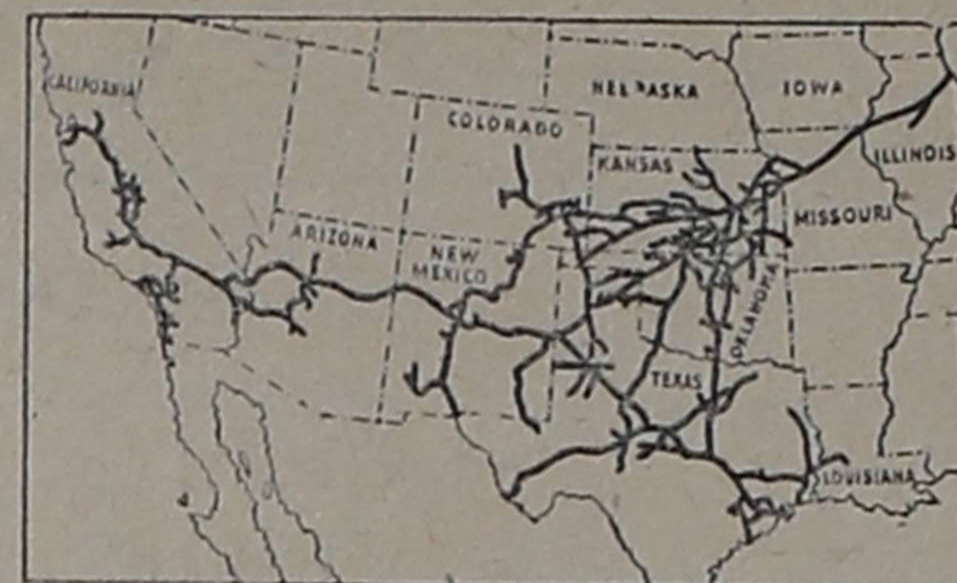
prises are providing retirement income for their permanent employees. In this connection, he said that since entering this field, the Southwestern Life Insurance Company has underwritten pension business on more than 60 of the 104 plans adopted in Texas.

While military deaths were high, overall statistics compared favorably with the company's five-year record, due to lower civilian mortality, Mr. O'Donnell said. 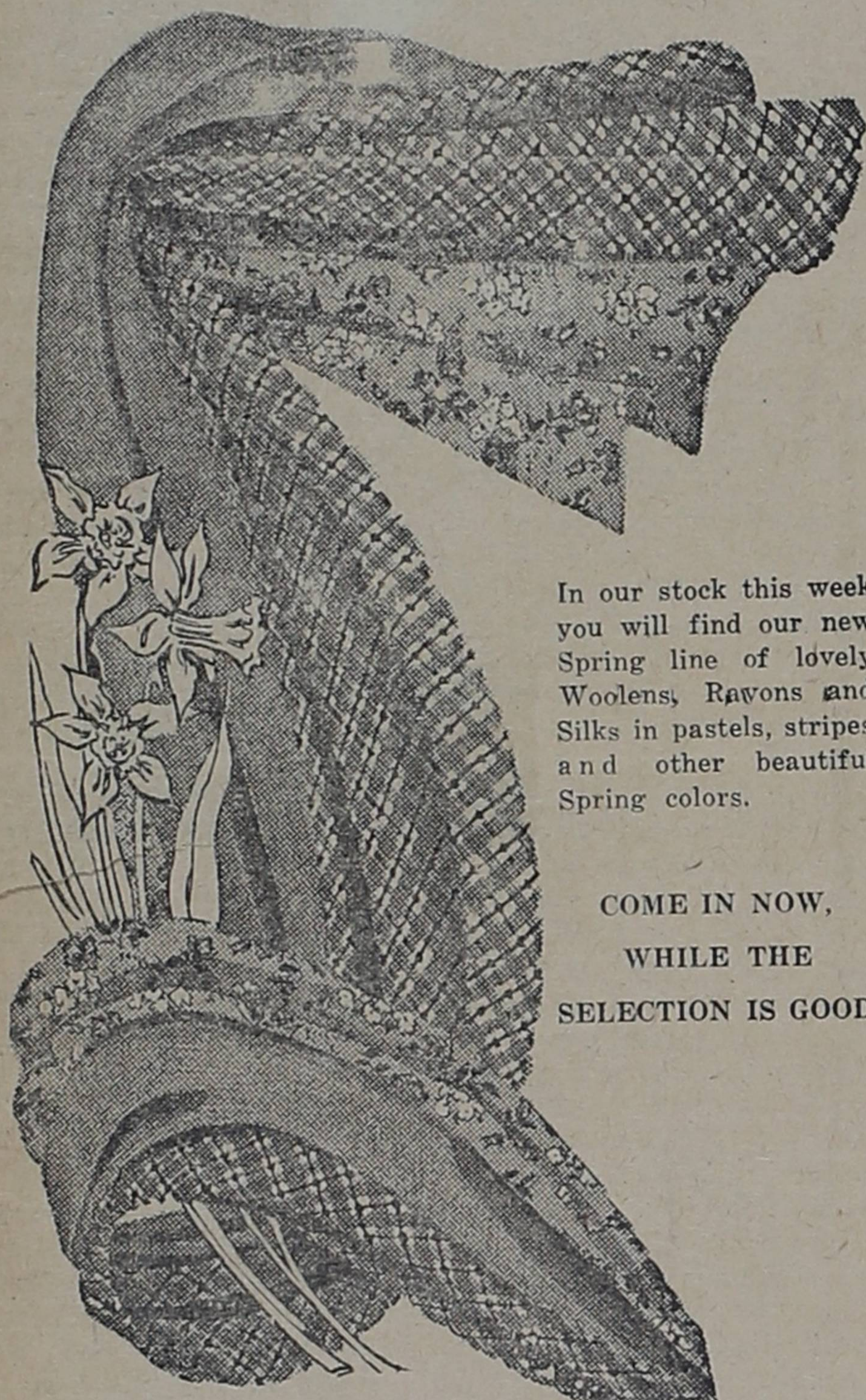

