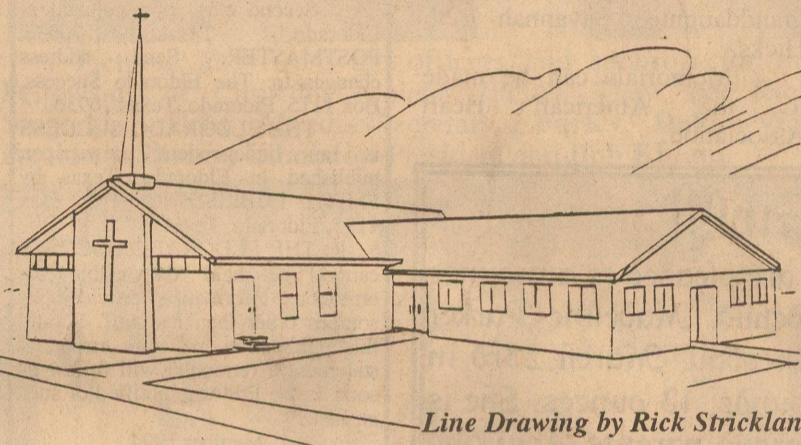
A delicious chili-dog lunch was served to workers by Nancy Lester and her "Lunch

Community Baptist Church To Host Dedication Activities

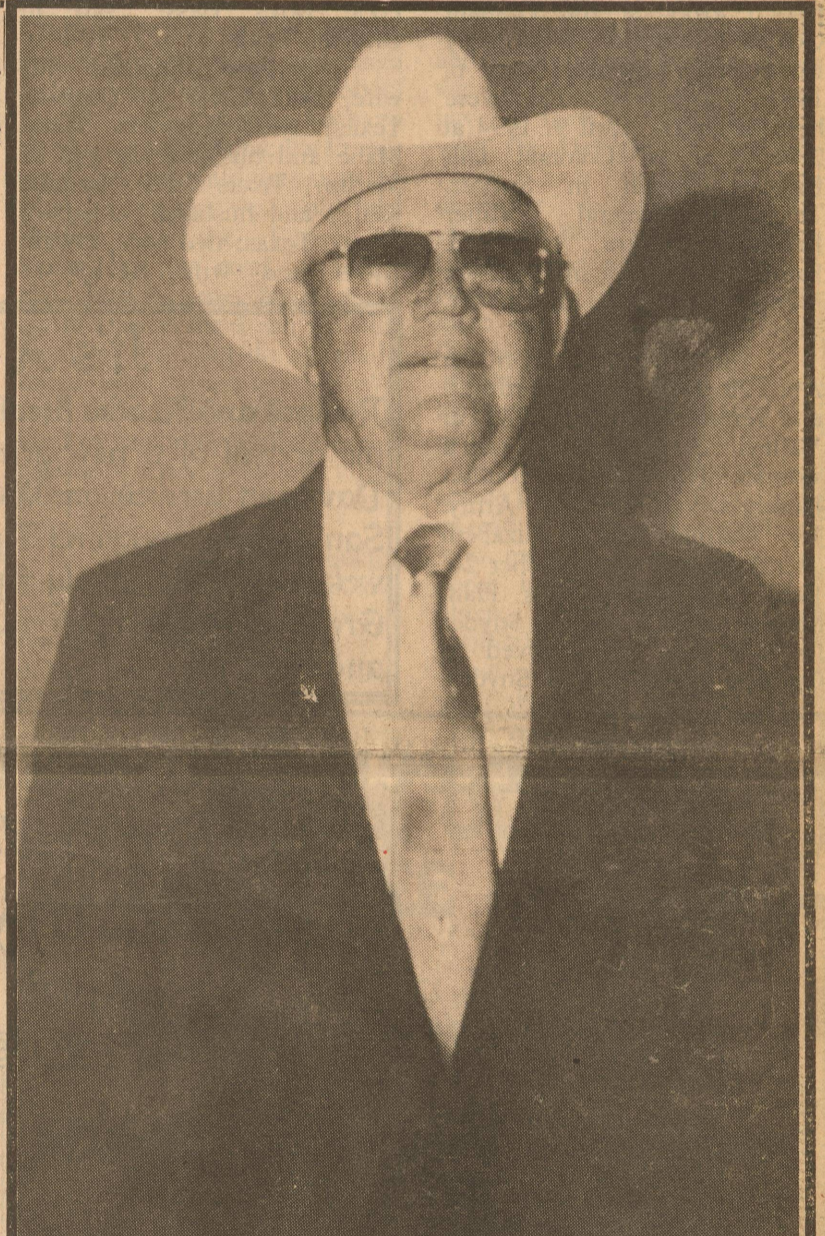

On Sunday, April 17th, Community Baptist Church of Eldorado will host dedication activities of its newly refurbished and remodeled church facilities, featuring special services including guest preachers and musicians, dinner-on-the ground, and an afternoon of gospel singing. Refurbishing began in September, 1993, and includes the installation of steel beams, acoustical ceiling, new roof, remodeling nursery and rest room facilities, pew cushions, carpeting, and both interior and exterior painting.

