New Ambulance Needs New People To Operate It!

The Schleicher County Volunteer Emergency Medical Service has recently obtained a new ambulance vehicle. This unit is the box style instead of the van like those that have been in service. One older van style unit does remain in service so that two ambulances are available to the community and the county.

The E.M.S. is in need of more personnel to serve the county as ambulance attendants. The Texas Department of Health minimum requirements for emergency ambulance personnel is certification as Emergency Care Attendants. This requires about ninety hours of combined classroom study and skills practise. The state then administers both a written test and a skills test that must be passed before certification is awarded. Schleicher County E.M.S. is planning an E.C.A. Course to train new attendants.

The E.M.S. would like for people who are willing to join the ambulance service to take this course. More people are

needed to help provide emergency ambulance service twenty-four hours a day, 365 days a year for the people of Schleicher County. It does take time to go through the training and to attend the meetings and to make the runs when on call, but the reward is knowing that the emergency medical service will be there whenever it is needed.

The Emergency Care Attendant Course will begin April 4th and meet Tuesday and Thursday evenings from 6:30-9:30 p.m. until the course is completed. One Saturday may also be required which will involve practise in extricating accident victims from vehicles. For more information, call David Doran at the Schleicher County Sheriff's Office.

In Will Durant's monumental work *The Story of Civilization*, he has a phrase that needs to be heard in America today: "A civilization is born Stoic and dies Epicurean." This process is certainly at work in our nation. If we do not address it, we have only ourselves to blame for our decline.

The Stoics believed that life was meant to be lived in disciplined effort. Self-denial was a necessity for the good of the society as well as the individual. The virtuous life is one in which passions and emotions are mastered in order to achieve wisdom and knowledge. Pleasures are not evil, but they are secondary to the desire to work within the framework of natural law.

American history is filled with the examples of pioneers and founding fathers who surrendered their personal pleasures and desires for the good of the nation and others. It was through hard work and

sacrifice that a nation was built and sustained. They were willing to give even their lives so that the generations to come could have the freedom to seek and achieve their goals.

But something has happened over time in America, as it has in countless societies before ours. The children who have been blessed by the efforts of their fathers have accepted the gifts of their parents as rights rather than as efforts which must be sustained. We have moved away from self-discipline and responsibility and replaced virtue with the Epicurean belief that the center of life is to be found in the pleasures of the moment. What matters is what makes me feel good now.

ourselves and our society! For our freedoms and rights to be maintained it is going to mean sacrifice and concern for other's rights as well as my own.

I believe we stand at a crossroads in American history. We can continue down the road to selfishness and personal pleasure, avoiding personal responsibility. Or, we can choose the harder road of self-discipline and honest work in order to remain free to pursue the greater goals of life. But then again, maybe we don't care what happens to our children.

Severe Weather Spotters Training

It is severe weather season in the Concho Valley, and now is the time to make preparations and plans to help cope with the almost certain hazardous weather some of us will experience.

As part of the preparation and planning, the San Angelo Amateur Radio Club and the National Weather Service will sponsor a training and briefing session to teach persons who wish to become severe weather spotters the characteristics to watch for in thunderstorms. This vital information alerts the San Angelo National Weather Service Office that a potentially dangerous situation could be developing or approaching so that a timely warning could be issued for the threatened area. Larry Vanzozi, Warning Preparedness Meteorologist for West Texas, will conduct the teaching.

The agenda will include a briefing on the upgrading and

modernization of NWS which is not far off and includes installation of new equipment, such as the Doppler radar system, and relocation on the airport of the San Angelo National Weather Service Office. This information will be given by staff members of the San Angelo NWS Office.

Also, there will be a discussion of the highly successful spotter network ran mainly by amateur radio operators on the High Plains.

This meeting is open to the public and will be held in the Multipurpose Building at St. Luke's United Methodist Church, 2781 West Avenue N (enter on the Jade Street side), Saturday, March 26, 1994, between the hours of 8:30 a.m. and 12:30 p.m.

