Swimming Pool **Increase Seen** Soon In State

More than 140 public and private swimming pools will be built in Texas within five years after the war, according to a recent study by a prominent swimming

"Increased stress on swimming in the armed forces, the intensive instruction program of the Red Cross and the growing pollution of open waters will result in doubling swimming facilities everywhere," said Sylvian Hoffman, editor of Beach and Pool, who forecast that the nation will construct about 10,000 new pools in the first five postwar years.

Outdoor pools, now about 60 per cent of the total in operation throughout the country, will show

its sanitary features and ease of cleaning. Chief change will be a demand for new designs and more

use of color, he predicted. "In general, municipal pools will be larger, with wading and diving cause they yield a product with separated from swimming sections," Hoffman said. "Tile indoor pools will be in greatest demand by schools and colleges, where swimming, like other body building exercises, will be stepped up after the war," he declared.

Texas now has about 145 pools, according to estimates. Swimming facilities of private estates, camps, hotels, country clubs and pool operators, as well as municipalities, are included in this figure.

The greatest number of U. S. swimming pools—an estimated 4,-000 of the national total of 10,000 -are owned by municipalities and YMCA's, colleges, 2,500, while private estates claim 1,500 pools, country clubs 1,200 and commercial interests 800.

Many of these will insist on being made permanent. An example is the Fair Employment Practices Committee, set up by Executive order purportedly to help solve certain manpower problems during war-

A desperate attempt is now being made to make the F. E. P. C. permanent, from now on, and give it tremendous powers of control and regimentation over employment practices of merchant and

This proposed legislation stems from the influence of pres sure groups, highly organized, that make violent political threats against Congressmen who don't do as they are told.

The fight to make the F. E. P. C. permanent is being led in the House by Congressman Vito Marcantonio of New York, of the American Labor Party. Every radical organization in the country is supporting the move and there are some people who support it solely because they don't know of its vicious un-American provis-

Here, briefly, are some of results

the measure would bring about: 1. It would enable a bureau in Washington to tell the farmer and merchant affected whom they can hire, whom they can fire and whom they can promote. It would protect the lazy and the indolent.

2. It would allow the bureau to force school boards to hire teachers of minority races, regardless of the judgment of the trustees.

3. It would deprive the farmer and merchant of a right of trial by jury where a complaint be filed by a disgruntled jobholder or job seeker, claiming discrimination on account of race, religion, etc.

4. It would set up a system of regulations over employers, that would make F. E. P. C. the investigator, the prosecutor and the






