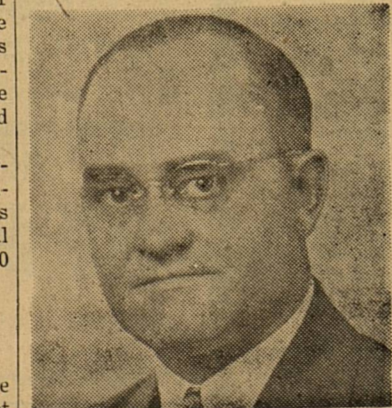

### ELECTRIC SHOP OPENS SEPT. 14th IN BEARCE BLDG.

B. L. Blakeway, returned serviceman, and former resident of San Angelo, has chosen Saturday, Sept. 14, for the opening of his new electric shop in the Bearce building.

Mr. Blakeway and his assistant, John Teague, also a veteran, have been in Eldorado about two weeks. After leasing the building Mr. Blakeway started on a complete renovating job, adding shelving, changing partitions and painting the interior. The business is located on paving, across the street from Frozen Foods.

Mr. Blakeway has franchise for Frigidaire appliances for the growing Southwest Texas Electric Co-op, now serving Schleicher and parts of several other counties, and also has franchise for the city of Sonora. He will do electric wiring and other repair work in addition to selling Frigidaire merchandise.

The owner and his assistant will hold an open house Saturday, and invite the general public to visit the store when in town for the Lamb Sale.

Last minute details and plans for the annual Lamb Sale were worked out at the regular meeting of the Lions Club Wednesday. The committee which, in cooperation with those from the PTA, canvassed San Angelo merchants Tuesday, reported very good luck on their trip, stating that approximately \$1,000 in donations and bids are promised from that city.

Committees to serve the barbecue Saturday, and to take up tickets for the football game Friday evening, were appointed by President Jimmie West. Some discussion of the proposed new hotel was made, but no definite action taken.

Guests present included: Olin Fenner, Soil Conservationist, D. L. Rogers of the Parker Drilling Co., and Max Henry, son-in-law of C. C. McLaughlin.

Work on the street paving continues rapidly with the contractors and city engineer pleased with the way the work is progressing, moving ahead of schedule, and the response and cooperation with which the citizens have met the contractors' needs.

Allan L. Sanders, city engineer, states that he is very proud of the town in that they had already contracted \$9,000 worth of paving for private property owners. "This is unusual for a town of this size, and denotes a strong civic pride," Mr. Sanders stated. The engineer stated that it would greatly speed the work and prevent delays if owners who desire paving done in front of their property, to please decide and let him know at the time the equipment is moved on their street. Many have waited until the equipment was moved away before deciding, thus making it hard on the contractors.

Since many have asked about the cost for paving, the following estimation is available: all streets that have 100 ft. right of way, owners paving is 26¼ ft. wide by the length of the lot. On 60 ft. right of way, owners portion is 7¾ ft. wide by length of lot. On 90 ft. right of way, it is 21½ ft. by length of the lot. All work is done at \$1.40 a yard which includes the complete cost—an 8 inch flexible base and the black top.

Those desiring this work done are to see Mr. Sanders at any time during the day. He drives the little blue jeep.

**Shriveled Pickles**

Shriveled pickles may be due to the strength of brine used. Too strong a solution of salt, sugar or vinegar may cause this. It can also be due to overcooking the pickles. Start pickles with a weak rather than a strong solution, and each day make the brine stronger by adding salt, or by boiling down the syrup of sugar and vinegar if that type of pickle is being made, or by adding more vinegar or more sugar to the solution.

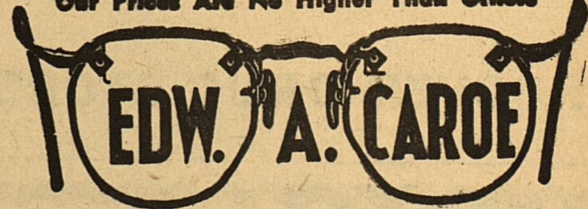
