Lower Utility Rates Now In Effect Here

A new and lower rate schedule is now in effect for Eldorado electricity users, according to Jerry Pennington, local manager of the West Texas Utility Co., who states that his company is making lower schedules, this year in most of the cities which it serves.

As an example of the saving, a residential customer using 100 KWH will have a saving in his electric bill of about 20 percent. A commercial customer using 1000 KWH per month will have a saving of about \$4.50. The new rates are now in effect and will be reflected on the next (July) bill.

First Big Producer Brought In At Koy's

Climaxing a week's rumors to the effect that Cooper Gas Co. might have something, Schleicher County's first big producer was brought in early Sunday morning on Jess Koy's ranch.

Flowing Monday at 110 barrels of high gravity oil from two zones Cooper Gas Co. of San Angelo No. 1A Jess Koy oil well showed indications of being the most promising oil discovery east of the Permian basin in many years. The company immediately showed faith in the well to the extent of staking off locations for several other tests in that locality, at least one of which, a short distance west, is to be drilled soon if materials are available.

The bringing in of the well has provided the go-ahead signal for rapid developments. George D. Morgan, high-ranking official with Cooper, has been on location practically 24 hours per day, and other specialists have been brought in from Dallas, Odessa, San Angelo and other places, as the well is groomed along toward maximum production.

The first oil flow was from open 2-inch tubing and casing perforations between 5605 to 5640 feet—and by Railroad Commission test it ran 90.75 barrels in two hours. Per-

Jess Koy at last has something over Henry Speck! Old rivals, the two have locked horns over ranching, calf roping and everything relating thereto for years. A short time ago Henry gave Jess a trouncing in the calf roping arena, the second time he has done that in a public matched roping.

Now Jess has something Henry doesn't have and the latter admits it when he says, "Guess Jess has me beat on an oil well!"

Horses are still Rancher Koy's first love and his Black Angus cattle are his second. Koy has been so indifferent to the drilling operations on his place that Saturday night, when the lowliest rough neck was excited over bringing in what they were certain would be a producer, Koy was asleep and did not answer his phone until after daybreak Sunday. Then later in the morning he vaccinated a prize horse!

Tuesday, when the crew was running a thick stream of oil into a slush pit, Koy asked what would happen if the oil ran down a draw and his cattle drank some of it!

Lewis Ballew made a heroic dive just before dawn Tuesday morning, when he jumped in to close a valve, and thus stopped heavy flow of oil from the well which had gotten out of control and had been running wild for half an hour. Ballew works on a night shift at the No. 1A Koy producer.

forating of a second zone higher up more than doubled the flow. By mid-week the well had been killed a second time to allow perforation of casing opposite a third zone, from 5340 to 5413 feet.

As the third zone seems to be mainly gas bearing, gas will be conveyed out for commercial use, if it flows in sufficient quantities, operators state.

The Koy well, though the first major producer in the county, is not the first to produce oil. The Cooper No. 1C Page well flows 25 barrels per day. Activity in the county started about 1931, and included development of several gassers, and abandoning of several tests as dry holes. Henderson, McBurnett, Page and other ranches have been included in the drilling area.

Though the oil boom town is now a thing of the past, it is generally conceded that Eldorado's business and residential districts will feel definite effects of intensive oil activity—especially if other companies develop their leases, as will probably be the case.

Most of Schleicher County is already under lease, but it is expected that there will be more buying and selling as development is stimulated.

Uniforms Issued To Band Members

C. F. Jones will continue his band instruction at the Eldorado school through next year, and uniforms are now being issued to present band members, according to announcement made recently by Mr. Jones.

Issuing of the uniforms precedes a public appearance of the band which will be in a few weeks.

Enough uniforms are on hand for the summer class, but additional ones must be provided for the fall term. Band parents in regular session Friday night considered this and other questions which have arisen concerning the group.

Mr. Jones states that he has decided to remain in Eldorado and continue to teach next year, after which he may start work on his remaining two years of college medical courses.

Sodding Underway On Football Field

Sodding of the Eldorado football field is under way, as interested school officials and boosters, and Eldorado High School students make preparations for the 1946 football season which will open in September.

Sodding operations include planting of sod in each square yard of surface. The two to five-inch covering of dirt, applied in January by the county, provides an excellent base for the sod, the workers state, and they also report that Sunday morning's rain benefitted the grass. Jerry Pennington, Supt. Reynolds, Al Vance and the squad members have been carrying out the project.

The workers report that their chief difficulty is an inadequate water supply, as the small pipe must convey water also for arena calves and goats, Tom Smith hogs, and other users in the locality, and a larger water line is needed.

Dial equipment from Concho Field, where there were 330 stations has been transferred by the San Angelo Telephone Co., to Eldorado, to be utilized in installation of the dial system here. There will be at least 425 patrons here when new customers are provided with telephone service.