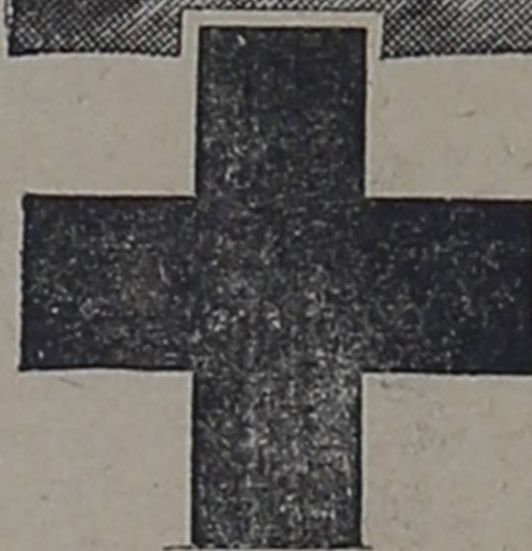

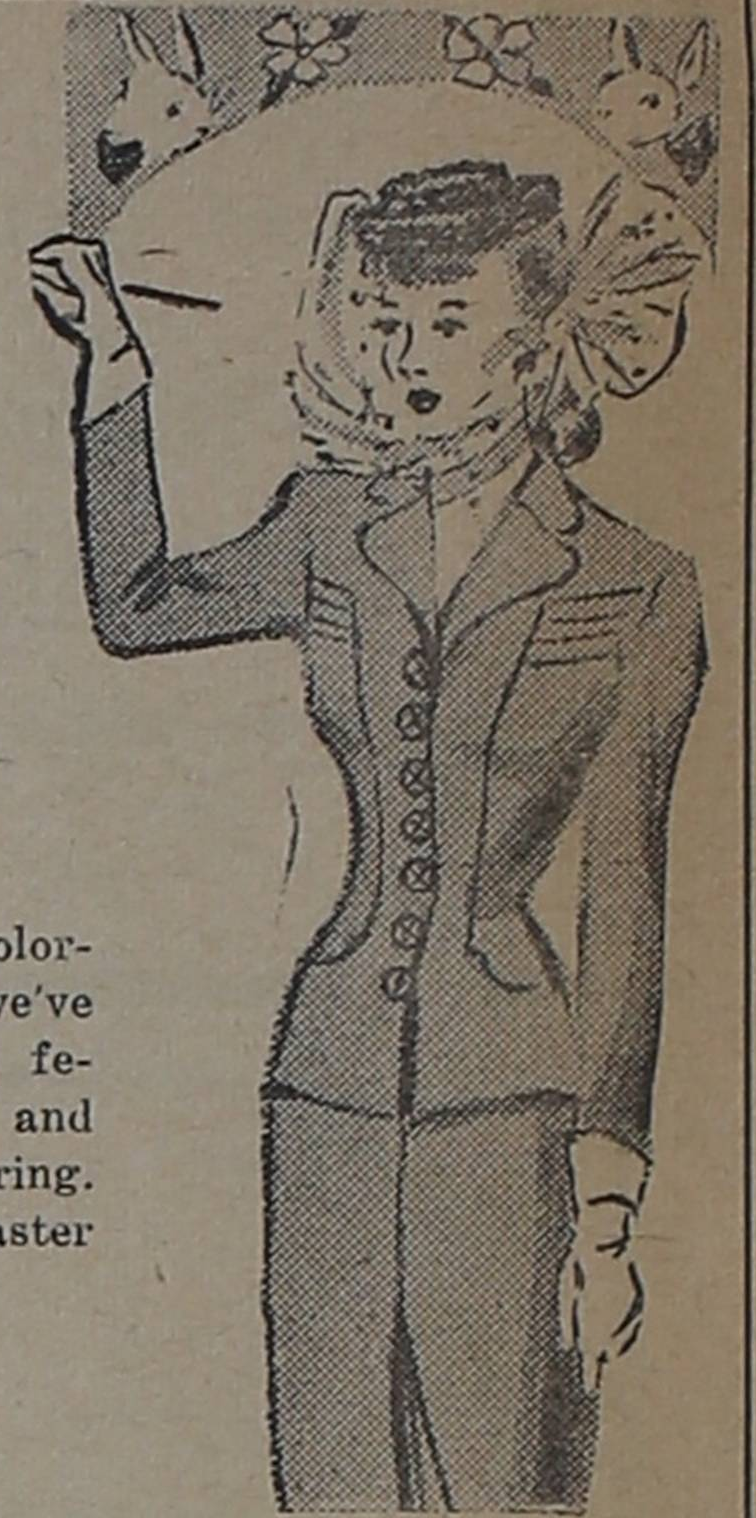