Special guests include the contractors involved in the remodeling project and several singing groups. Dr. Lynn Eckerberger, Director of Missions, Concho Valley Baptist Association, will preach the dedicatory message.

During the month of October, 1992, Community Baptist Church was constituted as a Southern Baptist Church and purchased the former First Christian Church building located at 12 East Warner, Eldorado. Several pastors served the church during the interim prior to the calling of a full-time pastor. On June 6, 1993, the church called Dr. R. Byron Orand as its first pastor, and he began his service on July 1, 1993. In October, 1993, Community Baptist Church was received into the fellowship of the Concho Valley Baptist Association, the Baptist General Convention of Texas, and the Southern Baptist Convention.

The members and pastor of Community Baptist Church invite the public to attend services beginning at 11:00 a.m. and to tour the reconditioned facilities.

Editor's Journal

TOP OF THE DIVIDE by Thomas Giovannitti

The other day I had to take one of my children to a hospital in San Angelo, to get some x-rays taken. The original appointment had been set up by a doctor there. I called to change the original appointment because of a conflict and the radiology department person said there was no problem. In fact I had to do this twice. With an abundance of caution I called the hospital radiology people the day before my son's appointment and confirmed the time when he was supposed to be photographed.

Very early that morning when we arrived at the hospital we went directly to radiology. They had never heard of us. What! I just talked to someone here yesterday and you confirmed the appointment. No,

we had to go to "Out patient" admitting. (There's an oxymoron for you!)

At out patient admitting I began by giving the clerk all of the information she asked for. I can't figure out how hospital clerks can type without ceasing even when I was clearing my throat. Just before she completed her interrogation she asked me why I had taken my son to the doctor. Wait! He was sick that's why! Aren't you just a clerk? I didn't think they used doctors for the admitting process. She was very polite (I was not) and after a few seconds she gave me the bottom copy of the printout and told me to go to radiology.

We did. It was now about 8:15. Our appointment had been

at eight. So, we took a seat and looked at those hospital waiting room magazines. You know they ones I mean, they are always several months old and aside from the odd news magazine, they are usually on obscure things that only doctors or hospital personnel must enjoy.

I was looking through a magazine called "Yachting Monthly." It consisted mainly of advertisements of yachts for sale (or is that sail?). I think the cheapest boat in the book was a quarter of a million dollars - as if people sitting in x-ray labs all could afford such things.

They finally took Nicolas in about eight thirty, not a long wait by hospital standards, and

he was out in about an hour and a half. You'll have to have him tell you about the picture session.

As ethics is the theory of what is right and wrong and the reasons behind those choices, morality is the activity which follows out of our ethics. A person is moral if they do what is right and refuse to do what is wrong. It is a matter of making a choice and following through with it. It is a seemingly easy concept, but the living of morality is often not so easy.

Our society is much more comfortable saying "yes," than it is saying "no!" We become ill at ease when we have to set limits for ourselves and others because we are disturbed by the problems it can cause. It is often easier to say yes than it is to live with the consequences of saying "no" in the short term.

Dr. Scott Peck has written extensively in the area of personal growth. He points out that there is a constant pull in life toward entropy. Entropy is the scientific tendency of bodies in motion to come to rest. In human life, entropy is the tendency of a person to become comfortable rather than to grow, because growth almost always entails strain and discomfort.

Insights

Every human being, to some degree, refuses to grow because it is difficult to do so. We refuse to grow in maturity because it is easier to be childish and selfish. We refuse to grow emotionally, because it means risk of being hurt. We refuse to grow in our relationships because we do not want to exert the effort to change. In short, we want to protect our comfort zone in life.

Now do not confuse comfort with happiness. All of us are unhappy with certain aspects of who we are. We would like to be friendlier, more involved, more giving and kind. Many of us would like to lose weight or become more knowledgeable in certain areas. We are unhappy because we have not reached our potential in life. Nevertheless, we do not become what we want to become, or change what we need to change, because we do not want to put forth the effort and risk the pain that change entails. We had rather be comfortable than happy.