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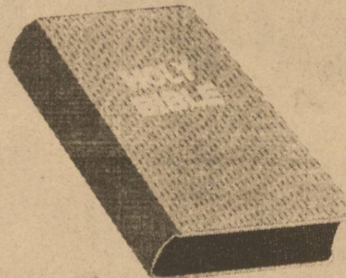

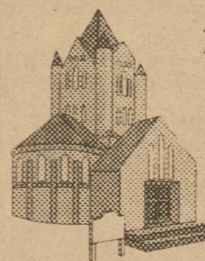

To whom or to what institution do you feel comfortable entrusting your health to? Is it the government, now headed by the Clintons and an army of people whose views and values about government

and life were largely formed in the 1960's? Or should it be the medical profession, which like any profession, has its share of questionable practitioners and profiteers, but has a far better track record than government in the trustworthy category?

In order for big

government to grow even bigger by gobbling up healthcare, it first must drive a wedge between patients and the trust they have traditionally placed in their doctors. So president Clinton, and especially Hillary Clinton, have accused doctors of being greedy and uncaring. They want to impose Marxist economic principles (from each according to his earning capacity, to each according to his needs) on medicine.

Language manipulation is another tactic used by those who seek to "reform" health care. Notice how the word *physician* is almost never used by these lobbyists for change. *Health care provider* has replaced it. People who used to be my patients are now *beneficiaries* or *consumers*. The effect, notes cardi thoracic surgeon and Baylor College of Medicine Chancellor, Dr. Michael DeBakey, "has been to move the profession of medicine toward a trade or a business and to drive a schism between the healer and the ailing, whose partnership is essential to a successful outcome."

Despite the pronouncements of Hillary Clinton, most physicians are not super rich. According to American Medical News (published by the AMA), the median annual income for

physicians is \$139,000, as compared to \$154,227 for lawyers. The administration is not trying to "cap" lawyers' fees, or those of TV Anchorpersons such as Diane Sawyer, who was just given a \$7 million dollar contract by ABC. Where are the government programs to lower the salaries of lawyers and network anchors in the name of "fairness?"

Physicians are required to have much more education and experience than lawyers or TV anchors, and most work a whole lot harder. Physicians spend four years in college, then another minimum of four in medical school. It takes between four and seven additional years in residency training before they become qualified to practice in any given field. And the debt incurred becoming prepared to work in the medical profession is staggering, running in some cases as high as half a million dollars.

Again, Dr. DeBakey offers a strong defense of the medical profession against attacks by administration critics: "Physicians are repeatedly censured in the press for greediness and 'profiteering,' while athletes, rock musicians, and other entertainers, some of them school dropouts, have become national heroes. Patients complain, for example, about a fee of \$50 for an office visit to a physician while eagerly paying several-fold that amount for a ticket to a concert or game."

Michael DeBakey is an inspiring role model and one of my medical heroes. I believe the dedication, skills, and bedside manner of many physicians, like Dr. DeBakey, will become scarce if government becomes medicine's dictator.

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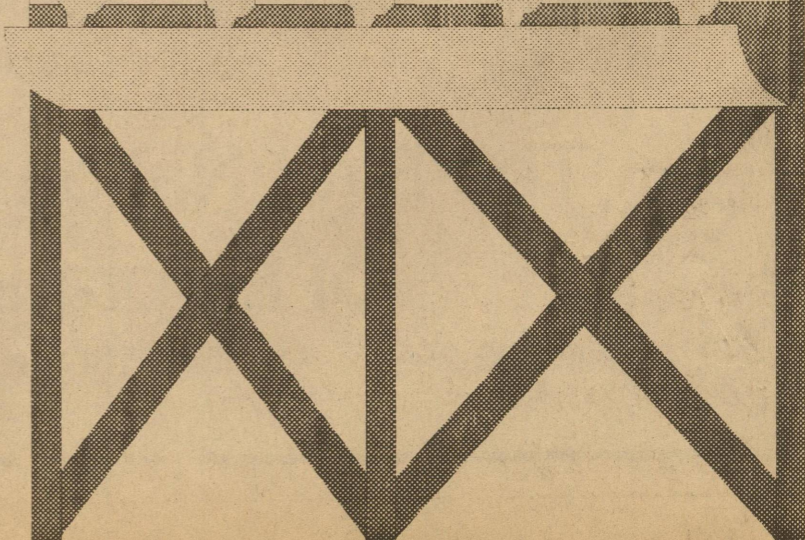

