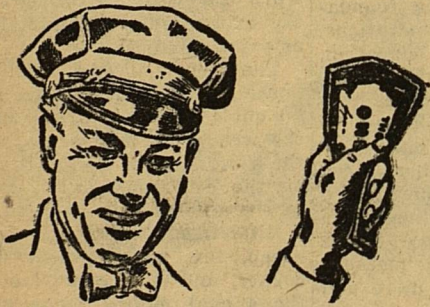

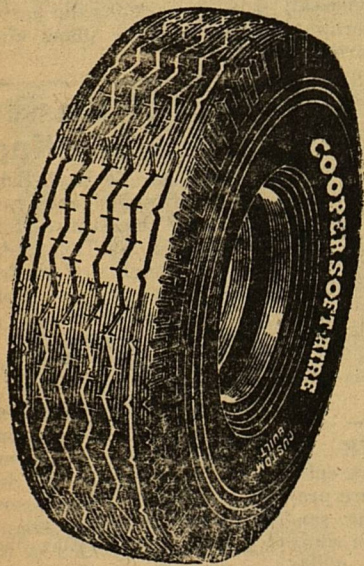

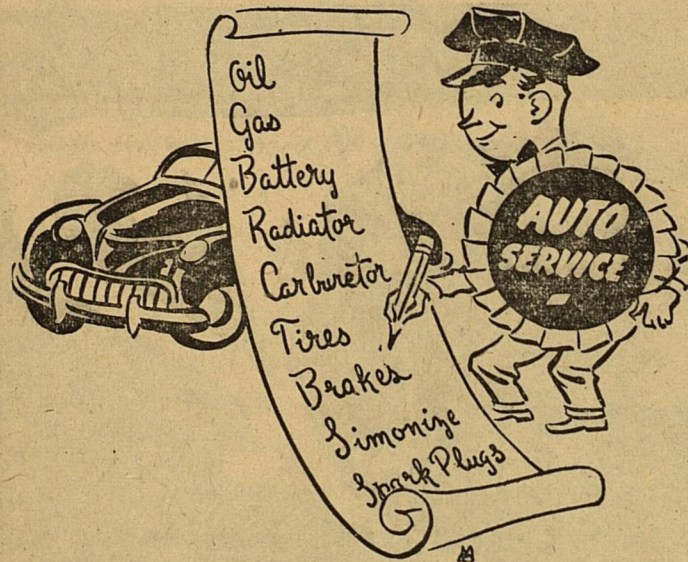

"My address is: Don Bosco School, 140 Hangchow Road, Shanghai, China.
"Good bye Sir Your boy January, A Lee Fu."