If you think this is not true, just think of your own life a moment. Are there not some

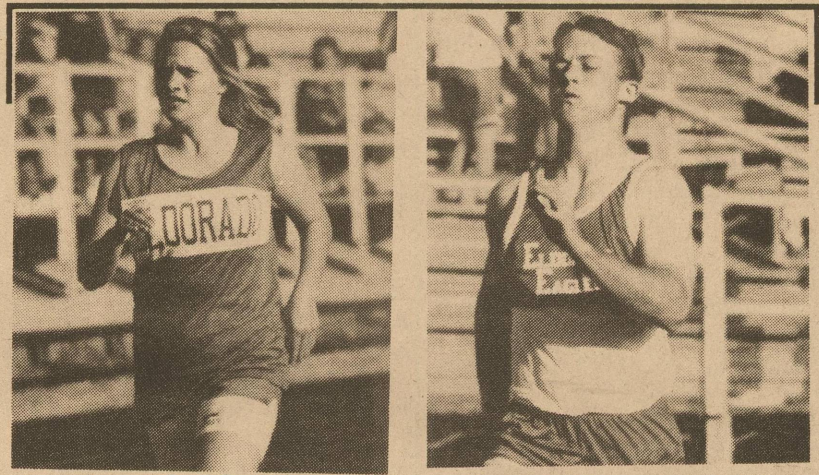
areas in your life with which you are unhappy? Couldn't you change them if you were really willing to pay the price to do so? Every honest person has to admit it is true. It is easier to be lazy and comfortable than it is to work and change even if we know we could be more comfortable if we did change.

And this brings us back to morality and our dislike of saying no and setting limits. Our desire for comfort over growth and responsibility is often seen in our home relationships. Parents give in to their children to avoid a fight or uneasiness in the home, even though they know that saying no is the right thing to do. We become angry if someone else disciplines our children for what they do wrong because it disturbs our comfort zone. We know what is right, but we do not want to put forth the effort to take a stand for what is right. The irony is, however, if we do not make the effort to set limits on our children the odds are that

we will pay a much higher price in the future, and so will they.

Our government often acts on the comfort principle. It really does not matter if what they do is right, so much as it matters that the fewest number of people are disturbed. Politicians pledge to change the way things work in government, and we all cry for them to do so as long as it does not make us uncomfortable. But change and growth is always uncomfortable, and eventually we are going to have to pay the price.

Many of our problems in America are based on our choice of comfort over morality. Until we are willing to say "no" to what is wrong, and "yes" to what is right even if it makes us uncomfortable, we are not going to see growth and change in this nation. And the only way our nation will change is if we as individuals are willing to make changes in our own lives. Will we choose what is right, or will we choose entropy and ease?

Kindergarten Round-Up Wednesday, April 20th

Wednesday, April 20, 1994 at 3:00 p.m., Kindergarten Round-up will be held in the Multi-Purpose room of the Schleicher County Independent School District Administration Building. This event will enroll children in SCISD Kindergarten for the 94-95 School year. At this time, parents of prospective kindergartners will fill in enrollment forms, learn about the kindergarten curriculum, and meet the kindergarten teachers.

This event is helpful to both the parents and the school. Parents can pre-register their child for school, and learn what skills will help their child's transition into kindergarten. The school can get an idea of how many students will be enrolled in kindergarten the following

year, and get a head start on the paper work involved in registering new students.

Parents who come to kindergarten round-up will need to bring a certified copy (not a hospital copy) of their child's birth certificate, a copy of their child's immunization record, and their child's Social Security Card. (Children who attended KID'S KAMPUS do not need to bring these records as they are already on file.)

In order to hasten the process of registration, the kindergarten teachers ask that no children come to the round-up. If you cannot come to round-up, please pre-register your child in the elementary office so your child will be included in the class roster when school starts.

Antibiotic Abuse

I read an article in NEWSWEEK on March 28, 1994, titled: ANTIBIOTICS: THE END OF MIRACLE DRUGS? WARNING: NO LONGER EFFECT AGAINST KILLER BUGS. After reading this I realized how we have misused and abused antibiotics. At one time or another we have all been guilty of this. It's Friday night and our child gets sick. So what do we do, we could take him/her to the Emergency Room, but that costs too much and besides we have some antibiotics on hand and we start them on this. But do we really know what we are treating. We don't know if the "sore throat" is viral or bacterial. Antibiotics are useless when you have a virus. They are used for bacterial infections.

Sometimes if one doctor tells us our infection is viral and does not prescribe an antibiotic we go to one who will. Also if a doctor prescribes an antibiotic that says take 3 times a day for 10 days, then that is how long

we should take it. Otherwise the bugs that did not get killed after taking the medicine just 5 days, begin to grow even stronger and become more resistant than before.

We must try to encourage one another to stop misusing and abusing antibiotics, while we still have some that work. I have worked for over 5 years with Dr. Deborah G. Peaslee. She is a Pediatrician (a specialist in the care of children). We are very fortunate to have her practicing in our community. This winter we have seen throat/ear infections that have not gotten well with one antibiotic. Dr. Peaslee has had to try different antibiotics to get the infection cleared up.

If you have not read this article in Newsweek, I urge you to read it. It is very informative. You must read it. If you do come in the clinic and have given your child some antibiotics at home, please let us know as this will help in determining the care of your child or you.