MRS. J. R. WORD, ELDORADO'S OLDEST RESIDENT, 88 YEARS OLD WEDNESDAY

"My neck is long and skinny and I take things easy, I'll live a long time!" Three quarters of a century ago Mrs. John R. Word began saying that; Wednesday she celebrated her 88th birthday in Eldorado.

Her birthday on June 12 was observed quietly. Relatives who were here attended a family dinner, and family and friends sent cards and letters. The anniversary of her birth is an event in Eldorado. Grandmother Word is now Eldorado's oldest citizen!

She was born June 12, 1858 at Moberly, Mo., and came with her parents to Texas when she was an infant. She was reared in Collin County and her husband, whom she married on Oct. 5, 1876, came from Hunt County. There the couple lived a number of years, later moving with their five small children to Willbarger County.

At about the turn of the century the Words moved to Sonora, a young town boasting only a few families. Mr. Word ranched for many years, while the family lived in town, joining him at the ranch for an occasional outing. The family home was razed in the big Sonora fire, after which Mr. Word built a residence in the schoolhouse locality. Widowed since Nov. 23, 1918, she eventually moved to this city to make her home with her son, Bill.

Washington News Letter

By Congressman Fisher

The legislative mill has been grinding away of late and has plenty of unfinished business to attend to before the recess in July. The Senators have been working at night and the House will likely come to that soon.

The Senate, after waiting three months to act on a House-approved bill to continue Selective Service for a year, finally amended and passed it. A conference committee of the two houses is now working out the differences. There is plenty of time to whip the measure into shape and pass it before July 1st when the stop-gap, temporary law now in force, expires.

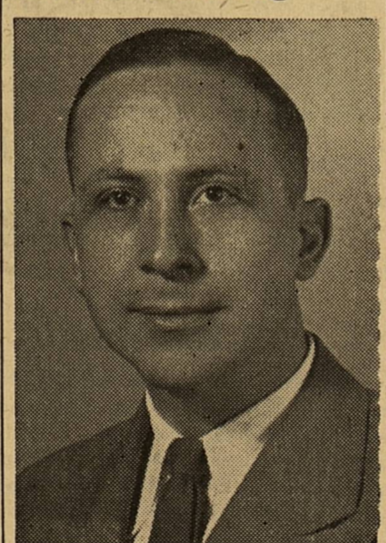
The appointment of Fred Vinson of Kentucky to be Chief Justice came as quite a surprise to Capitol Hill. Vinson served a long time in the House and is well known by many who served with him. He left Congress to take an appointment to one of the District of Columbia courts, which is a reward not infrequently given to Administration stalwarts in Congress. Then came the war and Vinson, who is admittedly a capable administrator, was given other duties in the government.

But as a lawyer, the Kentuckian is said to be only average. In recent years it has grown to be a sort of custom to appoint Supreme Court judges on a basis of political philosophy rather than legal ability.

Speaking of the Supreme Court, that tribunal has handed down a number of far-reaching decisions recently. Some of these have been contrary to established precedent of decisions made by the court previously. One was the outlawing of Jim Crow laws on interstate busses and trains. State laws that require segregation on such carriers are therefore stricken down. These segregation laws in the South had on other occasions been upheld by the courts.

The court also held that the Congress does not have the power to prohibit the payment of funds appropriated as wages to specified individuals. That came up over an Act of Congress passed two years ago which I supported—which prohibited the payment of appropriated money to three men who were named and were working in government departments. The reason for that action by Congress was that those men had, upon investigation, been found to be subversive in their beliefs. That is to say, they

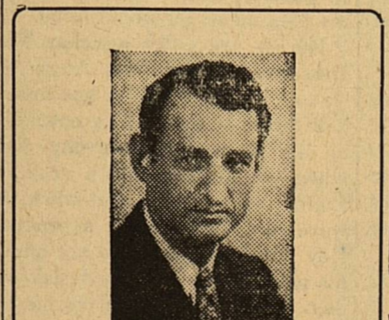

At the Ed Finigan ranch Building, in Schleicher County, Texas, Election Precinct No. 4, with Ed Finigan as Presiding Officer.

At the Mayer No. 2 School House Building, in Schleicher County, Texas, Election Precinct No. 5, with Joe Ruff, Jr., as Presiding Officer.

At the Alexander School House Building, in Schleicher County, Texas, Election Precinct No. 6, with E. F. Ramsel as Presiding Officer.

At the Cliff School House Building, in Schleicher County, Texas, Election Precinct No. 8, with J. F. Runge as Presiding Officer.

At the Reynolds School House Building, in Schleicher County, Texas, Election Precinct No. 9, with E. W. Craig as Presiding Officer.