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Schleicher County Library Book Review

The recent passing of several long time Schleicher County residents has caused me to reflect on this earlier generation. Here in Texas, and especially West Texas, we are fortunate that we are still so closely connected to the generation that settled here in the 1800's. It is still not uncommon for a man, albeit elderly himself, to regale his grandchildren with tales of his boyhood living on the old "homeplace." Nor is it uncommon for the grandchildren to live on that same place still. These were a hearty breed of men and women who took a wild land and through determination and a strong back gave us what we have today.

With this in mind, I began to browse through the Texas section of the Schleicher County Library. I found treasures untold. Not only is this collection extensive, it covers almost any Texas topic imaginable.

Of course, their books dealing with the early days before stachood (El Lobo and Spanish Gold, Llano Estacado) and books about the days of the big ranches (Cattle Kings of Texas, Old Ranches of the Texas Plains, 6,000 Miles of Fence, Life on the XIT Ranch of Texas).

Books about the cowboy are in abundance (The Negro Cowboy, The Last of A Breed, The Working Cowboy, Campfires and Cattle Trails).

Other professions have not been slighted either (Old Oil Fields, The Texas Ranger, Six Years With The Texas Rangers).

There are regional books. Pick your favorite part of Texas and you can read all about it. (The Staked Plains, Hill Country, Tales From The Big Thicket, The Romance of the Davis Mountains, Big Bend Country, The Big Ranch Country).

There are wonderful coffee table size picture books (The Texas Gulf Coast, Texas Wild: The Land, Plants and Animals of the Lone Star State, Rio Grande: Mountain To The Sea, Texas: A Salute From Above).

Cities have also received their share (Fabulous San Antonio, Ft. Worth - Texas Most, The Lusty Texans of Dallas).

Contemporary topics have not been slighted (Incident at Eagle Ranch, Santa Claus Bank Robbery), nor have women (Pioneer Women of Texas, First Lady of Home Creek, Home Builders of West Texas, of particular interest were the sections on Annie Dickinson Tankersley, Edith Black Winslow, and Judith Bronaugh Mansfield Hill).

Many of the books I saw defied categorizing (The Texas Courthouse, Famous Trees Of Texas, Backroads of Texas, Roadside Geology, Texas Range Grasses, Roadside Flowers of Texas, 1001 Texas Place Names, Missions of

Texas, A Guide to Historic Texas Inns and Hotels).

Of course there is a large selection of books by J. Frank Dobie, Elmer Kelton and Ben K. Green. Of particular interest to me were books by local authors: Alan R. Bosworth, New Country and Ozona Country, V.I. Pierce's Yesterday in Ozona and Crockett County, Judge Orlan L. Sims' Cowboy's, Nesters and so forth, Cowman to Cutler, Remembering Gene Newman in the Words Of Those Who Knew Him.

I believe I will mention here that perhaps the best History of Schleicher County was compiled by the Schleicher County Historical Society. There are a very few of these books left and can be bought for \$25.00 each and are a real bargain.

It was exceedingly hard to pick up one book to write on but I found one I just could not pass over, The Oldtime Cowhand by Ramon F. Adams and illustrated by Nick Eggenhofer. I enjoyed it so much that when turned it

into the library I realized it was overdue.

I'm sure you think you know all about the cowboy. Well, let me tell you something, you don't know "nothing" until you have read this book. This is not just a book with a detailed encyclopedia of what a cowboy was. It deals with his life before the fences came, his ethics, his humor, his morals, his code of honor.

There is a large section on equipment, the cowboy as well as his horses. There is an even larger section on rules, every aspect of his job as well as his play was governed by them.

All of this is told in readable, attention holding, detailed prose that paints a picture of a man larger than life itself, a man whose likes we shall never see again. Every country has its man who eventually becomes a mythical hero, the cowboy was ours.

All of the above mentioned books can be found in the Texas section of the Schleicher County Library.
